McLeish: Bushfire appeal money needed now

SIX months after Victoria's devastating summer bushfires, some people are still living in sheds and tents, stock fences remain unrepaired and yet more than one-third of the money donated to the 2026 Victorian Bushfire Appeal remains unspent, according to Member for Eildon Cindy McLeish.

Ms McLeish first raised the issue with the Minister for Natural Disaster and Recovery in March, when donations to the appeal stood at \$666,000.

Since then, donations have grown to \$892,166, yet only \$550,000 has been distributed, leaving more than \$340,000 still to reach bushfire-affected communities.

She has called for the urgent release of bushfire appeal funds and greater transparency in how the remaining money will be distributed.

"People donated this money because they wanted to help communities recover, not to see it sitting in a bank account," Ms McLeish said.

"More than six months after these devastating fires, some families are still living in suboptimal accommodation, fences remain unrepaired, farmers are still trying to restore their properties and winter has now arrived.

"Every day these funds sit idle is another day people who have already endured so much are left waiting."

Ms McLeish said the Victorian Emergency Relief and Recovery Foundation's own website states donations may be used to provide immediate assistance, relief and services to support affected individuals and communities.

"No-one is questioning the generosity of Victorians who dug deep to support the appeal, the question is why that generosity is still sitting there," she said.

"We are a long way past immediate assistance."

Ms McLeish said greater transparency was needed around how funding decisions were being made and when the remaining funds would be distributed.

"Communities deserve to know what the plan is for the remaining money and when it will reach the people it was intended to help," she said.

Severe weather isolates residents

THE east of Murrindindi Shire suffered considerably in last week's intense rainfall and wind conditions, with flooding on Thornton-Taggerty Road, residents of Spring Creek Road isolated due to impassable fords, a landslide on Skyline Road and trees down around the shire.

Peter Weeks from the Alexandra SES provided a rundown on the situation across the shire.

Flood warnings went out for the Goulburn River and the Acheron River with stream rises. There was around 60mm of rain until last Thursday around Murrindindi Shire that caused stream

rises on most of the Yea, King Parrot and Acheron Rivers and the Rubicon River and Snobs Creek flowing into the Goulburn. The Goulburn was running quite high as of last Friday.

Considerable flooding occurred on Thornton-Taggerty Road last Thursday night, with SES crews attending two locations.

The fire affected areas from the Longwood fire had issues as well. Spring Creek Road, where the temporary ford was put in place across Stoney Creek post-fires, and another ford on Spring Creek Road near the UK Gap had flooding.

There was also water across

the road on Coles Road, which is a continuation of Spring Creek Road which isolated around 20 people for a couple of days while the water was up.

Council were quick off the mark and had the temporary ford and the two other fords assessed on Spring Creek Road, with the verdict that they were still able to be crossed, but water went up and down causing further issues for a couple of days mid-week.

There was a landslide on Skyline Road near the Taylor Bay turn off last Thursday. A large boulder rolled down as part of the landslide. Council attended that incident along with police and SES.

The Yea River continued to rise last Friday. The Yea Caravan Park was evacuated mid last week. The Yea River did drop about 30cm and then came back up towards the end of the week. As of last Friday at 2pm, it was at a height of 3.3m on the marker at the Yea Caravan Park. There was some flooding on Webster Street in Yea.

A number of trees went down across Murrindindi Shire with the Alexandra, Marysville and Kinglake SES attending to those incidents throughout last week, especially with the strong winds.

Peter estimated the three SES units attended around 30 jobs last week up until 2pm on Friday.

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Minimum wage increase

THE Fair Work Ombudsman says employers must ensure eligible employees receive the correct minimum wage increase from the first full pay period starting on or after July 1.

The National Minimum Wage is now \$1004.90 per week (based on a 38-hour week for a full-time employee), or \$26.44 per hour.

Casual employees entitled to the National Minimum Wage must receive at least \$33.05 per hour, which includes the 25 per cent casual loading.

Employees covered by an award must receive a 4.75 per cent increase to their minimum wages, provided that: the lowest rate in any award that applies to ongoing employment must be at least \$1004.90 per week or \$26.44 per hour; and any entry-level rate that applies to the first six months (or less) of employment must be at least \$978.10 per week or \$25.74 per hour.

Most employees in Australia are covered by an award, which sets minimum pay rates and conditions of employment in an industry or occupation.

The FWO has updated its Pay Calculator to help employers and employees calculate the new pay rates. Information is also available on the annual wage review webpage.

The National Minimum Wage is the minimum rate for adult employees in the national system who are not covered by an award or enterprise agreement. It is set each year by the Fair Work Commission (a different agency to the Fair Work Ombudsman), as part of its annual wage review.

Fera wind farm

FERA is back and it could not be a more convenient time.

The communities have been devastated by the recent horrific bushfires and are still grappling with the loss of home, farms, livestock, and our unique habitat.

Now, to add into the mix the challenges of opposing the Seymour Wind Farm. I note that Andrew Lawson (Director Fera Australia) has begun regular social media updates. Is that so he doesn't have to face the angry locals? According to Fera's Strathbogie Ranges Communications, their last public meeting was in July 2024 in Alexandra, not the regular three-monthly meeting that was supposed to happen.

I am glad Mr Lawson was able to quote the number of people who are happy about wind and solar farms. Perhaps he forgot to check on the well over 100 community action groups across the coun-

try. He could check with Australian Communities Against Industrial Renewables or the National Rational Energy Network.

He could also recall his meetings with local communities, where most of the audience indicated a very negative response to the project.

As he mentions, the vegetation is slowly sprouting and fauna is returning. The last thing we need is this large-scale industrial project scouring the fragile landscape.

I also note that there is the sweetener of providing power to Euroa and surrounds, which hasn't been mentioned before. Perhaps Mr Lawson is hoping that the local communities are too absorbed with the aftermath of the bushfires to have the energy to protest, but he will be wrong.

Although the local communities are still traumatised, it is important that we keep resisting the pressure from Fera and save our unique landscape.

Still no formal response on Longwood fire cause

THE Longwood fire, which impacted Murrindindi Shire so badly in early January, started at a location on the Hume Highway near Longwood.

