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### Alexandra District Health to offer local cancer treatments

ALEXANDRA District Health (ADH) is delighted to announce that they will be offering oncology services.

Dr Yang Wang commenced at ADH on Thursday, July 31, and spoke to our newspaper on the same day. Dr Wang has been based at Eastern Health for the past six months, and has previously worked at different health networks, including Monash, Northern Health and Peter McCallum Cancer Centre.

He said, "I've seen a broad range of capabilities and have a lot of oncology experience training different sites."

He explained that the opportunity to work at ADH came up about a month ago, as part of a collaboration between Eastern Health and Alexandra District Health. They sent out an expression of interest and he applied and got the job.

He'll initially be working at ADH one day per week, on a Thursday for the whole day. There is also an opportunity for this to increase in the future.

From Dr Wang's side, he will be providing medical oncology services. A specialist nurse, Molly Kitson, will be joining the team in a month and she will be able to deliver infusion treatments, such as immunotherapy targeted treatments, and then once they have the capability, they will be looking to expand that as well

Nathan Willoughby, Interim Director of Clinical Services, said, "The impetus probably came about from the development of the Health Service Networks, of which we're part of the East Metro Murrindindi Health Service Network, with Eastern Health and St Vincent's. As part of that collaboration, we were looking for something that would benefit the community, and this was one of the very first identified areas of need, essentially providing and meeting one of those key goals of providing care closer to home. We know that we've got people who are driving over an hour and a half to go down for these treatments. There's generally support people around the individual patients who are taking days off work as well in order to support people to do this. It was a nobrainer as far as 'what's something that we can hopefully come to an agreement with'. Eastern Health is providing the oncology services outreaching to us here at Alexandra District Health.

"A lot of goodwill from all the parties, in particular some really enthusiastic interest from the Director of Cancer services, Dr Phillip Parente, who has been one of the driving forces to get this through and ensure that we can start out with the intended one day

per week in order to provide the consultation service with Doctor Wang, and then Molly Kitson who is the clinical nurse consultant who's been employed to provide a transfusion service for chemotherapy.

"We identified a space that we have available here to facilitate this, and certainly it's come together very quickly and was organised within the space of a couple of months," he said.

Natasha Bowater, Director of Quality and Risk at ADH, added, "I think it's a great opportunity for our local community... It's a great opportunity for us and we need to obviously be able to do it safely here at ADH. We're opening it up and making it available. We're doing it within our existing capabilities here at Alexandra and working with our partners at Eastern Health to be able to develop this service and see how that might evolve in the future. There might be an opportunity in the future for us to upskill and train our existing staff, but certainly this is how we've set it up for now and we can see how that develops and evolves, but there's some great opportunities at a number of different levels, most importantly for the health and wellbeing of our local community."

It was pointed out that people who have already been diagnosed and are receiving treatment can potentially transfer to the ADH service, depending on the regimen they're on, by speaking with their GP and getting a referral to the oncology services at Eastern Health. ADH are able to take calls and direct people appropriately where they need to be.

It will certainly save a lot of time for people who are currently travelling to Lilydale or beyond.

Dr Wang said, "Starting off will be clinical reviews, looking after a lot of patients at who drive for an hour and a half down to Lilydale to see us once every few weeks or so, so even just cutting out that review, it does help to save time for them."

Asked whether the service is a trial or ongoing, Nathan responded, "We're committing to this. It's been agreed to that this is something that we're doing as part of the partnership to have been established with the local Health Service Networks."

People in all locations are welcome to access the service, including all the towns in the shire and beyond.

ADH CEO Jane Poxon said, "I am so excited. I've had a bit of a vision for a little while. I do have a bit of a passion around oncology and I think it is so important. I think it just demonstrates for me how a collaboration can work really well and how supportive Eastern Health and the network have been. It's only early days and it's been so positive for us at Alexandra. It's for our community, and that's what we wanted. It's just incredible. I'm so proud."

Tour de Cure travelled through Murrindindi Shire back in 2023 and made a generous contribution of \$10,000 towards a cancer-free future. These funds were used to purchase transport vouchers for patients accessing cancer services, and a portion of these funds will now go towards setting up the new oncology unit. Most of the funding for the service is coming through general revenue however.

# **Bendigo Bank 'decline to** comment' on whether Eildon ATM will be removed

IN light of the announcement of upcoming Bendigo Bank agency closures around the country, including the agencies in Marysville and Alexandra, the media representative from Bendigo Bank was asked on July 22, 'Will the Eildon and Marysville ATMs be removed?'

They responded with background information on the same day, "Agency closures do not impact Community Bank ATMs."

On Thursday, July 31, just nine days later, the Eildon Bakery Cafe announced on Facebook that Bendigo Bank will not be renewing their contract to have an ATM at their premises, and that it will be removed by September 30.

When asked about the sudden change and whether they would confirm or deny that the Eildon ATM would be removed, Bendigo Bank "declined to comment."

# Man rescued on **Mt Sugarloaf** in Taggerty

A MAN was winched to safety last Tuesday after slipping about 50 metres down Mt Sugarloaf in Taggerty around noon on Tuesday, July 29.

Emergency services, including Victoria Police, Ambulance Victoria, Buxton and Taggerty Country Fire Authority and Marysville and Alexandra State Emergency Service personnel, attended the man's location near Cerberus Road.

