Rotary hears from family violence specialist

AT their most recent meeting, members of Alexandra Rotary listened to an informative address from Finn, specialist family violence

children's clinician at Nexus Primary Health. Finn has been helping children and families affected by family violence in our area for over 20 years.

In Murrindindi in 2023-24 there were 1201 reports of family violence. Family violence includes physical, emotional, psychological financial and sexual abuse, coercive control within family groups. It is a disproportionate use of power to gain control over others. Regional areas including Murrindindi experience higher rates of family violence compared to metropolitan areas, with less access to resources partly to blame, and less anonymity.

No large scale land tenure changes for **Central Highlands?**

THE Eminent Panel for Community Engagement (EPCE) completed their work on the Central Highlands state forest in October 2024 and it is currently being considered by government.

The Victorian Environmental Assessment Council (VEAC) website states, "On July 31, 2024, Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos MP extended the date for VEAC to submit its final report to one month after the government publicly releases the Eminent Panel on Community Engagement's report on Central Highlands state forest."

The government was asked when the EPCE report be released, and the reasons behind the delay.

A Victorian Government spokesperson responded, "Victoria's forests are the heart of our state, our forests are spaces for families to experience their favourite activities like camping, fishing, hunting and walking.

"We have heard that Victorians want to enjoy the great outdoors with access to a wide range of recreational opportunities, while protecting what we love about our iconic bush for generations to come.

"We see a future where the benefit of our forests are enjoyed by all Victorians. The government will not be considering large scale land tenure changes."

Attempts were made to confirm whether the statement relating to no large scale land tenure changes definitely applies to the Central Highlands rather than the Great Outdoors Taskforce area, however no response was received by the time the newspaper went to print.

The EPCE was set up to talk with people and organisations to understand values and priorities for forests in the Central Highlands. They spoke to over 1000 people at 60 engagement sessions and received over 14,000 responses through Engage Victoria to its consultation on the future of State Forests in Victoria's Central Highlands.

She reached out to Alexandra Rotary for financial support because the government redistributed the funding for the specialist family violence unit, leaving six very experienced staff and hundreds of vulnerable children and their families without support.

Nexus Primary Health resolved to retain the three therapists under community health funding, and with additional community support such as Rotary's donation will be able to cover the copayment for families seeking counselling. \$13 may not seem a lot, but for some families it can be the difference between feeding their families, or not, tonight.

Family violence is not just a personal tragedy. It is a community crisis affecting our whole community.

In 2023 Victoria Police responded to 94,170 family violence incidents statewide, one every six minutes. One in three women in Victoria have experienced physical and/or sexual violence since age of 15. Family violence incidents have increase 38 per cent over the last 10 years.

Challenges include limited emergency housing options for victims seeking immediate safety, geographical isolation hinders access to support services.

Another topic discussed was elder abuse. Elder abuse involves harm to older individuals by someone they trust, often a family member. Psychological (63 per cent) and financial (62 per cent) abuses are the most reported. Physical abuse accounts for 16 per cent of reports, and social abuse 11 per cent.

In 91 per cent of cases the abuser is a family member, commonly sons (39 per cent) or daughters (28 per cent).

Approximately one in six older Australians experience some form of elder abuse.

Local data is limited, but demographic trends suggest the issue is pertinent in


It's understood that the government will respond to both the Eminent Panel and Great Outdoor Taskforce's reports together to provide a holistic picture on the future of Victoria's state forests.

Murrindindi Shire, although our rural setting may exacerbate challenges in reporting and accessing support services.

Community response and support


I wish to point out that it is possible to claim an exemption under section 23 of the Circular Economy (Waste Reduction and Recycling) Act 2021. An exemption is to be

granted when the property is not generating sufficient waste, or you don't want the service and the property is outside the compulsory waste collection zone.

The compulsory zone applies to properties 'within a township or low-density residential area" so it does not apply to most farming properties. Residents can apply for an exemption through the council website at murrindindi.vic.gov.au/Services/Bins-Rubbish-and-Recycling/Kerbside-Collection-Service

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The death cap mushroom is lethal, even in the smallest quantities. -S

Poisonous mushrooms growing in Victoria

AN alert from the Chief Health Officer was issued on Tuesday, May 6 as the poisonous death cap and yellow staining mushroom are appearing in Victoria now that autumn has arrived, and the weather is becoming wetter and cooler.

These mushrooms can be lethal and consuming even a single death cap mushroom may result in death. Even cooking, peeling or drying these mushrooms does not remove or inactivate the poison in these mushrooms.

