Council approves Eildon Key Worker Housing project

MURRINDINDI Shire Council conducted a special meeting on Wednesday, August 13, to discuss the Eildon Key Worker Housing project. Cr Carpenter was on planned leave.

Cr Carr said that she was not declaring a conflict of interest, but would like it noted that she has an interest in items 4.1, 4.2, 4.3 and 5.1 on the agenda. She stated that she was a community member on the deliberative panel, and knows most of the submission-makers, both for and against.

In Open Forum, Cleveland Aitken spoke against the Eildon Key Worker Housing project, the development of land and dwellings. He lives next to the site. He said that council named him as being in support of the project, at the initial decision, when he is in fact "completely opposed" to the later iteration. He asked that council delay the decision for independent input into the decision, and noted council's advertising error at the site. He asked council to contact the minister and to say that there are objections. He said, "Are you going to address these shortcuts or is this common?" Mayor Gallagher said that he has provided information which will be posed to council officers later in the evening.

Mike Dalmau, president of the Lake Eildon Houseboat Industry Association (LEHIA), spoke on the same project during Open Forum. He said LEHIA strongly supports the Eildon Key Worker Housing project due to the lack of housing stock, the age of the homes in the area and the proportion of nonresidential owners. The primary school currently has less than 20 students. He suggested that council and local groups put together a welcome kit for new residents.

Cr Lording asked how many people would be hired by LEHAI members and the rough timing. Mr Dalmau responded that "you can't put the cart before the horse... but we believe that there will be significant demand coming up.'

Charlotte Bisset, CEO of Outdoor Education Group (OEG), spoke in support of the project. OEG has 71 employees who live in Murrindindi Shire and 111 who travel to Eildon regularly as their work base. The organisation spends just under \$1 million annually, in the shire including fuel and food. She said that affordable accommodation was an ongoing barrier for attracting staff to the area.

Eildon Key Worker Housing project

Background, process and council's role

The report, presented by Cr McAulay, provides an overview of the history of the project, strategic alignment and decision-making process. The officer recommendation was that "council note the information in this report, including the timeline decisions leading to the development of 10 Eighth Street and 18 Twenty-first Street, Eildon, for key worker housing.'

Ben Harnwell said that under the planning act, council is responsible for all planning decisions in the shire, including council's own planning applications. The Eildon Key Worker Housing project, an external town planner was engaged to develop and submit the applications. This was done by a team separate to the planning team and was assessed according to the planning scheme.

Cr Hildebrand asked about the businesses showing interest in the project, and Mr Harnwell said that there are conversations underway.

Questioned by Cr McAulay, the officer said that the covenants were removed and land re-zoned on March

24 at both sites under ministerial delegation. They followed up on July 25 and sought additional legal advice to ensure that everything was done correctly. The report found that the minister followed due process and excluded herself.

Mr Harnwell said. "The community had agreed to use this land to fund the reserves. It's just a slight pivot on instead of us selling it, we're actually creating an ongoing income stream that will repay council back for the cost of the reserves." He said that no individuals were mentioned as a result of the community consultation. He also stated that if there is low demand, the units could go on the open rental market, but they are not fit for social housing. He said that the buildings will be high quality and built to last.

Councillors voted to note

Planning Application -Twenty First Street, Eildon

This land is general residential zoned and not impacted by any overlays. The planning application is for the development of land for six dwellings and a six-lot subdivision.

Five objections and one submission of support were received

by council. The objections relate to the loss of open space, traffic impacts and car parking.

It was considered that the application is consistent with Murrindindi's Planning Scheme. The work of council officers was acknowledged by the councillors.

Council voted unanimously to issue a notice of decision to grant a permit, with 37 conditions outlined n the application.

Planning Application -10 Eighth Street, Eildon

This application is for the development of land for eight dwellings, an eight-lot subdivision, and removal of native vegetation.

Twelve objections were received, along with two submissions of support. The objections raised "issues in relation to amenity, loss of public open space, traffic, noise, and questioned the demand for such a development."

In both cases, it was noted that the dwellings are prefabricated rather than transportable.

Council voted unanimously to issue a notice of decision to grant a permit, with 40 conditions outlined in the application.

FROM floods to late-night emergencies, four dedicated Alexandra SES volunteers who have seen it all have been officially recognised with well deserving long service awards.

Peter Elward led the list of recipients, receiving a prestigious 35 year long service medal in honour of his decades-long contribution to local emergency response.