It is understood the man was bushwalking alone when he slipped off the track. He was stuck on a rock face and unable to climb up or down.

Air Wing were able to winch the 24 year old man to safety about 2pm. The Oak Park man was not injured during the incident.

The Victoria Police Search and Rescue Squad attended in a Leonardo AW139 helicopter, marking the first time this

The SES crews, once again, did a fabulous job to hike in and locate the hiker.

It was fortunate that the hiker had a fully charged phone with him and was able to plot his location for the Triple Zero Victoria operators who relayed his location to the responding crews.

If you go hiking this time of year in the Cathedral Ranges, be careful on wet and slippery tracks. Ensure you are experienced in the different terrain and have a fully charged phone with you.

# Remanded in custody

A MAN was hospitalised under police guard after he was allegedly involved in multiple incidents across the Goulburn Valley on Wednesday, July 30.

The police media report stated, "It is believed officers first sighted an allegedly stolen Toyota Hilux on the Goulburn Valley Highway and Killingworth Road in Molesworth on July 30 about 12.15pm.

"A man ran from the vehicle into a nearby shed, allegedly stealing another Toyota Hilux.

"The man drove the Hilux but quickly became bogged, before allegedly running into another property and threatening the occupant with an axe.

"It is alleged the man stole another Hilux and fled in the vehicle.

"Police monitored the stolen vehicle into the Yarck area when they received reports of a collision on the Maroondah Highway about 1.50pm.

"Officers were quickly on scene and attempted to arrest the man, who was allegedly resistant and violent towards them.

unsuccessiui, officers were still able to overpower the man and take him into custody."

The 33 year old man was hospitalised and put under police guard in a metropolitan hospital.

"The driver of the other vehicle involved in the collision, an 83 year old Bonnie Doon man, was taken to hospital with non-lifethreatening injuries."

Detectives from the Alexandra Crime Investigation Unit were also keen to express their appreciation to the members of the public who assisted at the scene of the motor vehicle collision in Yarck on the Wednesday afternoon.

The police said, "Your assistance is a great example of how to care for members of the community until the arrival of emergency services, and the assistance that you provided to police on scene has not gone unnoticed."

Detectives would like to re-assure the community that there are no outstanding offenders involved.

The man was charged on Friday, August 1 with aggravated burglary with person present, aggravated carjacking with offensive weapon, attempted carjacking, Reckless conducted endangering life, burglary (four), theft (12), common law assault, fail to stop vehicle on police direction, dangerous driving while pursued by police, possessing a controlled weapon (two), unlicensed driving, recklessly cause injury, and aggravated burglary with an offensive weapon.

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# New local mental health service launches

A NEW local mental health service was launched at the Yea Shire Hall on Tuesday, July 29. The service will help connect people living in Mitchell and Murrindindi local government areas with mental health clinicians based in Yea, Alexandra, Seymour and Kilmore.

Elizabeth Sinclair, Yea and District Memorial Hospital CEO, welcomed the audience and acknowledged the Traditional Owners of the lands on which the new service will operate.

She said, "It's truly a privilege to stand in front of you here today to talk about this, not just as the CEO of Yea and District Memorial Hospital, but also as a proud member of this community, and celebrate with you a really significant milestone with the official launch of the Lower Hume Primary Mental Health Service.

"This isn't just another service. It's testament to what we can achieve when we actually work together. For too long, we've known the challenges faced by our communities, both Mitchell and Murrindindi people, particularly when it comes to accessing mental health support.

"Our own data which is reinforced by Murray Primary Health Network (PHN) data, clearly shows that the number of local people reporting a mental health condition is higher than in many other places, not just in our state but in our country.

"We all know that sometimes the hardest part isn't just asking for help, but knowing where to turn, especially when you live outside nature metropolitan areas. This is precisely why this new service is so important and so vital.

"It connects our community members with a dedicated mental health set of clinicians... right here in Yea, Alexandra, Seymour and Kilmore. They are residing in communities that they're going to be serving. It brings the support closer to home and reduces barriers to access, which is fundamentally what we should be doing across the board in all areas of health," she said.

She also noted that it's a partner project, not initiated by any one hospital or service, and was grateful for the funding received through the PHN. With Yea hospital leading the service, she also thanked the PHN for their trust

She added, "We understand the unique nuances of rural life, the strengths and the challenges, and by managing and delivering these services locally together, we're ensuring that care is not only accessible but also culturally appropriate, and truly responsive to the needs of our residents."

"This collaboration means more to people who have access to face to face mental health services close to their home. Our team of mental health clinicians is here to help us and here to help make this come to life, but also help those in the community that are desperate for services.

"It's been five years since we've had any mental health services coming into Murrindindi... This service has been created for the benefit of people living here. Together we are dedicated to building a healthier and more supported Lower Hume," she said.

Elizabeth also spoke about the Alpine Outreach bus which was sitting outside of the Yea Shire Hall during the launch. She explained that she and board chair Ian Marshman spent a rainy weekend at the Alexandra Truck, Ute and Rod Show speaking about mental health services in the shire. The truck show raised an extraordinary \$150,000 for the hospital to buy a van. The aim is to provide mental health and other health services accessible to the smaller communities in the shire.

They heard about Alpine Outreach, which had done a similar thing and had a bus all fitted out. They met with the organisation to find out more and ended up being handed the keys so they could borrow the bus. It made its debut at the Yea Saleyards on Friday, and they expect that it will have a lot of use moving forward. They will also be buying another bus with the truck show funds, so there is a large amount of outreach potential, to keep our community healthy.

