MEMBER for Eildon Cindy McLeish believes and internationally owned companies while are effectively paying for the services they that the Victorian Government is favouring corporate-owned wind and solar farms, granting international proponents cheaper fire service levy payments, while Victorian famers are being forced to pay the full amount.

Ms McLeish said that the government has given enormous concessions to the proponents of renewable projects, seeing them pay a collective total of \$600,000. Ms McLeish believes that this is an injustice to local farmers, many of whom are CFA volunteers, and who are being charged \$75.7 million in fire service levies this financial year, compared to \$47.5 million last year.

"The Allan Labor Government are clearly looking after the major corporate country highways. Through this levy, they

hanging Victorian farmer's out to dry.

"Farmers are the backbone of the Murrindindi and Mansfield Shires and play a major role in our community and economy yet are being financially slugged."

Wind and solar farm owners will see a 92 per cent reduction to their fire service levies, being classified as public figure rates, the same rates as schools and hospitals. Meanwhile, the farmers that live around those wind turbines, are paying 72 per cent more after this year's state budget.

"Many of our farmers also man the CFA trucks and are first responders to grass fires, bush fires and car accidents on our provide to our community.

"The Allan Labor Government continuously ignore calls from local CFA brigades for urgently needed funding, facility and equipment upgrades, leaving brigades to do so much of their own fund raising. It is a disgrace and again highlights that this government will forget about hard working volunteering Victorians.

'We know out of control wind turbine fires are a real threat. They cannot be easily extinguished and are typically left to burn out. This is a major concern as we lead into what will be a very dry summer. Our farmers and CFA Brigades need more support, more funding and upgraded equipment," Ms McLeish said.

# Council statement on the proposed Seymour Wind Farm

MURRINDINDI Shire Council acknowledges the proposal by Fera Australia to construct a large wind farm called the Seymour Wind Farm in the area between Avenel, Longwood, Ponkeen Creek and Ruffy in Victoria. The proposed project is said to feature 80 to 100 wind turbines that are up to 245 metres tall and require approximately 30km of new 330kV transmission lines, proposed to be overhead, mainly across private and crown land within Murrindindi Shire.

While the Murrindindi Shire community generally recognises the potential benefits of renewable energy projects, council acknowledges the significant concerns raised by residents regarding the Seymour Wind Farm's potential social, economic, and environmental impacts in our 'culturally significant, environmentally sensitive, ecologically diverse and pristine' region.

Council believes it is important to carefully balance the need for renewable energy generation with the protection of local amenity, environment, agriculture, tourism, and social outcomes. We have reached out to Fera Australia to seek a more comprehensive and meaningful community engagement process to ensure community concerns are heard, considered and addressed effectively. Council has suggested that citizen panels could be effective in expressing and tackling community concerns, including consideration by Fera Australia for the undergrounding of transmission infrastructure to protect our significant and celebrated landscapes.

As the Seymour Wind Farm project is still in its preliminary stages, council encourages Fera Australia to step up community engagement efforts and conduct thorough environmental and social impact assessments. If a permit application is made to the Victorian Minister for Planning, who will ultimately assess and determine the project's outcome, council will provide a submission as a referral authority that will clearly reflect the community's views.

# Premier comments on state forests and transmission lines

THE Premier of Victoria, Jacinta Allan, made a series of comments in recent days about governmental decisions and proposals.

Speaking at the Bush Summit, she said, "There are eight million hectares of public land in Victoria - close to a third of our state. And there are pockets we must protect, areas we must conserve. But, to me, the most important thing we can do for our bush is make sure it's enjoyed. That's why today I want to be very clear: as Premier, and a proud country Victorian: I will never put a padlock on our public forests. It's not who I am, and it's not what I believe. I want to make sure our kids and grandkids can get out in the bush and fall in love the same way I did.'

She also made a series of statements at the Rural Press Club of Victoria luncheon in Bendigo on Friday, August 23.