He was joined by Peter McKernan, who was recognised for 15 years of service, and Shannon Mitrow and Nigel Adams, who were both awarded for 10 years of dedicated volunteering.

The awards were formally presented by SES Operations Officer John Newlands, while Alexandra Unit Controller Trevor Evans had the honour of handing out the medals and congratulating each recipient.

"These awards reflect not just time served, but a true sense of duty, professionalism, and heart," Trevor said.

"Peter Elward has been a steadfast member of Alexandra SES, including being in charge of search and rescue and is one of our rescue boat coxswains.

Telstra upgrade in Marysville

TELSTRA will be upgrading its mobile base station that services Marysville to bring new 5G coverage to the area.

Telstra 5G delivers increased capacity, which means more consistent speeds, smoother streaming and typically faster download times. Delivering 5G to the area will also help boost the area's existing 4G performance.

Mobile services in the area will be temporarily affected while the upgrade works are underway

Some disruption is required while the upgrade is underway, but Telstra said they will only be switching off the site when they need to and will have it back online as quickly as possible.

Landline services, NBN internet

services, and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted. Telstra mobile customers will receive texts advising of the upcoming work.

From Wednesday, August 20 to Friday, August 22 there will be network disruptions with the site restored each evening.

On Saturday, August 23 to Sunday, August 24, the site will be online.

From Monday, August 25 to Friday, August 29, the site will be fully offline.

Telstra customers can continue to make calls and send texts during disruption to mobile services by switching on Wi-Fi Calling. This is a free setting on most popular mobile phones and allows your mobile to make and receive mobile calls while connected to Wi-Fi.

Business owners can talk to their bank about connecting their EFTPOS terminals to their NBN or Wi-Fi connection to prevent delays in processing transactions.

Eildon Key Working Housing – awarding of contracts

Tenders closed on May 30 and five tender submissions were received at the close of tender.

It was proposed by council officers that two locations be awarded to different tenderers, with Tenderer A1, Millbuilt Pty Ltd, being awarded the contact for construction at 18 Twenty-first Steet and Tenderer B1, JMB Constructions (AUST) Pty Ltd, being awarded the contract for construction at 10 Eighth Street. The names of the tenderers were included in the minutes rather than during the meeting.

Council will take on the civil and ancillary aspects of the development, and these have been removed from the scopes.

Councillors approved the tenders.

Endorsement of Municipal Association of Victoria Motions

Murrindindi Shire Council is a member of the Hume Region Local Government Network, consisting of councils from the northeast of Victoria.

At its recent meeting the network resolved that Strathbogie Shire Council, on behalf of the network, submit four motions for consideration at the upcoming MAV State Council meeting scheduled for October 10.

These motions seek to achieve the following: Measures to improve the financial sustainability of rural councils. Reconsideration of the Emergency Services and Volunteer Fund fees and collection method. Drought assistance for the Local Government Areas represented by the network. Reconsideration of fee increases by the State for the mining and quarry sector.

While the exact wording of these motions is yet to be finalised, this report sought council's endorsement of the intent of the motions, and that the Chief Executive Officer be delegated to work with the network councils to finalise the wording.

Council endorsed the motions.

THE issue of slime in the gutter at the Nihil Street children's crossing has been raised again, with concerns that it could easily cause children to slip and maybe injure themselves.

Council was asked to provide further information about the issue and how they plan to resolve it.

Council responded, "An inspection of the school crossing at Nihil and Webster Street has confirmed that the water pooling is due to excess water from private property and is not a structural issue.

"Community safety is council's top priority. Our engineers will continue discussions with the owners of the property. In the meantime, we will continue to maintain the site with regular cleaning and street sweeping to improve safety and reduce inconvenience for pedestrians.

"We welcome requests from the community if they see the problem building up between services so we can attend the issue as needed."

Special National Medal Presentation in Buxton

LAST fortnight the Buxton CFA brigade held their regular quarterly brigade meeting at the fire station and were joined by two guests from CFA, who travelled up from Melbourne to make a very special presentation to one of the valued brigade members.

Deputy Chief Officer Gavin Thompson AFSM and Group General Manager Matt Davies were the guests for the brigade meeting. Gavin and Matt were afforded the opportunity to address the meeting ahead of the presentation. Gavin spoke about the challenges and opportunities ahead of him as the recently appointed Officer-in-Charge of the North-East Region. Matt talked about his first six months in his role as manager of CFA's Infrastructure Services area.