Matt Jones, CEO of Murray PHN, said, "On behalf of Murray PHN, I really commend your health services and your interest and willingness, and I know your communities are really going to benefit greatly from these services."

Naomi McNamara, Director of Community Services at YDMH provided information on how to access the services. She said, "The Lower Hume Primary Mental Health Service is designed to support people of all ages, people who are living or working in Mitchell and Murrindindi Shire, who are experiencing mental health symptoms that are mild to moderate and have mild to moderate levels of distress and people who are requiring a non-urgent mental health response."

When people get in touch, there will be an initial consultation, focusing on people's needs and their situation to best understand how to support them. That will be followed by brief intervention sessions that will assist in identifying goals and working through issues that have been identified.

The service can be accessed through the Medicare Mental Health Line, available Monday to Friday on 1800 595 212. They will conduct an assessment and work out where to refer people to meet their needs. That could be local services or other services which meet their needs.

Referrals may also be direct from the Lower Hume Mental Health Program, GPs, other health and support services, or self-referrals.

She added, "The team is really committed to providing confidential and non-judgmental timely support to help people in the community to manage and improve their mental health closer to home."

Key services a focus for Helen Haines in first weeks of Federal Parliament



#### MEMBER for Indi, Dr Helen Haines MP, has covered a gamut of key service areas in the first two weeks of the new Federal Parliament.

With international affairs a heavy presence in the Parliament, so too were domestic issues with Dr Haines making key advocacy statements for Indi.

The Federal Government passed legislation on its election commitment to reduce student HECS debt by 20 per cent, which Dr Haines supported for the almost 14,000 people in Indi that have an average HECS debt of \$21,000. Dr Haines's support was not without criticism, though, citing the timing of indexation as a problem for students.

"The current indexation arrangements are unfairly adding thousands of dollars to Australian debts and should be fixed," Dr Haines said.

Dr Haines called on the government to extend payments for practical placements for students, following her successful amendment in the last Parliament to have the system reviewed within three years.

"I hear from so many people having to choose between study or work, some putting their degrees on hold because unpaid placements are simply not possible when they have mortgages, rents and bills to pay."

Dr Haines raised issues with changes to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) Pricing Review after meeting with local service providers last month. Under new rules, the amount providers can claim for travel is halved and risks the viability of future service delivery.

"Last month I met with more than a dozen of Indi's physiotherapists, occupational therapists, dieticians, speech pathologists and support coordinators to hear their concerns.

"I have urged the government to pause these pricing changes and consult with providers in order to protect these NDIS services in

Other legislation passing the Parliament included two bills to legislate technical changes required for aged care reforms that will come into effect from November 1.

Dr Haines reinforced concern that the delay of 83,000 new Home Care Packages was leaving nearly 90,000 people waiting for care, speaking on the bill and raising the issue in Question Time last Thursday.

"The government's delay to the new aged care system leaves nearly 90,000 people waiting for a home care package," Dr Haines

#### "Despite this, the government ignored the crossbench call to fund 20,000 packages to bridge the gap to the new system and cannot articulate what they are doing to support these people in the meantime."

Parliament resumes on August 25.

#### McLeish calls for action on **Eildon Container Deposit Scheme**

THE Eildon and surrounding community are in uproar after the unexpected halt of the popular Container Deposit Scheme in Eildon township. Local Member, Cindy McLeish MP called on the Minister for Environment in Parliament to get involved and sort out the situation.

Under Parliamentary guidelines, the minister has 30 days to respond to Ms McLeish's request, however can choose to act quickly and resolve the matter with Visy in a couple of days.

Ms McLeish said, "I am particularly grumpy about this, and the Eildon community are as well, and rightly so, because it seems to be almost out of the blue that this scheme was halted. The community want it back up and running pronto."

"The government want communities involved in the container deposit scheme. This is a great example of them pushing community away from it."

During the tourist season, people from the many local caravan parks and campgrounds use the Eildon location to deposit their containers. The community, extending well beyond the township, support local operator, Jason Lodge, who wants to continue operating the scheme

"It sounds to me that Visy do not want this successful scheme operating. The Minister needs to fix this ASAP. The community is fuming," Ms McLeish concluded.

### Council outlines actions taken in opposition to the ESVF

Victorian local government areas met on July 26 to devise a plan to stop the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) levy. Murrindindi Shire Council was asked to provide information on the decision not to attend.

They responded, "Murrindindi Shire Council has been a strong and consistent advocate for change to the ESVF levy since it was first announced.

"Rather than duplicating efforts, council has focused its energy on coordinated and strategic advocacy through Rural Councils Victoria, Regional Cities Victoria and the Hume Region Local Government Network all existing networks with established influence and shared rural priorities.

"Council has taken clear and public action. In May 2025, we passed an urgent motion calling on the state government to provide relief for rural landowners and

COUNCILLORS and Mayors from 22 primary producers, acknowledging the with both the Treasurer and Minister for significant cost-of-living impact of the ESVF. particularly for those already grappling with drought, disaster recovery and rising costs. The motion followed legal advice via the Municipal Association of Victoria confirming that councils are obligated to collect the levy and that unpaid charges cannot be waived or ignored.