There is no home test available to distinguish the safety of mushrooms and determine whether they are poisoinous or not. The best way to source mushrooms is to purchase them from a supermarket, greengrocer, or other reputable sources.

sense of recovery, however the toxin will have entered the body's circulation and started causing serious harm, particularly to the liver. Typically, two to four days after ingestion those severely poisoned will develop irreversible liver failure, often associated with kidney failure, that may ultimately result in death.

These mushrooms usually grow under oak trees and the caps are 40 to 160mm in diameter. The cap ranges in colour from pale yellow to green and olive brown and the ridges on the underside of the cap (gills) are white. The base of the stem has

Anyone who collects and consumes wild mushrooms of unknown species is putting themselves at risk of potential poisoning and serious illness.

Unless you are an expert, do not pick and eat wild mushrooms in Victoria. If you suspect you or anyone in your care may have eaten a poisonous mushroom, do not wait for symptoms to occur before seeking medical attention.

Pets can develop a range of illness from eating wild mushrooms including gastroenteritis-type syndrome to severe life-threatening disease and death. Dogs are more likely than cats to ingest mushrooms.

Death cap mushrooms

THE death cap mushrooms are extremely poisonous, consuming just one mushroom can kill an adult.

Symptoms usually commence six to 24 hours after ingestion with stomach pains, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea. These symptoms can then settle, giving a false

a membrane 'cup'.

Yellow-staining mushrooms

THE yellow-staining mushroom (*Agaricus xanthodermus*) is the cause of most poisonings due to ingestion of wild fungi in Victoria. Symptoms of yellow-staining mushroom poisoning include stomach pain, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea. The severity of symptoms varies with the amount eaten.

This mushroom looks very similar to regular purchased mushrooms or 'cultivated mushrooms' (*Agaricus bisporus*) and to edible wild mushrooms such as the field mushroom (*Agaricus campestris*). In urban areas the yellowstaining mushroom is unfortunately much more common than edible mushrooms. It can grow in large troops in lawns and gardens, and when damaged, the cap and stem stain yellow, later fading to a brownish colour. The mushroom can also emit a chemical-like smell. Contact the Victorian Poisons Information Centre immediately on 131 126, 24 hours a day, seven days a week for appropriate advice. This may include seeking treatment at a hospital emergency department. Keep a sample and a photograph of the mushroom that was consumed to share with the Victorian Poisons Information Centre for expert identification of the mushroom.

If you or anyone in your care has trouble breathing, collapsed, is having a fit or is suffering an anaphylactic reaction, immediately call 000 for an ambulance. Do not call the Victorian Poisons Information Centre in an emergency.

Henry Andrews: From Vietnam to the Alexandra RSL

HENRY Andrews joined the Alexandra Returned and Services League (RSL) when he moved to Alexandra in 2003 from Melbourne with his wife Yvonne, and became president of the Alexandra RSL in 2009, at a delayed AGM due to the Black Saturday bushfires.

"The 2009 AGM was postponed due to the fires, as the RSL hall was used as a clothing distribution centre. It was in March that I went down to see Keith Bennett [then Alexandra RSL president] and he was in terminal, down at St Vincent's Hospital. We came back and had our AGM in March, and that's when I took over as president," Henry said.


"It was quite interesting, my first ANZAC Day service. I was a bundle of nerves, being the first time I'd ever done it. I got through it, and I inaugurated a Vietnam veteran's service up here as well."

He served as president until 2017, when he stepped back to become vice-president due to health issues. At the time he was also on the boards of the Murrindindi Climate Network and the Murrindindi Cancer Support Group. These health issues continued, which has led to the decision to soon leave the Alexandra area. started doing the tests. The orderly came and put a thermometer in my mouth. They took the thermometer out and everyone started running, I was 108, which is about 43 degrees. I ended up in an ice bath and was in a coma for about a week."

During the war he was also working as a technician in a control centre when dichlorodiphenyl-trichloroethane (DDT) entered the facility through the air vents. He spent two days in hospital following the incident, as he had inhaled a lungful of the chemical.

During a mortar attack a piece of shrapnel took a chunk out of his shoulder when he left a safety bunker to turn off the signal light that the enemy was using as a target for their military base.

Henry stayed in the army for some 20 years after returning from Vietnam, working in a construction squadron tasked with building communications centres among other various roles.



Long before coming to Alexandra, Henry served in the Signal Corps in the Vietnam War, working as a technician.

"I went to Vietnam in April 1966 and came home in May 1967. I had nearly 14 months there. I was in the Signal Corps, one of the technicians operating the transmitter station on the outskirts of Saigon. That was 12 hours on, 24 hours off. I did that from mid-April all the way through to October without a break," Henry said.

"The reason I finished up then was because I got dengue fever. That put me into hospital, but they didn't know what was wrong with me. I got two days off and a few Panadol and a 'you should be okay'. I was just going downhill.

