Lake Eildon recreational plans being developed

GOULBURN-Murray Water (GMW) is ensuring community members understand crucial safety and access information at its recreational sites.

Key information about both topics are included in Recreation Area Management Plans for 10 of GMW's water storages, incuding Lake Eildon.

The plans were developed in accordance with Victoria's Water (Recreational Area) Regulations 2023 and outline existing operating arrangements at the storages.

Development of the plans involved extensive face-to-face and online consultation with councils, agencies, Traditional Owners, local community members and recreational visitors.

GMW General Manager Water Storage Services Jon McKeown said it was important to hear from a broad range of stakeholders.

"While the primary role of our storages is to harvest and store customers' water entitlements, with over 2.5 million visitors since 2021 we know how popular these places are with recreational users," he said.

Key topics raised during consultation and clarified in the plans include environmental management, speed zones, and when and where campfires may be lit. Mr McKeown said the plans also included key guidance around foreshore access.

"They outline what areas people can access both above and below full water supply level at these locations," he said. The plans also support responsible pet owners in their desire to have their dogs join them when visiting the storages.

"We recognise the importance and value dogs play in the lives of recreational users," he said. "The expectation is that dogs are on a leash or under control at these locations at all times and that pet owners clean up after their dogs.

The plans will be formally updated every 10 years or as needed. They can be viewed on GMW's dedicated engagement platform, yoursay.gmwater.com.au/ recreational-area-management-plans

His brother works at the Meggitt's fish farm in Thornton, and he's hoping to see him. Sadly, his sister passed away recently. He also has uncles and aunties in the area.

He said, "It would be great to catch up with everybody."

He added that he hopes to see some friends from the area there as well. "There's been a

Jason will be performing solo original music on Thursday, September 18 and on Friday, September 19, some solo 1990s cover songs. "That'll be just basically old school bangers all the way through the night," Jason said.

He added, "If anybody's out there, any locals that know that I'm coming down, please come and say hello. I'm going to be there all weekend, during the day as well, so even if it's just to catch up, sit down and have a beer and have a chat, I'll be there on Friday all day, all day Saturday and then fly out Sunday night back to the Gold Coast. 

million reward for capture of Desmond Freeman

VICTORIA Police has announced a reward of up to \$1 million for information leading to the arrest of Desmond Freeman following the murder of two police officers in Porepunkah last month.

Detective Leading Senior Constable Neal Thompson and Senior Constable Vadim De Waart-Hottart were part of a group of police who attended a Rayner Track property on Tuesday, August 26.

The officers were executing a search warrant as part of an investigation by the Wangaratta Sexual Offences and Child Abuse Investigation Team.

They were confronted by Freeman at his property about 10.30am, resulting in the two officers being fatally shot. A third officer was seriously injured after being shot in the lower body and is now recovering at home. The investigation into the deaths of the two officers and the serious injuries to a third officer is being conducted by the Homicide Squad.

As part of the effort to locate Freeman and bring him into custody peacefully and safely, police are offering a reward of up to \$1 million for information on his whereabouts that leads to his arrest. This reward represents the largest ever offered in Victoria for an arrest.

Over the last fortnight, a significant search has been undertaken by Victoria Police in an effort to locate Freeman, otherwise known as Desmond Filby.

A number of heavily armed police officers from across a range of specialist areas within Victoria Police continue to undertake a significant search for Freeman, assisted by personnel from a number of other agencies. More than 450 police each day are dedicated

Freeman was last seen at his Porepunkah property on August 26 shortly after the fatal shooting. At this time, police are unaware of Freeman's current location and are appealing to members of the public who do have information about his whereabouts to

At this time, there is nothing to indicate that Freeman is being assisted by a specific person, however given the difficult terrain and the requirement for various supplies this remains a possibility. Police are also open to the possibilities that he remains at large alone or is dead as a result of self-harm.

Freeman was last seen wearing dark green (khaki) tracksuit pants, dark green rain jacket, brown Blundstone boots and reading glasses. Police believe Freeman remains armed and advise members of the public not to approach him.

Detective Inspector Dean Thomas from the Homicide Squad, said, "While the offering of a reward for a murder investigation is not unusual in itself, what sets this apart is that this reward is for arrest and not conviction, and it is the largest reward ever offered for an arrest in Victoria.

"This figure recognises the seriousness of this violent offending and our commitment to locating Freeman as soon as possible so that he is no longer a risk to the broader community.

"Our aim in offering this reward is that it will lead someone out there, who may not have been willing to come forward until this time, to contact police.