> "Deputy Mayor Cr Anita Carr, who introduced the urgent business, said at the time, 'The motion highlights council's deep concern about the impact this new tax will have on our farming families and rural communities. We simply cannot allow a situation where people are pushed closer to the edge because of an unfair system.'

> "Mayor Gallagher also wrote directly to Treasurer Jaclyn Symes MP, stating the levy unfairly targets those who already contribute so much through volunteering, fundraising and community service. Council has met

Agriculture Ros Spence, highlighting the additional \$1.8 million this levy will extract from our local community and local economy.

"We've welcomed the state government's recent decision to cap the levy for primary production land from 2025-26, an outcome our advocacy helped achieve, but we know this is just a first step.

"Through the newly formed Victorian Government Drought Response Taskforce, we are continuing to press for long-term reform. Most recently, Mayor Gallagher wrote to Premier Jacinta Allan calling for 'A full review of the Emergency Services Levy, which remains a significant burden for our agriculture sector supply businesses despite the temporary reprieve for primary producers.'

"Council has always had our community's back, and we will continue to stand up and speak out until the ESVF levy is fair for all Victorians."

# What happened to Warren Meyer?

AT Easter in 2008, Warren Meyer disappeared from the Dom Dom Saddle area of the Black Spur.

Over the years, there have been a huge number of theories around his disappearance, including that he may have stumbled across an illegal marijuana plantation, encountered criminals or illegal shooters (or all of the above) or an escaped psychiatric patient known to have been in the area at the time. It's possible that no-one will ever know the answer, but the goal is to bring Warren home for a dignified funeral.

Zee Meyer and husband Warren were married for 31 years. Their first meeting was in Kathmandu, travelling on the back of an old converted army truck. Zee said, "We had an adventurous spirit right from the moment that we met, and hiking and camping was a huge part of our life."

Warren was Canadian, but Zee "dragged him back" to Australia, although he was happy to be here as the Canadian winters were so long.

They settled in Melbourne and had two children together. Zee said Warren enjoyed Australia because "If it's cold, you can still get out and about."

The couple developed a core group of friends, and they would all go away together each Easter to stay somewhere in the state. In 2008, they chose Healesville, the 10 of them staying in three cabins.

Warren would always build a hike into their trips, usually on the Sunday and generally around 10km, and it was the same that year. A special Easter lunch extravaganza had been booked months in advance at the RACV Country Club, so Warren left for his walk early so he would be back in time. He chose to walk from Mt Dom Dom.

It was a sunny, warm day. Warren had prepared food and had water. He had a fully kitted out backpack that he always had with him, a GPS, and a fully charged phone. In addition to hiking for 30 years, he was also a member of the Bayside Bushwalking Club. He had an understanding of the bush and was a very fit and athletic 57 year old. He also played basketball and tennis at competition level.

Zee said of the day that Warren vanished, "I was with my friends. We had breakfast together and we just were laughing and carrying on. Warren wasn't back by 12 and he did say if I'm a little bit late, just go on and I'll catch you up, so we went into the restaurant and I kept looking up, waiting for Warren to walk past the window, because everyone was coming into the restaurant and he just wasn't turning up and we all started to worry and everyone was talking about, well, where's Warren. There was an empty chair at the end of the table and it sort of became a bit haunting, that there wasn't anyone there to take up that space.

"I suppose it would be 1pm we started phoning. He had my phone because my phone was fully charged and we kept phoning, and there was just this disconnected sound. You couldn't even leave a message. We thought, this is really weird. Really weird. So because we were caught in this situation, this very extensive lunch, we went through those formalities. I thought... maybe he's lost his keys. The panic had started setting, I'd say at 3pm. We all got up left and half of the group went to Dom Dom Saddle. Half stayed behind in case he did arrive back."

Zee was among the group who went to Dom Dom Saddle. As the Black Spur is very windy, she began to wonder whether Warren might have gone off the road, however she was relieved to find Warren's vehicle in the Dom Dom carpark. Unfortunately, the relief was short-lived. Warren wasn't at the car and neither was his backpack. The car was locked.


The group headed towards Road 8, calling his name, and started to panic. They called the police at about 3.45pm. The police soon arrived, along with a police helicopter. They were able to signal to it from the picnic tables near the car park.

The police were concerned that Warren may have become lost in the bush. Zee later found out that Warren was the only person who went missing in the bush in 2008 who wasn't found.

Two young officers appeared not long after the helicopter left. They had four-

wheel drive and they said they'd search all the known tracks in the area. Zee still thought that Warren would be found, maybe with a twisted ankle or something. The police officers searched until about 2.30am but were unable to find him.

Zee stayed overnight in the car, still expecting Warren to walk out of the forest in the full moon light. She started becoming very stressed and couldn't sleep. She also hadn't eaten since the lunch and was down to the last of her water.

The search recommenced at 8am, with Zee called into the control room. She contacted her son, who was at home, and asked him to go onto his computer and see what maps Warren had downloaded, and which of Warren's six maps was missing. The map was sent through to the control room.

Warren had told her he was going to Dom Dom. She thought this meant Mount Dom Dom instead of Dom Dom Saddle carpark. As a result, the searches were around the Mount Dom Dom area, where there are no walking tracks, instead of the walks emanating from Dom Dom Saddle.

She said, "Warren wouldn't have gone there" if there was no track. She is therefore concerned that the search was conducted in the wrong place.


