Front-line healthcare workers in Shepparton and public aged care residents located at GV Health Aged Care facilities at the Shepparton, Tatura and Rushworth campuses will be the first to receive the vaccine.

Exact timing for administration of the COVID-19 vaccine across the GV Health vaccine hub catchment area, which includes Yea, is expected to be from Monday, March 22 onwards but is dependent on vaccine availability and allocation to the local region by the Commonwealth Government.

"We are excited that the vaccines will soon arrive at the GV Health vaccine hub and not too long after will be available to us in the Yea region," Louise Sharkey, Director of Clinical Services at Yea & District Memorial Hospital said.


"Our front-line healthcare workers and public sector aged care staff and residents will be vaccinated first as part of the Commonwealth's phase 1a rollout. We are working closely with GV Health to co-ordinate timings and logistics for the vaccine launch for our region."

The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine was the first COVID-19 vaccine to receive regulatory approval in Australia, undergoing a complete assessment and approval process and meeting high safety, efficacy and quality standards. Two doses of the vaccine will be provided at least three weeks apart.

More specific details about the first vaccinations being provided to front-line health workers and public aged care residents in the GV Health vaccine hub and for the Yea region will be advised soon.





Logging

LAST week, council passed a motion to protect nine coupes within the Snobs Creek Valley. It was a unanimous decision. If you listened in to the carefully considered decisions of each councillor, you came to understand that there were a multitude of issues surrounding the continued logging of this area. The value of biodiversity and ecotourism as well as climate change overrided the small economic profit and job loss of the industry.

As a local resident of Yea, this forest is my local and following the 2019/20 summer bushfires I have found it to be a refuge and place of hope. This forest was untouched by the country-wide inferno, but has been quickly being snapped up by VicForests. Each time I visit, my heart breaks. Witnessing more and more disappearing before my eyes. Knowing the full extent of this loss having studied environmental science and working for Melbourne Water for many years post university. Now, in the dead of night, I find the animals rejoicing in the darkness. We cannot continue to allow our forests to fall and this motion has set a precedence. It is a monumental moment where a council, a group of influencers representing their community has stood up and called upon the government to listen, and listen they must.

Maybe, like these councillors, seeing is finally believing. There are no words or graphs drawn up by VicForests that can rationalise through skewed, inadequate and unjustified 'science' to justify how barbarbaric it is to plunder the last remaining, unburnt, intact, ecologically vital native forests of this country. It is time to transition the industry and save Snobs Creek Valley.

Tourism and events

THE Victorian tourism and events sectors are among the hardest hit by the COVID-19 pandemic. Many events on small and large scales have been cancelled across the state, often at the last minute. Event organisers have spent too long juggling the everchanging restrictions or waiting anxiously for the Victorian Government to individually approve each and every COVID-19 safe event permit. Rightly so, people are nervous to travel and attend events due to Daniel Andrews' snap lockdowns and unpredictable decision making.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, tourism contributed to 6.5 per cent of the Victorian economy and provided thousands of jobs. Now, due to the Andrews Labor Government's bungled handling of COVID-19, our visitor economy has haemorrhaged up to \$2.5 billion per month and is projected to shed 85,300 jobs by September 2021. Victoria's tourism and events industries are on their knees.

That is why Shadow Minister for Arts, David Davis and I successfully pushed for the Victorian Parliament to conduct an inquiry into both sectors. The inquiry will recommend exactly what support is necessary to get events and tourism back up and running

Politicans LET'S talk about values. Politicians like to. Especially when discussing migrants and refugees. THE Labor Government is seeking the responses from Victorians regarding the proposed change of regulations for allowed recreational use of Crown Land near watercourses, both licensed and unlicensed.

The proposed changes will allow Victorians to camp on regulated land, with some minor restrictions to ensure the safety and comfort of themselves and nearby residents.

Further amendments will see a focus on protecting the environment, protecting the interest of licenses and managing the risk of

In 2018, the government committed to guarantee access to fishing and camping on Crown Land that has grazing licences and water frontage.

For these commitments to be applied, Parliament passed amendments to the Land Act 1958 that removed the ban of camping on licensed river frontages. The Victorian Government will in turn create the set of regulations that support the changes made by Parliament.

Minister for Fishing and Boating, Melissa Horne said the Victorian Government recognises the enjoyment its residents have in the outdoors and is committed to ensure they get the most out of their recreational experiences.

"The public has a right to enjoy public land. With these changes, campers will be welcome to use Crown Land with water frontage free and in harmony with licensees and the environment, the same way that currently occurs in State Forests," Horne said.

"The land is already available to use for a range of recreational activities including fishing, but the addition of camping will mean more opportunities for families to

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Off-Grid Living Festival gets COVID-19 tick of approval

one month out of the event date due to COVID-19, the Off-Grid Living festival has become one of the first events to be approved to go ahead in 2021.

"Our event always allowed for 5000 visitors per day to control things like parking. With the one person per two square metre restriction, we are allowed a maximum of this many visitors per day also so that hasn't changed."

Kate is also expecting a new demographic of people heading to the festival this year.

> "It's going to be a big year for the festival. People have been busting to go out, and this festival will be one of the first opportunities to allow people to do so."



