### Regional healthcare access in a pressured system

FOR more than a month, the Victorian Department of Health were asked questions by Alexandra Newspapers about regional people gaining timely access to health care when they have a serious COVID-19 infection.

They were initially sent the following email, "Murrindindi is a small regional shire, and our health services aren't equipped to deal with health provision for serious COVID-19 cases. What actions are being undertaken by the state government to ensure equal access to healthcare for regional people, particularly as the state opens up and there are significantly more cases? Students being back in the classroom is also likely to have an impact on case numbers. It appears likely that there will be significant pressure on the ambulance service moving forward, meaning that delays are likely, both due to resourcing and access to the relevant health services (the closest being around two hours away).

They were asked this question by Alexandra Newspapers on September 30 and October 8, but there was no response.

A rephrased version of the question was asked by us on Ôctober 19.

"I am concerned that people with serious COVID-19 in small regional areas will be disadvantaged in terms of accessing timely healthcare, due to: travelling time (the nearest COVID-10 COVID-19 hospital being around two hours away), limited ambulance numbers in regional areas, ambulances being ramped at hospitals (and therefore not available to other people in the regional area, and delays for the people inside the ambulance), the lack of respiratory clinics in the local area, and local hospitals in the area not being equipped to deal with serious COVID-19 cases

"It seems possible (likely?) that a serious COVID-19 case in our regional shire might need to wait for a long time for an ambulance, followed by around

two hours of travelling time, and then likely hours of ramping at a hospital before being admitted. A metropolitan person may also face ramping, but would be likely to access medical care sooner than a regional person. What is being done to address this?"

no answer Again, was forthcoming from the Victorian Department of Health.

The question was sent for a fourth time on October 22, again rephrased.

"Given the pressures on the health system due to COVID-19, what is being done to ensure provision of timely healthcare for regional neonel?" regional people?

"How is the government ensuring that regional people are not being time-disadvantaged compared to metropolitan people in accessing hospital care? This particularly relates to serious COVID-19 cases, but also stroke and heart attacks, etc, under the current COVID-19-impacted circumstances. circumstances.

"Is the amount of time, from initial ambulance call to hospital presentation, factored in at the health service? What other measures are being put in place to ensure equivalent and timely access for regional people?'

### The answer

А Department of Health spokesperson responded on Thursday, October 28. "We've been working to keep all Victorian's safe throughout the coronavirus pandemic.

"As well as providing Victoria's health services with the beds, resources and equipment they need to care for patients, care and support is also provided to people who test positive in the comfort of their home, freeing up beds at health services.

"The best way people can protect themselves, their family and their community from coronavirus is by being vaccinated."

#### Further information

All hospitals, including Alexandra and Yea have the capability to provide initial care to COVID-19 positive patients until they are able to be safely transferred if necessary or be discharged home.

The vast majority of the people who have been hospitalised with COVID-19 have not been vaccinated, with a smaller proportion of the patients only having had one jab.

Most people who test positive for COVID-19 are able to receive their care at home.

People who test positive for COVID-19 are able to be assessed and offered support through the COVID Positive Pathway program (C+P program). As part of the C+P program, people are contacted by a triage and assessment (intake) provider for their geographic catchment area.

Cases are triaged into one of three pathways: low, medium, or high severity, based on clinical risk, severity of illness and social needs. Health services, community health and primary care providers

combine to support this severitybased approach.

Some GPs and health and monitoring as part of their service to their regular patients, while other health professionals are assigned to the program. The program provides clinical care, monitoring and regular checkins to manage symptoms and ensures patients who are at risk of deteriorating are identified early and are transitioned to higher levels of care.

### **Blue Gums to Eildon Recreational Trail**

MURRINDINDI Shire Council is excited to present to the community the detailed design for the Blue Gums to Eildon Recreational Trail Project, which is the first stage in a long-term plan to connect Alexandra, Thornton and Eildon via a shared trail.

