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Quarry conundrum

DURING last Wednesday's August meeting of Murrindindi Shire Council, the issue was raised about a development plan application for a quarry at 1327 Killingworth Road, Molesworth. Residents of Killingworth Road turned out to voice their opposition to the application, and the developer also spoke and answered questions from the councillors.

Greg Conlan represented the Kinglake Road residents' group, which has 66 objections to the application for a proposed quarry at 1327 Killingworth Road, Molesworth. Residents have concerns as to whether an industrial scale operation is appropriate for this location and whether it would affect the road safety of Killingworth Road. The quarry is being presented as being used for on-farm use, but

there are a number of questions about it around dust, noise, heavy vehicle usage, etcetera. Residents also asked council to refuse the application and request an independent review of the impact of the quarry on Molesworth.

Mayor Gallagher said the councillors were not briefed on this issue and it is currently before council's planning officers.

Molesworth residents Charles Spanjer, Therese Bradshaw, Raelene Mold and Jennifer Walden spoke against the quarry application, reinforcing the points made by Mr Conlan and asking council to refuse the application or request much more information, including geological reports, heritage overlays, etcetera.

Nick Anderson audio-linked into the council meeting to answer questions and provide justification for the quarry application. He's been working on it with his team since February 2023. The development plan stage is the initial stage, but it's been a lot of work to reach this point. Should they have their application approved, Mr Anderson's client intends to submit a subdivision application before the end of the year with development of the site to be commenced in 2027 if supported by council.

Mr Anderson outlined what has been undertaken, leading to the development plan. They undertook the necessary vegetation and bush-

fire assessments to determine the lot layout and had a land capability assessment done that led to the relevant water authorities advising it should run on sewer.

"What we've got now is a development plan that we feel probably complies with the requirements of the CFA from a bushfire point of view, DEECA from a vegetation management and protection point of view, VicRoads in terms of no additional access points to the Melba Highway, and the requirements of the water authorities for that low pressure sewer system. It's a relatively straightforward process from this point on if we can get council's support," Mr Anderson said.

He also talked about road access al-

lowing emergency services to attend the site, which was a previous issue.

Mayor Gallagher asked Mr Anderson how he felt about the requirement for an addition of pedestrian access connecting to Meadow Lane. Mr Anderson responded, saying that he wasn't across this issue but he's sure it could be facilitated and incorporated in the subdivision stage.

Mayor Gallagher followed up by asking Mr Anderson how he would feel about screening planting along the boundary with the Melba Highway, and development that's consistent with the adopted residential design guidelines. Mr Anderson agreed with the first point, saying that if council required some screening planting they would be happy to do it.

CFA researchers seeking interview participants re Longwood fire

FOLLOWING the Longwood bushfire in January, researchers from Queensland University of Technology and RMIT University will be conducting interviews with people in Ruffy and Euroa in mid-September on behalf of the CFA.

The interviews will take place between September 12 and 15, will take approximately an hour, and each participant will receive a gift card in recognition of their time and contribution.

Participation in the research project is voluntary, and participants must be 18 years of age or older.

CFA are looking for participants that live, work or were involved in the Longwood fire case study location to share their experiences and challenges.

According to the CFA website, “The Longwood East Fire in Janu-

ary 2026 was one of Victoria’s most significant bushfire events in recent years, occurring during catastrophic fire danger conditions across the state.

“Igniting on January 7 near Longwood, the fast-moving fire spread rapidly through central Victorian communities, including Longwood East, Ruffy and surrounding rural areas, destroying homes, farmland and critical infrastructure.

“More than 140,000 hectares were eventually burned, with hundreds of firefighters and aircraft deployed in response. Tragically,

the fire claimed at least one life and resulted in extensive property and livestock losses, while thousands of residents were forced to evacuate under emergency warnings.

“This event demonstrated how quickly bushfires can escalate under extreme heat, strong winds and dry conditions. It reinforced the importance of acting early on emergency warnings, having a clear evacuation plan, maintaining a fire-ready property, and understanding local fire danger ratings before travelling or working in high-risk areas.

“On behalf of CFA, researchers

from Queensland University of Technology and RMIT University, are seeking participants to share their experiences of and challenges during the significant fire event of earlier this year.”

Social research of this kind is important for fire agencies and organisations involved and the community. This allows areas to learn from these events to improve understanding of the process and impact of information provision as well as community comprehension and use of bushfire information before, during and after a bushfire.

The mystery of the Eildon camera solved

CONCERNS around a traffic monitoring camera in Eildon were recently raised by the community, but the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) says it is a temporary measure to “better understand vehicle and pedestrian movements around school crossings.”

The temporary low-resolution traffic data collection camera was installed near Eildon Primary School at the Centre Avenue and High Street intersection to capture vehicle and pedestrian movements and was active between August 18 and 20. It is now offline.

The information collected will be used by the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) to inform recommendations on future network planning.

These cameras do not capture the identity of pedestrians or vehicles and are only activated to detect movement during peak morning and afternoon periods.

The survey has been commissioned by DTP with the support of the associated school as part of a state-wide safety audit on children’s crossings.

Similar traffic safety surveys are being carried out over 2300 children’s crossing sites across 78 Victorian local government areas (LGAs).

According to a DTP spokesperson, “a traffic monitoring camera was temporarily installed in Eildon to better understand vehicle and pedestrian movements around school crossings.

“The information collected will be used to inform future network planning. The low-resolution camera does not capture the identity of pedestrians or vehicles.”

ALICE ANDERSON FUNDRAISING COMPLETE

MEMBERS of the Alice Anderson Memorial Project have proudly announced that the fundraising for the project is complete, having raised a spectacular \$165,000.

Alice Anderson grew up in Narbethong and was a trailblazing Australian mechanic and entrepreneur who founded Australia’s first all-female motor garage. Despite her life being tragically cut short at just 29 years old, she became a national icon of female independence and

technical skill during the 1920s.

New early learning centre for Alexandra

THE state government is opening two Early Learning Victoria centres in Northern Victoria from 2029, including one in Alexandra, build at the Alexandra Primary School.

Council's fire funding challenges continue

MURRINDINDI Shire Council was asked for further information around the bushfire funding they have received from state and federal governments.

Andrew Paxton, Director of Community and Development at council responded, "Recovery from the January 2026 bushfires will be a long-term effort, and council remains committed to walking alongside our communities as they rebuild.

"Recovery activities are being supported through a range of Victorian and Australian Government disaster recovery programs, alongside investment of council staff time, resources and operational capacity.

"Given that Murrindindi Shire experienced 48 per cent of the total bushfire impact across Victoria in 2026, we look forward to the ongoing support from both the commonwealth and state governments in rebuilding lives, assets, businesses and communities.

"Councillors and staff continue to advocate strongly on behalf of affected communities and work closely with recovery agencies and all levels of government.