It is documented that he went along Road 8 and Morley Track with his bushwalking group. He was also interested in Road 9 or Monda Track, part of the Bicentennial Trail. People can also hike in the water catchment area, closed to vehicular traffic.

Warren wasn't wearing gaiters when bushwalking. He was wearing shorts and long socks with boots, and because of this, Zee doesn't believe that he would have left established tracks. "He wasn't a bush basher. He wasn't unhealthy and had a heart attack," Zee said. "All these things have been said to me. Had an aneurysm."

When the possibility of a snake bite was raised, Zee said, "Those tracks, you can drive a car on them... I mean it's really easy to get around, really easy.

A five day search was conducted by police, "Which was really just scratching the surface, I think," Zee said. The police received a statement from a doctor at one of the hospitals, saying that it was highly unlikely that he would have survived, "so they packed up and left."

Zee was surprised by this as there's plenty of water around that area, and people can survive for weeks without food.

Family and friends continued to search every week for the first year, but to no avail, and the police investigation found no results.

The case remains in the hands of the Missing Persons Squad.

A number of leads were uncovered further down the track when she engaged a private investigator, Valentine Smith. He was encountered by accident in a restaurant and worked for them pro bono.

Through the investigator, she found out that there was an error with the time frames to do with an absconder from a mental hospital, in the area at the time.

Zee went on *A Current Affair* in October 2008, and as a result, they heard from people living at the closest house to where Warren went missing. On the day, the family heard out of control shooting in the area when their family was out looking for Easter eggs. They ushered the children inside. They were not believed to be deer hunters, "because the bush was blown apart," Zee said, adding that it's unlawful to shoot on the Black Spur as it's a National Park.

Easter is well known as being a busy time in the area, with many additional tourists.

"You're really sitting on the doorstep of a huge city, a city of going into 6,000,000 soon, I think. At Easter, we could see it at the place was just booming with people. There was a flood of people through the area. It was very, very busy. So you get a certain element heading out there, an unsavoury element perhaps. Camping and drinking and shooting up the place. And I really think that seems to be what's happened here."

She explained that Meni Caroutas was producing a podcast about Warren in 2024. He had previously worked with Julie Cohen and Search and Rescue Dogs Australia (SARDA) on a case in NSW. He got in touch with Zee and said that he wanted to bring a human remains dog in. Zee said that she would like them to run the dog along the track where the shooting was heard.

The dog was walked five or six kilometres and went through an area of water. On the way back, the dog 'alerted' in the area where the shooting location had been indicated following the information received in 2008. She said that it was unambiguous, a clear indication that there were human remains.

They were unable to track the scent due to the nature of the heavily-wooded bushland, and it may have been the result of water runoff from the surrounding hills. A couple of weeks later, they got the same result. Zee and the team again returned to the Dom Dom Saddle area, this time with two dogs. Both dogs again 'alerted'. It was after rain, and water was draining off the hill. They followed the water past a pipe and first one dog then the other dog set off a huge alert.

Afterwards, Zee got in touch with the now-former Police Commissioner Shane Patton and told him what had happened. He responded very quickly and got it down to the Missing Person's Squad.

On July 15, the Missing Person's Squad sought to see replicated results, however the ground was fairly dry. Those present included Search and Rescue, the Missing Person's Squad, SARDA Valentine Smith, an anthropologist, Warren's son, and Zee.

When the dogs alerted, the anthropologist looked up the hill a bit and look at lush ferns as an indicator they had been fertilised. Zee noted that the same method had been used to successfully locate the body of Matthew Leveson.

It was also noted that her nephew had noticed a bad smell in the same area as the dog had 'alerted' when they were searching in the months after Warren's disappearance. The location also fitted with the 9.01am phone 'ping' and the time indicated for the end of the shooting.

Given the time that's passed, and the lack of dash cams and roadside cameras at the time, it's unlikely that anyone associated with the death will ever be found, if this was the case. Zee would just like to have her much-loved husband buried with honour and dignity.

She said, "We actually had a celebration of his life a month after he went missing because we knew he was deceased. But to be discarded in the bush like that is, I don't even have a word for it. It's so disgraceful that that has happened. But I also believe if we can't extract him from there, I probably believe 95 per cent that he is in that area. But because we can't locate a particular grave because the density of the bush, it makes it really hard. If we were to bring in a bobcat into a National Park that's going to set off a whole different saga.

She said, "I want it understood what the capabilities of these dogs are. I want some sort of academic approach to the dogs so that when the next person comes along, you don't have a debate about, 'do these dogs have these skills that they're claimed to have?'

"The police are going to go away and do an assessment. We're doing an assessment, and already experts in the field have been contacted in Scotland and in the United States, because these dogs are being used all around the world and I want some sort of understanding of their capabilities so that it will help the next person.

"If I can't get my husband back, I want to make some sort of change or developing an understanding of the capabilities of these dogs, because we're only in the infancy of using them in Australia."

She noted that special canine skills are required to pick up the scent of human remains, and that their skills are different to police dogs.

Asked what she would like to say to the people of Murrindindi Shire, Zee responded, "I know there are a lot of people in the areas that searched for Warren. I've always tried to communicate just how appreciative we were of them, and the time they put in and dealing with that difficult bush, often in difficult circumstances and they were always kind if we were around and we didn't feel so alone as a family doing this when we saw the community to come together like this. So that's the first thing.