Council is currently seeking community input on some important elements before finalising the detailed design for the project.

The current stage of the project will see the construction of a 2.6 kilometre walking and cycling trail between the Eildon town centre, the Pondage and the Breeze Bluegums Riverside Holiday Park.

Following extensive planning and community consultation in 2016, council received funding under the Victorian State Government's Regional Tourism Investment Fund stimulus round, which is underpinned by the Visitor Economy Recovery and Reform Plan. Council was successful in receiving funding of \$1.77 million to deliver the project.

Member for Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes said this will deliver a boost to the visitor economy as regional Victoria continues to recover from the global pandemic.

"Many people already know that Eildon is an amazing part of Victoria in which to live, work and visit, and with new investment to capitalise on its natural assets, that number will grow significantly. These works will provide crucial jobs in construction while bolstering our region's tourism appeal and bolstering jobs into the future," Ms Symes said.

Council's Eildon Ward Councillor Karine Haslam said the construction of the Blue Gums to Eildon Recreational Trail (the trail) will provide a range of economic benefits to the Eildon community and local businesses.

"There is currently no safe off-road link between the Breeze Bluegums Riverside Holiday Park and the Eildon town centre," Cr Haslam said.

"The park attracts around 2000 visitors during its peak season so it will be fantastic to have a direct link from the park to Eildon's local shops, businesses and tourism operators. The trail will provide safe, offroad access for day and over-night visitors along the picturesque Back Eildon Road and Goulburn River, and it will encourage greater use of Eildon's parks, playgrounds and facilities.

"We're really pleased to present the detailed design to the community. A lot of work has gone into this project in recent years. The design includes ideas and input gathered from the local Eildon community, local businesses and community groups in 2016 when the design was initiated," Cr Haslam added.

"Before we finalise the detailed design, we're keen to hear your thoughts on some important landscaping and seating elements.

"If you'd like to provide your input, head online to The Loop, where you can use an interactive map to select where you think trees should be planted and seating should be installed. We need your feedback by November 19.

"The next steps for this project involve tendering for the construction of the trail, appointing a successful contractor and commencing works early next year. If all goes to plan, we're aiming to have the trail completed by the middle of next year.

"I'd like to thank the Victorian Government, which has contributed \$1.77 million to supplement council's \$190,000 investment in this \$1.96 million project. We are very grateful for their vision and commitment to the future of Eildon,' Cr Haslam said.

GOULBURN-Murray Water (GMW) has removed the blue-green algae warning for Lake Eildon following a significant decline in blue-green algae levels.

GMW Water Quality co-ordinator Bianca Atley said the lake was a popular spot for visitors and the local community and it was great it would be safe for everyone to enjoy ahead of the Melbourne Cup long weekend.

"We acknowledge the importance of Lake Eildon in the community, as an iconic

tourist spot and a popular recreational area, and we are pleased it is now safe to remove the warning," she said.

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The warning for Lake Eildon was first put in place in July 2020 and was the longest on record for the lake.

"There have been five warnings for blue-green algae at Lake Eildon since monitoring first began. The first warning was for 26 days in late 2004," Ms Atley said

"This warning was significantly longer and was in place for 467 days. We thank everyone for their patience during this time


GMW undertakes frequent water quality monitoring at storages and waterways across the region, and will issue warnings if blue-green algae reach levels deemed unsafe by national health guidelines.

### Australians to receive COVID-19 vaccine booster shot

TO provide even greater protection against COVID-19, Australians aged 18 and over who have received two doses of a vaccination at least six months ago will be eligible to receive a booster shot from Monday, November 8.

The decision to allow booster shots follows advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) and approval from Australia's medicines regulator, the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA).

The Australian Government has accepted ATAGI's advice that the Pfizer vaccine is recommended for the booster dose, irrespective of the primary COVID-19 vaccine used.