"As at June 30, the main funding provided directly to council comprised the \$750,000 Council Support Fund and the \$1.3 million Community Recovery Officers and Recovery Hubs program, a combined total of \$2.05 million. While this support has been invaluable, both programs have specific eligibility requirements, need prior state approval and are directed to particular recovery activities.

"Council is also able to seek reimbursement of eligible disaster expenditure through the Australian Government's Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA), primarily for the restoration of essential public infrastructure such as roads and bridges damaged by the fires.

"These arrangements operate on a reimbursement basis, requiring council to fund works upfront before claims can be assessed and paid, with repairs authorised only to reinstate the prior condition and function of the assets. The funding arrangements do not extend to building back climate resilient infrastructure or assets to a contemporary standard for future generations.

"Under DRFA, council is eligible to claim under Category A and Category B measures. Category A supports immediate relief and recovery activities, including recovery centres, temporary accommodation, debris removal, and personal support services.

Category B supports emergency works and the repair and reconstruction of essential public infrastructure.

"So far, council has incurred more than \$15 million in bushfire-related expenditure. Approximately \$5 million in DRFA claims has been approved, with a further \$8 million under assessment. While council expects to be reimbursed for eligible works, the requirement for council to carry these costs in advance, along with the need to and navigate complex claims and reporting processes, place significant resource, financial and cashflow burden on a small rural council.

"By way of comparison, Mount Alexander Shire Council has publicly reported receiving approximately \$2.3 million in state and federal recovery funding to June 30. As the same date, Murrindindi Shire Council had received \$2.05 million in direct council recovery funding through the Council Support Fund and Community Recovery Officers and Recovery Hubs Program," he said.

In the Harcourt area, 66 homes were destroyed and 36 damaged to the extent that they were no longer habitable in the January 2026 fires. 4500 hectares were destroyed.

In Murrindindi Shire, 217 houses were destroyed and 10 damaged. 58,175 hectares of feed and pasture lots were lost.

This is not intended to minimise the devastation suffered in the Harcourt area, but rather to explore the funding inequities.

"Since June 30, council has welcomed the announcement of a further \$920,000 in recovery funding, bringing total direct council recovery funding to approximately \$2.97 million.

"While this additional funding is appreciated and will assist council's ongoing recovery efforts, it is noteworthy that Murrindindi experienced just under half of Victoria's structural losses from the January 2026 bushfires. As at June 30, council had received around 8.3 per cent of council-directed recovery funding, increasing to approximately 10.6 per cent following the recent funding announcement.

"This highlights the scale of the recovery effort being coordinated by Murrindindi Shire Council and reinforces council's ongoing advocacy for recovery funding arrangements that more closely reflect the level of impact experienced by affected municipalities with equitable and proportionate funding," he said.

COFFEE CONNECTION A CHANCE FOR A CHAT

At last Wednesday's Coffee Connection, Murrindindi Shire Council attended to chat with attendees and gather feedback around the Grant Street precinct, which a plan is currently taking shape for.

Time running out to have your say on Grant Street

HAVE you submitted your feedback regarding the Grant Street precinct in Alexandra?

The Grant Street Safety and Streetscape Improvement Plan is about understanding what is working well, what could be improved and what priorities should guide future investment.

Many suggestions have already been made, with pins and comments scattered across the precinct map.

On Nihil Street, two speed bumps have been suggested to slow vehicles down.

Behind FoodWorks, someone has suggested that the parking area be one-way. In the large vacant area accessible via Bayley Street, people have suggested that it be made into a formalised car park, potentially with shade sails. It's also been requested that trucks be banned from accessing the Grant Street shopping area.

Other ideas include seating improvements, better signage to overflow parking, pedestrian right of way at the roundabout, removal of the red brick paving at the roundabout replacing with concrete finishes, the removal of centre parking on Grant Street, acknowledgement of the Traditional Owners, information about the history of the gold-mining in the area, reducing the speed limit at the shops to 20km per hour, angle parking, adding greenery and planter boxes as well as planter baskets on lamp posts, streetscaping to indicate that it's a shared zone, protective bollards, planting native plants, raised crossings, replacing the slippery red bricks on Bakers Lane, new line marking in the Bakers Lane carpark, contemporary seating, moveable planter boxes, consideration for wheelchair and elderly access, bench seats and tables under the shade trees, fairy lights in the trees, colour and greenery, working with the traders on themed windows, and heritage colours on heritage buildings.

At the intersection of Grant and Downey Street, a well-known dangerous location and the location of a pedestrian death in April, several people suggested traffic lights be installed, while others were keen to see pedestrian crossings and better line marking.

A pedestrian crossing has also been suggested outside the Alexandra Shire Hall, and beautification of the UT Creek Bridge as the entrance to town. It was also suggested that there be a pedestrian and cyclist underpass beneath the UT Creek bridge, an improvement to the Leckie Park entrance from Grant Street, and improved signage for oversized vehicle parking and caravans.

On Webster Street, it was asked that council use the block next to the post office for car parking, as intended. The council-owned land up from the roundabout on Grant Street could also be used for overflow parking.

Feedback from the community will help shape the longer-term vision for the precinct, support Murrindindi Shire Council's advocacy to other levels of government and strengthen future funding applications.

In addition to putting your 'pin' on the map with your ideas, there is an option to provide direct feedback via Q&A and free form boxes, or you can speak with council staff at one of their pop up events.

Local man set to be sentenced

A LOCAL man is set to be sentenced at Mansfield Magistrate's Court on November 24 after pleading guilty to some crimes and being found guilty of others.

One of the crimes was the theft of the UGFM generator from Marysville's Mount Gordon Fire Tower on January 5, two days prior to the Longwood fire starting.

The generator was a back-up generator used to power communications for emergency broadcaster UGFM radio, CFA and DEECA when mains power cannot be utilised.

On the morning of January 9, power was lost to the Marysville

area. The official alert to 'leave immediately' due to the Longwood fire occurred at 5.39pm on the same day.

In chronological order, the charges include that that at Coldstream on November 10, 2024, the man drove a motor vehicle while methylamphetamine was present in his oral fluid. An oral fluid sample was sent for analysis and the drug found to be present. The vehicle was also unregistered.

On February 9, 2025, the man was found to have entered as a trespasser into a facilities shed located on Buxton-Marysville Road in Marysville with intent to steal.

On the same date in Marysville the man stole five Husqvarna chainsaws, two Dewalt circular saws, a Dewalt angle grinder and two Dewalt batteries, a pair of Kinesis hiking boots, a set of keys and various other tools and outdoor equipment, belonging to Marysville Outdoor Education Group. He dishonestly undertook in the retention of goods knowing the goods, a key to the Outdoor Education Group buildings, to be stolen goods.

On February 21, 2025, the man entered the DEECA Depot situated in Marysville, as a trespasser with

intent to steal therein. He stole nine Stihl chainsaws, a Honda portable pump, various Milwaukee power tools and batteries being property belonging to DEECA.

