Communities LEAPing towards resilience

FIVE communities across Murrindindi Shire have successfully completed the LEAPing into Resilience Project, creating Local Emergency Action Plans (LEAPs) to help them withstand the impacts of natural disasters. The communities are Flowerdale, Glenburn, Marysville and Triangle, Toolangi and Castella, and Yea and district.

The LEAPing into Resilience Project is a joint initiative between Murrindindi, Mansfield and Strathbogie Shire Councils, made possible with funding from the Australian Government.


The first round of the LEAP Project was designed to help communities prepare for and recover after emergencies. It provided opportunities for community members to connect with each other and receive training in areas they identified as important, such as what to do in the first 72 hours after an emergency, chainsaw use and maintenance, grant writing skills and psychological first aid. Council would like to thank the community members who participated, and emergency services volunteers and agencies for their guidance and input into the project.

With the completion of this project, community members who participated from these five communities are now better equipped with skills and knowledge to increase their resilience. Council encourages all community members to practise preparedness, and familiarise themselves with the finalised LEAPs on the website at *murrindindi.vic*. *gov.au/leaps* A second round of the LEAP Project is coming in April 2025, as council has been successful in securing extra funding to work with more communities. The new grant funding is from the *Safer Together Program* through the Victorian Government's Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA). This upcoming project will be in partnership with Mansfield Shire Council.

Murrindindi Shire Council's Community Wellbeing Portfolio Councillor Jodi Adams encouraged more communities to nominate for the project. "Our residents who were involved in the LEAPing into Resilience project have already taken the jump and are building towards stronger communities with increased resilience. Feedback from those involved has been positive, and I would highly encourage our communities who were not involved the first time to contact council and nominate for the upcoming opportunity."

"Real opportunities for capacity building, such as the chainsaw operation course, help our communities prepare for the future, and the equally important, but harder to measure, connection between our people, provides a key pillar of resilience in the face of adversity," Cr Adams added.

Marysville Community Centre powering forward

ON Monday, March 10, Victorian Minister for Energy and Resources Lily D'Ambrosio announced that Murrindindi Shire Council has been successful in securing grant funding for a battery storage and solar PV installation at the Marysville Community Centre as part of round two of the Victorian Government's \$42 million 100 Neighbourhood Battery Program.

The project at the Marysville Community Centre is being funded as part of a joint initiative led by the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance in partnership with 10 councils across regional Victoria, with support from the Goulburn Murray Climate Alliance of councils.

Climate change and extreme weather events pose an increasing risk to electricity infrastructure in Murrindindi Shire. Marysville has been affected by multiple weather events in recent years, that caused extended grid outages. With extreme weather events in the region becoming more frequent, there is a growing need for the establishment of an energy resilient hub in Marysville.

Following detailed feasibility and business case work undertaken in partnership with the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance in 2024, council identified the Marysville Community Centre as a suitable location for an energy resilience hub for the town and surrounding areas.

The project will double the current solar at the centre and install an energy backup system of a 120 kWh battery to future-proof this site as an energy resilient hub for residents of Marysville and surrounding areas to access in the event of an extended grid outage.

The system should provide up to three days backup power. It can also charge from solar while the mains power is out, extending this time.

The success of this grant funding is an important step towards making Marysville Community Centre a more energy-efficient, resilient, and sustainable space for the community. Murrindindi Shire Council is proud to be playing a leadership role in the facilitation of local energy solutions that create long-term environment and financial benefits and demonstrate a model for others to follow.

Batteries funded through the 100 Neighbourhood Batteries Program are helping Victoria reach its target of at least 2.6 GW of energy storage by 2030 and 6.3 GW by 2035.

Council is grateful to the Victorian Government for its support and looks forward to the successful completion of this project in 2026. Council would also like to acknowledge the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance for its support of sustainability initiatives in our region.

Murrindindi Shire Council's Cathedral Ward Councillor Sandice McAulay was pleased with the outcome for the Marysville community.

