When it became clear that the annual ANZAC parades and associated social events could not proceed due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Greta collaborated with Sasha at the Embassy of Ideas to reach out to RSL members and senior citizens at the Alexandra, Yea and Eildon retirement homes with 382 packages of volunteer homemade ANZAC biscuits. Greta's energy didn't stop there. With further determination to help people needing extra support during such isolating times, she and Sasha devised the Pick Me Up Pandemic Care Packages.

It is typical of Greta to establish such connections between community groups to achieve an outcome beneficial to so many people.



## **Police officer assaulted**

AN EILDON man received a \$1200 fine with convictions recorded for charges relating to the assault of a police officer and cannabis possession. He faced the Mansfield Court last week.

Police prosecutors alleged that in November 2019 the accused and his de facto partner were involved in a loud verbal altercation at a property in Eildon.

The argument was reported as a family violence matter and police attended the scene.

When they arrived, the police stopped the argument on the front porch and separated the parties. One officer took the accused male onto the lawn to get his version of events, and the other officer remained with the female on the porch.

After police advised the accused he would be required to accompany them to the station for breaching a Family Violence Safety Order, the accused voiced his refusal.

The officer then told the accused he was under arrest, and when the accused resisted, the officer attempted to physically restrain him. The accused refused to comply and continued to fight with the officer.

The second officer assessed the situation as serious and deployed capsicum spray to defuse the situation. They continued to wrestle with the accused until he was brought to the ground. Additional police and ambulance officers attended and the remaining member of the household consented to a search of the premises.

The accused was taken to Alexandra hospital and was subsequently interviewed and bailed to appear at court.

Upon searching the premises police located a piece of wood fashioned to look like a firearm, a bowl containing cannabis, and in the backyard were a large number of cannabis plants which allegedly belonged to the accused.

The defence said the accused had a hernia in his stomach at the time of the incident which caused him significant discomfort on the ground, and said that this was why he was thrashing around.

Defence also noted the accused was on WorkCover payments due to back injuries sustained from working as a carpet layer.

The accused pleaded guilty to both the drug charges and assaulting police.

"Police are off limits as far as these things go," the magistrate said. "This got completely out of hand. Police don't go to work expecting to be assaulted. I understand you were in discomfort, but that still doesn't justify what happened, it merely explains it. I know there was an argument, but you in a sense took it out on police and an officer had to have surgery to rectify the injury, which is not acceptable. ## Symptoms change depending on vaccination status

For people who have been fully vaccinated, the most common symptoms, in order of prevalence, have been found to be a runny nose, headache, sneezing, a sore throat and a persistent cough.

It is worth noting these differences as sneezing did not previously occur at all in the list of common or less common COVID-19 symptoms. If you have been sneezing a lot lately and it's not the result of persistent hayfever, it might be a good time to get tested.

## ABC's local radio programming reduced

THE ABC has announced that locally produced radio content will be reduced next year. They stated that the aim is to create more dynamic programming and boost digital and on-demand services.

Murrindindi is within the ABC Goulburn-Murray region, with the content produced in Wodonga.

Under the plan, local radio presenters in Wodonga, Sale, Ballarat, Bendigo, Horsham and Mildura will have their breakfast shows reduced by one hour from January. The programs will now run from 6.35am to 9am, and the 10am to 11am shows will be dropped. The 9am to 11am will be filled with Victoria-wide programming.

The ABC stated that there would be no job losses resulting from the change, and said that the axed morning presenters would be deployed as field reporters, hosts of outside broadcasts, act as fill-in presenters and creators of digital content.

### Logging injunction until **December 13**

ON Wedsday, November 17, the Victorian Supreme Court yesterday ordered that state logging agency VicForests halt logging in 27 areas of forest across East Gippsland and the Central Highlands until December 13.

There are currently 10 court cases underway against VicForests. The two new cases have been launched concurrently by community groups Environment East Gippsland (EEG) and Kinglake Friends of the Forest (KFF), concerned about the protection of the greater glider and the yellow bellied glider. The southern greater glider is now listed as a threatened species.

On behalf of the two groups, barrister Jonathan Korman argued that Vicforests is failing to adequately survey for these animals prior to logging, and failing to avoid risk of serious, irreversible damage to the environment when conducting logging operations.