On July 5, 2025, the man trespassed into the Taungurung Land and Water Council depot in Alexandra with intent to steal. The man stole five Stihl chainsaws, a Stihl hedge trimmer, a battery Stihl blower, a Makita tool bag, chainsaw accessories and various other tools and equipment.

Between December 16 and December 30, 2025 the man stole a white Isuzu D Max belonging to the

Yarra Ranges Council, and attempted to commit an indictable offense, namely burglary.

On January 5, 2026, did steal a Khola brand generator being property belonging to UGFM Radio from Mount Gordon. On the same date, he intentionally and without lawful excuse damaged fencing belonging to DEECA.

On February 10, 2026, in Marysville, the man was in possession of a drug of dependence, namely methamphetamines, and possessed a prohibited weapon without an exemption, namely knuckle dusters.



GARDEN GIVEBACK TO RESTORE FIRE-AFFECTED GARDENS

FOLLOWING the horrific Longwood bushfire in January that tore through Murrindindi Shire and surrounds, a Garden Giveback weekend is being organised to be held at the Embassy of Ideas in Alexandra on September 12 and 13.

In the Murrindindi Shire, including Alexandra, impact assessments by Murrindindi Shire Council estimate that 217 houses and 520 sheds/other structures were destroyed, over 7500 livestock (both cattle and sheep) were lost, and 486 beehives destroyed.

As these stories now emerge, the communities are working together to assist with support, both financial and emotional, to those who feel the painful

loss of so much framework that holds people together.

Some have experienced the loss of stock, sheds housing the important machines of their farming existence, gardens once planted with love and pride and sadly homes with priceless memories forever destroyed.

To celebrate recovery, gardens and community spirit, especially towards those who are looking to reestablish their gardens, Bunnings are donating plants and other garden essentials at a Great Garden Giveback weekend.

There will be free garden giveaways, garden workshops, coffee and a sausage sizzle, children's activities and more.

Spring firewood collection now open

VICTORIANS can prepare for next winter by collecting free firewood for personal use from state forest collection areas from now until November 30.

Free firewood for domestic use from state forests comes from fallen trees and forest and fire management works. As a result, the amount that is available will vary.

Maps for this spring season's designated collection areas are available at ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood

Mr Hayse said people could collect up to two cubic metres per person per day with a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year as long as they collected

it from designated firewood collection areas during a firewood season. Most firewood will take longer than 12 months to dry.

It is illegal to collect wood outside designated areas or to chop down or damage any dead or standing trees. It's also an offence to take vehicles off formed roads to collect or load firewood.

Authorised officers will be patrolling state forests and can issue on-the-spot fines of up to \$814 to those caught breaking the firewood collection rules.

More serious offending can result in maximum penalties of \$10,175 and/or 12 months in

prison. Authorised officers can also seize chainsaws, trailers, vehicles, and equipment used in firewood offences.

Suspected illegal firewood collection can be reported to Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Financial support includes the Energy Assistance Program, the Non-Mains Energy Concession and Non-Mains Utility Relief Grant Scheme.

Lookout for the rubbish

MURRINDINDI Shire is well known for its spectacular views, with tourists coming from far and wide to enjoy the serenity. Sadly, many refuse to ‘leave only footprints’ and instead leave their rubbish behind, creating an unsightly mess in a place which all should be able to enjoy.

At one particular location on the western side of the shire, there is a lookout which few people have heard of, however in recent weeks, social media influencers have been posting about the location, leading to a sharp increase in visitation and sadly rubbish. We have chosen not to name the location here to avoid even higher visitation.

Alex Whitford and Peter Wroblewski feel a strong connection to the area and were keen to ensure that the lookout continues looking its best. Alex grew up in Broadford and has lived in and around the area for most of her life. Peter works as an outdoor educator and wilderness guide and is in the area with Alexandra quite frequently.

Alex explained, “It’s a place that I’ve been going to for many, many years, whenever I’ve needed some time to think or to breathe. It’s a beautiful lookout that has beautiful sunrises and wonderful sunsets and complete surrounding views. It’s a very quiet little spot that has recently blown up on social media.”

Peter commented on the increase in visitation and rubbish, saying, “It’s really unfortunate to see such a beautiful location has unfortunately been disrespected. We want nature to be available to everyone and to help people feel connected to those places.

“I think with its growing popularity and lack of broader support and systems in place to help people feel connected to nature and to understand nature, has unfortunately led to people just not really knowing how to look after the place and treat it right.”

They were keen to take action and do something about the situation rather than just complaining about it, so they put a post on the local community page saying that they would be doing a cleanup at the location the following day and asked whether

others would like to help.

They ended up collecting 12 large garbage bags full of rubbish at the site and at another nearby lookout.

Alex added, “We just wanted the spot to be beautiful for everyone to enjoy and we want everyone who visits to share that same sentiment.”

On Monday, August 24, they went to the site, armed with garbage bags, joining some local community members who decided to pitch in and help, including a wildlife carer, a mother and two children, and a CFA member.

The site is a mixture of private property and public land, and sadly people have also been graffitiing trees at the site.

Moving forward, Peter said “In the short term, we’d really love for there to be more education and support for local communities in understanding how to

feel more connected to a place. I guess the motto and philosophy I like to adopt is if you feel more connected to nature and a part of nature, you’re going to respect it a lot more.

“I think some broader education and support for the community, but ideally long term, you know, we’d love to see the council get engaged and even just put in some really simple facilities up there.

“We don’t want that location to be taken away from the community. We want everyone to enjoy it. But ideally, you know, there’s infrastructure and support put in place on a multitude of fronts to ensure it’s looked after, not just putting in reactionary measures... Putting in more education around nature and taking more of a proactive approach is a more sustainable, long-term solution,” he said.

Due to the recent popularity of the area, Alex and Peter contacted three local governing bodies and they have acknowledged how concerning the situation is. Alex has also been put in touch with a local ranger keen to chat about working together with the groups to ensure the area is preserved.

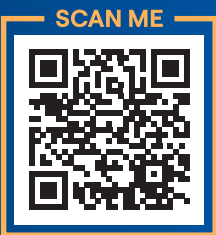
The rubbish issue at this lookout is not an isolated incident. Murrindindi Shire Council has been contacted for their thoughts on the situation with rubbish at lookouts across the shire, however nearby residents may need to run similar working bees at their favourite local lookouts to keep everything looking perfect.

While previously, council has made the decision to remove rubbish bins from these sites to encourage people to take their rubbish home, perhaps more signage is needed.



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Day three of the Longwood fire fight

CFA District 12 Commander Stephen Keating spoke about the Longwood fire at length in a wide-ranging interview, including some of the local concerns. This is the third article in the series.

People in some of the smaller fire-impacted communities have raised concerns about why the fire trucks were located in Alexandra and Yea, particularly on Friday, January 9.