"This neighbourhood battery will make a difference to the Marysville community and increase resilience in an area of high fire and storm risk. It also aligns with Council's sustainability goals for Murrindindi Shire. I would like to thank the Victorian Government for the grant funding, as projects of this size are beyond the scope of small regional councils like ours. The success of projects like this shows the impact we can have when we work together," Cr McAulay said.

Rural communities to be hit hardest by new state government levy

A REVAMPED Victorian Government emergency services levy is set to rip \$140 million from rural communities annually according to a new analysis, prompting urgent calls for the tax to be scaled back.

The new Emergency Services and Volunteer Fund represents a 150 per cent tax hike on some rural landholders, when compared to the Fire Services Levy it is designed to replace. This is despite a complete lack of guarantees regarding how (or where) the new money will be spent.

"This new levy is dreadfully unfair. It's going to smash farm budgets, hurt local businesses and cause job losses in our towns and communities," RCV Chair Cr Rob Amos warned.

"Every extra dollar we send to Spring Street is a dollar that can't be spent in a local business or used to pay an employee."

Aside from the weather, financial stress is already the leading driver of poor farmer mental health.

"Everybody agrees our emergency services need a boost."

"This new levy will hit Victorian farmers the hardest. How does that make any sense after years of drought and amid a cost-of-living crisis?" Cr Amos said.

"At the very least this new tax burden should be shared equally among all Victorian landholders."

RCV is also concerned by the Victorian Government's refusal to guarantee that money raised by the levy will only be spent on local CFA and SES crews, equipment and infrastructure

Rural Councils Victoria has written to the Victorian Treasurer, Jaclyn Symes, sharing this new analysis and raising its concerns. We look forward to sitting down with the Treasurer to ensure she's aware of the impact the ESVF will have on Victoria's farmers and rural communities.

Other concerns RCV holds about this new levy include: Rural councils will be required to collect this new annual levy through rates notices and then pass the money onto the state. However, forcing local governments to collect a Victorian Government tax is unfair. The State Revenue Office exists for this exact purpose and should be the vehicle for collection. There's nothing to stop the Victorian Government increasing the levy in the future. This contrasts with local councils, which have been subject to a rate cape of 2.38

per cent (average over 10 years). The rate cap is essentially a cap on council funding for local services and infrastructure. Either way, the new levy should be capped also, or subject only to scheduled increases. The Victorian Government says CFA and SES volunteers will be exempt from the new ESVF levy. But this is only partially true, as the exemption will only apply to one rateable property. Most farmers hold the title for numerous rateable properties and will therefore still be required to pay a significant fee.

"The Emergency Services Volunteer Fund levy isn't scheduled to come into force until July," Cr Amos said.

"There's still time for the Victorian Government to acknowledge the inequities and unforeseen consequences of this new levy and make changes.'

A Statement from Murrindindi Shire Council said, "Council recognises the critical role that emergency services play in protecting our communities and the importance of ensuring they are adequately funded. However, we are deeply concerned about the financial impact of the new Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) on our rural and regional ratepayers, as well as the additional burden placed on

councils to collect this levy on behalf of the State Government.

"Council is closely monitoring the issue and engaging with the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV), Rural Council's Victoria (RCV) and other councils to advocate for a fairer approach. We will continue to raise the impact on farming and commercial ratepayers in our discussions with the State Government.

Rural Councils Victoria first published this release. Murrindindi Shire Council is represented on the RCV committee.

Council responds to handdelivered concerns

AT the March council meeting, during the public participation section, Garry Angus handed over an envelope to Livia Bonazzi containing concerns.

Council was asked to provide further information on this, including the nature of the allegations and any investigations being undertaken.

Council responded, "At the council meeting on March 26, Mr Garry Angus spoke about the subdivision and civil works at 45-47 Carey Road, Killingworth, and handed an envelope to the CEO during public participation.

"Council treats all correspondence and documents received from community members in a confidential and respectful manner. The content of Mr Angus's verbal comments and the fact that he tabled documents in a public meeting are now part of the public record.

"Mr Angus asked a series of questions that relate to a range of matters, including planning, engineering approvals, and compliance. At this stage, no complaint has been lodged, and no evidence has been presented that would indicate any breach of council process or impropriety.