Sue McKinnon, president of KFF said, "It is known that logging kills Greater Gliders. They can't just move on. When their trees are cut down Greater Gliders are very unlikely to survive. Other Gliders and Possums are also killed by logging operations. This causes a domino effect with reductions in these species causing declines in predators including the Sooty and Powerful Owl."

Contacted for comment, a VicForests' spokesperson said, "VicForests are unable to comment on matters currently before the court."

Fifteen of the coupes in question are located in the Central Highlands, and 12 of the coupes are in East Gippsland.

The Supreme Court heard both interim injunction applications on November 17, pending a substantive hearing, an 'interlocutory injunction' on 13 December.

#### **Carpenter appointed** Sue nay

Carpenter as the new mayor, and Damien Gallagher as the deputy mayor, at their meeting on Wednesday, November 17. Mayor Carpenter replaces Sandice McAulay in the mayoral role.

Sue Carpenter was asked what she hopes to achieve in the role. Her response was, "I'd reflect on the fact that we've worked really hard to develop a community plan, after having lots of engagement with the community. If we can work to the road map that it gives us, I'll be happy."

She plans to bring an approachable, communicative approach to the role. "Communication, between the councillors, between the council officers, we want it to be really sound. We want to be able to make sure that there's no ambiguity, that we really understand what we're saying. I want to give all the councillors the opportunity to be heard. We're all different. We're a wonderful blend of councillors but we're all different, and some people are more willing to discuss and some people a little bit more hesitant. I want to make sure that those that are more hesitant are still given the opportunity. I really want robust, constructive dialogue, so that we really fully understand the issues we're having to deliberate on, and

> Asked what she has learnt from watching others in the role, Ms Carpenter replied, "Councillor McAulay has led us with a very calm, considered and respectful approach. I believe her experience has been invaluable in encouraging the rest of the councillors to settle into our roles. Four of us were newbies, so it has been a pleasure to be her deputy. She has been very encouraging. She really has.

"I could also say that the acting CEO, Michael Chesworth, delivered a most comprehensive induction program at the start of our term, and I am so grateful for the

depth of understanding that we gained from that program under his guidance. There's so much to get into your head and under your belt, and we were guided very, very capably. It was terrific," she said.

"The new CEO, she has also been very supportive of my role as deputy mayor, and I really value her insights and clear thinking. When she responds to something, she's concise but relevant and constructive. Even the language that she uses is in some ways new to me, and so I'm learning from her as well."

Ms Carpenter has been living in the Murrindindi Shire community for 30 years now. When her children were in primary school, she was involved in the parents

and friends group before finding herself as president. It was her first experience of chairing a meeting. She learnt through the role that good communication is vital. "The more you communicated with your community, the better off everyone was," she said.

She was also a member for the Rotary Club of Yea for 20 years. She said, "I was so shy when I first joined that club that if I was asked to chair a meeting or hold a microphone, I just wouldn't even go to the meeting, I was so nervous. I couldn't public speak to save myself. But there have been so many wonderful role models within that club and they have helped me to develop my confidence so much. In 2018/9, I was asked to be president, and that just took it to another level again, because I felt I was really steering the shire. I learnt to delegate, I felt that I could respect and encourage and trust my fellow members, and we can build each other up and not judge people. I think all those experiences within the club really helped to shape me to be able to take on this role."

She is much more comfortable with public speaking now, as a direct result of her experiences with the club.

### Deer spotlighting charges

SEVEN people are expected year old man from Noble to be charged on summons following a three night police Mooroolbark, a 33 year old last weekend.

Mansfield and Jamieson uniform police officers, supported by staff from Game Management Authority (GMA) and Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP), led overnight patrols in a number of illegal spotlighting hotspots between Thursday, November 11 and Saturday, November 13.

During the operation officers apprehended seven people who they allege were committing numerous offences against the Firearms Act, including prohibited person possess firearm; possess loaded firearm in public place; fail to store Category A or B longarm correctly; store firearm or ammunition in an insecure manner; possession of spotlight and firearm in recognised deer habitat.

A number of other charges are likely to be laid in relation to offences against various Wildlife Game Regulations.

Police seized six firearms, spotlights seven and ammunition during the operation.