Stephen said, "It's the hardest thing in the world to tell smaller communities our state control priorities. Firstly, we're protecting human life, that we're giving timely and accurate warnings, and the third one is that we're controlling the fire around critical infrastructure and assets. The critical infrastructure and assets are those things that we need after an emergency to rebuild a community.

"Some of those things we can do before the fire gets there. The communications towers we did some work on Thursday before they got impacted to make sure they were okay so they survived.

"How do we protect human life? We tell people don't be there. For how dynamic this fire was and the size of the area that covered, I think we were, and I'll use the word, lucky, that we didn't have more either serious injuries or worse, because of the speed that the fire ran on the Friday and because of how intense that fire was on and how difficult it was on the Thursday.

"We had people trapped at their homes on the Wednesday at the evening from the fire. We had people trapped around their homes on the Thursday and on the Friday. My mind says that the good engagement helped people have properties that were either prepared or had a place that they could go if they couldn't get themselves away from their properties.

"But the hardest decision is to tell the community, sorry, we are focusing our efforts. How I'll explain it is our efforts were focused on where the critical infrastructure was, so the bigger communities, more so where the vulnerable people in the communities were located. We know where people will congregate in emergencies and we have the Neighbourhood Safer Places, the idea that that's where we have to put our efforts to ensure the protection of life because that's the highest.

"The communication's been very clear prior that the safest option is to leave, and people who have very well prepared properties and have okay fire knowledge and equipment still can be at high risk if they stay during a fire."

On the Friday afternoon of the Longwood fire, there seemed to be quite a number of different incident controllers listed in the emergency messaging. Stephen was asked why this might be the case.

Stephen said, "When an emergency message is released, it's released by the incident controller. There would be a point in time where things get busier, that responsibility specific for the messaging might change to one person. So that's their sole job is to do messaging. As it gets bigger, it gets more subdivided, so



that may be what's occurred.

"The other is, at a point in the evening, there is a shift change. The day shift would have changed over to the night shift. How busy the Friday was, I know that occurred a bit earlier than normal to help bring an extra set of resources in there. Rather than the day shift finishing and the night shift starting, the night shift come in a bit early and they both work together for a while. So then that may have been during that period."

He added, "I'm really proud of the community's reactions to the messaging, more so from the Thursday... You couldn't buy a coffee in the main street... The streets were empty and people were leaving.

"I couldn't be prouder of that community in Alexandra and in Yarck and Molesworth and Yea, and even up in the Highlands and Terip Terip space, they took notice, and I've got no doubt in our smaller communities as well... They did what we asked them to do, and that makes our job easier because we're not dealing with the traffic, and we're not dealing with more people in the fire area.

"We certainly had a lot of phone calls, triple zero calls for people who were caught at their own properties, and people stuck at a dam, and things like that we had to try to respond to... Our ability to get into some of those became very difficult and it took sometimes a couple of days to be able to get to people to find out that they're okay. That's something that becomes a non-issue when people evacuate."

For people still considering staying to defend their property in a fire, Stephen said, "The only thing I'd say is what's your life worth? Is it worth risking your life or losing your life trying to defend your property or your farm?... The best thing you can have is well-prepared property. Whether you're there or not is not the most critical factor. It's the fuel that's in and around the home and property. Preparation starts now.

"The first part of preparation is writing a plan down on what it's going to be and how you're going to enact it. We're going to do the Get Fire Ready campaign again this year with

the fire brigades... We've got some kits that will help people do that.

He added, "I'm of the view that on one of those catastrophic days the best thing is just not to be there. You don't want to put yourself and your family at risk."

Asked how are the CFA members coping in the wake of this fire, Stephen said, "We've got a lot of support mechanisms in place for our brigade members, not just those who have been personally impacted, but there's a lot of other people who have had significant experiences over the year, over the fire and subsequently. So certainly there's members out there that had some really traumatic experiences on the day and the days after. We've got welfare teams and some psychological support programs in place for people, and that's ongoing.

The first plan we wrote after Friday was our welfare plan. We sat down and put that together and put it into place as quick as we could. That's probably going to be the longest plan that runs for this fire. It'll go for years. We've connected people with others that have been through a process and come out the other side, because we think that's important as well, that people understand that there is a pathway through this."

Stephen was pleased with the increase in the number of people joining the CFA following the Longwood blaze.

District 12, which covers the Murrindindi and Mitchell Shires, along with the greater northeast area, were found to have the highest conversion of people who have expressed an interest to becoming a member to joining and becoming operational firefighters.

Just in Whanregarwen CFA, six new members joined and began their training. Alexandra, Yea, Molesworth and Yarck have also had new members join.

Stephen said that for some of the new members, it's because of their own personal experience and for others it's because they become aware that their brigade had a need that they weren't aware of previously.

He added, "For anyone who is interested in not just joining the fire

brigade but learning more for their own benefit about fire and helping others, one of the most selfless things you can do is to put your hand up to help others and our organisation.

"I've been a member and I've been a member as a volunteer for over 35 years. It's an amazing community within a community and we have people from all walks of life and all different ages... We're always really keen to build diversity because the best represented fire brigade should be a cross-section of community, whether that's male, female, whether that's old or young, farmers or professional workers, it shouldn't matter. But the best represented brigade, the one that understands its community best, is the one that's got a diverse background of people that are involved."

Of the upcoming year, Stephen said, "This year is going to be a difficult year for us because we're going to have to go back to the communities and talk about fire again. And that's the community south of the Longwood footprint, as well the communities in the Longwood footprint.

A lot of grass is coming back out there and again not everybody's got fences up and not everybody's got stock, so we're going to have a lot of grass fuel again this year.

"The other part of it that concerns me personally this year is we've got a lot of people who are living in alternate arrangements that don't have really good landscaping around them and preparation around them to be a safe place to be should we end up with another grass fire.

"The other concern I've got is the way we approach communities this year because what we don't want to do is upset anybody in the community when we come in to talk about fire. We are working really closely with all our brigades to make sure that we tailor the approach for community engagement, for each of our communities. We've got some communities who are saying, we think we're okay, we'll be right to discuss that in a normal fashion, and other communities that were hit, and it's a pretty tough thing to talk about preparing your farm and your house when it was hit last year."

Replacement of damaged repeater station needed

MEMBER for Eildon Cindy McLeish has called on the Victorian Government to urgently fund the replacement of the Mount Concord repeater station destroyed in January's Longwood fires.

Ms McLeish raised the issue directly with the Minister for Emergency Services recently, warning the loss of the station had left a gaping hole in communications coverage across the northern part of her electorate.

The Mount Concord UHF CB repeater provides coverage for Yarck, Molesworth, Gobur, Cathkin, Kanumbra, Yea and surrounding communities.

"This is critical infrastructure in an area that knows only too well how quickly communications can fail during bushfires, floods, storms and power outages," Ms McLeish said.