About hospitals, she said about not supporting the amalgamation recommendation in the Health Services Plan, "We know that local people at local hospitals do have a very clear sense of what their communities need. And just as those organisations listen to their communities, government should as well. And as I said, I know how much local health services matter and I'm extremely proud of the work we've done over a sustained period of time to make it even stronger."

As the premier was speaking at the event, protesters were outside the building, particularly concerned about transmission lines on farm lands.

When asked about this, the premier responded, "Rural and regional communities, primary producers and farmers are the most exposed to the challenges of climate change, they are the most exposed to the negative consequences of a change in climate... Part of the answer to that is delivering more renewable energy and delivering more renewable energy means that we provide better energy security."

committed to supporting sustainable development that benefits the local community while minimising negative impacts. We will continue to monitor the progress of the Seymour Wind Farm project and advocate for outcomes that protect the unique character and values of our shire.

The vice president of the Victorian Farmers Federation said, "Farmers are feeling increasingly frustrated. Death by 1000 cuts, whether you look at wild dog, pest transmission, renewables and welfare legislation and... Farmers feel extremely unheard. Are you open to committing to a holistic food and fibre strategy across the whole of Victoria that actually prioritises agriculture and rural regional?"

The premier responded, "We are working on an economic growth strategy at the moment, looking at those sectors of the economy that have served us well."

## Call for candidates for Murrindindi Shire Council election

CANDIDATES ready to stand in the upcoming Murrindindi Shire Council postal election are urged to use the Victorian Electoral Commission's (VEC's) newly refreshed Candidate Helper to get their applications ready for submission when nominations open on Monday, September 9.

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel reminded candidates that there are several important steps they must complete before nominating.

"If you want to represent your local community, make sure to confirm your

eligibility and complete the mandatory online candidate training through Local Government Victoria before lodging your nomination. This rule applies to all candidates, including those who are currently or have previously been a councillor," Mr Bluemmel said.

The VEC's online Candidate Helper at vec.vic.gov.au/council-candidate allows candidates to pre fill their nomination forms before submitting them at their nomination appointment.

Candidates can also watch a series of videos on key topics such as the nomination

# More support for tiny towns

BIG things are coming to Victoria's tiniest towns with new support from the Victorian Government, helping make our smallest communities even better places to live, work and visit.

Premier Jacinta Allan last Friday announced a new round of the government's \$20 million Tiny Towns Fund will be open for applications on Monday, August 26, with grants between \$5000 and \$50,000 to boost tourism, livability and community pride in towns with up to 5000 people.

"Supporting projects that make small communities great is one of the ways we encourage their vibrancy, making them even better places to visit and live," Ms Allan said.

From new barbecues, bike tracks and walking trails to club and community hall upgrades, the grants will support towns to bring to life projects that celebrate community spirit and make a positive difference to locals.

The first round of the government's *Tiny* Towns Fund is already supporting more than 200 projects in 181 towns across regional Victoria and interface councils, backing stronger communities by enhancing local towns. The fund boosts livability and local jobs and creates more reasons for people to visit Victoria's great regional towns.

"Now we're giving more tiny towns a chance to make their own projects a reality, creating local jobs, boosting economies and attracting more visitors to experience our great regional towns," Minister for Regional Development, Gayle Tierney, said.

In Mortlake in the Great South Coast region, the restoration of the Thomas Montgomery Pavilion will support more local events to uplift the town's identity and social scene.

In Glenrowan, the state government is adding to their investment that created the Ned Kelly Discovery Hub, with a \$50,000 grant for an augmented reality experience that will immerse visitors in the stories of the Kelly Gang's final siege in 1880.

Townships that have not yet received a tiny town's grant, or that have worthy project ideas to boost community resilience, recovery and economic growth, are encouraged to apply in this second round, with updates made to the application process to make it even easier for smaller, volunteerrun community groups to apply.

The fund is a part of the state government's record \$45 billion investment since 2014 in projects and programs that support regional and rural Victoria.






"It's a good way to learn new skills and just have that core group of friends that you know you can call on if you need to.