Six of the seven alleged offenders have had their firearms licences suspended while the seventh person was unlicenced. The following people are expected to be charged on summons: a 48

> Mansfield Acting Senior Sergeant Geoff Hutchison said, "Local police along with specialist units and our partner agencies braved the rain and horrible weather conditions last weekend, however it was undoubtedly worth spending three nights in the challenging high country conditions to apprehend seven hunters allegedly committing a multitude of offences.

"Illegal spotlighting is not only against the law, it is dangerous, unethical and reduces recreational hunting opportunities for law-abiding hunters.

"We will continue to collaborate with our partner agencies, share intelligence, and act on reports from the local community to crack down on illegal hunting practices, and protect the community.

"Hunters should be reminded that illegal hunting activity is likely to result in immediate suspension of firearms licences, seizure of firearms, and the facing of charges."



## Water police testing for drugs this summer

BOAT and jet ski operators will be with the trial a major step towards tested for drugs across Victoria in a major trial this summer.

The trial will see tests conducted at boat ramps statewide. Key locations include Patterson River, Williamstown, St Kilda and Lake Eildon. It will be the first time members of the Water Police Squad have conducted drug testing.

Tests will be conducted between November and March, with the first operation scheduled for November 20.

Operators found with illicit drugs such as methamphetamines, MDMA or cannabis in their system will have their marine licence cancelled for three months and face a fine of up to \$2180. Water police can also ban them from driving a motor vehicle for up to 24 hours.

The drug testing trial is the result of more than a year's planning involving Victoria Police's Water Police Squad and Road Policing Command. Victoria was one of the first jurisdictions in the world to introduce roadside drug testing, greater safety on waterways. An evaluation will be completed mid next year. Testing could become permanent if the trial is successful.

Police have had power to drug test boat and jet ski operators for several years however it is the first time water police have conducted testing. A preliminary oral fluid test will be conducted with a secondary sample sent to a lab for analysis, mirroring the existing system for roadside drug tests.

Water police already test vessel operators for alcohol.

Inspector Greg Barras, Water Police Squad said, "Boat and jet ski operators with illicit drugs in their system are not only a risk to themselves but to all water users.

"This trial sends a clear message that this type of behaviour will not be tolerated.

"Water police will be out at boat ramps across the state this summer testing for drugs so there's a high chance we'll be at one near you.


"The penalties for anyone caught are severe and you may well find your ability to drive a motor vehicle sunk too."

Inspector Brenda Bagally from the Road Policing Drug and Alcohol Section added, "Drugs are a huge problem on Victoria's roads and it's a sad reality there will also be use among boat and jet ski operators.

"Road police provided their expertise in this trial because we know the trauma drugs cause on our roads and we don't want the same tragedies playing out on our waterways.

"Be it on land or water, drugs impair judgement, slow reaction times and increase risk-taking behaviour. That's why this trial is so important."

An Eildon Police member said, "We're pleased the Water Police will he here doing the operation. It will deter people from doing the wrong thing, and make the lake safer for everyone."

## More capacity and a faster fleet

VICTORIA will have 50 aircraft strategically placed across the state over the summer season to assist fighting fires and help keep communities safe.

Minister for Emergency Services Jaclyn Symes has announced the 2021/22 aircraft fleet arrangments, which includes a mix of firebombing aircraft, air supervision and airborne information gathering aircraft.

There is greater flexibility and firebombing capacity in this year's fleet compared to previous years, with higher speed aircraft and increased carrying capacity. These enhancements provide a more modern fixed-wing and helicopter fleet, with technologically advanced systems.

There are several new additions to the fleet this summer, including a CH47 Chinook with a capacity of 11,000 litres, and a larger capacity Aircrane capable of holding 9000 litres, and a Super Puma with a tank of up to 4000 litres.

Victoria will have two Large Air Tankers (LAT) based at Avalon Airport, one of which will be shared with Queensland and will be based in Victoria for our peak summer period.

The new LAT Q400 can carry 10,000lt of water or retardant and has fast dispatch and turn around times. It also has short take off and landing capabilities making it more agile to move around the state, in line with changing risk.

It can also operate from smaller regional airports as it requires less room for take-off and landing, making it more agile to move around the state, in line with changing risk.