"The other is if anyone has knowledge of anything in relation to not only Easter 2008 but knowledge of the goings on in an area that they live in. Especially in relation to shooting, we would be very interested in that as well."

Warren now has four grandchildren he's never met, and his family just want to lay him to rest with dignity. Please call Triple Zero or contact Crime Stoppers on 131 444 if you know anything about the case.

# **Occupational therapy students create**

sensory space at Yea Uniting Early Learning

TWO occupational therapy students from Australian Catholic University, Jade and Tully, have recently completed their clinical placement at Yea United Early Learning Centre. Their placement was part of the Yea and District Memorial Hospital's (YDMH) Innovative Model of Care Project, which aims to enhance the delivery of allied health services in early childhood settings.

During their time at the centre, Jade and Tully designed and implemented a sensory space to support children's self-regulation, engagement, and overall wellbeing.

They describe the space in the following way:

"We created this sensory space as a dedicated area for children to visit throughout the day to help regulate their sensory systems. By supporting their individual needs in this way, the space enables children to engage more actively in their learning and participate more fully in kindergarten life, they said.

"The design of the space was informed by extensive research, including both formal assessments and close observation and interaction with the children. With the invaluable support of our clinical supervisor, Siobhan from Dindi Kids in Alexandra, we were able to develop an

intentional, purpose-built environment tailored to their needs. "Working within

a limited budget, we focused on creating as many elements as possible ourselves and purchased only what was necessary. To support the use of the space, we also developed an informational brochure for families and a picture storybook designed to teach children how to use the space purposefully, with clear examples of what they might do while there.

"Our hope is that this sensory space will have a lasting positive impact, supporting children to self-regulate, engage in learning, and thrive in both play and classroom activities"

Centre Director Fiona Purvis commented on the students' placement, saying: "It has been such a positive learning experience for everyone involved in the project. The sensory space that Jade and Tully created as part of their project has had such an impact with supporting and guiding children's behaviour and self-regulation since we have returned after the school holidays. I really look forward to watching how this project evolves with future students"



# Stepping up security on your far

DUE to the typically remote and accessible nature of farms, it is essential to look at a range of measures when enhancing security, in order to safeguard your property, equipment, and livestock against theft, vandalism and potential threats.

By taking a good look around the farm and seeing how your security measures up is a great way to identify any areas that need attention.

Some of the following tips are a great starting point.

Firstly, to deter trespassers, place "no trespassing" and "private property" signs at the entrance to your property, and along boundary fences and areas that access roads to paddocks.

the area has security cameras and alarms is also a good way to deter trespassers.

#### Sheds

Securing your sheds with good heavy duty roller doors and keeping them locked with good quality padlocks. Ideally having your sheds positioned so they can be seen from the home is not always possible, but it is ideal. A great deterrent around sheds can also be sensor lights and security alarms.

#### Fencing and gates

Ensure they're in good and secure condition they need to be regularly checked, and the securely to corner posts and monitored for wear and tear.

#### Fuel

Fuel is a popular item when it comes to theft. Lock your fuel tanks with padlocks, ideally at the cut off valve and make sure you close and lock the valves and switch off the pump when they're not in use.

#### **Firearms**

Make sure your firearms are registered, and your licences are up to date. Follow all laws when it comes to storage that meet legal requirements. Never leave your firearms in

Having signs saying equipment is marked and conditions of your gates should be mounted unattended or in unlocked vehicles. If you're not home for long periods of times or your property is unoccupied, consider storing your firearms with a trusted licence holder.

Your stock is your livelihood, keep accurate records of all your livestock, including ID, numbers, purchases, sales, births and deaths. Taking photos or videos of them is a good idea in case of theft.

Keep any receipts of purchase to prove ownership and make sure your stock's National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) tags are up to date.

As feed is such a problem these days it makes it an ideal item for theft. Never leave storage bins or loaded trucks unattended during harvest. Make sure loading equipment isn't readily available when you're not around, and if possible store hay bales in locakable sheds instead of being out in the open for all eyes to see.

For a comprehensive guide to farm safety, Crime Stoppers have a printable farmer safety checklist you can use as you go through your property and assess what needs to be done around the farm.

If you become aware that livestock, equipment, fuel and feed is missing it's important to report it to police. The sooner it is logged with police there is a better chance of catching the offender.

To report non-urgent farm crime, call the Police Assistance Line on 131 444 or submit an online report.

#### More trees on farms to benefit landowners

THE Victorian Government is encouraging Victorian farmers and landowners to take advantage of a new program to plant more trees on their farms, helping to boost timber supply, increase biodiversity and prevent soil erosion.

Minister for Agriculture Ros Spence last week announced the Victorian Trees on Farms Program at Parliament House, alongside industry members at the Victorian Forest Products Association's Timber Plantations showcase.

"Victoria's tree plantations are an essential resource, not only for our state's biodiversity, but to support our housing pipeline, create regional jobs, and produce

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paper and packaging products to replace single use plastics," Ms Spence said.

"We're supporting Victorian farmers and landholders to reap the benefits of planting trees on their farms, including improving grazing outcomes and offsetting carbon emissions.'

The new program is offering grants of up to \$80,000 for landholders to plant trees on their property, providing long term solutions including boosting shade and shelter for livestock, improving stock and crop production, offsetting carbon emissions or generating income through carbon credits.

Landholders will also be able to generate additional income through timber production, including from harvested wood products or use the timber for on-farm uses such as firewood and fence posts.