The rumours about how the fire started bear a striking resemblance to each other, however there is still no official word on the cause of the fire.

Victoria Police were contacted again last week for an update on the cause of the fire, six months after the event.

A Victoria Police spokesperson responded, "Victoria Police continues to work with its partner agencies

following the fires across the state, including the Longwood blaze.

"The investigation into the cause of the Longwood fire and the associated death is being led by the Ar-

son and Explosives Squad.

"Such investigations are complex and when we are in a position to provide confirmed information about the cause of any fire, we will do so."

What happened to funds from Bushfire Appeal

THE Victorian Government launched the January 2026 Bushfire Appeal on January 12. The appeal raised \$892,166. The Victorian Emergency Relief and Recovery Foundation (VERRF) was activated to administer funds raised through the appeal.

When asked for an update, they said, "To date, the VERRF has provided money to Murrindindi Shire through different means and therefore it is difficult to quantify the exact total that was provided. In January 2026, shortly after the devastation of the fires, the VERRF Board provided GIVIT with \$250,000 to support the immediate needs of those impacted across Victoria. There was a significant uptake in services available through agencies that work with GIVIT to ensure the funding reached those most in need.

"On March 19, the VERRF commenced seeking applications from households who lost their primary place of residence and their home is considered uninhabitable. A grant of \$1000 has been paid to all eligible applicants. The application closed June 30. Murrindindi Shire accounted for our largest cohort of applicants, with over 140 approved to receive the grant.

"Overall the VERRF has disbursed \$550,000. The VERRF will finalise the disbursement of the remaining funds once all applications received to date have been processed. As we did not know how many individual applications would be received, the board considered it appropriate to stage funding deci-

sions as more information became available about the level of demand.

"This approach ensured that people affected by the disaster were not disadvantaged if applications exceeded initial expectations and reflected the Board's responsibility to manage public donations carefully and in the best interests of the impacted communities.

"We are keeping the VERRF webpage up to date should you wish to check any of the numbers at any stage."

Recycled water release from GVW's Yea Wastewater Management Facility

GOULBURN Valley Water (GVW) will release fully treated recycled water from its Yea Wastewater Management Facility into the Yea River over the coming weeks.

The Yea Wastewater Management Facility is nearing capacity. Irrigation infrastructure upgrades at GVW's Yea farm delayed the start of irrigation at the site, meaning not all available recycled water could be used during the season.

With onsite storages at the Yea Wastewater Management Facility nearing capacity, a controlled release of 0.5 to 1 megalitre per day of EPA Class C recycled water will be released into the Yea River.

The release began in late June 2026 and is expected to continue until October 2026.

GVW's Wastewater and Recycling Coordinator, Stuart Harris, said the controlled releases will prevent uncontrolled overflows and protect critical infrastructure.

"The releases will continue until lagoon levels are returned to a safe and manageable level."

The water being released has undergone full treatment and meets EPA Class C recycled water standards. GVW has notified the EPA of the releases and will work closely with them to monitor for any potential environmental impacts.

Upcoming Geoscience aerial survey across Victoria

GEOSCIENCE Australia and the Geological Survey of Victoria will be carrying out an Airborne Electromagnetic (AEM) survey north and west of Melbourne this year to improve understanding of Victoria's geology.

The survey is being carried out to obtain data that will enhance understanding of geology and natural resources of the region. This information will support future informed decision making for resource management.

During the survey and aeroplane, towing equipment designed to map variations in the natural electrical conductivity of the ground to a depth of several hundred metres, will fly at approximately 120 metres above the ground, along flight lines 2.5km and 10km apart.

A signal will be transmitted from the aircraft into the ground. The signal passes quickly as the aircraft moves and is similar to that produced by an electric fence. Towed antennae detect the returned signals that are analysed to map variations in the electrical conductivity of the ground caused by the presence of groundwater and some minerals.

The AEM technique is completely safe for plants and animals. Due to the speed the aircraft passes, livestock rarely even look up before the plane has gone. Flying near concentrations of stock such as feedlots is avoided.

Given the signal has a similar output to electric power lines or a mobile phone, it is too weak to disrupt any electrical appliances, electrical systems, plants, animals, humans or the internet.

The airborne survey is expected to be carried out between July and November 2026, across areas of New South Wales and Victoria. Murrindindi Shire falls into the survey area alongside prominent locations Bendigo and Shepparton.

Precompetitive data acquired by Geoscience Australia will be publicly available after quality control and assurance checks have been performed. Public release of this information may contain explicit spatial location information, such as specific deployment locations and/or areas which may be interpreted as containing groundwater and resource potential.

Geoscience Australia is conducting a national program for airborne electromagnetic (AEM) surveys where one or more survey is planned each year. The program started in 2017 and is projected to be completed by 2032. The last time this program conducted an AEM survey in Victoria was in 2022 and previously in 2021.

Small scale surveys are conducted sporadically by state government agencies such as the Geological Survey of Victoria who are co contributors to the current survey. Other types of airborne geophysical surveys such as gravity, magnetic and radiometric surveys are also techniques used regularly by governments and private industry to learn more about the earth below our feet.

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Victorian Access Regime impact on the planned solar farm

THERE are no Renewable Energy Zones (REZ) in Murrindindi Shire, however there is a significant Samsung solar farm in the planning stages in Rubicon in Murrindindi Shire.

A new Victorian Access Regime has been announced for renewable energy projects, so VicGrid was asked about the impact that the changes may have on the planning for the solar farm.

VicGrid Chief Executive Alistair Parker replied, "The Victorian Access Regime will help us coordinate renewable energy development and ensure developers meet government expectations on community engagement and benefit sharing."

"This new regime will encourage development in renewable energy zones over time and ultimately give communities more certainty about what development is likely to occur in their region."

"Whenever there is a big change like this there needs to be a period of transition, so there will be a period until the new regime comes into effect where you will see well-advanced projects going ahead outside zones."

VicGrid also provided the following information. Renewable energy zones are a key part of a long-term approach to improve the way renewable energy projects are planned, developed and connect to Victoria's power grid.