# **Confusion surrounding green drought**

ACCORDING to the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF), farmers and regional communities are confused about whether they are eligible for drought assistance or where they can turn to for support as Victoria's green drought lingers and farmers approach the critical spring growing season.

VFF Vice President Danyel Cucinotta said the confusion was adding to the burden faced by many farmers and is the driving force behind the VFF's proposed Victorian Drought Resilience Program.

"Farmers are telling us they are either unaware, confused or do not know that drought assistance is currently available or where they can access it. For those who do find assistance, it's not uncommon for them to encounter roadblocks when it comes to asset means testing, which is a huge problem.

Farmer worries on the rise

THE National Farmer Priority survey results have been released and the National Farmers Federation have said a growing number of farmers love what they do in their communities however, industry sentiment is deteriorating with half of farmers less positive about the future of family run farms.

One thousand and twenty-six farmers across Australia had their say on the survey and it showed farmers are worried about a wide range of policy pressures, with biosecurity, the market power of supermarkets, and federal environment laws topping the list.

Farmers are worried about farmer sentiment towards the Federal Government's policy agenda has continued to slide by up to 39 per cent in the second National Farmer Priorities Survey by the National Farmers' Federation in partnership with Seftons.

The survey found heightened levels of concern across a range of issues compared to last year, up by an average of eight per cent across all metrics.

Biosecurity topped the list of concerns with 94 per cent of farmers voicing concerns. The market power of supermarkets and processors fell to a close second place at 93.9 per cent. Federal environment laws ranked third at 92.5 per cent, both up more than 10 per cent on 2023.

The largest swings in concern levels, compared with 2023, were seen towards

biosecurity (up 12.7 per cent) and live sheep exports (up 12.2 per cent).

There has been a steep decline in farmers' confidence in the Federal Government, with ratings across four sentiment measures deteriorating by an average of 32 per cent in the past 12 months. This includes one in 10 believing the government has a positive plan for the farming sector, a drop of nearly 38 per cent from 2023.

However, in good news the survey found 89 per cent agree with the statement "I love what I do" and 78 per cent say their community is a "great place to live," with those measures rising by 18 per cent and 10 per cent respectively.

NFF President, David Jochinke said, "The results are unsurprising. Critical issues like the live sheep export ban, biosecurity tax and water buybacks have weighed heavily on farmers.

"Particularly telling are the results around the live sheep exports. Despite only 10 per cent of respondents hailing from WA, it rated as one of the highest areas of concern.

"This clearly demonstrates when bad policy infiltrates one sector, it puts every other sector on notice that they could be next.

Mr Jochinke added, "With meaningful engagement from the government together we can build a more positive outlook for Australian agriculture and reach our shared goal to be a \$100 billion industry by 2030."

"There's an urgent need for the Victorian Government to better communicate the current assistance available to farmers and explain that a formal drought declaration is not needed to access it.

"We need a centralised resource that clearly outlines the financial and mental health assistance available, and the dedicated organisations tasked with helping Victorian farmers," Ms Cucinotta said.

Ms Cucinotta said the VFF is currently engaged with the Victorian Government to progress the proposed Victorian Drought Resilience Program and streamline information for farmers and communities doing it tough.

"We see a real need for a one stop shop for drought information, resources and assistance available for all farmers and

"There's an urgent need for the Victorian regional communities that is available on a overnment to better communicate the permanent basis.

"Farmers are doing it tough right now. We can get this up and running quickly to serve those immediate needs and use it as a permanent resource and hub for the future. We just need the government to get on board.

"Of course, there remains a number of roadblocks in place when it comes to certain types of assistance and this resource would help inform the VFF's advocacy in future.

"This hub would help plug the hole in drought information and be a resource where farmers can provide feedback on the issues they are facing. Roadblocks such as low asset ceilings preventing farmers from accessing assistance is some of the key feedback we're hearing and initiatives such as this hub would be invaluable in helping us fix the problems out there," Ms Cucinotta said.