"Council prides itself on its strong foundations of good governance, integrity and transparency. Our processes are designed to be robust and stand up to scrutiny. As with all questions or suggestions posed by the community, council will review the processes related to this development in accordance with its statutory role and responsibilities. Should any irregularities be identified, council will take appropriate steps, which may include referral for independent review.

"Members of the public who believe they have evidence of wrongdoing are encouraged to raise concerns through the appropriate formal channels. The Public Interest Disclosures Act 2012 (the Act) requires council to maintain internal processes that facilitate disclosures, effectively manage the receipt of information and provide protection for all parties who may be involved. High tides for the 2024-2025 pool season

MURRINDINDI Shire Council's outdoor pools have made a splash this summer, welcoming the highest-ever number of visitors. Nearly 35,000 visits were recorded across Alexandra, Yea, Eildon and Marysville pools

during the 2024-25 season, it was most of the free entry program an impressive increase of almost 25 per cent on the previous record set in 2024.

Mayor Damien Gallagher said it was wonderful to see so many locals and visitors making the

"All of our pools broke attendance records this season. The Alexandra Swimming Pool led the way, becoming the first in the shire to welcome over 10,000 visitors in a single season, more than 2000 above last year's tally. Across all pools, favourable weather conditions meant there was a record low number of pool closures, with one dedicated Marysville swimmer even clocking up 100 visits."

Mayor Gallagher extended his thanks to the Eildon Op Shop which kindly donated new pool toys for the Eildon Swimming Pool. "With 8646 visits recorded at the Eildon pool and the opening of the brand new Baanh ba Djila Splash Park nearby in the Walter Moore and Thomas Marr Reserves, Eildon has solidified its position as a summer destination with local businesses also commenting on the increased visitation in Eildon."

"My sincere thanks to our lifeguards, who worked tirelessly throughout the season to keep everyone safe. I take my hat off to the team, well done on another successful swimming pool season."

The statistics for the pool attendance across the Murrindindi Shire for the 2024-2025 season were as follows: Alexandra 10,624 patrons, Eildon 8646 patrons, Marysville 8224 patrons, and Yea 6884 patrons. This amounted to a total of 34,778 patrons using Murrindindi Shire Swimming Pools.

As council looks ahead, recruitment for the 2025-26 pool season will begin soon. Each year, we recruit around 45 lifeguards and support staff, but like many communities across the state, we are feeling the impact of a statewide lifeguard shortage. Lifeguards are essential to ensuring our pools are safe and enjoyable, so if you or someone you know is interested, keep an eye out on council's website or Facebook page for updates," Mayor Gallagher said.

your smoke alarms

DID you remember to check and change your smoke alarm battery when daylight saving ended? There's still time, and while doing this, it's best to clean them. Vacuum the dust and cobwebs and gently wipe around the unit while making sure they are working correctly.

Fire Rescue Victoria recommends using smoke alarms powered by a 10 year lithium battery for longevity. If you already have one of these there is no need to change the battery yearly until required. If you hear a chirping noise this can mean the battery is running low and needs to be replaced immediately. It is advised to replace all smoke alarm batteries every 10 years, when doing so consider getting interconnected smoke alarms so when one sounds, they all sound throughout the home.

Don Wilson to host photographic exhibition

DON Wilson is a landscape and wildlife photographer from Marysville who will be displaying over three decades of photos at his at-home exhibition on Saturday, April 19 and Sunday, April 20.

He started playing around in the field of photography at about the age of 20, back when cameras were film.

"I have never got really involved in it, I just always had a camera and messed around,' Don said.

"I probably was often disappointed with the results with film, as it takes a long time to get good with film. Once you go to digital and you can take photos and delete them, you advance so quick. I found that I did.'

With his nature photography, Don focusses on capturing the image in the moment and doing as little post-editing as possible.

"Most of what I do, and I've pretty much always done, is got very minimal post-editing etcetera. That's probably why I like wildlife so much, because I do almost nothing to it. It is what it is straight out of the camera. Which, for me, is important.

"Everyone's different of course, but what I take is what was there, and that's important to me.'