Ageing coal-fired power stations are closing over the next 10 years. New wind, solar and battery projects, supported by transmission upgrades, are needed to ensure all Victorian homes, businesses, farms and essential services have access to reliable power.

Renewable energy zones are areas identified as the best places to host wind and solar projects and will play a key role as Victoria transitions from coal to renewable energy.

Renewable energy zones will help coordinate renewable energy projects and reduce the need for unnecessary transmission infrastructure; enable VicGrid to set clearer rules for how projects gain access to the grid, including expectations for how developers engage with communities; provide more certainty about how and where renewable energy projects are developed; and unlock new economic benefits for regional communities and Traditional Owners.

New rules for how projects gain access to the grid, known as the Victorian Access Regime, will be in place in July 2027.

Under this new regime all projects, whether they are inside or outside a renewable energy zone, will need to demonstrate how they meet government expectations for community engagement and deliver social and economic benefits, before they can secure access to the grid.

Before the access regime comes into effect, VicGrid will ask projects seeking to connect to the grid to ensure their engagement is consistent with these expectations.

All projects, both inside and outside renewable energy zones, will still be subject to Victorian planning approvals processes that consider environmental, land use and social impacts.

It's important to have a clear period of transition to the new access regime to ensure VicGrid don't inadvertently impact well-advanced projects that have been developed over many years under the existing rules.

Once the new rules are in place, projects can still be developed outside renewable energy zones, but they will face additional steps as part of a new assessment process.

This is part of a more coordinated approach to renewable energy development, helping to avoid too many projects connecting in the same area and reducing pressure on the electricity network.

Over time, this will lead to more projects seeking to develop inside zones, which are considered the best locations based on a range of factors.

Residents express concern about proposed Rubicon solar farm

SAMSUNG'S proposed Rubicon Solar Farm has been the subject of debate and confusion since it was first announced last year. The Stop Rubicon Solar Facebook page currently has over 450 followers and the petition opposed to the solar farm, presented in the Victorian Parliament by Member for Eildon Cindy McLeish in May, had 1509 signatures.

So what are the main concerns?

Among the neighbours to the proposed solar farm are Sue and John Horn who have a property along Blue Range Road in Rubicon. They have a 100 acre block and recently purchased the block next door, before news of the proposed solar farm broke. A potential reduction of the value of their property is just one of their concerns.

Many people would be familiar with the large Eildon power station near the dam wall. John said that the terminal station for the Rubicon solar farm is projected to be around the same size.

The family will have a one kilometre boundary with the solar farm on one side of their property and an 800 metre boundary on another side.

Their son Marcus also joined the conversation. He commented that the Rubicon project will be larger than the Winton solar farm, along the Hume Highway.

"This is 100 acres more," John said. "They say it'll power 53,000 homes, when the sun shines in the middle of the day."

Unfortunately, it's not always the middle of the day and the sun isn't always shining.

John pointed out that the Rubicon Valley is known to be a very fertile valley, ideal for farming, unlike some of the flatter and drier land further to the north and west of the state.

Marcus added that he is concerned about the potential for run-off into the Rubicon River which joins the Goulburn River shortly afterwards. He is concerned that if a fire occurs and rain afterwards, there is a potential for the debris to flow into the two creeks then the river and then downstream.

He said, "They're talking a 200 metre buffer between [the solar farm] and the state forest. We've all seen fires and how quickly they can spread."

He said, "There are batteries, there are transformers, there's all the other grid infrastructure, as well as the solar panels and all those potential leakages into the into the aquifer underneath."

The fog is another issue in the valley. Marcus questioned, "How can a business look at this one and then look at other ones they're doing and not see this one as a dud."

While the government requires site rehabilitation once the project has reached end-of-life, Marcus said that there have been some incidents where this hasn't occurred.

It is not yet known whether Samsung intends to build and operate the solar farm for the life of the infrastructure, or whether they are developing to planning approval or full solar farm to sell, as often happens.

The Victorian Farmer's Federation on June 17 said of the VicGrid Guidelines, "...The guidelines are long on expectations and short on obligations. At this stage there is no clear enforcement mechanism, no compliance framework and no meaningful consequences for developers who fail to meet these expectations."

Samsung will be on a leasing arrangement at the site, so people with solar panels potentially on all three sides of their property are unlikely to be offered the option to sell at market rates. They may instead see a significant reduction in their property value.

John, Sue and Marcus have seen the visual impact studies provided by Samsung. While there is expected to be little impact on the main house, their son has a house on the same property which will overlook a significant area of solar panels. John was also planning to build a new house on the farm which would also be impacted.

John said that the visual impact study was conducted from "All the way down the paddock and they did all this stuff and all we got was a photo." The second house on the property couldn't be seen.

John and Sue are also deeply concerned about fire. John said, "Our property is a direct vegetation link [from the Rubicon State Forest]," adding that the batteries and 200,000 solar cells would each have two connections, creating a fire risk.

John said, "One of the questions I posed to Samsung and fire risk consultants was on a catastrophic fire day, I said, do you plan to shut the plant down, turn the solar cells and the batteries off, so there's no danger? And there's no chance, because on that day, Melbourne will be sweltering."

The solar panels are on a single track axis, and there will be associated noise when they move as they are motor-driven. Reflections may also be an issue for some properties at a certain point in the day.

The family are also concerned that locals may not fully understand the size of the project and the potential impact on tourism.

Murrindindi continues push for fair bushfire recovery support

MURRINDINDI Shire Council has stated their disappointment that fire-impacted residents will now need to pay gate fees to dispose of bushfire debris at council Resource Recovery Centres, following the end of the free waste disposal program.

While the Victorian Government has waived the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) levy for eligible bushfire waste, residents will now be required to pay a gate fee, which covers council's costs to operate the service, including staffing, handling, transport and disposal.

A Domestic Bushfire Waste Gate Fee of \$47.32 per cubic metre will now apply from July 1 for general bushfire waste taken to the Resource and Recovery Centres by affected residents. Loads of bushfire waste exceeding three metres cubed and loads of building rubble (containing bricks, concrete, soil) will continue to be directed to the Alexandra Landfill where the appropriate fees will apply and the EPA levy will be removed.