Following the meeting, Matt assisted Gavin in presenting a National Medal for Service to Carmel Denham. In inviting Gavin to present

the National Medal to Carmel, the Captain thanked Secretary Jenny Tonkin for her efforts in pursuing the award of this honour for a non-operational brigade member. We believe this may be the first time this award has been bestowed on a CFA member who hasn't served as an operational firefighter.

In 2011, the National Medal regulations were amended to clarify that service by a member to fulfil the primary function of an approved organisation (such as CFA) may include providing remote assistance in relation to which the member is exposed to the risk of psychological trauma alone.

Carmel is a returned veteran of the first Gulf War, having served as part of an Australian medical contingent on USNS Comfort. After her Navy Service, Carmel started with CFA joining Boronia brigade in 1994, initially as an Auxiliary member and later as a Brigade

member in 2004, and supported the Boronia brigade in many ways.

In 2009 Carmel became a Critical Incident Street (CIS) Peer in District 13 and continued in that role until 2014 when she transferred to Buxton brigade. As a CFA Peer, Carmel supported various members exposed to traumatic events as well as members travelling from regional areas to undergo treatment in various Melboure hospitals.

The citation for Carmel's award, in part, says "over all the years, Carmel has supported many CFA members in her Peer role, providing support, guidance, comfort and advice to many and is an involved, supportive and diligent brigade member.

"Carmel unhesitatingly supports her brigade in any way she can and is particularly focussed on ensuring that the wellbeing and

health and safety of our members is monitored and managed appropriately.

"Her contribution to helping everyone to achieve our mission, while remaining safe ourselves, is significant and valued".

The National Medal recognises long and diligent service in organisations that protect life and property, often in situations involving risk to those members. Carmel's service to CFA is an ideal example that you don't have to be on the fireground to be exposed to risk, especially the risk of being exposed to psychological trauma.



Volunteers strengthen local disability and aged care services

DAME Pattie Menzies Centre Inc., trading as Menzies Support Services, is a not-for-profit organisation with over 40 years history in the Alexandra area.

Volunteers, and support from the community, have been essential in the establishment and operations of this organisation since the 1970s.

Dame Pattie Menzies Centre, the property in Alexandra known as The Mount, was established as a direct result of an enormous community lobbying and fundraising campaign.

Dame Pattie Menzies, born Pattie Leckie in Alexandra in 1899, became the patron of Dame Pattie Menzies Centre in 1978

In 1979 The Mount was purchased by the local community with funds raised locally and matched by the federal government.

The Poll Shorthorn Society donated cattle to establish a working stud on site at the

At the fundraising event to raise the \$20,000 deposit for The Mount, Dame Pattie Menzies autographed nearly 200 car stickers and these were sold. Pledges from the night totalled \$20,625, plus one bullock.

Over 40 years on, Menzies Support Services is still providing disability supports to people in Alexandra and surrounds, with group programs at The Mount providing opportunities for socialising and skill development, support in the wider community to access services and opportunities, and support in people's own homes to assist in activities of daily life.

Since 2020, Menzies Support Services have also delivered community aged care services including personal care, respite, domestic assistance, and social group activities. Service users include people receiving funding from Commonwealth Home Support Packages, Home Care Packages, and Veteran's Affairs.

Dame Pattie Menzies Centre Inc. is an incorporated association, governed by a volunteer Committee of Management, and is calling for new committee members, and members of the association.

Committee members are involved in setting strategic directions of the organisation, attending monthly meetings to approve general business items and policies, and considering legal and financial matters.

Eildon hosts free fishing festival

ONE of Victoria's most popular fishing regions will again be home to all things angling next month when the Goulburn Fishing Festival is held at Eildon's Lions Park.

Last week the Minister for Outdoor Recreation Steve Dimopoulos said the ever-popular annual event was held on the first Saturday every September to mark the opening day of trout fishing season in Victoria's rivers, creeks and streams such as the nearby Goulburn River.

Running from 9am to 2pm on Saturday, September 6 the free Goulburn Fishing Festival is hosted by the Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) and will include a range of family-friendly activities, free kids' fishing clinics, cooking demonstrations, a casting competition and a nighttime fireworks display, all in the heart of the Eildon township.

The festival is based at the Eildon Pondage, which boasts great shoreline access and is regularly stocked with brown and rainbow trout, many of which weigh several kilograms making for a memorable catch for anglers of all ages.

Free learn-to-fish clinics for kids will include expert guidance from Fishcare Victoria to teach youngsters casting, rigs, baits and what to do if they catch a fish.

Kids who participate in a clinic will also receive a free fishing rod to take home with a tackle box, and links to online instructional videos through the VFA's Little Anglers Hub. Spots in the clinics always go fast so parents are encouraged to get in quickly and register.