He gave some advice for people looking to get started in photography, that it's not about the gear, it's about cultivating the eye for a good shot and taking a number of photos that improve on each other, even of the same subject.

"My main photography thing I guess is not really about gear, it's about seeing what you see and how you capture it. And photography has just gone more that way into photoshop and what you see is maybe not even real anymore.

"Develop your eye. I can see what will make a good photo well before I've got the camera out. I can see the art in a normal landscape and imagine what light can make it better. That's more important than gear.

"Look at lots of photos too, try and understand what you like, what appeals to you. Try and work out if there is a style that is actually yours, which is hard to do these days. When you look at your photos, look at what shouldn't be there as well."

Don's exhibition includes a lot of photography that he's taken over the last five years but hasn't shared and some of his favourite photos from over the years. He mainly presents them in the form of canvas.

"The exhibition is a fair bit of new stuff, but some old favourites as well. It's really just a mix. It's almost 30 years of photography, so it's not a specific thing in general. It's at-home so people can come or not come, and there'll be a sign down the road.

"I've done a lot of seascapes, I've done stuff in Tasmania, up the New South Wales coast and stuff like that. I push the local stuff because it's a bit unique.

"I haven't been sharing a lot of what I've been taking over the last four or five years, which is why I thought I better do the exhibition. I've got this big build-up of stuff again, and I thought I'll put that together."

Drought seminar well-attended

AN event titled *Farming in Dry Conditions: Free seminar and breakfast* was held at the Alexandra Showgrounds on the morning of Thursday, April 3.

Andrew Embling explained that the 2022 Flood Recovery Committee still had some funds left over. He had been a part of a drought committee from 2004 to 2009 and was familiar with the challenges being faced. He suggested to the shire that they form a drought committee, and they said that there was some money left over from the floods so it was diverted to addressing drought impacts through a dry conditions seminar.

The funding came through the state and federal governments, with Murrindindi Shire Council and Alexandra Events providing the funds for coffee and food.

The main speaker was Rob Inglis, a nutritionists from Elders in Wagga. Andrew said, "People went away with a lot of knowledge from him." Kerri Goschnick from Agriculture Victoria also spoke about water. Andrew said, "All in all, it was a great day,

and it was a great lead-up coming into the screening of *Just a Farmer* on May 2."

Alexandra Events will be a major part of the screening, along with all of the agencies.



Positive prices at April cattle sale in Yea

THE April cattle sale at the Yea Saleyards took place last Friday, with a big yarding of 3250 head due to continuing strong interest from northern buyers.

Majority of the cattle were steers and black Angus, with the top price per head being \$2560 and top weight 645 kilograms, making for 411c/kg.

The last three rows of the sale were heifers. Top price was \$1990 and top weight 499.2 kilograms, leading to a strong average of 399c/kg.

On average, the cattle at the sale weighed in at 312 kilograms average and sold for \$1233 per head on average, making 395c/kg the average for the day.

High prices were a good sign for farmers, showing that the industry is still standing strong despite concerns around tariffs and the continuing dry conditions.

Also at the April sale was Dr Anna Manning from Delatite Veterinary Services, who was talking with farmers about zoonotic diseases, or diseases that can spread from cattle to humans, and people from AgBiz Assist were offering rural financial counselling services.

Upcoming cattle sales at the Yea Saleyards include an Elders and Nutrien Store Sale on May 2, and an Alex Scott and Staff Chris Stanley Store Sale on May 9.



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Australian agriculture sector disappointed by tariffs

THE United States recently introduced a 10 per cent tariff on all Australian exports, leaving the agriculture sector disappointed.

The relationship between the Australian and US agricultural industries has been longstanding, with the existence of the Australia-United States Free Trade Agreement supporting trade in the form of zero tariffs on two-way trade.

Australia imports \$2.5 billion AUD worth of US food and agricultural products annually, and around \$400 million worth of farm machinery annually.

In return, the US owns and leases about 2 million hectares of Australian agricultural land, being a multi-billion-dollar investor in our agriculture sector.

Various agricultural organisations have expressed their disappointment in the tariffs since the announcement last Thursday.