Council has been advocating for the free waste disposal program to be extended until June 30, 2027, to give residents more time to safely clear homes, sheds, fallen trees and fire-damaged vegetation.

Mayor of Murrindindi Shire, Cr Damien Gallagher, said council welcome the EPA levy waiver but remained concerned that residents will still face out-of-pocket costs during recovery.

"Waiving the EPA levy is a positive step, but it does not make waste disposal free for our residents," Cr Gallagher said.

"People who have lost homes, sheds, fences, trees and vegetation are now being asked to pay gate fees to continue cleaning up after a disaster they did not ask for.

"Six months is simply not long enough for many residents to complete this work, particularly when clean-up involves not only homes, but sheds, outbuildings, fallen trees and large amounts of fire-damaged vegetation."

The free bushfire recovery waste disposal program at council facilities has provided important practical support for fire-impacted residents as they work through the long and difficult process of clearing their properties.

Council says many residents are still only beginning, or are yet to begin, the full clean-up process because of access issues, insurance processes, safety concerns, housing pressures and delays in broader recovery programs.

More than 280 Murrindindi property owners registered for the Victorian Government's on-site clean-up program, however, almost two thirds are ineligible and have had to make their own arrangements, placing greater pressure on council facilities and on households already carrying significant recovery costs.

Cr Gallagher said Murrindindi residents deserved the same level of post-disaster support provided to other Victorian communities.

"We will continue to advocate for our residents to receive fair and practical support that reflects the scale of what has happened here," Cr Gallagher said.

"For many families, recovery is still underway. The clean-up effort did not end on June 30, and neither should the support that helps make that recovery possible.

"Communities affected by disaster should be able to access support for as long as it is genuinely needed, particularly where recovery timeframes are beyond residents' control."

By the end of June 2026, council expects to have received about 14,000 tonnes of bushfire debris at its landfill, equivalent to around seven years' worth of landfill in just a few months, placing significant and unplanned pressure on local infrastructure and resources.

It calls for more road maintenance and further funding to restore regional roads.

"I write to you regarding the critically dangerous condition of Victoria's regional roads. This situation has become so dire that it demands you act urgently to significantly increase investment in the road repair program, and ensure Victorians have the smooth and safe regional roads they deserve," Ms Lovell said.

"Blowing out a tyre or swerving to avoid a damaged road surface can cause accidents, and the dangerous state of Victoria's roads is putting lives at risk.

"Recent wet weather has exposed the extent of deterioration on our roads. High rainfall has filled many deep potholes with water and hidden them from unsuspecting drivers, while heavy fog has reduced road visibility, leaving motorists unable to see and avoid hazards ahead.

"Even our major highways in northern Victoria, including the Hume, Calder, Midland, Maroon-dah, Murray Valley and Goulburn Valley Highways, have fallen into a state of dangerous disrepair. Many other state arterial roads also suffer from a lack of maintenance, and are in desperate need of repair and full rehabilitation of the worst sections."

Debbie Skinner becomes new Alexandra Rotary president

WELL-known local, Debbie Skinner has taken on the presidency of the Rotary Club of Alexandra. While she admitted that "it is a big move," she has spent a long time as a member of the club and is looking forward to the challenge.

She explained that she became the first female member of Alexandra Rotary around the year 2000. Since that time, "I have always maintained a connection and rejoined again a number of years ago and worked with international projects."

Speaking about her plans for the year, Debbie said, "Because of the bushfires, things did change enormously and that has to be the priority, bushfire recovery. As we know, particularly for those who were in the 2009 fires, things happen in a survival mode initially. Lots of people move on, other people remain displaced, and it takes a long time.

"People might make decisions and change those decisions about where they live, how they're supported, what they can do, what they can't do, up to 10 years later.

"We've certainly been very active. Rotarians have worked very hard since the bushfires in January. Just under \$100,000 has been allocated to the com-

munity via a voucher system, using that within local businesses and also through other projects."

The Rotary International theme for the year is 'Creating lasting impact.'

Debbie said, "That is really about sustainable change. Everything we need to do in planning, like we do with many of our projects, is looking at what can we do now, what do we need to do now, what is actually happening in the community and how can we support that? How does it become sustainable and what can we do about that?"

Rotary has a variety of different committees, with people concentrating on different areas and thing they enjoy. Debbie said, "It's a massive organisation with enormous opportunities."

She has been to many Rotary Clubs around the world as she found these visits to be fascinating, including the type of local projects they were working on and "how they differed so dramatically."

There were also so many different kinds of people participating. In Hong Kong for example, the Rotarians were people who owned race courses and hotels, while in Cairo the Rotarians were often generals from

the armed forces, protecting artefacts.

She said, "Every Rotary and every situation is unique, but there's a commonality. There are many common goals... We work through community services, youth services, international services where we do projects and give funds to help people in disadvantaged countries, and we have vocational services where we support the kids at school in fostering relationships and also in the secondary college with mentoring in terms of interviews, helping them get ready for the workforce by doing mock interviews."

In addition to the many exciting things to do in the local Rotary Club, the club is also part of the district grouping. These groups might hold get-togethers and work on joint projects. There may also be financial support from different clubs when a specific Rotary area is facing a challenge.

Debbie works as a nurse consultant at the Alexandra Medical Centre, with a lot of her work involving chronic conditions including diabetes and wound management.

She said, "I guess my particular love, and what I always knew I was born to be, was someone who cared for other

people. From probably about three-years-old, I knew that I was on this earth to care for others and that's what I've done my whole career. That's taken me to many places, post-graduate degrees and probably 15 years in the Navy Reserve as well."

When she first moved to Murrindindi Shire, she was pregnant with her third son. He is now aged 30. She said, "I feel like the 30 years that I've had here would equal any amount of time in Melbourne. It's just been so jam-packed with things to do, things that we've explored, the amount we've worked in the community. It's just been an enormous, enormous ride, enormous chapters in this community and somewhere I'd never leave, to the point where my sister now lives here and my parents were both at Kellock Lodge.