The booster shot is not mandatory; however it provides further protection against the worst effects of COVID-19.

Those first eligible for a booster, based on when they completed their two-dose course, will be people in high priority groups who were prioritised early in the roll out of the vaccine program. This includes Australians aged 50 and over, residents of aged care and disability facilities, people with underlying medical conditions, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians, and people at increased occupational risk of COVID-19.

The booster program will roll out directly to people living in residential aged care facilities and people with a disability through an in-reach program.

Frontline workers are strongly encouraged to book in to get a booster dose, if six months has passed since their second dose.

The Australian Government will consider the possibility of other vaccines being used for booster shots if successful applications are submitted to the TGA, and pending advice from ATAGI.

The Pfizer COVID-19 booster shots are free and will be available through the primary healthcare network (GPs, community pharmacies, Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services, Aboriginal and Commonwealth Vaccination Clinics) and state and territory vaccination hubs.

Australia's COVID-19 vaccination program is now one of the most successful in the world, with more than 75 per cent of Australians aged 16 and over being fully vaccinated.

### Positive cases in Alexandra and Marysville

ON Tuesday, October 26, Murrindindi Shire Council announced via Facebook that they had become aware of a possible COVID-19 exposure at the Alexandra Library.

A person, who later tested positive, visited the library and spoke to a staff member at the entrance. They did not enter the library building.

When they became aware of the exposure, council made the decision to close the library for deep cleaning. They re-opened on Wednesday, October 27.

They asked that people who visited the library on Monday, October 25 from 9am to 10pm monitor for symptoms.

afterwards, Shortly Alexandra District Health

(ADH) provided a further update. They stated that the case was active in the community from Friday, October 22 to Monday, October 25, and was later treated at ADH. A transfer to another hospital was arranged, following the appropriate protocols.

People were seen cleaning the public toilets in Rotary Park in full personal protective equipment (PPE) on Tuesday, October 26.

Council's Director of Assets and Development told the Alexandra Standard back in July 2021, "Under the directions of the Chief Health Officer Victoria, stand-alone public toilets do not require a QR code check-in. Regardless, we are in the process of expanding use of QR codes

to all public toilets in our shire,'

ADH emphasised that people in the community should be on the lookout for symptoms including fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny nose or loss of sense of smell, and advised them to get tested and stay home until receiving a negative result. Two cases were also recorded in Marysville during the week.

Testing is available at The Cottage, set up at the old ADH, every day from 1pm to 4pm. No appointment is necessary, but people are asked to follow the signage to ensure a smooth flow of traffic.

For testing out of hours, call the nurse in charge at ADH on 0418 589 131.

### **Regional Victoria's drug problem**

SEWAGE testing has been underway to work out the type and consumption level of drugs people are using. A report was released by the Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission on Thursday, October 28, and it appears that drug use in regional Victoria is much higher than in metropolitan Melbourne in many areas.

It found that people in regional Victoria have been drinking significantly more than people in metropolitan areas, with regional people consuming over 1200 standard drinks per 1000 people each day during June 2021. In metropolitan Melbourne, the consumption was at around 800 standard drinks per day per 1000 people.

People in metropolitan Melbourne were well ahead of regional Victoria in terms of cocaine usage. Although the consumption dropped from a high of almost nine doses per 1000 people per day in Melbourne in June 2020, to around 3.5 in June 2021, it was still significantly higher than in regional Victoria, with around 2.5 doses per 1000 people.

Fentanyl is much more popular with people in regional Victoria compared to their metropolitan counterparts. Fentanyl is a powerful opioid used as a pain medication, and is sometimes used recreationally, including in combination with other drugs. In April 2018, it was close to 16 doses per 1000 people per day in regional Victoria, however this is now at a little over three doses. In metropolitan Melbourne, it's less than 2 doses per 1000 people per day.

Heroin continues to be used at higher levels in Melbourne, with just over nine does per 1000 per day in the June data. In regional, it was just over two doses per 1000 people in April.