"There is no doubt that up to a million dollars is a life changing amount of money for anyone and has the potential to completely change their circumstances

We believe this investigation will only be brought to resolution through assistance from members of the public and again, I am urging anyone with any information at all to come forward and contact Crime Stoppers.

"This could be sightings of Freeman, information you're hearing in your local communities, even suspicious activity on your property. Whatever it is, we want you to tell us.

"I would also like to stress to members of the public that if you see Freeman, then we need you to call triple zero immediately because this will give police the very best chance of apprehending him.

"Freeman has killed two people and injured a third, and it's immensely important that we can bring him into custody safely as soon as possible, hopefully this reward helps do just that."

Police urge the public in and around the township of Porepunkah to remain vigilant and report any sightings or suspicious behaviour by calling Triple Zero (000).

Lake Mountain and Mt Baw Baw EOI Update

ALPINE Resorts Victoria (ARV) have alpine sector throughout May, June and July provided the following statement regarding possible future Lake Mountain and Baw Baw operators, but unfortunately, they were unable to provide much information.

It states, "At the end of 2024, ARV launched an Expression of Interest (EOI) process for Lake Mountain and Mt Baw Baw, seeking suitably qualified entities to take on the management of one or both of the resorts in their entirety, including operation of both commercial and essential services.

"Submissions closed in February 2025, and since that time, ARV has been working through associated proposals, a process that is currently ongoing. As that process is subject to commercial in confidence, ARV is not in a position to discuss the details of these submissions but will continue to provide updates as the process progresses.'

ARV has also been meeting with stakeholders and representatives of the to provide input into the development of the Alpine Resorts Strategic Plan (ARSP) for 2025-30. They stated that the consultation included over 120 individuals in face-to-face workshops, 290 online submissions and four online workshops.

Each round of consultation has generated a report, which can be reviewed on Engage Victoria website at engage.vic.gov.au/ alpine-resorts-strategic-plan-2025

They added, "ARV is currently reviewing submissions, survey responses and input into the workshops and synthesising the data into a plan that reflects the priorities of the sector, the traditional owners, and the local communities that surround and live in the alpine resorts.

"ARV will continue to update the website and all stakeholders with information as the development of the plan progresses."

Update on Puzzle Range Wind Farm

TETRIS Energy was asked to provide an update regarding the proposed Puzzle Range Wind Farm, located between the towns of Merton, Bonnie Doon and Fawcett. The location is not within a proposed Renewable Energy Zone.

An Alinta Energy spokesperson responded, "The project proposal is in its earliest phase of development, the pre-feasibility stage, which means we are assessing whether a project is viable. It may be more than a year before these assessments are complete.

Right to disconnect is activated

THE right to disconnect and the 'employee choice pathway' from casual to permanent employment both began for small business employees last wek on August 26.

Small business employers and employees should have conversations about out of hours contact, with the right to disconnect starting for businesses with less than 15 employees.

The right to disconnect was added into the Fair Work Act as part of the Closing Loopholes laws, and began for employees of businesses with 15 or more employees in August last year.

Now small business employees have the right to refuse to monitor, read or respond to contact, or attempted contact, outside their working hours unless that refusal is unreasonable. This includes contact or attempted contact from their employer or a third party, such as a client.

Whether a refusal is unreasonable will depend on the circumstances, but certain factors must be considered in making this assessment. Those factors are: the reason for the contact the nature of the employee's role and level of responsibility; the employee's personal circumstances (including family or caring responsibilities); how the contact is made and how disruptive it is to the employee; and any relevant extra pay or compensation the employee receives for working additional hours or remaining available to work out

Fair Work Ombudsman Anna Booth said small business employers and employees should talk to each other about out of hours contact and set expectations suited to their specific workplace and the employee's role.

"We hope that people working in larger businesses have already had conversations about out of hours contact and set expectations in the context of their workplace and the employee's role; now it's time for small business employers and employees to have that conversation," Ms Booth said.

"It's important to remember the right to disconnect does not prohibit employers from contacting their employees, nor does it prevent employees from contacting one another, including across time zones.

"We encourage workplace participants to educate themselves on the right to disconnect and adopt a commonsense approach.

"Like most employment matters, any dispute should first be discussed and sought to be resolved at the workplace level. Workers

Crossbench secures win for Home Care Packages

THE Australian government has bowed to pressure from the crossbench to release 20,000 new Home Care Packages for aged care, agreeing to amendments in the Senate.