"I'd never go anywhere else because when I was growing up, I was really a surfy chick, a surfy girl, and it was all about the beaches and the water and lots of other things. As an adult, give me a cold river, some mountains, lots of green, and I don't think I could work in a healthcare environment unless I had these mountains around me because it's what keeps my feet grounded."

NAIDOC Week celebrates and recognises the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It provides an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous liv-

This year marked the 50th anniversary of NAIDOC Week, with Aunty Angela speaking about her family's history in the Yea area, and about the artwork on the poster created for this year's event. She also clarified 'deadly' in the Indigenous tradition refers to something or someone being "excellent, brilliant, amazing or awesome" and that it's not a threat. She compared it to the words 'wicked' or 'sick' in English.

Mayor Damien Gallagher thanked Aunty Angela for her speech and said, "It frustrates me when I hear people say that they don't need to be welcomed to their own country, because the traditional owner notion of Country, Aunty Angela's notion of Country, is not like a contemporary sense of ownership. It's about a connection between people and place. Just like my connection to a Murrindindi

sunset, or yours to your back paddock."

He also stated that Murrindindi Shire Council is proud to sponsor the week of engaging NAIDOC events.

He said, "This year's NAIDOC theme reminds us of the strength, resilience, and contributions of First Nations peoples, and of the importance of listening, learning, and walking together with respect and understanding. NAIDOC Week is not only a celebration, it's an invitation to deepen our understanding, to honour truth-telling, and to build stronger relationships with our communities."

Forest Fire Management now recruiting

FOREST Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) is recruiting entry-level forest firefighter positions across Victoria for the upcoming bushfire season. Both ongoing and seasonal roles are available.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said seasonal firefighters boost Victoria's firefighting ca-

capacity in the lead-up to summer and during the peak fire season.

"New recruits train and work alongside our permanent firefighters, responding to bushfires to keep communities safer this summer."

"They will be part of a team of close to 1800 frontline personnel and 1200

accredited incident management staff this bushfire season.

"These are fantastic jobs doing practical work, right at the frontline of protecting communities and the environment."

FFMVic firefighters responded to more than 900 bushfires across the state last summer and delivered

priority planned burns.

Mr Hardman said seasonal firefighter roles provide rewarding career opportunities for those with a passion for the outdoors, learning new skills and making a difference.

"In addition to responding to bushfires and helping to deliver planned burns, seasonal firefighters

also undertake pest and weed control works, and maintain recreational reserves, fuel breaks and forest roads.

Changes to paraquat chemical usage for agriculture

THE Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority (APVMA) announced recently their review decision on the agricultural chemicals paraquat and diquat after concerns were raised linking them to Parkinson's disease. The chemicals will remain available for use in Australia but new restrictions on application rates and equipment will apply.

Paraquat and diquat are non-selective contact herbicides used to support the production of grains, cotton, horticulture, sugarcane, rice, wine and various pastures. They provide cost-effective protection against crop yield losses.

APVMA CEO Scott Hansen said the reviews applied contemporary risk manage-

ment frameworks to rigorous scientific investigation of the impacts of paraquat and diquat on human health and the environment.

"Both chemicals remain available for use with significant new restrictions on application rates and permitted uses," Mr Hansen said.

"To protect users from acute exposure, new restrictions will phase out backpack sprayers and require enclosed mixing and loading systems for all uses, and enhanced personal protection equipment."

The maximum application rate for paraquat will be reduced from 1150g per hectare to 231g per hectare for broadacre use, with a higher rate for technology-assisted optical spot spray-

ing.

New conditions will require enclosed mixing and loading systems, the phasing out of backpack sprayers and mandated enhanced personal protective equipment.

During the review, APVMA received 171 submissions from scientists, doctors, the agricultural industry and other interested parties. Submissions on paraquat and diquat included a range of concerns including human health impact, farming viability and environmental impact.

APVMA found the weight of evidence does not show that paraquat exposure through approved uses increases the risk of developing Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's Australia

disagreed with the APVMA decision, stating that the herbicide is dangerous and banned in more than 70 countries, and campaigned for banning it locally.

Parkinson's Australia CEO Olivia Nassaris said that the incidence of Parkinson's is going to accelerate in the future.

"This is going to be an absolute epidemic and we have to be doing something now if we are to stop it," Ms Nassaris said.

"While we welcome the controls, including increasing PPE requirements and getting rid of backpack sprayers in favour of enclosed cabs, they simply don't go far enough.

"The APVMA has failed not only farmers who use paraquat but all the other

Australians exposed to it. In the 30 years they've been reviewing this chemical, 70 countries around the world have banned it, yet we've still got Aussie farmers using it every day. We're the last to act here, and we've failed."

The National Farmer's Federation (NFF) acknowledges the APVMA final decision and will now take the time to carefully consider the detail of the decision and its implications for farmers and Australia's food and fibre production.

NFF President Hamish McIntyre said farmers take their responsibility to protect people and the environment seriously.

"Without healthy people and a healthy environment, there is no food and fibre

production. That's a fundamental reality for every farm business," Mr McIntyre said.

"We acknowledge the community concern around paraquat, and it is absolutely critical that the products farmers use are safe for both people and the environment."

"Today, agriculture operates under stringent regulations, including strict restrictions on application systems, mandatory personal protective equipment, and training on certification requirements for chemical use."

"These are science-based safeguards designed to protect farmers, their workers, and the environment."

Winter weather sets in at Yea monthly cattle sale

THE July Combined Agents Store Sale took place last Friday at the Yea Saleyards, with over 2000 head of cattle yarded and prices stretching above 490 cents per kilogram (c/kg).

Included in the yardings were various breeds, including Red Angus, Black Angus, Herefords and Charolais. The average price per head stood at \$1810, with the average weight per head at 322kg, equalling out to an average sale price of 562c/kg.

The top steer pen weighed 635kg maximum and sold for \$3160, equalling out to 498c/kg. The top heifer pen had a top weight of 549kg and sold for \$2680, equalling out to 488c/kg. Cows and calves reached a top price per head of \$3650.

Andrew Hill from Elders Yea provided a summary of the sale.