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# **Alex Scott and Staff heading to Yea**

ALEX Scott and Staff will be holding their first sale in Yea on Friday, September 13. David Setches, their Livestock Manager, spoke about what lead Alex Scott and Staff to taking their cattle to the Yea Saleyards.

"Due to the closure of the Victorian Livestock Exchange (VLE) in Pakenham, we have a clientele base in the Yarra Valley, and northeast and west of Melbourne. Those points there have indicated to us that, from the logistical side, it's a long way to get them down to Koonwarra freight wise, and we've been trying to get into Yea with Elders and Nutrien.

"The time has come now that we've decided to pull the trigger and have a go ourselves, and have our first sale on Friday, September 13," David said.

"We have invited the other private agents who want to come onboard. On our sales basis, the more the merrier of private agents who want to come, because it will strengthen the sale.

David elaborated on the challenges faced in selling at Yea.

"Elders and Nutrien said they were happy to sell our cattle off-site, and they couldn't really

accommodate them numbers wise if we were to join in their sale, but they were happy to sell them on consignment, which doesn't really make sense.

"Why would we give half the commission away to another agent when we can sell them ourselves?" David said.

"With Pakenham's closure, the Yea Saleyards are one which could potentially increase by 20, 30, 40,000 cattle per year. The facility really at 3000 cattle is about maximum capacity, so I can't see any other option but Elders and Nutrien will have to have a bi-monthly sale.


"If you have 30,000 cattle per year, and 12 sales per year, they can't fit them all in. Three thousand, when they sort of capped the saleyards, they wouldn't let us in on their sales, so we just picked a date opposite to them and we thought we'll go then."

David concluded by sharing the companies excitement to be back selling cattle in Yea.

"Alex Scott and Staff, in 2012, or eight years ago back when I started, we did initially sell in Yea. We were selling in Yea back in the day.

"We're really excited to get back into the Yea district area and be an alternative option for anyone who may want to sell cattle up there and certainly look after our existing clientele that the company has on that side of the ranges," David said.

# **Riddellvue spring sale offering at standout despite dry times**

RIDDELLVUE Angus has faced poor seasons and falling cattle markets since moving to Markwood last year, but it hasn't hindered the continued improvement of its herd.

Principal Ian Bates said despite having to feed cattle through the winter, the spring sale bulls are looking as good as ever at Riddellvue.

"Old timers in this area are saying the season is one of the worst they've seen, so it has been a battle, but the bulls are going along really well," he said.

"This will be our fourth sale at Markwood, and since the move the climate in the beef industry has been very tough.

"And while opening new doors is harder in tough conditions, the locals have been really receptive to us in the area and past clients have followed us along, so it has been a good balance."

Ian will catalogue 36 angus bulls aged 18 months for the spring sale, to be held onproperty and via AuctionsPlus on Thursday, September 12.

The offering will include sons of the \$64,000 Reiland Ricochet R952, a bull which has a TransTasman Angus Cattle Evaluation estimated breeding value in the top five per cent of the breed for calving ease and top 10 per cent for docility and intramuscular fat.

"When I saw the Ricochet bull I wasn't necessarily looking to buy a new bull but we went up to the Reiland sale at Gundagai and we liked everything about the bull. It had a great set of numbers, and he has proved the weather, moving into the spring.

ground that he is stronger than his 600-day numbers show, so to me it is a very special bull," Ian said.

"We will end up retaining 50 to 60 females, and he has been used heavily in the Reiland herd and other prominent studs. We have now sold him on to Merlewood Angus for stud duties.'

It will be the first time Riddellvue will offer Reiland Ricochet progeny under the hammer, and Ian is excited for clients old and new to see the bulls.

"They have great temperament; confirmation and their feet are fantastic. I am really looking forward to them coming through the sale." he said.

As usual, Riddellvue will also offer 20 registered females at the spring sale, and there is a chance of Ricochet progeny to be included in that lineup as well.

One of the other prominent sire lines in this year's spring sale will be by Blackjack Genesis Q04, a son of Pathfinder Genesis with growth figures in the top 10 per cent.