Independent Members and Senators raised the alarm back in June that the delay of the government's aged care reforms would leave 80,000 people stranded on the wait list for in-home support.

The parliamentarians signed an open letter calling on the government to fund, at a minimum, 20,000 new packages under the current Home Care Packages scheme, to bridge the gap until the rollout of reforms in November.

Crossbench pressure increased on the government last week, with questions from Dr Haines to the Member for Aged Care, a motion from Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie, and amendments to aged care legislation from Independent Senator David Pocock and the Coalition.

Dr Haines said this was a win for older Australians and showed the impact of the crossbench in the interests of the nation.

"I think we have seen a victory today that will bring practical relief to 20,000 people

waiting for a home care package," said Dr Haines.

"This is proof of the positive and effective work the crossbench does across the parliament for the good of the nation.

"The government had consistently rejected calls from the crossbench and peak bodies to release more packages that would help hold the waitlist steady.

"I'm pleased that today the government has seen sense."

Dr Haines had noted on Monday that the waitlist had blown out a further 50 per cent in six months and the department had confirmed no additional plans had been released beyond the attrition rate.

"The fact is that the waitlist for home care is getting longer, not shorter, and this is the last thing older persons and their families need, more delays and more uncertainty when they were promised the opposite from this government," she said in her speech in Parliament.

The bill will now be returned to the House of Representatives.

Goulburn spring fresh

released into the Goulburn River this month to stimulate fish movement and promote the growth of native plants to help protect the riverbank.

Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority Environmental Water and Wetlands Manager, Simon Casanelia, said the annual water release was referred to as the Goulburn River spring fresh and was expected to run from approximately September 13 to October 12.

"Environmental water will greatly benefit native vegetation by wetting the river's banks and then receding, encouraging new growth," Mr Casanelia said.

"Establishing the bank vegetation is a high priority. Without this vegetation growth in spring, the bank would stay bare and be more prone to damage.

This delivery of water for the environment helps long-term stabilisation of the riverbank as native grasses, sedges, rushes and flood-tolerant native species will grow and thrive at this time of year. The roots of the plants help stabilise the bank.

The timing of the fresh is similar to last year's spring fresh which proved successful for vegetation establishment.

Mr Casanelia said this delivery of water for the environment would also increase habitat and food resources for native fish such as Murray cod, trout cod and golden perch, platypus and waterbugs.

"Because fish are more actively migrating and spawning in spring, there is great value in the spring fresh, even with the high winter flows we've had."

Water for the environment is water allocated and managed to improve the health of rivers, wetlands and floodplains. Use is adapted based on climatic conditions, water availability and ecological needs.

Decisions about using water for the environment are based on science, including

WATER for the environment will be research by river ecologists and long-term environmental monitoring. The research and monitoring clearly demonstrates water for the environment, and in particular the spring fresh, is vital for improving the health of the Goulburn River.

> Environmental flows are planned by the Goulburn Broken CMA in consultation with the local community, river ecologists, Goulburn-Murray Water, the Victorian Environmental Water Holder (VEWH), the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder and the Murray Darling Basin Authority.

> These flows complement on-ground activities such delivering stock fencing, off-stream watering, weed control and revegetation incentives to restore high quality riparian vegetation corridors that are resistant to flood related channel change such as river bed and bank erosion.

> The spring fresh is expected to benefit the whole length of the Goulburn River downstream of Lake Eildon. Flow will gradually increase to approximately 9300ML/day at Trawool and Shepparton before slowly dropping back to approximately 1000ML/day in mid-October.

> Peak flows will be well below minor flood levels along the Goulburn River. At Trawool the river will reach 2.3m. The minor flood level is 4m. At Shepparton the river will reach 5.6m. The minor flood level is 9.5m. Timing and height of the fresh may vary depending on natural flows in the river. Delivery of water for the environment will reduce or stop if there is any flood risk.

> The flows are authorised by the VEWH in line with its Seasonal Watering Plan 2025-26. The plan is available for download from vewh.vic.gov.au, with regular watering updates posted on the Goulburn Broken CMA website gbcma.vic.gov.au

Goats on the rail trail? Just kidding

THE Great Victorian Rail Trail between Ridds Road and Baynes Road, Cathkin was closed on the afternoon of Monday, September 8, to put in place a temporary goat fence. Goats will be used to manage vegetation along this section of the trail.

The goats will remain on-site for approximately 10 weeks. They will be securely contained behind the fencing and moved progressively along the trail as they complete their grazing. No further trail closures are expected during this period.