"The agents yarded a total of 2100 cattle, which is pretty good for this time of year. We thought the numbers might have been down a little bit, but obviously the buoyant market's dragged them out of the cupboard," Andrew said.

"The feeder steer market is very strong at the moment. There's a lot of interest in those 300kg cattle. They broke the \$6 barrier at times through the sale."

"You come down to those

410kg cattle, they made \$2490, and 380kg cattle came out at \$2350, which is around that \$6 bracket and a very good result.

"There was a pretty good run of heifers. Top weight was 470kg, they came back at \$2450.

"Overall, the cattle sales the last three weeks have been pretty strong all around the state. Ours was on par with everything everywhere else, in positive territory. There were buyers from Swan Hill and feedlots from around the country."

The next cattle sale at the Yea Saleyards will be on August 7, with combined agents.

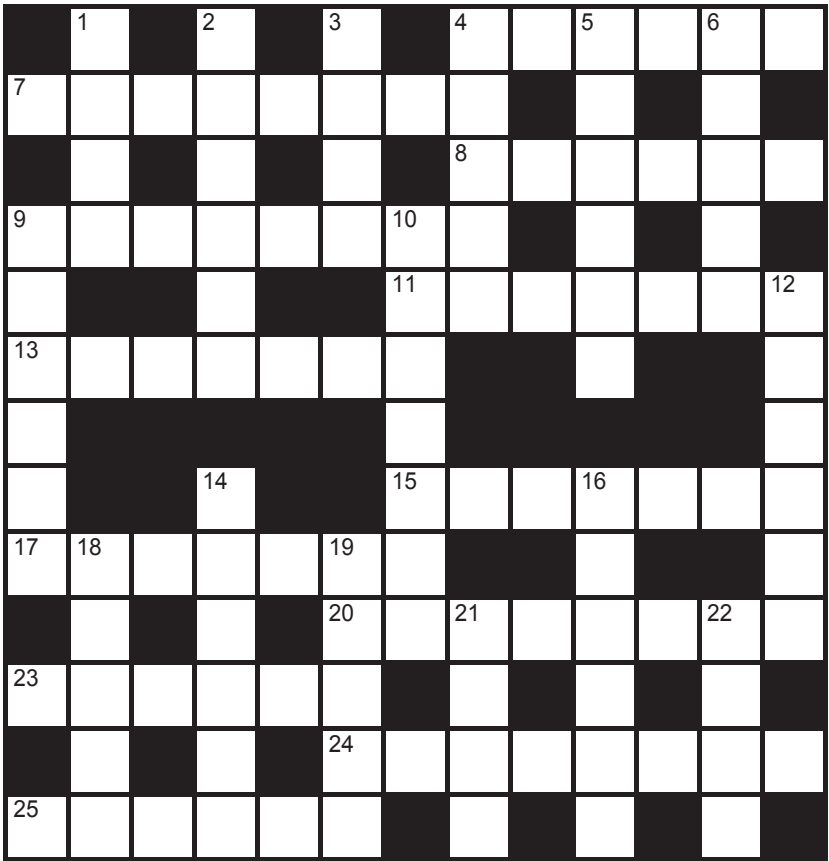

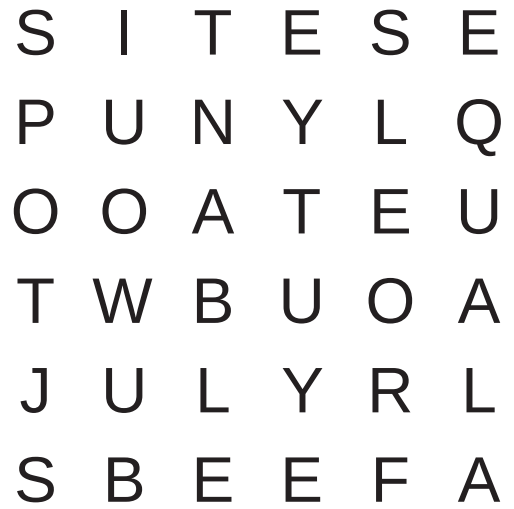

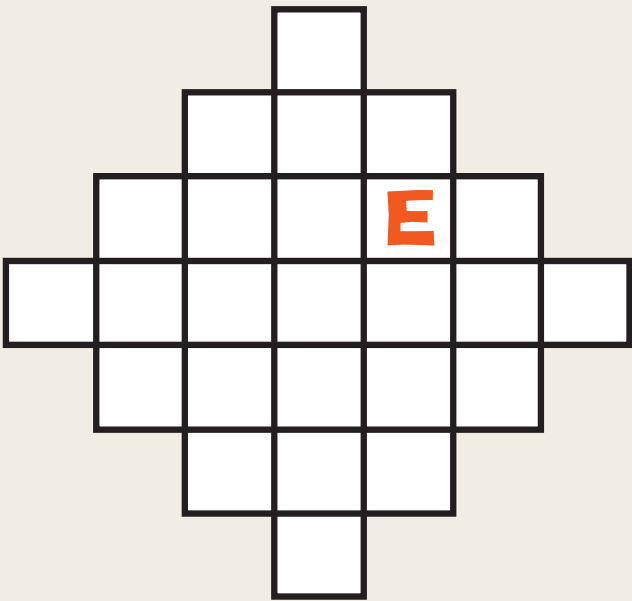

Special event highlights the impact of diabetes

A SPECIAL function at Parliament House recently has highlighted the serious impact of diabetes in community and the need for further support for people living with the disease.

Co-convenor of the Parliamentary Friends of People Affected by Diabetes Gaelle Broad said the event brought together MPs and key stakeholders from the diabetes sector.

“This event was held in conjunction with Diabetes Victoria and was a chance to shine a spotlight on diabetes in the lead up to National Diabetes Week this month,” Ms Broad said.

Ms Broad said diabetes was at least twice as common among people living in regional or remote areas of Victoria compared to those living in the metropolitan areas.

“Diabetes is one of the most significant health challenges facing my electorate of Northern Victoria, with thousands of people living with either Type One, Type Two or gestational diabetes.”

Ms Broad said Northern Victoria contains some of the state’s hotspots for diabetes.