The Night Fire Aviation Program will continue this summer with the Chinook, the highest capacity helicopter, with a continued focus on initial attack and keeping small fires small. The Chinook can operate through the hottest part of the day and can continue into the night, to give firefighters the best chance to put fires out.

The Victorian fleet will continue to provide immediate response in the early stages of fires and support firefighters on the ground to keep communities safe.

## New forest firefighters ready to respond to fires this summer

SIXTY-seven of Forest Fire Management Victoria's (FFMVic) newest firefighters are completing an intensive training program to learn the skills needed to protect communities and the environment from bushfires.

The program covers the fundamentals of firefighting including fire behaviour, fire suppression, planned burning, safety and survival techniques.

Forest Fire Management Victoria's Deputy Chief Fire Officer Aaron Kennedy said, "Our new firefighters are completing a mix of theory and field-based activities to prepare them for the varied role of a forest firefighter.

"Forest firefighters rely extensively on dry firefighting techniques as water is often scarce in the middle of the bush.

"The course covers hands-on training in how to use rakehoes and other tools to construct a mineral earth control line, as well as skills such as four-wheel driving, use of chainsaws and water pumps, working around heavy machinery and aircraft, and engaging with the community.

"Recruits will not only respond to bushfires across the region and state, they'll also be undertaking important risk reduction and preparedness work such as planned burning, slashing and track clearing.

"Once they've successfully completed the program, the recruits



will work alongside our experienced firefighters where they'll continue with on-the-job learning while undertaking bushfire preparedness and response work."

This year FFMVic has recruited 124 seasonal project firefighters in north east Victoria to help keep communities safe. Last year FFMVic responded to more than 530 fires across the region in forests and reserves.

Project firefighters complement the existing workforce during the bushfire season, responding to fires and undertaking planned burning during the peak autumn period. They are based at 19 depots across north east Victoria including Corryong, Tallangatta, Eskdale, Ovens, Bright, Beechworth, Mount Beauty, Benalla, Yarrawonga, Wangaratta, Whitfield, Mansfield, Shepparton, Nathalia, Alexandra, Toolangi, Broadford, Kinglake and Marysville.

All FFMVic crews are adhering to appropriate COVID-19 restrictions and hygiene guidelines to ensure operations and training can safely continue across the state.

They also thanked Jas Reid, a swimming instructor from Mansfield, who became involved when Linda went to Queensland, and local tradespeople and the local community, many of whom assisted after hours and often donated their time, expertise or just getting in and getting a job done.

The pool was declared officially open when the giant pool noodle was cut.





### Don't drive under fallen trees

AT around 4.30pm on Thursday, November 18, Marysville SES were called to the Maroondah Highway near Dom Dom Saddle after three trees fell in close proximity, blocking the road. Afternoon peak hour made for long queues of traffic while they worked.

The largest of the trees had to be safely lowered from the top embankment before being cut and rolled into a nearby pull over bay. The SES were grateful for assistance from Victoria Police, who stopped traffic at Fernshaw, and Regional Roads Victoria who helped them to clear the debris. An excavator was called to continue the clean up and ensure any other unstable trees in the impacted area were made safe.

After several hours, the crews returned to headquarters to sharpen their saws and clean their equipment. They wanted to thank all the passing motorists for their patience and friendly waves. It was lovely to hear locals in particular saying hello to SES members as they passed.

The SES would like to advise motorists to never drive under or over fallen trees, powerlines, or other hazards. Trees can move or fall further at any time, suddenly and without notice. Anytime a tree has fallen on the road, there is also the risk of further trees or branches being disturbed and falling in the area.

If motorists come across a hazard, particularly on heavily treed roads such as the Maroondah Highway or Woods Point Road, SES recommended they stop a safe distance back from the tree. If the tree is leaning or stretching from a higher embankment, a distance of at least one and a half times the length of the tree is a good rule of thumb, although this may not always be possible.

Pull over to the left if there's room, or stay in your lane. Turn your hazard lights on, and make your vehicle visible to cars approaching from behind. Remember your headlights may make the hazard difficult for oncoming traffic to see.

Once you are parked, call the road authority or emergency services for assistance as soon as possible.