MDMA (ecstasy) skyrocketed in regional Victoria in December 2018 and December 2019, with over five doses per 1000 people per day. Usage has been reducing however, and in April 2021, it was under one dose per 1000 people. The popularity of the drug has also reduced in Melbourne, likely due to the lack of parties and festivals during the lockdowns

Cannabis consumption was also higher in regional areas. Regional Victorians have been consuming around 25,000mg of THC per 1000 people per day, while people in metropolitan Melbourne were consuming just under 15,000mg of THC per 1000 people per day.

Australia had the seventh highest consumption of all 24 comparison countries, in terms of cannabis and ecstasy use.

Methylamphetamine (ice) use has been moderately higher in regional areas. In April 2021, there was a massive 45 doses per 1000 people per day, however at its height in April 2019, there were over 65 doses per 1000 people per day. In Melbourne, there were around 35 doses per 1000 people per day in June 2021.

Australia-wide, there were 48 doses per 1000 people per day in April 2020. Australians are the second-biggest ice users in the world, behind the USA.

Nicotine usage is also much higher in regional areas. It's estimated that over 2000 cigarettes per 1000 people are consumed every day, while in Melbourne, it's below 1500.

Oxycodone use is also far more prevalent in regional areas of Victoria, with almost seven doses per 1000 people per day in April 2021. In Melbourne, it's around three.



### **Beautiful gardens to enjoy**

THE Rotary Club of Yea's annual Open Gardens will be held over the weekend of November 6 and 7. There will be 10 delightful gardens to explore as we all enjoy more freedom, and what a glorious time of the year to see these treasures in our own district.

The Yea Garden Club annual Plant Sale will also be held in conjunction with the Open Gardens weekend and, as usual, there will be hundreds of potted plants for sale at bargain prices. The plant sale will be held at 'Abutilon', 5 Welch Street in Yea and all COVID-19 restriction will apply there, as in all the gardens. Only double vaccinated people will be admitted.

Two beautiful gardens will open in Whittlesea Road, just a few kilometres from Yea. 'Glengowrie' has been open before and many will want to re-visit this lovely garden. The word 'serene' best describes this shaded, restful setting, a place to linger over long lunches or drinks on the deck as you watch the evening settle after a long hot day.

An ornamental dam is a spectacular feature with a lovely walk around the bank. Wander around meandering paths and enjoy a peaceful rest in the gazebo overlooking the water. Koalas often visit this garden.

'Our Little Country Farm Garden' is a small but delightful country garden and is open for the first time. An avenue of capitol pears will welcome you into the garden and they will be a spectacular feature when they reach maturity. A lovely 'olde world' fountain is also a feature at the end of the drive.

The garden is still a work in progress but already has a great variety of plantings and shrubs including roses, bromeliads, natives and many spectacular feature trees and shrubs. Donna is inspired by the French country style and this garden will be one you will want to revisit in a few years.

In the township, the Ireland garden is a beautiful garden which perfectly Although a large town block, the garden has been deliberately kept to a 'retirement' size. A formal planting of white iceberg roses outlines the front garden beds which are full of old fashioned and much-loved cottage plants. Massive photinia hedges give absolute privacy as well as spring flowers and autumn colour.

The rear garden is a delight. There is a high trellis supporting a Boston ivy, as well as ferns, succulents and several outdoor seating areas giving the option of sun or shade

The Ralph-Simon Garden has an exposed setting on Racecourse Road and most of the township has watched with great interest the spectacular garden being created here in just two short years. Four mature trees and a great variety of camelias remained from the original garden but lawns have disappeared under beds full of wonderful colour and variety and the thriving 'kitchen' gardens developed.

### MARYSVILLE PRIMARY SCHOOL

### Changes ahead for the Lower Hume PCP

BIG changes are about to take place in the Victorian primary care field, with the state government making the decision to cease their funding from April 2022. But is it as dire as it sounds?