"I've never seen such good feet as the Genesis bulls in this sale, and there is a bigger group of them," Ian said.

"It is just a great lineup of bulls across the catalogue, consistent right through and presenting really well."

With early bull sales in the north of the country looking promising, Ian is hopeful there will be a change of sentiment, and

"We've had 50ml this month, which has made a little bit of movement, and the days are getting longer so we are heading in the right direction, with a lot of crops looking good in the district," he said.

'The spring sales in the north are going well and Victoria is normally the cheapest place to buy bulls, which isn't a reflection of the bulls, it is just that there are a lot of good bulls in Victoria that people overlook.

Last year's spring sale at Riddellvue sold 21 bulls to a top of \$12,500 and average of \$6675, while in the autumn of this year a Genesis son made the top price of \$10,000 and the 21 bulls cleared averaged \$6450.

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

# Job pathways for local government workers

THE Victorian Government is supporting more Victorians to get the training and skills they need to work in local government.

Minister for Local Government Melissa Horne announced a \$6.3 million pilot program to address workforce shortages in councils across Victoria, creating pathways to secure jobs with good pay and conditions.

The two year pilot will be delivered by a consortium of higher education providers led by RMIT University, filling skills shortages in areas like engineering, town planning and allied health.

Local government Earn and Learn program participants will commence training in 2025, creating more job pathways for local government workers wishing to retrain and new opportunities for jobseekers.

By connecting education providers with councils, the free program will help Victorians get the skills they need to work in local government and deliver important services and infrastructure across the state.

RMIT, Federation University, Swinburne University of Technology and Victoria University will collaborate with the local government sector to identify skills shortages and co-design training to directly address workforce need.

All 79 local councils in Victoria will be invited to participate in the program, addressing skills shortages across the state so that councils can deliver key services and projects.

It's understood that Murrindindi Shire Council has expressed their interest in being involved with the program, pending further investigation.



# Illegally dumped tyres

ALMOST 3000 illegally dumped rubber tyres were cleared from Kinglake National Park last month.

Parks Victoria employed a team of contractors to complete the task. The multiple piles of illegally dumped household waste were found by local rangers since the operation, highlighting a concerning rise in rubbish dumping throughout the park.

Just one example of the illegal activity across Victoria, between January to August this year, Parks Victoria recorded more than 375 instances of rubbish dumping on public land, with last year's period recorded at 304.

Parks Victoria informed that the highly involved process of removing rubbish costs Parks Victoria more than \$1 million each year, diverting time and resources away from local rangers.

It also impacts the maintenance of facilities and implementation of conservation programs that protect plants, animals, historical and cultural sites.

While Parks Victoria hires techniques to identify rubbish dumpers, park visitors and neighbours are also an important source of information and deterrence.

Anyone witnessing rubbish dumping or littering in a park is encouraged to call Parks Victoria on 13 1963, the EPA Litter Line on 1300 372 842, or the EPA 'Report Litter' app.

Penalties for people caught littering or dumping rubbish can include fines and prosecution, resulting in convictions and even possible imprisonment.

# The challenges of car insurance in regional Victoria

IT is a well-known fact that life in regional Victoria has its challenges. Whether this is longer commutes to the shops or work, or the unavailability of certain products and services, regional life is significantly different to suburban lifestyles.

Other such challenges faced include wildlife on the road, the ability to get cars repaired following any incidents, and making claims with insurance companies.

According to the Australian Financial Complaints Authority (AFCA), "There was a 21 per cent surge in complaints about comprehensive motor vehicle insurance, meaning it overtook home building cover as the most complained about insurance product in 2023-2024.

"Claim delays accounted for a third of these vehicle complaints, and delay in claim handling remained the top issue in general insurance overall."

This comes alongside the data from the Insurance Council of Australia website that states the average comprehensive motor vehicle premium has been steadily increasing year on year, except for a 1.8 per cent dip in 2015. What began at 99.83 per cent in quarter one of 2004 is now 198.48 per cent in the first quarter of 2024.