Goats are an ideal weed control option on sensitive sites as they have minimal impact, and reduce the need for other control methods like pesticides.

Council explained that they got the idea from a trial conducted by Parks Victoria and Pheasant Creek Blackberry Action Group in a sensitive gully which required minimal impact and was a great success. It was funded by the Victorian Blackberry Taskforce.

Goats have also been used locally by the Taungurung for weed control. Council also used goats at the Yet Wetlands last year.

The goats were tested in a single 400 square metre cell in May on the rail trail as a test,

and council are now expanding it further along the trail. They are using the same contractor as they did earlier this year and at the Yea Wetlands. The goats are pretty good at looking after themselves for the most part, but the contractor will be checking in on them and moving them to new cells when required.

People are more than welcome to visit the goats and observe them, however they are not domestic animals and are there to eat weeds, so we would ask visitors to not feed, interfere with or touch the goats.

Swoop-di-doo

AS the weather gets warmer and the days longer, we also start to see the occasional swooping bird. Native birds enter their breeding season in spring, and some may get protective of their young.

Lachlan Clarke, Manager Statewide Wildlife Advisory Services at the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) said, "Swooping is a normal, temporary behaviour for native birds like magpies, butcherbirds and masked lapwings to defend their eggs and chicks for a short time while their young are most vulnerable.

"Think of it as a warning sign. They're telling you to keep your distance. While it can be a bit unsettling, it's rare for them to make contact."

Swooping can occur in both urban and rural areas, including parks, gardens, and along bike paths.

"Not all birds swoop during the breeding season, so the presence of magpies or other common swooping birds does not necessarily mean you will be swooped," Mr Clarke said.

This behaviour only lasts a short time, usually ending once the young have left the nest.

If you are worried about being caught out by a protective bird this spring, here are some steps you can take to feel safe, while also protecting our native birds:

Avoid known swooping hotspots. Move quickly, don't run if near a swooping bird. Wear protective head and eye coverings. Don't harass birds, as this can escalate swooping. Don't feed birds or destroy their nests.

Report a swooping incident on Victoria's interactive swooping bird map by visiting wildlife.vic.gov.au/managing-wildlife/swooping-birds

All native wildlife is protected by law. Harassing, harming or disturbing native birds and other wildlife is illegal in Victoria and penalties apply.

You can report wildlife crime such as harassing, harming or disturbing wildlife to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.





THE Goulburn Valley Suicide Awareness walk is set to be held for the fifth time on Sunday, September 14 starting at 8.30am.

Organiser Jacky Gilbee said that it's going to be a big year for the event "because we're finally getting the speakers really up and roaring. This year we've got guest speakers including The Unbreakable Farmer Warren Davies. Everyone knows about him. It's been so hard on farmers this year... including the cost of living and the cost of hay has just skyrocketed, so we think he's very appropriate. We've also got we always have a local person, Ron Hockley. He's a local hay man and he's been around Yea and Seymour and all those areas for a long time, and he has a really good story as well. We're also going to have David from the band Stoked, who does acoustic music. We're featuring this year local identity, Tayla Arnett. We're also going to have the mayor, Damien Gallagher, to read out our honour list.

"We ramped it up a little bit. A lot of people will be wondering who painted that gigantic blue tree on the Melbourne Highway. I would have to say we had a lot to do with it. We always walk probably about 100 metres from it normally, so we're going to you give you the choice of walking to the two bridges closest to the Melbourne Highway, or you can actually go and touch the blue tree. 



\$95 billion spring in the step for agriculture

AUSTRALIAN agriculture is marching closer to its \$100 billion goal with the sector forecast to reach \$94.7 billion in 2025-26, according to the latest forecast from Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES).

NFF President David Jochinke said despite the sector taking a hit from droughts, floods and uncertainty from global trade disruptions, farmers had held a steady hand.

"The lift is largely underpinned by strong livestock prices, but credit must be given to calm approach by the government and industry on the tariff turbulence.

"Most of all, the result is also a reflection of blood, sweat and smart investment from farmers."

Mr Jochinke said with the 2030 Roadmap goal within reach, now was the time for smart policy to get the sector over the line.

"We need to seize opportunities in front of us, like the EU FTA, ensuring they deliver meaningful market access for Australian agriculture. This will be a smart move toward value-adding and market diversification.

"Proposed federal tax and environmental reforms must build on this momentum. Sensible reform that cut red and green tape, promotes competitiveness and encourages investment into innovation will pull us closer to \$100 billion.