Victorian Primary Care Partnerships is a statewide coordinating group representing all primary care partnerships (PCPs) across Victoria. Chair Gregg Nicholls explained that the secretary of the Department of Health advised the PCPs four weeks ago that the existing program would be folded into the new public health units which have been established across the state.

"The guarantee is that what the department is calling the 'high value functions' of the PCPs will continue to be provided through the public health units, and all the existing staff will be transferred from their current employment to the public health units."

PCP programs have been operating for 21 years. They were originally started in response to the Kennett Government's competitive tendering process, which tended to create barriers between service providers. PCPs were tasked with instilling a sense of partnership, as the name suggests, between organisations, providing both health and community services.

"After 21 years, you'd hope that has been successful," Mr Nicholls said. "In addition to that, the health system has changed dramatically in the last 21 years, and so, the reasons why the PCPs were formed. The government really has learnt a lot of lessons from the COVID-19 situation. It's really looking to create a better network of primary prevention and public health, hence the decision to merge the PCPs in with the new public health units." Asked about the proudest achievements of the PCPs, Mr Nicholls explained that each PCP will have different claims, with different circumstances in different parts of the state. "But as a general rule, I think the major achievement is our leadership in terms of primary prevention and our capacity to create partnerships to solve local problems in a way which is better, because the more people are involved who are trying to solve things normally get a better result," Mr Nicholls said.

In terms of changes to the functions of the PCPs, Mr Nicholls said, "There's a Department of Health Transition Reference Group that I'm a member of, as are other members of PCPs, and its task is to sort out how everything's going to work in the future. It's all the transfer arrangements, etcetera. There will no doubt be changes, but those changes are still being thought about."

The final form and functions of the local Public Health Units are still being finalised, however the catchment for the Lower Hume PCP is most likely to be included in the Goulburn Valley Public Health Unit attached to Goulburn Valley Health.

"I think generally, across the state, PCPs are generally seen as being a good change. Obviously, it's beneficial in terms of local areas with the staff continuing to be guaranteed employment by the Department of Health, and I think the move to strengthen primary prevention and public health is a good thing. I think we learnt a lot from the roll out of the vaccination program with COVID-19, particularly with hard-to-reach groups in the community, who may be more disadvantaged, and I think the PCP program will continue to kick goals under the new public health unit," he said.





### **Murrindindi ineligible for Homebuyer Fund**

ALL of Murrindindi Shire is excluded from the Victorian Government's Homebuyer Fund.

The eligible locations are largely metropolitan based, with some of the larger regional centres also included.

The Homebuyer Fund provides eligible homebuyers with a contribution of up to 25 per cent towards the purchase price of their property, in exchange for a share of the property, reducing their minimum required deposit to five per cent and avoiding the need to pay Lenders Mortgage Insurance.

Shadow Treasurer David Davis MP called it discrimination and said, "Many, many Victorian families seeking a quieter life in a smaller country town will have been bitterly disappointed that their dream location was excluded.

"The Treasurer appears to have got his Home Buyer Fund criteria wrong or else it was a nasty, deliberate tactic to discriminate against some country people and families.

"The criteria for this scheme are a slap in the face for country Victorians. An arrogant citybased Treasurer couldn't care a hoot about Victorians outside Melbourne.



"The scheme is closed now slamming the gate shut."

When contacted about the issue, a government spokesperson said, "We're playing our part in making home ownership more accessible for Victorians, by providing significant investments and tax support to help Victorians into homes. The Victorian Homebuyer Fund will be the key to get many Victorians into their homes sooner.

"The fund will be a sustainable scheme where homeowners can

buy out the government's share at market value over time if they choose, and those funds will then be reinvested to help other aspiring homebuyers get into the property market. "The list of eligible regional locations has been expanded from the pilot to now include 42 locations spanning 524 suburbs."