The comprehensive motor vehicle cost per policy has also increased over the years, from 96.54 per cent in quarter one of 2004, to 120.70 per cent in quarter one in 2014, to 216.89 per cent in quarter one of this year. There has been a steady rise in cost per policy since 2022 as well, with a 37 per cent increase over the last two and a quarter years.

Reaching out to various car insurance providers uncovered a few interesting details about car insurance in the regions.

Sophie Ryan, iSelect's comparison expert, was asked does damaging your car on a pothole or as a result of hitting wild animals increase your premium?

She responded, "Certain types of car insurance policies may cover the costs of repairing damage caused to your car if you accidentally hit a pothole or a wild or native animal on the road that was unforeseen or unexpected," Ms Ryan said.

"However, there can be exclusions and pay-out limits depending on the policy. This is one of the reasons why it's important to read the Product Disclosure Statement before deciding on any policy.

"When an insurer calculates your premium, they consider various factors. This can include any previous claims you've made and your incident history. It will, however, depend on your provider because each typically has its own way of assessing risk.

"Some of the reasons for an increase in car insurance premiums include higher rates of

reinsurance, natural disasters and claim costs, as well as inflation in the motor repair sector," Ms Ryan said.

A spokesperson for Allianz Australia discussed the details of car insurance for the regions compared to Melbourne.

"Allianz's average premiums in regional Victoria are materially lower than for Melbourne. This figure though is commercially confidential," the spokesperson said.

They also spoke to premium increases due to unforeseen circumstances, such as hitting a pothole or wild animal, and issues around getting your car repaired in regional Victoria.

"A claim where there is not another at fault driver from which the repair cost can be recovered may or may not impact the premium depending on the policy. For example, if the claim reduces a customer's 'no claim bonus' (NCB), there could be a premium increase when the policy is renewed. Alternatively, if the policy has Protected NCB, a single claim would not impact the premium.

"Allianz does not maintain a network of 'authorised' repairers. Our policies offer choice of repairer so policyholders can get their car repaired wherever they prefer (subject to the terms and conditions of the policy). Repair times can vary considerably in regional areas depending on the location, repairer's workload, availability of parts and other factors," the Allianz spokesperson said.

Furthermore, a spokesperson for Royal Automobile Club Victoria (RACV), suggested similar uncertainty around car repair in the regions.

"The average wait time for a motor repair varies based on the extent of the damage to the vehicle, and the availability of parts. Our claims and repair team will update the customer on the progress of the claim during the repairs.

"We have partner repairers across regional Victoria in places including Wallan and Seymour and can authorise repairs through non-partner repairers in areas including Mansfield," the RACV spokesperson said.

What the extent of this research reveals is that there is very little data available around the difference between regional and suburban car insurance. Individual policies will be affected by location and variable factors, but overall, there is not a lot of focus on how car insurance claims, repairs and costs differ in the regions.

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

# Haines said If we can't connect then we fall behind

IN a recent parliament sitting Helen Haines MP spoke about the state of regional telecommunications infrastructure.

She said, "Every three years, the government undertakes a regional telecommunications infrastructure review to examine the state of phone and internet connectivity in regional Australia. It looks at what's working well, where the gaps are and what needs to be done better. Poor phone and internet connections are one of the top issues I hear about from my constituents. That's why, in May this year, I helped bring together representatives of the nine local governments in Indi and the government's Regional Telecommunications Independent Review Committee. A public consultation at the Benalla Town Hall was also very well attended, with the unambiguous takeaway that the federal government needs to do better, because what I hear time and time again is that telecommunications aren't up to scratch in regional, rural and remote Australia. More than ever, we work online, we study online, we access health services online and we keep in touch with our friends and family online, but we can't do any of these things if we can't connect. If we can't connect then we fall behind.