President of the National Farmer's Federation (NFF) David Jochinke spoke with Prime Minister Anthony Albanese last week, outlining that the sector does not support the introduction of reciprocal tariffs and supports the government in standing firm in defence of Australia's science-based biosecurity framework.

"This decision is a disappointing step backward for our nations and for the global economy," Mr Jochinke said.

"The Australian agricultural industry supports a considered and measured approach to negotiations with the United States and will work closely with the government and all sides of politics to seek a resolution to this issue," Mr Jochinke said.

"The NFF has long championed free and fair trade, not just for agriculture but all industries, recognising its role in global economic growth and stability. Australian to the US failed to recognise that Australian agriculture is unwavering in its commitment to this.

'While this decision creates unnecessary uncertainty, we remain confident in the strength of Australian agriculture. Our products are sought after worldwide for their quality, sustainability, and reliability."

The NFF also welcomes the government's \$50 million commitment to help affected sectors diversity markets and will seek clarity on how the funding will be delivered.

The Red Meat Advisory Council (RMAC) and its members are disappointed in the United States' decision to impose tariffs on Australian red meat exports destined for the US.

Red Meat Advisory Council (RMAC) Chair, Mr John McKillop, said the decision to impose a 10 per cent tariff on goods imported

red meat contributes to stable food supplies and prices in the United States.

"While Australian meat exports will shortly be subjected to a 10 per cent tariff, there is no ban on Australian red meat and our trade with the US will continue," Mr McKillop said.

"However, it remains a disappointing decision from the US, in stark contrast to our 20-year partnership under the Australia-United States Free Trade Agreement (AUSFTA).

"Last year, 2024, was a record year for Australian red meat exports, driven by strong global demand. Australian producers can be assured that we operate in a strong global trading environment with high demand for our red meat from over 100 markets.

Mr McKillop said the Australian red meat industry, in partnership with the Australian government, has worked to alleviate economic trade barriers, including tariffs, via the negotiation of free trade agreements (FTAs) over a number of years. As a result, 91 per cent of beef, 74 per cent of sheep meat and 89 per cent of goat meat exports traded globally are covered under existing FTAs, which remain effective.

"The US was Australia's largest red meat export market in 2024, worth A\$6.07B, almost one third of total global exports. The US will continue to be a key market despite these tariffs," Mr McKillop said.

Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA) Managing Director, Michael Crowley, said that MLA and the industry had already been working on this issue throughout 2025 with the formation of an industry taskforce and collaboration and communication with the Australian Government.

"US tariffs will impact the prices paid by American families and may have flow on impacts on the supply chain. It is unlikely these changes will make a difference to retail prices here in Australia," Mr Crowley said.

Free RSV Protection for eligible families

THE long acting immunisation to keep babies safe from Respiratory Synctial Virus (RSV) is now free for families until September 30. It was announced that the RSV imumunisation will be free for all newborns if their mother wasn't vaccinated during pregnancy.

RSV is a highly infectious virus that infects up to 90 per cent of children within the first two years of life. The Victorian Government is delivering a free program to protect around 40,000 Victorian babies born this RSV season.

As part of the program, the long-acting monoclonal antibody, nirsevimab, is administered in hospital as part of standard post-birth care, helping parents save and avoiding visits to the GP

"I am passionate about ensuring our Elders are

Treaty is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to reshape our future on our own terms. It is about truthtelling, justice, and ensuring the next generations inherit a legacy of strength, culture, and sovereignty.

Eligible infants aged up to two years who are vulnerable to severe RSV disease will be protected thanks to a dedicated catch-up program.

The Victorian Government's state-based program complements the Commonwealth maternal vaccine, Abrysvo, which commenced in February as part of the coordinated national effort to protect as many babies as possible.

Mothers are encouraged to get vaccinated during their pregnancy to help build immunity in their baby as early as possible. However, for those unable to be immunised with Abrysvo, or mums immunised less than two weeks before delivery, the Victorian-funded, nirsevimab, will now be available for babies.

In Australia, RSV is the most common cause of hospitalisation in infants because it can often progress to pneumonia or bronchiolitis in very young children.