"When mobile phones and power go down, you need an alternative, another way to communicate when other systems fail, another way to warn emergency services, get the message to the public.

"The cruel irony is that the 30 year old station had received a major refurbishment through a Victorian Government grant only 12 to 18 months before it was destroyed."

The January fires destroyed the communications hut, antennas, solar panels and batteries, while the tower and supporting guy wires have also been compromised.

Ms McLeish said these communities had endured more than their share of natural disasters and should not be left entering another fire season without the tower.

"Seventy per cent of the Longwood fire footprint was in Murrindindi. There is still an enormous recovery task ahead," she said.

"Replacing Mount Concord is essential to that recovery.

"Residents and emergency volunteers know how important this repeater station is - the Minister should know too.

"I shouldn't have to make the case for it in Parliament.

"We need the funding now, and we need the work done as quickly as possible."



The value of eating seasonal produce

WHEN you walk into an Australian supermarket today, you could be forgiven for thinking the seasons no longer matter.

Strawberries appear in winter, asparagus can be found long after spring has passed, and tomatoes are available almost year-round. Modern food production has given us remarkable choice, but it has also disconnected us from one of the simplest rhythms of eating.

Eating seasonally means choosing fruit and vegetables that are naturally harvested at a particular time of year, preferably from growers relatively close to

where you live. In Australia, that calendar varies considerably between regions. What is in season in tropical Queensland may be completely different from what is being harvested in Victoria.

But wherever you live, eating seasonally has some obvious advantages.

Fruit and vegetables harvested when they are naturally ripe often have a freshness and intensity that can be difficult to replicate when produce has been transported long distances or stored for extended periods. A ripe

summer peach or tomato hardly needs anything added to it.

When a crop is plentiful, increased supply can mean lower prices. Seasonal produce is therefore often among the best bargains in the fruit and vegetable aisle. Buying what is abundant can be a particularly useful strategy for households trying to keep grocery bills under control.

Rather than buying the same vegetables throughout the year, the changing seasons provide a constantly shifting menu.

Summer brings tomatoes, stone fruit, berries, grapes, melons,

zucchini and sweet corn. Autumn brings apples, pears, grapes and pumpkins.

Winter offers an abundance of broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, leeks and sweet potatoes. Then spring arrives with asparagus, peas, broad beans, strawberries and an increasing range of fresh greens.

Out-of-season produce may require long-distance transport, refrigeration or extended storage. Buying locally grown seasonal food can reduce some of those demands, although the environmental impact of food

depends on much more than seasonality alone.

Seasonal food also gives us something modern supermarkets have largely removed, anticipation.

The first cherries of summer mean more when you haven't eaten them for months. The arrival of asparagus announces spring. Winter mandarins become a small pleasure precisely because they belong to winter.

Eating seasonally isn't about giving up choice. It is about discovering what is good now.

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Hospital amalgamation approved

VICTORIAN Minister for Health, Ingrid Stitt MP, has approved the voluntary amalgamation of Alexandra District Health and Eastern Health.

The press release states that the announcement marks “a significant step toward strengthening access to care closer to home for the Alexandra and district community, from November 1. A voluntary amalgamation will create a more sustainable local health service in Alexandra and support more connected care across the rural-metropolitan catchment, building on an established partnership already

benefiting local patients and staff.”

Alexandra District Health Board Chair Kim Flanagan welcomed the Minister’s decision, saying that the announcement on Friday, August 28 “is a positive outcome for the Alexandra and district community. It will strengthen local health services and includes safeguards to protect local identity, leadership and community involvement.”

“We will now work closely with Eastern Health to implement the Minister’s decision and ensure the benefits of the voluntary amalgamation are realised for our community.”

Once implemented, the following service improvements will be delivered, as identified in the business case: Expanded local access to specialist care, with new and increased specialist clinics delivered at Alexandra District Health, including general medicine, geriatrics and paediatrics, reducing the need for patients to travel long distances for routine specialist review; Increased low-complexity surgery services to better utilise existing beds and theatre capacity to safely deliver more care locally; A three-chair dialysis service at Alexandra District Health, operating

as part of Eastern Health’s renal hub-and-satellite model; Improved access to imaging (X-ray) and diagnostic services, addressing current service gaps that limit the ability to deliver and coordinate care locally; Stronger workforce sustainability, supported by expanded training and career pathways across rural and metropolitan settings, including access to Eastern Health training programs, commencement of an allied health graduate program from 2027, extension of learning management and scholarship programs, and opportunities for post-graduate education and specialist

supervision; Clearer, more integrated care pathways, supported by unified clinical governance and, over time, shared patient information systems, making it easier for patients to move between local and metropolitan services when escalation or specialist care is required; More sustainable use of shared systems and support services, including emergency and disaster response, allowing Alexandra District Health to focus resources on frontline care while maintaining a strong local presence.

Every five years, GVW prepares a pricing submission for Victoria's independent water regulator, the Essential Services Commission. The submission outlines the services GVW proposes to deliver, the infrastructure it needs to invest in, and what customers may pay.

Customer values will be at the centre of the development of the pricing submission, which will help inform GVW on balancing service reliability, affordability, water security, growth, climate pressures and the need to renew ageing infrastructure.

A major customer engagement program is now underway, giving people across the region the chance to have their say through GVW's online Water Matters engagement hub or in person at local water café pop-ups.

Goulburn Valley Water General Manager of Customers and Growth Jonno Bellette said hearing from customers early was essential to making sure the pricing submission reflects what communities value most.

"We're planning for the services, infrastructure and investment our region will need, while also considering the cost-of-living pressures affecting many households and businesses," Mr Bellette said.

"Our operating environment has changed significantly over the past five years, and we know we will need to respond to challenges including a changing climate, population growth and an ageing infrastructure network.

"We need to understand how we fund essential services and long-term infrastructure after sustained period of stable prices, and how we make this fair for current and future customers.

"That means making choices about how we balance service levels, affordability and long-term reliability, and we want customers to help inform those choices."

Mr Bellette said reaching as many people as possible through engagement opportunities during the year was key in ensuring all customer voices are heard.

"What we hear now will influence the next stages of our engagement and planning, ensuring it is meaningful, inclusive and reflects the realities of our customers and communities."

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Yea area has highest number of kangaroo collisions in shire

NEW RACV Insurance claims data reveals Victorian motorists experienced a collision with a kangaroo nearly 20 times a day on average last year, with crashes becoming more frequent, costlier and more severe.

RACV members lodged almost 31,000 kangaroo-related collision claims between January 2021 and June 2026, peaking in 2025 with 7232.

The average claim reached almost \$9000 in 2025, up 48 per cent since 2021, while one in six kangaroo collision claims resulted in a write-off in 2025, compared with one in nine in 2021.