"As the regional Independent MP, I made a broad-ranging submission to the review, recording the experiences of people in Indi and making nine recommendations that would help close the digital divide between the cities and the regions. In order for the government to deliver on its commitment to better regional connectivity, it must accept and implement these simple but impactful solutions.

# Getting the most out of your food budget

WITH the recent cost of living increases, many people are choosing between heating or eating. When it comes to putting food on the table it's a daunting task if you're on a tight budget.

Whether you're providing meals for just one person or a family, there are some ways to help your food budget go further.

Meal planning and weekly meal preparation is a great way to help your budget. You can cook bulk meals, giving you leftovers which are great for lunch and those nights where you can't be bothered to cook, helping you to avoid the more expensive and convenient options. Through meal planning, you can incorporate what you have in your cupboards and fridge and then you're using what you have.

Having a shopping list helps you stick to buying only what you need. You can get apps for you phone or devices where you can share the shopping list with your family and it can be added to by anyone who has access to it.

Whether you shop locally or travel to do your food shopping, looking around for the best deal is the way to go. Looking at different food shops and butchers can really make a difference on where to get the best prices.

If things are on sale, stock up and freeze or put away. Usually meat, vegetables and dairy can have quick sale stickers on them as their use by or best before date is close. Check if these are on your meal plan or adjust accordingly so you can get a cheaper deal. Cooking from scratch is a great way to make meals in bulk and is usually a healthier option. You can bulk up meals like lasagna or spaghetti sauces with cheaper vegetables and pulses such as lentils and chickpeas, zucchini, carrot and onions. This will also help you get an extra couple of meals to enjoy for another day.

"Floods, fires or storms, extreme weather events are a common occurrence across north east Victoria, and too often our telecommunications networks are failing when extreme weather or emergency knocks out our power supplies. This is putting lives at risk. In the south of my electorate, Murrindindi Shire has highlighted the effects recent flood related power and telecommunication outages have had on local hospitals, emergency services and businesses. Further north, the people of Kariong still remember the weeks of isolation following the Black Summer bushfires. Outages like these threaten lives and undermine emergency services coordination, and the broader economic costs are significant.

"We must increase resilience now before the next fire or flood arrives, not after. We need to increase funding for programs that fund community energy nodes and power backup for mobile phone towers in extreme weather events. The town of Jamieson recently installed a community energy node at the memorial hall, with the support of Commonwealth grants, to provide residents with shelter and communication for several days in times of emergencies. In my submission, I recommend that the government expand programs that will fund similar projects right across regional Australia. Jamieson is a fine case study.

"Affordability is another major issue. I do not accept that a regional internet tax is the price that we must pay for living outside the major cities. The regional internet tax comes in many forms. It's families paying for expensive satellite internet because the NBN won't ever make it to them. It's businesses that miss out on sales because EFTPOS machines drop out of connection. It's farmers forced to buy expensive signal boosters just so they can run the farm using modern technology. This unfair burden falls onto regional Australians just because of where they live. It's not right, and I'm disappointed that affordability is not a focus of this government's review.

"It's also why I've recommended an expansion of the successful On Farm Connectivity Program, which supports primary producers to invest in new and necessary on-farm technology. Working with my Indi Telecommunications Advisory Group, I've long fought for more funding to fix the black spots that exist right across north east Victoria, and I'm proud to say that, under Independent representation, Indi has received more funding under the Mobile Black Spot Program than any other Victorian electorate.

"But I want that for everyone in regional Australia. We're making progress, but there's always more to do. Unbelievably, this program has no funding guaranteed beyond 2027. I'm recommending that the government make the sensible decision to provide ongoing, guaranteed funding for the successful Mobile Black Spot Program. The program relies on effective cooperation between government, telcos and local communities. Secure longterm funding would mean we could fix more blackspots sooner.

"With the final report due before the end of this year, I'll be watching closely to see what this government's plan is for closing the digital divide and ending the regional internet tax, because regional communities have had enough of second-rate services. It stops local communities and businesses from achieving their full potential, it threatens our safety, and it is a handbrake on regional development," Ms Haines said.