Families can help expert staff from the nearby Snobs Creek Fish Hatchery stock trout into the pondage and there will be market stalls, face painting, educational activities, fly casting lessons and an aquaculture stall with free tastings of locally-grown trout.

The event will also see 1500 huge 'stonker' brown trout stocked into the Goulburn River below the pondage, providing great fishing at riverside reserves nearby that are easily accessible.

The Goulburn Fishing Festival will be held on Saturday, September 6 at Lions Park on Riverside Drive in Eildon and families are encouraged to keep fishing and exploring the local area before enjoying the fireworks display at 7pm.

Celebrating 50 years of Timorese culture in Australia

STUDENTS from Buxton Primary School, Middle Kinglake Primary School and Yea Primary School were among the students from around Victoria attending the Boite Choir event, *Mai Fali Eh! Boite Schools Chorus 2025*, held at the Melbourne Town Hall on Tuesday, August 12.

Fifty years have passed since the first Timorese refugees fled their homeland in the face of invasion, arriving in Australia in December 1975. A quietly resilient community is celebrating survival and achievements this year.

The Boite Schools Chorus joined the celebrations, proudly presenting *Mai Fali Eh!* an uplifting musical project bringing together over 700 students from across Victoria to learn about and celebrate the rich culture of Timor-Leste.

The Boite Schools Chorus sang a repertoire originally developed by leading Timorese singer

and songwriter, Ego Lemos with Australian musician Andrea Khoza. The songs were a collection of traditional and contemporary pieces. Marking the 50th anniversary of Timorese migration to Australia, the powerful program honoured the community's resilience, language, and traditions through song, storytelling and performance.

Students took part in statewide workshops leading to three spectacular concerts, two at Melbourne Town Hall, one at Mount Clear College in Ballarat. This massed-choir performance was a highlight of the year. The energy was electric when the stage filled with hundreds of young voices, live music, and a joyful demonstration of cultural connection.

The choir was led by expert choir director, Stella Savy and the Mystic Trio (Paulo Almeida, Jose Mesquita and Filomeno Bioveda), and the event was attended by President of Timor Leste, Jose Ramos-Horta.

David Littleproud's comments on Agriculture **Roundtable transparency**

Littleproud said the Victorian Government's Agriculture Roundtable recently was shrouded in secrecy, with the invite list, the agenda and the outcomes not publicly available.

Mr Littleproud said Agriculture Minister Julie Collins was clearly hiding details of the meeting.

"Labor's agriculture roundtable today is disingenuous, without any outcomes, just a statement of platitudes from the Minister about how important agriculture is," Mr Littleproud said.

"The roundtable is supposed to be about increasing productivity, but the only productivity that has been given in agriculture since the election has been to US beef producers, and making it easier for them to import their beef into Australia, so Prime Minister Anthony Albanese can obtain a meeting with US President Donald Trump.

"If Labor really wants to protect and help our farmers, they should be proudly releasing

> "But Labor doesn't want accountability because it knows their policies are hurting the agriculture sector. They have done nothing for productivity in agriculture and they know it."

> Mr Littleproud added he would have been prepared to work in a bipartisan way with the state government at the roundtable, but wasn't invited as Shadow Agriculture Minister.

> "Productivity is going backwards. Farmers are struggling and selling their farms, and when supply goes down, prices go up. The best Labor could offer today was 'constructive discussions', which means no goals, no outcomes and no opportunity. No clarity around drought support delays

LIBERAL Member for Northern Victoria Wendy Lovell recently demanded answers in approving farmers' applications for drought support grants.

Farmers suffering from the devastating effects of the drought are eager to make use of the Farm Drought Support Grant Program and start work on projects to make their farms drought resilient into the future.

Ms Lovell told parliament that she had been contacted by a constituent who submitted an application for a drought support grant back in July, but almost a month later had still not received written in-principle approval for his project.

"It is completely unacceptable that Victorian farmers suffering the devastating effects of the drought are still waiting to have their drought support grants approved, almost a month after applying," Ms Lovell said.

Farmers express voice on state of the state

THE Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is urging farmers and regional Victorians to have their say on the biggest issues and opportunities facing their communities through the first ever State of the State: Farmer Priorities Survey.

VFF President Brett Hosking said the VFFled survey comes at a time when frustration in farming communities is reaching boiling point.

"We know that our members are copping it from all sides, whether it's the drought, conflict over land use, or new taxes. The feedback from communities I visit is that they're not being heard.