The government is believed to have based its selection of available locations on areas with higher populations, forecast population growth and healthy property markets.

Bendigo, Mildura, Shepparton, Ballarat, Daylesford, Warragul, Sale and Gisborne are among 42 eligible regional locations.

The \$500 million VHF is expected to support more than 3000 Victorians to become homeowners. The VHF will be delivered over multiple years as detailed in the 2020/21 State Budget.

The Victorian Homebuyer Fund is a separate initiative to the First Home Owner Grant.

Participants are still eligible for other Victorian Government housing schemes, including the First Home Owner Grant and first home buyer stamp duty concessions or exemptions, if applicable.

### Vaccination requirements at Council's services centres

LIKE businesses across Victoria, councils are rolling out changes to how they offer services so they can meet their obligations under COVID-19 Health Directions issued by the Victorian Government.

From 6pm on October 29, Murrindindi Shire Council is obliged to limit access at some of their facilities to those who can prove they have been double-vaccinated against COVID-19, or who have a medical exemption. Unvaccinated customers will only be able to access 'essential' council services, such as the resource and recycling centres, maternal and child health services and limited customer services

Council CEO Livia Bonazzi said this was a difficult thing for both councils and customers to navigate, but there are good public health reasons for this change. As the shire opens up to metropolitan Melbourne, it is likely that there will be an increase in COVID-19 cases locally. As at October 24, 94.4 per cent of the and 76.6 per cent were double-vaccinated. There are hopes the vast majority of community members will be doublevaccinated very soon.


"Limiting access to most of the inperson services to those people who have been double-vaccinated means people can visit the facilities with a greater sense of confidence," Ms Bonazzi said.

"Services like attending library programs or browsing the library bookshelves will now only be available to those with double-vaccination as these are deemed 'non-essential' services. We have got alternatives in place though. You can give us a call and we can provide you with a 'click and collect' service instead, so you don't miss out on reading material.

"However, if you plan to visit one of the facilities and can't prove you are double-vaccinated or you don't hold a vaccination medical exemption, please visit council's website *murrindindi*. *vic.gov.au* or call 5772 0333 to check if council is able to offer you the service in person.

"In addition, if you haven't yet managed to download your vaccination certificate on your phone just yet, please give us a call. We are rolling out some sessions to help you do just that. We will also be offering assistance to those who would like to print up their vaccination certificate.

"Please be kind to council staff, and to staff in businesses and organisations across our shire, when they ask you to check in and show your vaccination status. I have heard some awful stories about staff being abused by customers when they are simply doing their jobs and enforcing a Victorian law. This is simply unacceptable," Ms Bonazzi said.

### Half a century of community care

IT was 1971 when Graeme Robb, a fourth generation beef farmer from Eildon, decided to volunteer for the Alexandra District Ambulance Service (ADAS).

"In those days it was all people in other careers doing volunteer work. We never got paid or anything. But having worked by myself, the opportunity to be part of a team was a change that I enjoyed," Graeme said.

"The ADAS was a group of people who came together in the late 1940s because there really wasn't a service like it for the community. They got a bit of training from the local doctors and it continued from there.'

Five decades of service later, Graeme has certainly been pivotal in continuing to champion the community's legacy in pre-hospital care.

Now in his 50th year, he is still a familiar face at the Ambulance Victoria (AV) Eildon branch, assisting locals in need through his role as an Ambulance Community Officer (ACO).

"I suppose you don't think that far ahead when you start out, but I never thought I'd quit and I don't have any plans to. I never gave it any thought at all, I just kept doing what I'm doing,' Graeme said about his 50 year milestone.

In rural communities, Ambulance Victoria paramedics are assisted by ACOs who are first responders employed on a casual basis. ACOs have lifesaving skills that they develop and maintain every year.

ACOs operating at а community branch work in pairs and are responsible for providing first response emergency care in response to a Triple Zero (000) call. They may be 'backed up' by the arrival of a paramedic crew but may also be required to treat and transport the patient to hospital.