The driver and any passengers should stay in the car while they wait for crews to attend. It is not safe to walk or stand on the road, even if traffic is stopped. Emergency services may be using the other lane for access, and further branches or trees may fall. Follow the directions of emergency services or traffic controllers once they arrive. Remember not to exceed 40km/h when passing workers on the road. Slower is better.

Do not use your phone to take photos or check social media when driving, even at low speeds. The SES appreciates your friendly waves as you pass, but help keep crews safe by staying off your phone and focused.

They also encourage motorists to use the VicEmergency or VicRoads Apps to check for road updates before starting on a trip. Never to rely on social media for updates or to report incidents. Several weeks ago, the SES attended a potentially serious rescue event which was reported

on social media before being called in to 000. We highly recommend downloading the EmergencyPlus app to help you alert emergency services to hazards you come across.

While we're talking about road safety around emergency services, it's always timely to remind road users of what to do if a vehicle with flashing lights or sirens is approaching. By law, if a police, emergency, enforcement or escort vehicle has its red, blue or magenta lights flashing or its siren on, you must get out of its way. Give way and stop if necessary. They have noticed many motorists seem to be confused about what to do when emergency vehhicles approach from behind, particularly along the highway.

Firstly, stay alert to your surroundings when driving. They notice many drivers fail to hear sirens. Keep an eye in mirrors for lights approaching and pull over early if you can, well before the emergency vehicle reaches you. Otherwise, move as far left on the road as you can to give the vehicle room to pass. If you can't move left safely, stay where you are and let the emergency vehicle overtake you when safe to do so. Importantly, make sure to use your indicators and signal your intentions. If it's unsafe to pass the emergency vehicle would rather stay behind you until it becomes safe, and using your indicator is a great way to show them you've seen them and will pull over when possible. Slowing down in an area where overtaking isn't possible doesn't help, travel ahead and move over as soon as it's safe to do so. They may deactivate our sirens to let you know they are willing to wait.

It was a busy few days for Marysville's SES members. Earlier in the week they also assisted Ambulance Victoria with an injured bushwalker on a track near Marysville. In very slippery conditions, they were able to help the patient to the waiting ambulance by using their 4WD, saving crews a carry-out via stretcher.







## **Respect is growing**

the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence.

The 16 Days of Activism starts on November 25, the International Day for Elimination of Violence against Women, and ends on December 10, Human Rights Day.

The 2021 campaign theme, led by Respect Victoria, Domestic Violence Victoria and the Domestic Violence Resource Centre, is 'Respect Is ...' with people to complete the sentence with their own thoughts and opinion.

The positive message aims to support Victorian communities to engage in conversations about respect - what respect means to people, what respect looks like and how to put respect into practice, especially in the context of gender equality.

There is no single cause of violence against women. But current international evidence, outlined in 'Change the Story: a shared framework for the primary prevention of violence against women and their children in Australia' demonstrates that higher levels of violence against women are consistently associated with lower levels of gender equality in both public life and personal relationships.

This year, council, partner agencies and community groups across the region have planned a range of activities, workshops and opportunities to learn about the gendered drivers of violence, so people can act collectively to make an impact and take a stance.

Mitchell Shire Mayor Bill Chisholm said respect came in many different forms.

"Respect is equality. Respect is equal pay for equal work. Respect is being treated how you want to be treated," he said.

"We will once again stand with our community by taking part in the 16 Days of Activism campaign to highlight our stance as an organisation against violence."

Cr Chisholm said the campaign was an opportunity to partner with agencies

"As a shire with significantly high family violence rates, we want to send a clear message - violence will never be tolerated or accepted in our community," he said.

"We all have to work together to acknowledge the problem and find practical and worthwhile solutions."

As Mitchell Shire has high family violence rates, council is making it clear that it is not tolerated or accepted within our community.

Council is offering a free packet of native flower seedlings from libraries and community centres across the shire - fitting into its theme of 'respect is growing', and aiming to spark conversations about how to grow respect in the workplace, with family and friends or in the community.

Mitchell Shire is ranked 11th of the 79 Victorian councils for family violence incidents.

New data shows that 2020 was the first year in which all of Mitchell's townships experienced a family violence incident rate higher than the state average.

One of council's priorities for the upcoming federal election is securing funding for the Seymour Integrated Health and Community Hub.

Council's previous advocacy work led to the establishment of the recently completed Wallan Community Services Hub, which includes an Orange Door access point.