"We know we have a big task ahead to cut through with decision makers. This survey is about getting the data to support our advocacy for the next 12 months as we head towards a state election.

"We want the facts and figures to demonstrate where there's widespread concern to help us focus the minds of decision makers. We also want to make sure our advocacy is on-target and delivering maximum impact for members," Mr Hosking said.

Mr Hosking urged people across regional Victoria to take a moment to share their thoughts and share the survey through their

"Five minutes is all it takes to share your thoughts on issues that could well and truly shape our industry for decades to come," Mr Hosking said.

The survey is open until August 14. The survey can be accessed by visiting the VFF website.

"The state government must explain why it is taking so long to approve grant applications what the government will do to speed up the approval process."

Capturing and making efficient use of rainfall is time critical as winter draws to a close and spring arrives, but farmers may be stuck waiting for grant approvals.

Alexandra Newspapers contacted the Victorian Government to ask about delays to drought support.

Questions included: How many drought support grants has the state government received and how many have been approved? What is the average approval time for drought support grant applications? How many drought support grant applications have been submitted in Murrindindi Shire? How many of those have received approval?

Opportunity was also given for government to respond to the claims made by Ms Lovell.

The Victorian Government failed to answer most of the questions, instead supplying the below response.

"The Allan Labor Government is investing a total of \$144 million to provide appropriate drought support to every primary producer in the state.

"All farmers can access the Farm Drought Support Grants Program. Across the state, we're also investing a further \$5.9 million to continue critical technical decision-making support, mental health services, timely farm debt mediation and engagement activities for another 12 months.

"We're also reducing the costs of doing businesses for our primary producers with a \$6.3 million fee and duty relief package.

"Rural Finance can be contacted on 1800 260 425 if applicants would like to enquire on their application status.

"To view the full range of financial, technical and wellbeing support available to drought impacted farmers visit agriculture.vic.gov.au/ drought or call 136 186.

"We've been listening to farmers and communities who are doing it tough, that's why we're delivering real help, right now.

"We are receiving a strong response to the range of grant and payment programs being offered to support farmers during drought, including the Farm Drought Support Grants administered by Rural Finance.

"More than 2450 grants have already been provided across the state, and Rural Finance continues to process applications as quickly as possible. Rural Finance is onboarding additional staff to deal with this surge in demand."

Have Your Say On The Right To Work From Home

AS part of its plan to enshrine the right to work working from home: what's fair, what's from home in law, the Victorian Government is encouraging Victorians to have their say at engage.vic.gov.au/wfh

Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for Industrial Relations Jaclyn Symes opened a consultation last week to all Victorians ahead of legislation being introduced to the Parliament next year.

The consultation brings together workers and employers alike to ensure the proposed laws reflect the real-world experience of practical, and what's already working.

Under the proposed laws, if you can reasonably do your job from home, you will have the right to do so for at least two days a week, whether you work in the public sector or private sector.

Consultation won't determine whether working from home should be a right, we already know it should be. This is about making sure the rules are appropriate.

As part of the consultation, the government will consider the types of businesses and the size of businesses that will be covered by the proposed law, as well as the definition of remote work, and who is able to do it.

Roundtable discussions with industry will also be held from September 2025. Stakeholders, peak bodies and unions can register their interest for the roundtable consultations at engage.vic.gov.au/wfh

Survey data will reveal what Victorians think about working from home, including

whether employees have ever been denied a request to work from home, and whether they still feel unable to ask for it in their workforce.

Working from home works for families and it's good for the economy.

It's popular. Flexible working arrangements are utilised by workers and businesses alike, with more than a third of Australian workers, including 60 per cent of professionals, regularly working from home.


It saves families money. It saves Australians on average \$110 a week or \$5308 every year. That's more money back in the pockets of hardworking Victorians at a time when every dollar makes a difference.

Working from home gets more people working. It supports women with children, carers and people with a disability to work, and it's better for business with workforce participation 4.4 per cent higher than before

It cuts congestion. Victorians are now spending less time commuting, saving more than three hours in their week on average. That's three fewer hours sitting in traffic and three more hours back in your life.

THERE are a number of benefits to finding work in rural Victoria over being employed in the bustling metropolis that is Melbourne.

Aside from the relaxed and communityfocused lifestyle that country Victoria offers, there is also more demand for workers in regional areas.

According to the Victorian Government website, "more than 75,000 new workers are expected in regional Victoria by 2026, 60.7 per cent of whom will require higher-order skills.