An additional grants program, the Trees on Farms Incubator Program, is offering planting service providers and forestry professionals up to \$50,000 to support landowners who might be contemplating planting trees on their property.

This service will help landowners develop tailored, implementationready project plans to align with their property and planting goals, while providing education, training and upskilling for tree planting and management activities.

# The process of obtaining a firearm licence

MANAGEMENT of the Victorian deer population is a contentious issue at the moment, but most people agree that hunters are helping to manage the situation.

Navigating the bureaucratic process of obtaining a firearm licence is a challenge. Here's a relatively simple explainer of how to get your firearm licence.

In order to obtain a firearm licence, you first need a 'genuine reason for owning a firearm'. This legal requirement will be stated on your firearm application. Genuine reasons can include hunting, target shooting, etcetera.

If you list hunting or target shooting as your genuine reason, you either need written permission to hunt on private land or be a member of a club such as the Australian Deer Association or Sporting Shooters' Association of Australia.

Book yourself in for a firearm safety course. If you search 'firearm safety course' a number of results will come up that you can choose from. Alternatively, you can contact your local Divisional

Firearms Officers (DFO), who will direct you to a firearm safety course.

For Murrindindi Shire, the closest DFO is in Seymour and can be contacted on 5735 0294.

The firearm safety course that you will want for hunting or target shooting is a Category A and B firearm licence, which covers most rifles and shotguns. Once vou've completed your safety course you will receive a certificate which must be included in your licence

The next step is to apply for your Victorian firearm licence through the Victoria Police Licensing eServices Portal at eservices. police.vic.gov.au/eServices/login.

Items you need to complete your online application include: Proof of genuine reason to own a firearm (such as club membership); firearm safety course certificate; a personal reference who has known you for at least 12 months and is a person of good standing as categorised by Victoria Police; and 100 points of identification

(passport, birth certificate, driver's licence, etcetera).

A person of good standing could be a doctor, justice of the peace, a notary, etcetera. A full list of acceptable identification referees can be found at police.vic. gov.au/sites/default/files/2019-12/ Acceptable-Referees.pdf

The deliberation process is lengthy once you have submitted your application. Due to a legislative requirement, new firearm licence applications cannot be issued until 28 days have passed from the date of completion. It can then take up to 14 days for the application to be successful, meaning the whole process could take around 40 days.

If you are successful in your application, you will be notified by Victoria Police. They will provide you with a temporary licence that you can use while waiting for your licence card to arrive in the mail.

Furthermore, to purchase a firearm you also need a Permit to Acquire issued by Victoria Police.

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# **Informative discussions** on local crime

ON Thursday, July 24 the Neighbourhood Policing Forum was held online. The forum covers the Benalla Police Service Area (PSA), which includes the Benalla, Mansfield, and Murrindindi Shire and discussed current crime trends, crime preventions, young people, family violence, road policing, drugs and drug related crime.

Discussions were led by Superintendent Brett Kahan and Acting Inspector Mark Byers from the Victoria Police Eastern Region Leadership Team.

Acting Senior Sergeant (A/S/SGT) Jen Parker discussed the commitment of the Family Violence and Sexual Offences and Child Abuse Investigation Team to hold perpetrators accountable and break the cycle family violence.

Family violence reports have increased by 15 per cent in our area, compared to last year. A/S/SGT Parker stated that the increase indicates victims of family violence have trust in our police and matters of will be treated respectfully. The majority of family violence reported across the Benalla PSA, were reported as verbal incidents, with emotional abuse the second highest form of family violence reported.

Emotional abuse can include excluding someone from spending time with family or friends, it may also include statements such as 'If you loved me then you would do this for me' to control someone.

A/S/SGT Parker also stated children were present three quarters of recorded incidents of family violence. While not being directly the victim of the violence, being witness to incidents of family violence causes harm and many live with the effects of trauma from

It is important to continue to have discussions within the community that family violence is not acceptable, and police are available at any time to support victims. A/S/SGT Parker stated that detectives work closely with agencies such as Centre Against Violence, Benalla Health and Child Protection to support aggrieved family members.

Leading Senior Constable (LSC) Chris Di Ciero from the Proactive Policing Unit (PPU) discussed the role of early intervention and building trust between police and young people. LSC Di Ciero acknowledged the partnership between police and local schools, councils and support services for opportunities to engage with youth and help curb young people offending.

LSC Di Ciero explained members of the PPU play an important role in educating young people about issues relevant to young people such as online safety, consent, and road safety.

A/S/SGT Mel Walker spoke on road safety across the division and highlighted that reducing road trauma is not just the responsibility of Highway Patrol members but a priority for all members of Victoria Police.

A/S/SGT Walker acknowledged motorcycle riders are vulnerable road users and overly represented in serious injury collisions across our division. While rural roads can be quite unpredictable due to challenges such as rough road surfaces, fog and wildlife, speed was still the highest recorded contributor of serious injury and

A/S/SGT Walker discussed how the community plays a large role in helping keep our roads safe and urged members of the community who want to provide information about unsafe drivers to contact Crime Stoppers, alternatively if you witness dangerous driving and need immediate police assistance to call Triple Zero (000).

Crime Investigation Unit Manager, Senior Sergeant (S/SGT) Costakis Costa discussed recent crime data and stated that police have been focussed on firearm storage compliance. S/SGT Costa recommended that firearm owners do not store firearms at unoccupied locations, which have been targeted by offenders across the state.