The Orange Door helps people speak to workers from specialist family violence, child and family, Aboriginal and men's services.

The Orange Door is a free service for adults, children and young people who are experiencing or have experienced family violence and families who need extra support with the care of children.

"This year's theme is 'call it out' and we're trying to get men involved in activism against family violence," she said.

"[On social media] we'll do posts using men in our community, each one of them with a personal message about saying no to family violence or calling out violence if they see it."



Ms Audehm said family violence was a problem across the region, and men needed to play a role in reducing it.

"Family violence in the Mitchell community is at a fairly alarming rate, but family violence throughout Victoria and Australia is higher than it should be as well," she said.

"We're trying to raise awareness for men to call it out if they see something, like any of their colleagues or family members who might be saying things or acting in a way that is not acceptable. We want them to stand up and say something about it. "We're also trying to raise awareness for those people who are victims and support anyone who is a victim. We want them to know there are places where they can make connections and get help."

## Be careful of the potholes

MEMBER for Eildon Cindy McLeish has called for the Minister for Roads to visit the region.

She said roads across the region are in a deplorable condition and only getting worse due to the lack of serious repairs made by the Victorian Government.

Ms McLeish called on the minister to personally drive up the Melba Highway and onto the Maroondah Highway to Mansfield. On the way back the minister needs to head to Alexandra and take the trip over the Black Spur to Healesville to see for himself the dire need for serious road repairs and ensure these repairs are actioned.

Ms McLeish said, "I have previously called on the minister to drive Heidelberg-Kinglake Road between Kinglake and St Andrews. The minister can't do it from behind a desk in the city, he needs to see the road conditions for himself."

"I receive complaints from residents almost on a daily basis about how poor and dangerous the roads are, and the damage potholes cause to vehicles. People are fed up, and rightly so."

The Melba Highway is a serious concern, easily receiving the largest amount of complaints from drivers. It is full of potholes, crumbling shoulders and uneven road surface.

Ms McLeish continues, "I drive along the Melba Highway almost daily and it is no surprise that

residents are concerned about this road in particular. It has been an issue for years and is only getting worse with band aid fixes that don't last."

"I continually address the concerns of locals with the minister, who told me I raise more road issues with him than any other Member of Parliament."

Other major roads that the community are concerned about include the Warburton Highway, the Black Spur, the roads in and around Woods Point and the Maroondah Highway from Healesville all the way to Mansfield.

"The State Labor Government needs to stop ignoring regional roads. Repairs need to be made now," Ms McLeish concluded.

Under parliamentary guidelines the minister has 30 days to respond to Ms McLeish's request.



## Bird feeders may be spreading disease among king parrots

A WASTING disease affecting king parrots may be spreading via birdbaths and backyard feeders, University of Sydney veterinary science professor David Phalen has told the ABC.

The disease has been found in Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland. It causes the birds to lose weight, to the point where they are so weak that they can no longer fly.

Investigations are underway as to the cause of the disease, but it may be exacerbated by

spironucleus yeast growing in the bird's stomach, coating the small intestine so that the bird is unable to absorb nutrients.

It's also been found to spread rapidly among birds feeding close together, such as at bird feeders in back yards. The scientists advised that people should spread the food out, and to wash the bird feeder every day to help prevent the spread of the disease. They added that in many places, the feeding of wild birds is neither recommended nor legal.

She estimated that around \$30,000 would have turned over at the market, helping to stimulate the Eildon economy.

Karine, along with the Eildon Lions and Eildon Action, are already planning the next market, and they are hoping to have even more stalls, including an ice cream van. They have five markets planned to run on December 18, January 15, February 19, March 19 and April 16. Karine expects that the December and January markets will be particularly large, and she's hoping that eventually the market will stretch all the way along Riverside Drive.

As well as being very successful, the first market is being viewed as a learning experience. They are trying to keep the products local and handmade, and while they can be from anywhere in Australia, products created in the nearby area are particularly welcomed.

They are also likely to provide a disabled parking area at the next market, and additional entry points to avoid the bottle neck caused by the COVID-19 requirements. Children's games may also be included in the future. Dogs are permitted at the market as long as they are on leads and their owners carry a bag to remove doggy doos.