"Policies proposals that do not adhere to best practice principles, such as taxing unrealised gains, risks sending this trajectory backwards.

"If government can back agriculture with the right policy settings, farmers will do the rest."



Suspended postal services to the United States

ON August 26, due to recently announced changes to import tariffs for postal items sent to the United States and Puerto Rico, Australia Post temporarily suspended some postal services to these destinations, until further notice.

Letters and documents with no commercial value, and gifts valued under US\$100, are not affected by the new tariff rules or the temporary suspension.

This response is in line with actions taken by numerous international postal operators. Items sent to and from the US may experience delays due to flight capacity issues, which has impacted postal operations and delivery services.

Dr Nicola Charwat, Senior Lecturer, Business Law and Taxation, Monash Business School said, "Australia has joined a growing number of countries suspending small parcel shipments to the US following the removal of a de minimis 'loophole' that has allowed parcels valued under \$US800 dollars to bypass tariffs.

"The impact in Australia will primarily be felt by small businesses that sell directly to American consumers. This includes businesses specialising in sustainable clothing and gifts, as well as distinctly Australian goods such as cosmetics, food and wine. These parcels will now be subject to a 10 per cent baseline tariff.

"The real target appears to be major overseas retailers like Shein and Temu that also export directly to consumers and avoid much higher baseline tariffs of 25 per cent or more that apply to Chinese imports.

"American consumers are the real losers, facing either restricted access to overseas goods from online businesses or substantially higher prices to cover the tariffs. This is unlikely to play well to American voters who may also find that parcels from friends and family overseas will be impacted."

Be prepared for hay fever season

AS we enter the spring months, GPs are calling for patients to be prepared in managing hay fever, allergies, and asthma.

It comes following emerging evidence that climate change is creating longer pollen seasons in some of our largest cities, only heightening the importance of taking asthma and allergic rhinitis seriously. New data also reveals that Melbourne's pollen season is starting earlier and lasting longer.

President of the Royal Australian College of GPs, Dr Michael Wright, said that your regular GP is ready to help. "Hay fever is very common, and it's vital patients who experience allergic rhinitis and asthma manage their conditions very carefully,"

"This includes consulting with your regular GP to ensure you have an asthma plan in place. Rather than waiting for asthma flare ups to occur as the seasons change and pollen counts grow in coming weeks and months, it's important to have a plan ready, including preventive medications.

"Melbourne is notoriously the allergy capital of the world, with almost a third of people experiencing allergic rhinitis, often due to inhaling pollens. However, this isn't a problem isolated to Melbourne, people in communities nationwide should be ready.


"Thunderstorm asthma typically strikes in our south-eastern states from October to December, so now is the time to be prepared. People with allergy issues are at increased risk, so again these patients should talk to their GP about starting hay fever treatment and potentially asthma prevention ahead of time. It's best to be prepared, and your GP is there ready to help.'

Always fence your pool and spa

SAFETY always comes first if you're a pool or spa owner. Even though summer is now over, your pool needs to follow barrier requirements to prevent any accidents from occurring with you or your loved ones throughout the year.

The Victorian Building Authority (VBA) states all swimming pools and spas capable of containing water to a depth greater than 30 centimetres must have a compliant safety barrier to restrict access by young children under the age of five. These rules apply regardless of whether young children live at the property or visit the property.

Barriers are used for in ground pools and spas, above ground pools and spas, these even include any pools that require assembly and inflatable pools that can hold over 30 centimetres

Even indoor pools and spas need a barrier and any bathing or wading pools that can hold more than 30 centimetres of water.

Different standards apply for your pool or spa depending on how old they are. You can see the checklist requirements for these on the VBA website.

If you have a pool or spa they must be registered with the local council. This came into effect in Victoria in 2019 when new laws to improve pool and spa safety were introduced. This includes new registration, inspections and certification requirements for property owners.

Victorians buckle up and ditch devices behind the wheel

MORE Victorians are keeping their eyes on the road, with a drop in the number of people caught by distracted driver and eatbelt cameras rolled out by the Victorian Government.

The latest road safety camera statistics show that more Victorians are getting the message to stay focused on driving, with a 36 per cent decrease in the number of infringements issued by the cameras from January to March this year compared to the same period last year.

In quarter three 2024-25 there were 19,063 infringements issued for not wearing a seatbelt properly or for using a device while driving, while during the same time last year there were 29,832 infringements issued.