"Across regional Victoria, health care and social assistance, accommodation and food services, and education and training are forecast to need the highest number of new workers by 2026: 22,600, 8900 and 7100 workers respectively."

With more demand for workers, especially in skilled industries such as the ones listed above, there is more opportunity for career growth. Demand for workers leads to handson experience, and a smaller pool to choose from means more businesses are likely to upskill their workforce.

Housing can be more affordable in regional Victoria, with both the median sale price and the median weekly rent lower for regional according to the Real Estate Institute of Victoria (REIV).

Based on current data, the median sale price for metropolitan Melbourne is \$924,000 while in regional Victoria it is \$620,000. The median weekly rent for metropolitan Melbourne is also higher at \$580 per week compared to \$480 in the regions.

A Commonwealth Bank study in partnership with the Regional Australia Institute (RAI) from 2021 found that more Australians were choosing to live in regional areas.

"Capital cities in NSW and Victoria experienced the largest net migration outflows at 49.5 per cent and 46.4 per cent respectively," the study reads.

Commonwealth Bank's Executive General Manager for Regional and Agribusiness Banking, Grant Cairns said that the study showed positive growth for regional Australia.

"The index demonstrates how Australians formerly living in capital cities have embraced remote ways of working as an opportunity to experience what these areas have to offer, while those already in regional areas are finding reasons to stay," Mr Cairns said.

"I'm optimistic about what this growth means for regional Australia, as more people experience the liveability of our regional areas and embrace the associated work-life balance and affordability."

Regional Victorians also indicate better when it comes to mental health according to the Department of Health.

"When it comes to social capital (the networks of relationships among people), rural Victorians fare better than metropolitan Victorians on a number of indicators associated with mental and physical health," the Department of Health website reads.


"Indicators show that adults who live in rural Victoria (20 per cent) are more likely to belong to an organised community group than those who live in metropolitan Melbourne

"Indicators of social isolation show that adults living in rural Victoria are more likely

to not be socially isolated (39 per cent) than all Victorian adults (36 per cent)."

The quality of life working in the regions includes more of the natural world and more time outdoors, which has been shown to positively influence health.

Victorians can access discounts on a wide range of upgrades including reverse cycle air conditioners, heat pump hot water systems, induction cooktops, weather sealing and more.

A Strategic Review of the program is currently in place to make it easier for Victorians and businesses to get involved and start saving money on their energy bills, findings of the review have been submitted and the government is now considering our response.

Preparing Victorian schools for bushfire season

THE Victorian Government is making sure schools across Victoria are well-prepared for the upcoming bushfire season by providing grants to clear vegetation growth and reduce the risk of fire.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education Ben Carroll announced 345 campuses across 330 government schools would share in \$8.4 million to carry out essential maintenance work as part of the *Bushfire Preparedness Vegetation Program* (BPVP).

"We know how devastating bushfires are, that's why we're continuing to support schools to be as fire-ready as possible," Mr Carroll said.

"We're continuing to invest in the maintenance projects that matter most,

to make sure all Victorian schools are in the best possible condition and to protect classrooms and facilities in the event of a bushfire."

There are a number of schools in Murrindindi Shire supported by the program, including Buxton Primary School, Flowerdale Primary School and Flowerdale Uniting Kindergarten, Kinglake Primary School, Kinglake Ranges Children's Centre, Kinglake West Primary School, Marysville Primary School, Marysville and District Kindergarten Association, Melbourne Sports Institute Marysville, Middle Kinglake Primary School, Penleigh and Essendon Grammar Eildon campus, Rubicon Outdoor School Thornton campus, and Toolangi Primary School.

The program was introduced in 2018 to help schools undertake essential vegetation clearance around the school buildings prior to the bushfire season and in line with municipal fire danger periods.

Schools receiving funds are listed on the *Bushfire At-Risk Register* (BARR). These schools are required to undertake vegetation works on a regular basis to reduce the risk of harm to the school's community and buildings in the event of a bushfire.

The Bushfire Preparedness Vegetation Program also includes a School Support Program, providing two school visits to each participating schools by an accredited Bushfire Planning and Design consultant

who develops a Vegetation Management Plan.

Schools can also engage additional bushfire related professional services, such as a Bushfire Attack Level expert, to provide further advice and support in reducing their bushfire risk.

Victoria is one of the most bushfireprone areas in the world and that's why everyone should have a bushfire plan and the VicEmergency app downloaded on their phone. For more information on bushfire preparedness and to create your fire plan, visit *fireplanner.vic.gov.au*