Graeme said a highlight of his career was having a front row seat to the service as it evolved, with the Metropolitan Ambulance Service, Rural Ambulance Service and ADAS merging in 2008 to become the state-wide Ambulance Victoria service of today.

Graeme has seen many changes in the local ambulance service's equipment, medications, protocols, and vehicles.

"There's a local family and I remember carting a baby boy home in a humidity crib. He's an adult now. I've carted three generations of people around

with assistance when it was needed," Graeme said.

"Many people in the community know me and of course when an ambulance arrives they feel comforted as well."

As the service evolved, so to have the jobs that Graeme has responded to. He recalls everything from rescuing a group of scouts from the top of Mount Cathedral after they were struck by lightning, to using a water ambulance to assist in boating accidents on Lake Eildon.

"There's always something different or new to learn, Graeme said.

"At the moment I'm doing training, which is mostly all online. It has all changed so much, but I hope to keep going with it all."

Ambulance Victoria Acting Senior Team Manager Murrindindi Phil Irving said Graeme was a "stalwart in the

Eildon community" and while many ACOs had served their community for a long period of time, no-one had come close to Graeme's 50 year achievement.

"When I first came to Alexandra from metropolitan, Graeme had already been an ACO for decades," he said.

"He was always there offering to cover shortfalls and do what he can to keep the Eildon team going.

"He's got a long and colourful history with stories of how much pre-hospital has changed over the years.

"Thinking of all the jobs he would have gone to over the decades, it would be almost impossible to calculate the amount of coverage and service that the community would have received from Graeme looking after Eildon, Marysville and surrounds."

Graeme said he loved seeing younger people come into the service because "they take it up with such enthusiasm.

"My advice would be to tell them to have a go and not be afraid," he said.

"It's a great thing to become involved within your local area. A lot of people find it difficult to meet the time and meet the clinical demands of it all, but I'll tell you now, it's one of the most rewarding things I've ever done.

"Being able to provide comfort to people in their most dire moments is something that you never forget."



THE Murrindindi Shire Council held its October scheduled meeting on Wednesday, October 27 via Zoom, and was livestreamed to council's Facebook page. All councillors were present for the meeting.

### Annual report 2020/21 and 2017/21 council report

The annual report 2020/21 for the period of Wednesday, July 1, 2020, to Wednesday, June 30, 2021, was presented to council for its endorsement.

It outlined the significant achievements of council including objectives and activities made in the period.

A detailed summary of the report can be found on the Murrindindi Shire Council website, however some highlights of the annual report 2020/21 include: council keeping its promise to inform the community of changing restrictions due to COVID-19 and advised businesses of the various COVID-19 support available, over \$210,000 was awarded across the community as part of the grants and contributions scheme, with Mitchell and Mansfield Shire Councils, a \$1.2 million grant funding was awarded from Regional Development Victoria to create large-scale art installations along the Great Victorian Rail Trail, the commenced creation of Rethink, Reduce, Re-use, Recycle; a waste and resource recovery strategy, with the goal of making the shire a low-waste municipality and commencement of important capital works across the shire, to the value of \$10.7 million.

The 2017/21 council plan was presented also to councillors, and the report's aim focused on the projects, activities and achievements delivered through the plan.

As part of the plan, council made aware and adhered to four priority areas: our place, our people, our prosperity, and our promise. Council acknowledged and made note of

the report.

#### Draft of Domestic Animal Management Plan 2021-25

Feedback received to council from the public exhibition of the Draft Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) was presented to councillors in preparation for its adoption at council's November 2021 meeting.

Vito Albicini said that the plan was endorsed for public feedback at the July council meeting, and the submission received was mostly, in favour of the plan. "Generally, this feedback was supportive

of the draft DAMP. As such, no amendments to the draft DAMP have been made however some minor changes have been made," he said.