“The Victorian Population Health Survey of 2023 found that the prevalence of Type Two diabetes is significantly higher in adults who live in the local government areas of Murrundindi, Wodonga, Loddon, Mitchell and Yarriambiack,” she said.

“For many regional Victorians, managing diabetes is made more difficult by distance and limited access to healthcare services. Patients often have to travel long distances to see endocrinologists, diabetes educators, podiatrists and other specialists. Longer wait times and workforce shortages in regional health services can delay diagnosis and treatment.”

Ms Broad said complications of diabetes could include heart disease, kidney disease, vision loss and limb amputations. The event at Parliament was a unique opportunity to bring together experts in diabetes, Members of Parliament and most importantly, people living with diabetes.

Concerns over road safety in Glenburn

SOME of the residents of West Bridge Road and Old Glenburn/Kinglake Road in Glenburn are calling for immediate action from Murrindindi Shire Council after more than two years of reporting serious safety concerns related to the current 80 km/h and 100 km/h speed limits through a rural residential area and Kinglake National Park.

The road borders the national park and is used daily by families, school children walking to the bus stop, farmers in slow-moving vehicles, and residents who have no footpaths or safe shoulder, forcing them to walk directly on the road. The area also experiences heavy wildlife movement, resulting in frequent roadkill and dangerous driver evasions.

The road has become a popular route for car clubs and motorbike groups, with many vehicles travelling well above the posted limit and overtaking dangerously on blind bends, forcing residents and wildlife to react quickly.

The residents are now calling on Murrindindi Shire Council to immediately support a speed limit reduction before a serious injury or fatality occurs.

They have submitted three images to council as evidence of their concerns. These images include a dead kangaroo directly under a School Bus Turning sign, highlighting the collision risk for wildlife and the danger posed to children walking to the bus stop; an 80 km/h speed limit sign is placed on a sharp bend where drivers have limited visibility of pedestrians, animals, and slow-moving vehicles; and local residents, including children and dogs, are shown walking on the road due to the complete absence of footpaths or safe verges while vehicles legally travel at 80 km/h.

Residents have undertaken significant efforts to have the matter addressed across the past two years, including contacting Murrindindi Shire councillors, conducting a community survey of 100 households, reporting weekly wildlife fatalities and near misses, documenting high-speed car and motorcycle activity, including harassment of residents, receiving confirmation that council approval is the only barrier to lowering the speed limit, presenting at a council meeting via Zoom, and responding to a council-run survey, the results of which have not been released to the community.

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An update from Samsung on the Rubicon solar farm

STEPHEN Mitchell, Development Manager at Samsung C&T Renewable Energy Australia (SREA), was contacted for an update on the progress of the planned Rubicon solar farm.

He stated, "I can confirm the project remains active within our development pipeline. Project investigations have continued this year alongside ongoing government agency and stakeholder engagement."

"At this stage we are working through internal processes that are part of the normal project development lifecycle. We do not have any material updates, however remain committed to engaging with stakeholders when we have information to share and engage further on. Our timeline is to submit a planning permit application within the year."

They were also asked about the challenges of fog in the valley and the impact on solar output, how they will mitigate fire risk, how they will protect local waterways, how the amenity of neighbouring properties will be protected, how neighbouring property owners will be compensated for any reduction in property values, how the grass beneath the solar panels will be kept low, whether the project will be sold at planning approval stage or early in the active stage, and for assurances that the infrastructure will be removed at end-of-life under all circumstances.

Their responses to the questions will be published in an upcoming edition.

Planting more trees on farms

LANDHOLDERS across Victoria are being supported to integrate more trees into their farming systems, following an extension of the Victorian Trees on Farms (VToF) Program.

The program and Professional Service Provider Register has been extended to November 1, giving eligible landholders more time to apply for grants to establish trees on their properties.

Through the Victorian Trees on Farms Program, landholders can access grants of up to \$40,000 to deliver on-ground works such as shelterbelts, riparian planting and revegetation projects.

The program supports farmers to improve productivity and build resilience, while delivering environmental benefits including better soil health, reduced erosion, increased carbon sequestration and enhanced biodiversity.

Agriculture Victoria Acting Executive Director Forestry and Fibre Industry Liam Costello said the extension would support more landholders to take part in the program.

The VToF program builds on the Victorian Government's broader investment in plantation development and farm forestry, helping landholders diversify income and make the most of their land.

New bond option for renters

RENTERS have until now been forced to pay thousands of dollars for a new bond before receiving the refund from their previous rental home, but from today eligible renters can choose to move their existing bond to their new home.

Tenants Victoria CEO Jennifer Beveridge said the scheme makes a massive difference for renters navigating a tough housing market.

"Moving is stressful enough without having to find thousands of extra dollars to pay a new bond. At the same time people are scraping together rent in advance, facing moving costs and often still paying rent on the property they're leaving. This can amount to thousands of dollars in one hit," Ms Beveridge said.

"This reform makes that process fairer. It means renters have access to their own money at a time when they really need it and won't be left out of pocket waiting for a refund. For the state's approximately 657,000 rental households, this is a massive relief given the heavy financial burden and administrative hassle of moving."

Under the scheme, eligible renters can opt in to move their existing bond to a new rental property. The Victorian Government guarantees the existing bond amount to the rental provider until any claim is finalised.

The government will cover any claims against the old bond, and the renter will then pay the government, not the rental provider.

Seeds of Renewal program to support regional communities

ANZ has opened applications for its 2026 Seeds of Renewal program, committing \$250,000 in funding to help strengthen and sustain remote, rural and regional communities across Australia. Grants of up to \$15,000 are available for eligible not-for-profit and community organisations.

Delivered in partnership with FRRR (Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal), the program is marking its 24th year in 2026 and continues to back grassroots initiatives that respond to local challenges and unlock long-term community benefit.

This year, funding will focus on four key priority areas.

Financial wellbeing initiatives that improve economic participation, particularly for under-represented and disadvantaged people in the community. For example, building financial literacy and vocational skills and providing access to meaningful work.

Housing access initiatives and programs that support those experiencing, or at risk of, homelessness, or that provide housing support for people living with disability.