Locally, between January 1, 2021 and December 31, 2025, RACV members lodged 127 kangaroo-related collision claims across Alexandra, Eildon, Kinglake, Marysville and Yea, with Yea recording the highest volume.

RACV General Manager Insurance and Roadside Bill Bloodworth said "We tend to see higher claims volumes in the cooler months, when claims from April to August

run more than 20 per cent higher than the rest of the year.

"The risk is greatest at dawn and dusk, so motorists should slow down, stay alert and scan the roadside, particularly where kangaroos are most active."

To avoid a kangaroo collisions, avoid driving at dusk, night and dawn when kangaroos are most active, slow down in areas with wildlife signage or when visibility is poor, watch both sides of the road and the tree line for movement, if a collision is unavoidable brake firmly in a straight line as swerving can cause a worse crash, and use high beams when safe and there's no oncoming traffic to help you spot animals sooner.

Mr Bloodworth said while hitting a kangaroo could be distressing, drivers should prioritise safety.

"Pull over safely, turn on your hazard lights and check on your passengers. If anyone is injured, call 000, and if the animal is injured, contact local wildlife services via Wildlife Victoria on 8400 7300," he said.



Duck, it's a magpie

THE angry birds are back again as swooping season begins.

As Victoria heads into spring, people are being reminded to take simple steps to stay safe around magpies and other swooping birds.

Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) Manager Wildlife Emergencies and Welfare Services, Tony English, said swooping occurs during the breeding season for some native birds.

"Swooping is a natural and temporary behaviour that some native birds use to protect their eggs and chicks during the breeding season," Mr English said.

"Swooping is their way of telling you to keep your distance."

While being swooped can feel unsettling, it is rare for birds to make contact, with incidents occurring in urban and rural areas, including parks, gardens, playgrounds, roadsides and shared walking and cycling paths.

Mr English said some birds within a species are more aggressive than other.

"The presence of magpies or other birds commonly

associated with swooping does not necessarily mean you will be swooped," he said.

"The behaviour is usually short-lived and ends once young birds have left the nest."

Victorians can reduce the risk of being swooped by avoiding known swooping hotspots, moving quickly and calmly through the area rather than running, wearing protective head and eye coverings when needed, avoiding harassing birds which can increase defensive behaviour, and not feeding birds or disturbing nests.

People can help others stay informed by reporting swooping incidents to Victoria's interactive swooping bird map at wildlife.vic.gov.au/managing-wildlife/swooping-birds

All native wildlife is protected under Victorian law. Harassing, harming or disturbing native birds and other wildlife is illegal and penalties apply.

Anyone who witnesses wildlife crime, including the harassment, harm or disturbance of native wildlife, can report it to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.

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Council invests in community ideas, events, sport and heritage

MURRINDINDI Shire Council invested \$182,416 through its 2025-26 Grants and Sponsorships Program to support projects, events and initiatives that strengthen communities across the shire.

During the 2025/2026 financial year council supported 73 projects through the Program's six funding streams, with successful projects reflecting the breadth of locally led ideas and activities taking place throughout Murrindindi.

Funding has supported a diverse range of initiatives, including upgrades and equipment for Alexandra Junior Soccer Club, the Buxton Community Fun Day, the relocation of a historical storage building for Kinglake Historical Society, Yea Rotary Club's Garden Expo 2026 and work to restore Strath Creek's iconic historic water wheel.

Council also backed larger community celebrations, including Triangle Arts Group's Marysville Music Weekend, and sponsored Alexandra Football Club's ANZAC Day 2026 Commemoration Service.

While each project is different, together they help people connect, participate and



contribute to community life, fostering a sense of belonging, resilience and wellbeing.

Mayor Councillor Damien Gallagher said the diverse range of successful projects highlighted the initiative and dedication of local volunteers and organisations.

"Behind every successful application is a local group, volunteer or individual with a vision for their community and the commitment to make it happen," Cr Gallagher said.

"Whether it helps young people get involved in sport, brings neighbours together at a local event or preserves an important part of our history, each project contributes to a stronger and more connected Murrindindi Shire.

"We have seen time and again that strong communities are built by local people. Council is proud to support the volunteers, organisations and individuals who help make our towns vibrant, connected and resilient."

Kealy introduces bill to protect prime agricultural land

SHADOW Minister for Agriculture Emma Kealy has introduced a private members bill, The Planning and Environment Amendment (Agricultural Land and Food Security) Bill 2026, in the Victorian Parliament, aimed at protecting the state's most strategic agricultural land from being permanently lost to poorly considered development.

Nationals Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad said the bill would ensure agriculture is treated as the important asset it is.

"Victoria produces about 28 per cent of Australia's gross value of agricultural production, and Northern Victoria has some of the best agricultural land in Victoria," Ms Broad said.

"Farmers are concerned that the planning system does not take into account what is actually being lost when these developments are approved on prime agricultural land."

The Bill would set up a system to identify Strategic Agricultural Land and require Agricultural Land Impact Assessments for prescribed developments. It would also ensure Agriculture Victoria is consulted before significant decisions are made, as well as requiring agricultural expertise on advisory committees and Environment Effects Act inquiry panels.

The Bill would strengthen rehabilitation requirements through mandatory bonds and ongoing monitoring and create a public register to give Victorians greater transparency about the cumulative impact of development on agricultural land.

The Bill passed its first reading in the Legislative Council on August 11.

Separately, The Nationals have committed to removing the Emergency Services Tax, stop VNI West, review Victoria's Transmission Plan, repeal laws that remove a farmer's right to say 'no entry' on their land, cancel fines issued by VicGrid and tackle farm crime.

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Murrindindi Shire Council’s August meeting

There were no requests for planned leave and no apologies.

Public participation

A number of attendees spoke at the meeting about their opposition to a quarry being developed on Killingworth Road. See the separate article.

Ruth Huffett addressed council’s concerns about the proposed subdivision plan for her property at 30 Malaraway Road, Glenburn, explaining that there is no capacity for her to move the proposed dwelling, and that there will be no impact to the local ecology by clearing the land because there is minimal ecology. She also spoke about a 14-metre firebreak being reinstated on her property for protection. She was asking for a paper-based subdivision simply to reflect what has been the case with her property for the past 30 years or so, given that her property is already divided by council road. There is no physical division required.

Terry King shared a safety concern around the Grant Street and Downey Street intersection. His concern is the bushes on the corner of the intersection that impede the vision of pedestrians and motorists. He proposed removing the bushes. Council responded, stating that intersection is state-managed.

Trevor Johnson spoke about the inconsistency of pothole repairs by council maintenance crews in Kinglake. He said that some potholes were overfilled, some underfilled, and some missed entirely. He also said that the pothole filling washed out of the potholes during the next rainfall after the maintenance. He requested that council reconsider what pothole filling they utilise and conduct some studies.