Four written responses were received to council, and an additional 17 submissions were made via The Loop.

Some questions were raised among the written submissions, however, were responded to satisfactory and needed no amended to the draft.

During the open forum, the Alexandra and District Dog Obedience Club brought up concern of an off-leash park for dogs, something that Mr Albicini said was generally supported among other submissions.

Further to this, Cr Walsh asked if it would be 'anticipated that any use of such facility would necessitate the owners and the dogs undergoing some sort of safety related training as proposed by the Alexandra and District Dog Obedience Club'.

In response, Mr Albicini said that 'it would be ideal', but something that may be hard to force upon owners and their dogs.

#### Application for liquor license, 3 Back Eildon Road, Thornton

A notice of decision was presented to council to grant a permit be issued for a General Liquor License for the Schoolhouse café at 3 Back Eildon Road Thornton.

During open forum, Angelina Bell spoke on the matter, highlighting the importance that the liquor license would be granted for the café, which is an approved use of the land it is situated on.

"We're not proposing to change that use of the land, the existing use of the land for a café is to continue. The liquor license sort, it is required to expand this approved and existing business and to expand what's on offer," Ms Bell said.

The café has been operating with a limited liquor license for the last six months to which Ms Bell said has all run smoothly, and no fights, arguments or other disruptions have been caused due to alcohol being on the premises.

Three objections were received to the planning permit, with major concerns surrounding the use of the land will change from a café to a pub or bottle shop, impact of other businesses in the township and traffic impacts because of increased numbers given the sale of packaged liquor.

Despite the objections, council officers are satisfied that the application proposal is consistent with the provisions of the Murrindindi Planning Scheme. Subject to some minor amendments to the 14 conditions stated in council's October meeting agenda to improve clarity, a notice of decision to grant a planning permit for the General Liquor License was passed.

#### Gordon Street, Alexandra: proposed cooperative works

Mr Albicini presented the proposal to council that is contributes \$20,000 of gravel road surfacing material to upgrade the approximately 700 metres of unsealed road on Gordon Street, Alexandra, primarily used as an access point for the Alexandra and District Speedway Inc.

"The current unsealed section of Gordon Street is quite poor, and this particular section of the road is not listed in council's road register or covered under council's road nations programs," he said.

Alexandra and District Speedway Inc have been successful in attracting a new large event including the National Junior Sedan Titles. This event is expected to provide a significant economic benefit to the shire via hotel accommodation bookings as well as food and entertainment.

"Alexandra and District Speedway Inc is seeking approval from council to undertake road repairs using suitably skilled and equipped club volunteers. They propose to rip the road surface, use a vibrating pad-foot roller to break up the large stones and then re-shape the formation to a standard six per cent crossfall including table drains."

After his presentation, the motion was moved by Cr Lording and Cr Gallagher.

#### Open forum: Alexandra Timber Tramway and Museum

Gerry Laws spoke to his submission regarding the Council Plan 2021-2025, on behalf of the Alexandra Timber Tramway and Museum Committee.

Mr Laws said, "We can make a significant contribution to the goals in your draft plan."

He made two suggestions to council during his discussion, that councillors should consider specialised funding outside the grants and contributions program to help secure the museums operations in the longer terms, and to see a much clearer statement in the draft plan concerning the vital role of heritage operations.

Cr Gerenscer asked Mr Laws if the committee have looked into other state government funding for the railway, to which he responded that the railway is: "In a period of redevelopment at the site, but we are fairly constrained as a not-for-profit and where we can go for funding."

"We are looking at additional sources and constantly talking to people like the shire support officers in tourism and grant funding."

Cr Haslam further asked if the committee has an idea on how much this specific funding should be and is it a consistent amount or for a specific item. Mr Laws said that: "We have several projects in planning and one of them involves a beautification project for the ground which would allow clearer access for mobility challenged visitors."