"They took me into 17th field hospital, which is an American hospital, and they

He struggled with mental health, as many returned soldiers do. Asked how he dealt with this issue, he replied "mainly, I hate to say it, but I spent my time drunk. But I had a lot of people helping, family and that sort of thing. Plus I had a couple of outside hobbies, so that kept me going too."

Henry married his wife, Yvonne, on January 22, 1966. The pair had been engaged for 18 months, and brought the wedding forward to before Henry was deployed to Vietnam.

"I knew I was going to Vietnam when I got posted to this unit. So I went and asked, 'when am I likely to go?' and they said, this was December 1965, 'you won't be going until October or November," Henry said.

"I went and had a talk to Yvonne, and we decided we'd bring all the wedding stuff forward, so we got married January 22. I only had three days' leave. When I came back I got called into the orderly's room, and they said 'go pack your bags, you're going to Canungra on Thursday for a month of jungle training'.

"I did that, came back, and did two weeks' training on the transmitters to bring me up to speed. I had a week in vacation leave and then I was gone [to Vietnam]."

Henry and Yvonne have been married for 59 years, with next January marking their 60th wedding anniversary. They have four children, eight grandchildren and one greatgrandchild.

Though he has been a member of the RSL for a long time, and had some great experiences within the organisation, Henry encountered negativity when initially looking to join.

"In 1968, round about then, I called in after work one day, I was a corporal at the time, to Ringwood RSL, to join. The guy at the desk said he'd go and get some paperwork, go and grab a drink and I'll meet you at the bar," Henry said.

"I went and got a drink, which back in those days was rum and coke. There were two guys down the other end of the bar, I walked down to introduce myself. The first one sitting there said 'listen son, when you've been to real war, you can come back and talk to us'.

"I put my drink down on the bar and walked out, and I've never ever done that. I always finish a drink."

When asked what the RSL brings in terms of positivity and support, Henry replied that it is an important organisation because "it's a group of people who understand what you've been through. It's very difficult to try to explain to people who have never been scared of what's happening around you and there's nothing you can do about it."

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Allan Weeks celebrates 90 years

ALEXANDRA local Allan Weeks recently celebrated his 90th birthday so it was time to sit down for a chat, to find out about his remarkable achievements.

Allan was born at Alexandra's Kia-Ora guest house, run at the time by his father's sister, a nurse. It was located near the railway station. He initially attended Acheron Primary School because the state school teacher lived in Alexandra and drove past their door every day, in the days before buses. Later he moved to Alexandra Primary School, and at high school level, he attended Ivanhoe Grammar.

Allan's interest in photography started while he was in the last couple of year of his primary school education, starting out using a Box Brownie. Unfortunately, the first film he developed didn't work out. He managed to improve through trial and error, and built a plywood dark room at the end of his father's garage. As for his parents, "Well, they didn't say I couldn't do it," he said laughing.

After high school, Allan worked on his father's farm for a couple of years, before taking a job at the photography business, Granger Studios in Toorak, for two years. He didn't initially take photos but was a photographic assistant as well as working in the darkroom and proofing. It was in this role that he met a photographer with The Age. He taught Allan how to print thin negatives using a variety of techniques. This later came in handy in the air force, based in Laverton.

Allan said, "I put my name down to go to Korea [in 1954], but I was knocked back for no reason that I could at the time, but I think I heard later I was very good at producing photographs from a thin negative that you can hardly see anything on... and the commanding officer wanted to keep me there as long as possible, until I left the air force. In hindsight, who knows? You don't know whether you might pick up a stray bullet there. Might be just as well I didn't go."

Allan first met Patricia when he was stationed at Laverton. He used to go with friends to the Heidelberg Town Hall on Saturday nights. He said, "This particular night I met Pat. We used to have to leave about 11pm to be in by midnight. Here's muggins me walking down Geelong Road hitchhiking at about 1am. We got down there [to Laverton] and if I had gone in to the gate, I would have been slapped in the guard house. So it was over the back fences of Laverton, in the back way. In those days they didn't have big high fences around the airports like they do today," Allan said. Fortunately, he wasn't caught. Allan and Pamela married on May 17, 1958.

The couple moved back to Alexandra, where Allan started a photographic business.

He became a news photographer for the ABC, The Sun, GMV6 and the Alexandra Standard. He had an arrangement with the Alexandra Standard where they included his photos with a credit, as it was good publicity for him. He was happy with that. He was oncall with the Herald Sun, where his coverage included covering the Violet Town train crash.