Environmental sustainability initiatives that restore and conserve the natural environment or contribute to lower carbon emissions, water stewardship and waste minimisation.

Assisting local communities to thrive, which includes projects that either enable vibrant communities, where everyone can participate and build a better life, or create sustainable communities that help deliver demonstrable medium to long-term economic sustainability.

Take action for family fire safety this winter

VICTORIA'S fire services are urging residents to ensure they have working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan, as new figures show an increase in the number of preventable fire fatalities last year.

Across Victoria, figures compiled by CFA and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) show there were 21 preventable residential fire fatalities in 2025.

This compares with 18 equivalent fatalities in 2024, with the highest number of deaths recorded during winter.

The majority of fatal fires in 2025, 85 per cent, started in bedrooms or living rooms.

Now, with many families on school holidays, CFA and FRV are calling on all Victorians to take action to help reduce the number of preventable fire fatalities by ensuring their homes are fitted with working smoke alarms and that all occupants have a practised home fire escape plan.

FRV Acting Deputy Commissioner Community Safety and Operational Training Mark Carter AFSM said simple measures could significantly reduce the risks posed by house fires.

"When a fire breaks out, it spreads extremely quickly, meaning you, your family and other people you live with could have just seconds to escape," he said.

"These school holidays we're asking families to check their smoke alarms, replace those that are not working or are more than 10 years old, and practise their home fire escape plan.

"It is important to involve children who live in the home.

"Research shows that children aged up to four years are at increased risk in the event of a fire, so a home fire escape plan supported by working smoke alarms could save lives."

Acting Deputy Commissioner Carter said a home fire escape plan should be tailored to the living environment and the abilities of everyone in the home, including young children, older people and those with mobility issues.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan AFSM said an effective home fire escape plan starts with having working smoke alarms fitted throughout the home.

"Most fire fatalities are preventable. If you think you are going to wake up during a house fire, think again.

"There are gases in the room putting you further to sleep, so a smoke alarm is really the only thing that will ensure you are alerted when a fire occurs and give you the opportunity to escape," Chief Officer Heffernan said.

"We recommend intercon-



ected smoke alarms, so that when one goes off, all smoke alarms will sound across the home.

"If you have battery-operated smoke alarms, remember to check and test them regularly and replace their batteries yearly."

Whoooo knew? Owls are raptors too

The Powerful Owl (*Ninox strenua*) and the Australian Boobook (*Ninox boobook*) are featured this month in the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority's 2026 Year of the Raptor community awareness campaign.

Goulburn Broken CMA project officer, Janice Mentiplay-Smith, said it could be surprising to learn owls are raptors, carnivorous birds of prey that hunt and feed on live prey including rabbits, rodents, fish, lizards and other birds.

"With their flat, feathery faces known as facial discs, large forward-facing eyes, upright stance and circles of feathers under their eyes, they don't look much like a traditional raptor, such as a Wedge-tailed Eagle," Ms Mentiplay-Smith said.

"However, their sharp talons, curved beak and ability to 'fly silent' paired with their exceptional vision and hearing, put them firmly in the raptor category."

Ms Mentiplay-Smith said owls have some very useful hunting skills.

"Unlike other raptors, owls can turn their head up to 270 degrees to help them locate prey. They also have asymmetrical ears, so any noise made by potential prey reaches each ear at slightly different times which helps

them to precisely pinpoint the location of the next meal.

"As well, their sound absorbing feathers reduce the noise of their flapping wings."

Owls, like other raptors, regurgitate the non-nutritious parts of their prey. Several hours after eating they produce a pellet of 'leftovers'. Once rid of the unnecessary bits and pieces, they are ready to hunt and eat again.

Australia is home to 11 owl species. Those that call the Goulburn Broken catchment home vary greatly in size between species: the smallest is the Australian Boobook which weighs around 300 grams and measures around 30 centimetres. The largest is the Powerful Owl which can have a wingspan up to 1.4 metres and weigh approximately 1.4 kilograms.

"As Australia's largest owl, the Powerful Owl lives in large tracts of forest where it can access territory, nesting hollows and food," Ms Mentiplay-Smith said.

"A menu favourite is the Brushtail Possum, which also relies on tree hollows, emphasising the importance of retaining large old trees which has this important habitat. Tree hollow loss is one of the challenges faced by the Powerful Owl."

Powerful Owls have a

slow, double-note 'whoohoo' call that can be heard across one or more kilometres. In comparison, Australia's smallest owl, the Australian Boobook has a distinctive two-toned call that sounds like 'mopoke' or 'morepork'; a word that is often used as its common name.

Like all owls, the Australian Boobook has excellent night-time vision, however, possibly as an evolutionary trade off, it does not perceive colour very well. Its wingspan is between 60 to 80 centimetres and it can weigh up to 300 grams.

The Australian Boobook feeds on insects and small mammals, including microbats, which it catches mid-air. Ground dwelling prey is pounced upon once spotted from a tall perch.

Tuesday, August 4 is International Owl Awareness Day where you can celebrate and learn about owls from around the world.

Bush Heritage features interesting stories about owls of Australia and BirdLife Australia's citizen science Powerful Owl Project. The BirdLife website provides interesting reading on how everyday people are assisting the survival of the Powerful Owl in the challenging urban environments of South-east Queensland and

Chemist Care Now program.

It helps people avoid a trip to the GP for conditions like uncomplicated UTIs or musculoskeletal pain, as well as a prescription for the oral contraceptive pill.

Since launching, highly trained pharmacists across the state have delivered almost 100,000 services, the majority to women.

Virtual Emergency Department

The Victorian Government's Virtual Emergency Department connects Vic-

torians with emergency doctors and nurses via video call, 24/7.

This free service provides fast and convenient access to advice from clinicians without any need to leave home.

Since launching in 2020, the Virtual ED has delivered more than 900,000 consultations. In the past year, around 83 per cent of patients who used the service avoided an unnecessary trip to hospital.

Nurse-on-call

Nurse-on-call also offers 24/7 care, with registered nurses providing immediate, expert advice.

Victorians should call Triple Zero in emergencies, but non-urgent cases may be directed to alternative care options.