Grants and sponsorships quarterly allocation

This report presented applications received between May and July 2026, seeking council endorsement of recommended grant allocations and noting grants awarded under delegation.

Quick Response grants awarded under delegation included: \$646 to the Flowerdale Men’s Shed for a wifi upgrade; \$1800 to Eildon Golf

Club for replacement of chairs and furniture; \$1500 to Yea Rotary Club for their Garden Expo 2026; \$650 to the Thornton Eildon District Football and Netball Club for their end of season sponsors function; \$500 for the Kinglake Ranges Rotary Club for a Youth Showcase Night; \$2500 to Alexandra Primary School for the Boite Choir performance opportunity; \$2000 to Alexandra and District Dog Obedience Club for shipping container storage; \$2000 to Yea Arts Inc for the Sarah Belkner Artist in Residence weekend; \$1000 to Alexandra Secondary College for their production ‘I’m Big, You’re Little’; \$1000 to the Buxton Progress Association for a disabled parking space at Buxton Hall; \$2500 to the Marysville Information and Regional Artspace for the Marysville Art Show 2026; and \$500 to the Flowerdale Community House for the 2026 Flowerdale Quilt Show.

The report recommended that council endorse the allocation of funding for project grants recommended by the Grants and Sponsorship Assessment Panel, including: \$5000 to Mange Management Inc to support their efforts to protect Murrindindi’s wombats from the suffering and fatal impact of sarcoptic mange; and \$4000 to the Kinglake Ranges Neighbourhood House for their food share.

The report recommended council endorse the allocation of funding for a \$3500 sponsorship grant to the Triangle Arts Group Inc for their 2027 Music in the Park event.

It also recommended the allocation of \$10,000 to the Rotary Club of Alexandra for their Community Events Program for Alexandra and Murrindindi under a local (multi) event grant.

Council noted the grants made under delegation and approved those recommended.

Planning scheme review 2026

Council is required to undertake a review of their planning scheme for alignment with current state government policy. The review was completed by an independent consultant and presented to council for

consideration. The report found that the local planning scheme is generally performing well and can be further improved by a range of actions over the coming period. Initial implementation by a planning scheme amendment will bring the Murrindindi Planning Scheme up to date.

Council approved the Planning Scheme Review and requested authorization from the Minister for Planning to prepare an amendment to implement the recommendations of the Planning Scheme Review Report 2026.

Planning application – 6489 Melba Highway, Yea

A planning application was presented to council for the site at 6489 Melba Highway, Yea, some 1.5 kilometres south of the Yea township and with an area of 11.84 hectares. The development plan included in the application proposes the construction of a new internal road. The site will provide up to 22 lots. Adjoining landowners and relevant authorities were consulted with no written submissions received.

Council voted to approve the development plan and the application.

Planning application – 30 Malaraway Road, Glenburn

This report presented to council recommends that a refusal to grant a permit be issued for a two-lot subdivision (house lot excision), use and development of land for a dwelling and removal of native vegetation at 30 Malaraway Road, Glenburn. The land is in the Farming Zone and is subject to the Bushfire Management Overlay. The application fails to meet various objectives of the Murrindindi Planning Scheme, which includes limiting house lot excision, is inconsistent with the purpose and decision guidelines of the Farming Zone (stating that lots have to be a minimum of 40 hectares) as well as inconsistent with the Bushfire Management Overlay and the native vegetation objectives within the Planning Policy Framework.

After discussion, council voted to refuse the planning application as per the officers’ recommendations.

Planning scheme amendment C79 – Yea Structure Plan

The Yea Structure Plan was adopted in October 2025, with a resolution to commence the process for a planning scheme amendment to implement some key recommendations in the report. Amendment C79 has been prepared, authorised and exhibited. Five submissions were received, which were resolved through engagement with the submitters and a second minor change to the amendment recommended.

Council voted to adopt Planning Scheme Amendment C79 as exhibited, with two minor changes, and submit the amendment to the Minister for Planning for approval.

Capital works quarter four report

The report provided a summary of the delivery of the Capital Works Program for the 2025-26 financial year and seeks approval for the carry forward of projects to be included in the 2026-27 Capital Works Program. Council adopted a budget of \$17.21 million for the 2025-26 capital works and delivered \$14.43 million in works despite the bushfire disruptions, equating to 84 per cent of the adopted budget. Major projects re-phased into the 2026-27 financial year include: Eildon Key Worker Housing Phase B, worth \$1.95 million; Thornton Recreation Reserve lighting and scoreboard, worth \$635,000; Alexandra Landfill capping works worth \$694,000; and road reconstruction and road safety improvements impacted by the bushfires worth \$903,000. A separate carry forward of \$2.12 million is also proposed.

Council noted the June 30, 2026, Capital Works Report and endorsed the rephasing and carry forward adjustments.

Councillor reports

Cr Carpenter introduced the Healthy Foundations Murrindindi program, which will be progressing soon. Funded by a state government grant, it aims to improve health outcomes for the community, particularly children. She spoke about the exciting opportunities for growing and housing the shire’s

population, both in Alexandra and Yea.

Cr McAulay spoke about the support offered by council to local businesses.

Cr Hildebrand said that Eildon Key Worker Housing Phase One is nearing completion and the Kinglake Memorial Reserve restoration is on schedule, with completion planned for October. He congratulated the Yea senior women footballers on their premiership victory.

Cr Lording said that the current wet weather is delaying road grading, pit and drain cleaning programs are planned, and the line marking program is due for commencement towards the end of the calendar year. The roadside slashing program will be open for quoting soon with commencement in mid to late spring. He suggested community use Snap Send Solve if required for quick response.

Cr Carr said 2026-27 rates notices are on their way to residents, with notices being distributed last week. She said that the Emergency Services Volunteer Fund (ESVF) is included in the rates charge and reminded people that this is a state government charge that council is required to collect on their behalf.

Cr Gallagher spoke about council being recognized as a finalist for the Municipal Association of Victoria’s MAVLabs Innovation Awards for their key worker housing initiative. Council participated in meetings of the Hume Region Local Government Network, working collaboratively with regional councils on shared challenges.

CEO report

Murrindindi Shire Council CEO, Livia Bonazzi, said that council will be holding a number of events for RUOK Day, to provide mental health support. Homes Victoria is progressing temporary accommodation solutions for fire-affected residents. The majority of roadside tree works has been completed. She said that a by-election will be held for the Kinglake Ward councillor position following the resignation of Jodi Adams, with voting occurring on December 5.

everything was covered in a thick blanket of eucalyptus tree litter.