One of his most memorable jobs was at Mount Buffalo, and he regards it as one of his best news stories. Two people or more were killed on Mount Buffalo when a bus they were travelling in was his by a falling rock. He received a call from *The Sun*, asking him to go up and take photos. He was told that a plane would be waiting for him at the Porepunkah airstrip. Allan knew Mount Buffalo fairly well as he'd been there before on news stories. He said to Reg, the pilot, who had been taking him to Porepunkah that they should fly over the ridge. As they did so, they saw a heavy haulage truck with the bus on the back, lifted up by its front wheels and a hole in the side. "To top it off, there were big rocks up the back," Allan said. "So I took photographs. We turned around. Twenty minutes later, we were back down at Moorabbin." From there, he called the pictures editor of the Sun and said that he had the photos. He initially wasn't believed as it had been so fast. The images made the centre page and the front page.

He also took photos of Prince Charles and Princess Anne at Timbertop, as well as doing an exclusive story on Malcolm Fraser with wife Tammy at Lake Eildon.

He fondly recalled winning third prize in a worldwide film competition, with competitors including the British Army and the American Army Medical Centre. Doctor Joan Esser at the Mansfield Autism Statewide Services. Dr Esser contacted Allan about filming a documentary. Allan didn't charge for his services and Dr Esser paid for all the film. The ABC loaned him a tape recorder. Some of the film was shot at Monash University, filming an autistic child through one way glass. It was titled Autism without Tears.

Flying is something which is close to his heart, and he spoke about the first flying group in the area, which became Lake Eildon Airways, with members including Ian Napier, Rex Tate, John Coles, Allan Courtney, Dr Len Weber and Allan Weeks. One of the biggest scares of Allan's life was when the motor blew up on the second plane they had when they were flying over the Black Spur. At the time, all pilots were trained in forced landings, and so this was what they had to undertake, landing on the side of a hill. Despite this, Allan always loved flying.

Stan Reynolds at the ambulance service in Alexandra needed someone to act as controller. This role "built into something pretty big," Allan said. He stayed with emergencies around the area.

Allan received an OAM at Government House in 2000, for service to the community, particularly through his work with the Alexandra District Voluntary Ambulance Service, where he was secretary/controller, from 1955 to 1994. His wife Pat was also involved in the ambulance service. In addition, Allan was a board member of the Alexandra District Hospital for 35 years, and their treasurer for 27 years.

In addition to also being involved in the ambulance service, wife Patricia is also a botanical artist.

On the farm, the deregulation of the dairy industry caused a significant change for farmers, with many moving to beef cattle. Allan decided in 2001 that it was time for him to retire, aged 69. Both Allan and son Clinton left the family farming partnership, based on the Acheron flats. Allan's brother continued on for a while but then decided to give it up because he could see the writing on the wall.

Following the retirement, Allan and Pat spent the following 20 years going backwards living there for 12 years, largely for the wildflowers, painted by Pat.


Allan and Pat now have five children, Peter, Clinton, Melissa, Carolyn and Sarah, He said, "We're proud of them all. They've all done very well." They also have 13 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

They certainly had a great party for Allan's 90th birthday in Acheron, with over 100 people in attendance.

Pat and Allan moved into central Alexandra from their former home on the Acheron Cutting around six months ago.

He noted that his grandmother, Daisy Ellen Weeks, received an Order of the British Empire (OBE) from the Queen Elizabeth II in London. She was one of the first female shire presidents in Victoria, with the Alexandra Shire Council (now Murrindindi Shire Council). As mentioned, Allan received an OAM, and son Peter Weeks, Alexandra SES controller, received an OAM in 2012 and an Emergency Services Medal (ESM) in 2025.

All are certainly fine efforts, and the family has given much to the area.

Big yarding for Nutrien Spring Drop

THE Nutrien Yea Spring Drop Weaner Sale took place last Friday at the Yea Saleyards, with a big yarding of over 3600 cattle.

A mix of mostly black Angus steer and heifer weaners, prices proved reasonable on the day.

Top price per head for steers was \$1450 with a top weight of \$362 kilograms, making for around 401c/kg, above average.

Heifers on the other hand had a top price per head of \$1100 and a top weight of 321 kilograms. With cents per kilogram equalling out to 343, this made heifers slightly below average when compared to the National Young Cattle Indicator, where the latest report states market average as 363c/kg.


Doing the maths, average price per head for the sale was \$870 and average weight per head was 297 kilograms, equalling to an average of 293c/kg. A large commission buyer from the north helped the sale along, with Duncan Brown purchasing almost half of the available cattle.

The next cattle sale in Yea takes place on the day this edition is published, Wednesday, May 14, with the Elders Yea Autumn Feature Store Sale. The next sales after that are a combined Elders and Nutrien Store Sale on June 6, and an Alex Scott and Staff Store Sale on June 13.







Over 70 members attended the exercise, including more than 55 local CFA members.