They are certainly open to feedback from the community about how to make the market even better.

November market The certainly highlighted the community's need to get together again, and many commented on how lovely it was to see people's smiles after so long in masks.

## **Building to rent**

THE Victorian Government is ensuring ensuring most land holders of rezoned more people have the stability of a home and significant value increases from government rezoning decisions are shared with the community, due to reforms which have passed in parliament.

Victorians will have access to more affordable rental housing through the Build to Rent scheme, which will provide incentives for investors to build rental properties.

Build to Rent provides a new approach to residential housing, where properties in a development are designed to be held for rental over the long term.

Eligible developments completed and operational between January 1, 2021 and December 31, 2031 will receive the 50 per cent land tax discount and full exemption from the Absentee Owner Surcharge (AOS) for up to 30 years.

The Windfall Gains Tax also passed through the Legislative Council, meaning significant value increases from rezoning decisions will be shared and Victorians will see greater transparency in the process.

The total value uplift from a rezoning decision will be taxed at 50 per cent for windfalls above \$500,000, with the tax phasing in from \$100,000, land won't be affected.

Residential land which includes a home, including holiday homes and investment properties, will be exempted from the tax. It will not apply to any other increases in value, such as appreciation in property value over time.

The new system will mean developers will pay taxes on properties which have sharp value rises overnight after planning decisions to rezone land. The profits can then be shared with Victorian communities and are used to fund the services and infrastructure these communities need.

Primary production land that contains a home will also be exempted up to two hectares. Rezonings to most rural zones, or to a Public Land Zone, will be exempted.

Exemptions will also be provided for charities if the land continues to be used for charitable purposes for the next fifteen years after a rezoning. The tax will start on July 1, 2023.

The windfall gains tax will be calculated based on valuations undertaken by the Valuer-General on the pre-rezoning and post-rezoning capital-improved values of land.

#### Victoria hits record levels of building permit approvals

BUILDING permit approvals in Victoria during the last financial year were at their highest level in the past decade, new data reveals.

Building permit data collected by the Victorian Building Authority (VBA) shows that approvals totalled 123,330 in 2020/21, an increase of 18 per cent from the previous financial year (104,560) and 13 per cent more than 2018/19 (109,396).

The largest increase in approvals was in regional Victoria, which saw a 32 per cent spike in the number of building permit approvals.

Of all permits issued, those for domestic building increased more than 22 per cent, with about 19,500 more permits issued in 2020/21 than in 2019/20.

The VBA's CEO Sue Eddy said the building and construction sector remained strong throughout the pandemic.

"It has been a challenging time for all Victorians, however the resilience shown by the building and plumbing industries, and its ability to adapt, has meant Victoria has continued to grow," Ms Eddy said.

"With

collaboration cooperation, and safety front of mind, we will hopefully see this trend positive continue through 2021/22 and beyond."

building New work accounted for more than 62 per cent of all building permits in 2020/21, with the number of permits issued for this work 24 per cent greater than a year ago. The number of permits issued for residential, retail, hospital and healthcare, and public buildings each decreased more than 10 per cent.

By region, the Gippsland area had 9560 building permit approvals in 2020/21, compared to 6859 in 2019-20, a 39 per cent year-on-year increase.

The north east, north west and south west regions all saw their building permit approval figures rise by more than 30 per cent in the space of a year.


There was also plenty of building activity in outer Melbourne, with 51,422 building permit approvals in 2020-21, a 17.7 per cent increase compared to 2019/20 (43,680).

As the number of building permits issued increased, so did the cost of building works. In Victoria, total cost of works increased from \$39.1 billion in 2019/20 to \$41.9 billion in 2020/21.

By building use, the cost of works for new building work was valued at \$34.6 billion, an 11.6 per cent increase compared to 2019/20.

Extension (\$1.8 billion) and demolition (\$577 million) cost of works increased 14 and 20 per cent respectively in 2020/21 compared to 2019/20.

The Federal Government's HomeBuilder Grant Scheme further supported the building industry, generating more than 35,000 applications from Victoria, with more than 29,000 of these for new builds.

Several extra special guests walked with us as well, canine friends who give us so much




love and support. The most poignant part of the day for me was meeting Russell Stacpool's dog Timtim (also referred to as Tim Tim the Dim Sim).