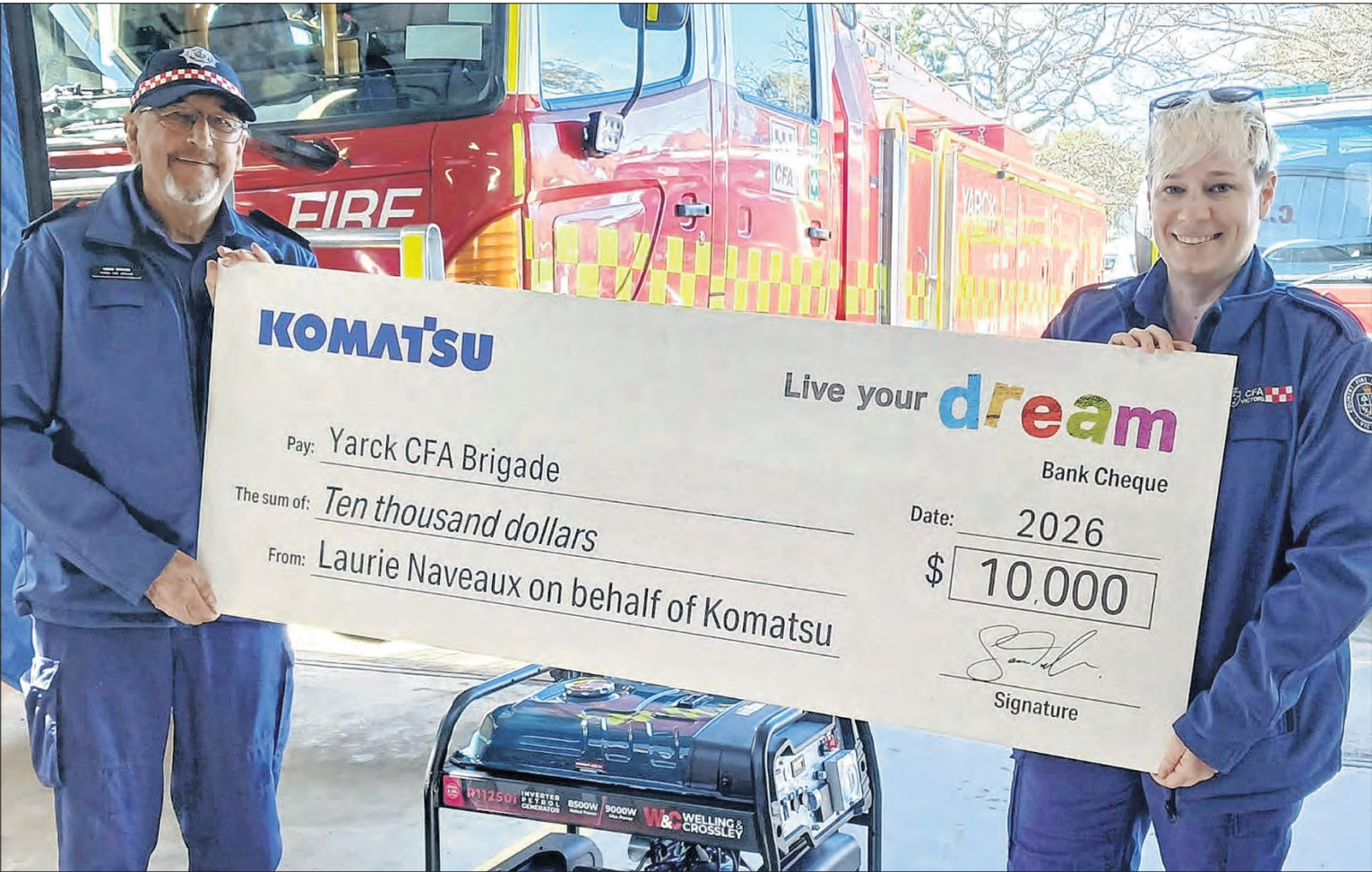

A wonderful donation for Yarck CFA Brigade

YARCK Rural Fire Brigade recently hosted members of the South Morang, Yarrambat and Diamond Creek brigades in an event that recognised a \$10,000 contribution to the brigade by Komatsu, a major excavation and earth moving company in Campbellfield, Victoria.

During the Longwood fire in January, strike teams from across Victoria, New South Wales and other states came to assist local brigades in combatting the fire.

Laurie Naveaux was a South Morang firefighter attached to the Yarrambat tanker and based at the Yarck Fire Station for part of their deployment. She is also the Regional HSE Manager with Komatsu Australia. Originally from Oyonnax, France, Laurie has been involved in fire services for over 20 years, starting as a junior cadet as a teenager. She later became a part-time firefighter in France, continued in New Caledonia, and joined CFA after moving to Australia.

Over those years, Laurie has attended many challenging fires and emergency incidents. While every fire is different, one thing she has seen repeatedly is the impact that resources, equipment and capability can have on the people working on the ground. Her connection with the Yarck Brigade developed during the Longwood bushfire response, where she worked alongside crews operating around Yarck. Like many small rural brigades, Yarck relies on local volunteers who give their time to protect their community and surrounding areas, often during long and demanding bushfire operations.

During that deployment, seeing the Yarck crew continue to support the response while dealing with equipment challenges reinforced something Laurie had seen many times before. Volunteers will always find a way to keep helping, but the right equipment can make a significant difference to how safely and effectively they can do it.

Through Komatsu Australia's Live Your Dream program, Laurie successfully applied for a \$10,000 grant to support the Yarck Fire Brigade. The funding was to be used for equipment identified by the brigade itself, ensuring the investment goes towards something practical that will strengthen its operational capability and support its volunteers.

For Laurie, after more than 20 years in firefighting, this project was a way of giving something back to the people she stands beside on the fireground and to a small rural brigade that plays an important role in protecting its local community.

On Saturday, August 29, a presentation was made to Norm Stokes, Captain of the Yarck Brigade of the \$10,000 cheque by Laurie, on behalf of Komatsu. In attendance were the captains and brigade members of the South Morang and Yarrambat brigades and members of the Diamond Creek

brigade, all of whom had contributed during the fire emergency. The Yarck Brigade and members had welcomed them to Yarck and all enjoyed a morning tea with the presentation.

In accepting the cheque from Laurie, Norm made mention of the fact that this generous contribution from Komatsu makes an immediate difference in the brigade's operational readiness.

"The new generator will be invaluable in keeping our station online, plus the purchase of a Thermal Imaging Camera for Tanker 2 ensures our firefighters have the tools they need to protect our local community.

"Komatsu's support proves that no matter how large a company is, they can still hold a deep commitment to grassroots community safety. We thank Komatsu, Laurie and the neighbouring brigades who stood with us through our hour of need in January and for that, we are truly humbled and thankful," he said.

Sad update regarding missing kayaker

HUMAN remains have been found at Ghin Ghin, six weeks after kayaker Shane Wilson fell into the Goulburn River while fishing.

The remains were found by another kayaker at 11.30am on Sunday, August 30, who contacted emergency services.

It's understood that the missing kayaker had become engaged in tree roots near the bank, and that the water level in the river had recently reduced. The remains are yet to be formally identified.

The death is not being treated as suspicious.