This reduction is even more impressive given that in this period, distracted driver and seatbelt cameras were deployed for more

ever before.

Distracted driver and seatbelt cameras are deployed across the state to catch those posing a risk to themselves and others by engaging in dangerous driving habits, such as using a mobile phone while driving, or when the driver or front seat passenger of a car is not wearing a seatbelt.

The penalty for using a mobile phone while driving is \$611 and four demerit points and the penalty for driving without a seatbelt is \$407 and three demerit points.

There are currently nine distracted driver and seatbelt camera trailers operating in Victoria that can be deployed anywhere at any time, including in regional areas.

Every dollar received from road safety cameras goes to the Better Roads Victoria Trust where it is spent on road projects such as

hours and assessed more cars than roads restoration, road surface replacement, bridge strengthening and other road safety improvements.

> Minster for Police Anthony Carbines warned people that the cameras are watching.

"I'm glad more Victorians are getting the message on road safety and doing the right thing, keeping themselves and others safer on the road," Mr Carbines said.

"We can't count this as job done. however. To those who are doing the wrong thing, these cameras are still watching and will catch you."

Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne said, "We all have a role to play to make sure everyone gets home safely, so plan ahead, drive to the conditions, take regular breaks and follow the road rules so that everyone gets home safely to their loved ones.'

Grants to upgrade local sports **facilities** across **Victoria**

THE Victorian Government is backing better facilities for grassroots sport and local communities.

Member for Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes encouraged applications for the 2025-26 Local Sports Infrastructure Fund (LSIF), which creates better places to play, train and compete across Victoria.

"Sport is the heart and soul of Northern Victoria, we are getting on with upgrading infrastructure so clubs can keep up with soaring demand, while also making them accessible and more inclusive," Ms

"I urge eligible councils and sporting organisations to partner and apply for projects that will make a real difference to our community."

The fund was extended in the Victorian Budget 2025/26 and has three streams including community facilities, community sports lighting, and planning with councils being able to apply for between \$40,000 and \$500,000 for projects.

Potential projects include new or improved sports courts, lights, change rooms, playgrounds and skate parks, to benefit local clubs and communities.

All Victorian councils and Alpine Resorts Victoria are eligible to apply in partnership with their local sport and recreation clubs, sport associations and leagues with a focus on projects that will support local communities and groups to increase participation including among women and girls.

Previous projects in Northern Victoria to receive grants from the Local Sports Infrastructure Fund include funding towards Wahgunyah Pump Track, Seymour Tennis Complex Lighting Project and the Robinvale Splash Park.

This announcement comes off the back of more than \$24 million invested in regional sports facilities in July through round two of the Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund.

The Victorian Budget 2025/26 is also investing \$20 million to continue providing new and improved community sports infrastructure, including through the *LSIF*. It's part of more than \$2.4 billion invested in community sport and recreation infrastructure over the past decade.

More cost of living suppor kids to play sport coming

THE Victorian Government is helping involved in community sport and live a busy families with the cost of living and supporting sports clubs to sign up more kids to local sports with another round of the Get Active Kids Voucher Program opening

Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence recently announced registrations are open for sporting clubs and organisations to become a Get Active Kids Activity Provider ahead of round nine of the Get Active Kids Voucher Program, opening in October.

We're cutting the cost of living for Victorian families with cheaper access to kids sports and activities, helping more get healthy active life," Ms Spence said.

"We know the vouchers are making a difference, with almost 20 percent of recipients joining a sports club for the first time. That's thousands of young people getting involved in sport thanks to this program.

Clubs and sporting organisations can register as a provider, which allows families to sign up their kids by using the voucher up front and reducing out-of-pocket expenses.

Eligible families with health care or other concession cards will be able to apply for vouchers of up to \$200 per child. Families apply for the vouchers online before redeeming them at an activity provider like a local sporting club.

To be eligible for registration as an activity provider, clubs and sporting organisations must be affiliated with a recognised State Sporting Association or State Sport and Active Recreation Body.

Since the program launched in 2020, almost 190,000 vouchers have been provided to families and 2100 activity providers have registered, opening up more opportunities across Victoria for kids to play sports.

It's not just the kids that benefit, by being a provider, clubs get more memberships and can provide more opportunities for kids to get involved.

There are two rounds of the popular program in 2025-26, with the first opening in October followed by another round in February 2026.

The program is open to kids aged up to 18 who are named on a Commonwealth Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, and named on a Medicare Card.

A special consideration stream is also available to support children in care, temporary or provisional visa holders, migrants and international students.