S/SGT Costa discussed the increase in drug possession statistics over the past year is a positive sign that police are targeting concerns regarding drugs in our community. Members of the community were encouraged if they 'see something, say something' about crime, including concerns about drug dealing or other criminal activity to contact Crime Stoppers or their local police.

Police value the opportunity to discuss local issues with the community, and encourage people who live, work or often visit our area to follow the Eyewatch Benalla Police Service Area Facebook page to stay connected.

# Major racing achievement for Tayla Street

AUSTRALIAN racer from Flowerdale, Tayla Street, travelled all the way to Croatia in July as she was selected to represent Australia at the 2025 FIM Women's Speedway Gold Trophy at the FIM speedway academy.

The three day event consisted of the first two days training with elite coaches Greg Hancock, who is a full-time speedway world champion, and probably one of the most successful speedway riders, and Glen Phillips, who is also a speedway national rider in track and long-track.

Tayla explained, "They had a lot of people who have so much experience with giving site coaching and the right devices you develop and build your skills before the main event on the Saturday. It was very good to have that. It was almost like a bit of a leg up. It's a pretty big deal to go over and ride in a foreign country, but then to also have two days of practice and coaching from these awesome people, it was a massive bonus.

"They had seminars as well, how to maintain your bike, and then also having the ability to understand how to conduct yourself in media, like social media, and how to promote yourself in a professional manner. It was insightful, those first few days. You had a lot of track time, but you were also working on not only riding the bike but having highperformance techniques like coming into the corners and having cones in certain spots to get the right line, and every rider is different, so finding the right process. And then the final day was the main race meeting.'

There were four heat races on the main race day. "I started from the outside in the first race and then each race I moved to the inside. My first heat I was starting from the outside, which was yellow, and that race I got a win, which was awesome. I was like 'alright, I've had a good start to the day.' My second race I got a second, and then my third race I got a third, and then I got a win. Every race that I rode I had points, which was awesome, and which put me in fourth place for the last chance qualifier.

"How speedway works, for the first two people, they have an automatic direct route to the final, and then from fourth to sixth you have a race and whoever finishes first and second is into the final.

'Unfortunately, I wasn't able to get the result that I wanted to in the final, but it was an exhilarating experience for me and it was just, for me to get sixth place in the world, I couldn't ask for a better result," she said.

Tayla describes her recent experience as absolutely incredible, "The help and support from not only locally but Australia-wide and then internationally was out of this world. This just does not happen. The event, with how it was constructed, was so professional and streamlined and I was so happy with my performance, especially for my first ever international race meeting. For me to have the ability to get fourth before the final, and sixth overall in the world, I couldn't ask for better."

Tayla had to do some serious fundraising to get herself over to the event in Croatia, being a bit reluctant to do a GoFundMe page she still went ahead with it, which really helped her reach her dreams.

"I was a bit reluctant to do it, I'm not going to get help and it doesn't seem right. I literally

wrote what I did, poured my heart out, told everyone this is what I want to do, can you help me, and then within the first two days I raised something like \$4000. I was like what, this is crazy. It got shared around different social media, it was unbelievable. It really put so much wind in my sails to say you can do this, it is possible. Also to make it happen, I'm a signwriter by trade, I'm doing a lot of work as well, I sold my old race bikes, I sold my trailer that I wasn't using. My grandpa cut all this firewood, and we did raffles and that. There was a lot of work involved, which was awesome. It was an awesome experience to have that.

"When I was over there, I was always having so many people message me, and I was getting flooded with all these messages on my socials asking how it was going. It was beautiful," she said.

Over the last 12 months Tayla has had her eye on the prize after some significant hurdles to cross with her racing career. This time last year Tayla broke her back in a racing accident at Gunnedah in New South Wales, and to get to where she is now in her racing career was a no mean feat.

"Honestly, it boggles my mind. Every day I'm in pain with my back, but I looked at this scenario of getting this opportunity. I'm 25 years old, so I'm coming towards the end of my racing adventures I guess, because I am going to be starting to organise myself and have a family and do all that sort of stuff. But for me to do this, and considering where I was, injured in a hospital bed, I just wouldn't believe it if someone told me that I would be racing over in Croatia in the Women's World Speedway Championship. I would be like 'nah you're dreaming'. It's just crazy and a nice little reminder that nothing is impossible and things can change in an instant.

"With my back it took time to recover, and it took a long time also to get my confidence back, get my speed and be comfortable with riding the way that you have to and being at the pointy end and high level. Eventually it came back, and I'm really passionate about racing," she said.

Now Tayla is coming down from the high of the recent racing experience in Croatia, more planning is in the works for her next adventure.

"For me at the moment, I'm just waiting to hear back when they are going to release the dates and location for the next meet. Depending on where it is, and if it's possible, I would really like to go over there again. And I will have a bit more time to organise myself, rather than doing it all in two months. I can have a little bit more time to plan and start getting my name out there a bit more and get together resumes and start applying for support financially from companies. I'm looking forward, I definitely want to go back over. When I went over I made some really good connections with people to help me in the future, which is awesome.

"There's so many more opportunities over in Europe, and I'd definitely like to be able to take it to the next level. But anything can happen. We just see how it goes and keep enjoying it, and do the best I can with networking and promoting myself and you never know what the future can hold.'