Financial support to help women rebuild after family violence

A NEW financial support program for women experiencing family violence will help victim survivors to be safe at home, leave abusive situations and rebuild their lives.

The Domestic and Family Violence No Interest Loans (FDV NILs) program offers women a financial conversation which includes information about government supports, hardship provisions from utility companies and others, referrals to a range of other support services as well as access to \$2000 loans without interest or fees.

Shepherd Good CEO, Stella Avramopoulos, said the FDV NILs program would help women rebuild their lives, with the loans available to be used for rent and bond, furniture and whitegoods, removal and transport costs, car repairs, legal and security costs and other household expenses.

"Women need access information and support and a small loan can be life changing. Women tell us that finances are very often the key reason they cannot leave abusive, violent households, Ms Avramopoulos said.

"Women can't leave because they can't afford that first month's rent or the bond, they can't afford removal or transport costs or they can't afford to set up a new house. Think about a mother with children facing all the costs of setting up a new home to escape violence," she said.

Workers will be specially trained to be able to sensitively address any challenges the women may face in the situation. For example, they might not have access to bills and other records, so there will be flexibility in what can be provided to help these families.

Personal Banking Executive Rachel Slade welcomed the new support program for women experiencing domestic violence.

'We are proud to support this program by helping to deliver No Interest Loans to assist domestic and family violence survivors in regaining their financial independence," Ms Slade said.

"Our teams hear first-hand from customers who are experiencing family violence and the loss of financial control that can come from this. It's important that we support those members of our community experiencing vulnerability with financial resources, education and microfinance."

The long-running No Interest Loans program has supported more than 300,000 low income people to get their lives back on track

Anyone applying for a NILs loan is firstly offered a financial conversation, which may include information about negotiating with service providers, banks or landlords to have debts waived or paused, supporting people to access government support and referrals to other services such as family and domestic violence, legal, mental health and financial counselling.

To be eligible for FDV NILs, women must have experienced family and domestic violence in the past 10 years, be aged over 18, an Australia citizen/permanent resident or visa holder and able to pay back a loan if a NILS loan is issued.

TAMARA Ruffin shares her passion for family day care and what it would mean to her if she is the eventual winner of the Excellence in Family Day Care award after being shortlisted as the Victoria/ Tasmanian national finalised.

What is your history in childcare? How long have you been in the industry and how did you first get into it child care?

I started my career in child care 18 years ago. During this time, I've had the opportunity to work around Australia, predominantly in long day care but also as a nanny. After having two children, my decision to become a family day carer was easy. After working in the industry for nearly 15 years, I decided to open my own child care service - Bee You Family Day Care Kilmore.

I started my family day care journey with another service and during my time, received fantastic training and support. However, like all good things, my time with that service came to an end. I wanted to grow and develop my skills so that I could help both myself and others.

I was thrilled that Murrindindi Family Day Care (MFDC) was able to take me on as a new educator. At the time, there were so many new educators coming on board and I nearly missed out on the opportunity. MFDC offers a huge support network and provides a wealth of knowledge that has helped me to become the educator that I am today and enabled me to support many children and their families. Joining MFDC is the best decision I have made.

How and why were you nominated for the award? What do you love about Murrindindi Family Day Care?

This is the third time I've been nominated by my family for the Excellence in Family Day Care Awards. I was lucky enough to win the Educator Regional Award in 2019 and 2020 for the Shepparton and the Goulburn Valley region, but this is the first time that I have been the VIC/TAS National Finalist. Being named a finalist is a tremendous honour, considering over 5600 family day care educators were nominated this year; the highest number of educators ever nominated.

What would it mean to you if you are the eventual winner?

This past year has been challenging for all Victorians. For me, this Award 'hope'. Hope that the represents

'Good habits are formed early. Children take lessons they learn at a young age with them, right up to adulthood," she said.

"By promoting good oral health behaviours early in life, we can decrease the likelihood of poor oral health later in life."

There is currently a 79 per cent award rate across childcare centres in the Lower Hume Primary Care Partnership area.

Services achieve the Smiles 4 Miles award by implementing healthy eating and oral health policies, engaging with families about the importance of oral health and educating children through a variety of fun learning experiences based on the Smiles 4 Miles key messages – drink well, eat well and clean well.

Children are encouraged to drink tap water or plain milk and avoid sugary drinks like cordials, juices and soft drinks; eat a variety of nutritious foods each day and limit sugary foods, particularly between meals; and brush teeth twice daily. Adults should help children until at least the age of seven.

Better mental health support for workers on its way

NEW laws passed by the parliament will make it easier for Victorian workers to get treatment and support for workrelated mental health injuries as soon as

on a key election Delivering commitment, the Workplace Injury and Rehabilitation Compensation Amendment (Provisional Payments) Act 2020 removes barriers for workers seeking urgent mental health support.

The new laws mean that Victorian workers who seek compensation for a mental health injury under WorkCover will receive

payments for reasonable medical expenses while they await the outcome of their claim.

Minister for Workplace Safety Ingrid Stitt said Parliament are proud to ensure that Victorians can access the help they need so quickly.

"All workers in Victoria can now be assured that if they're struggling, and put their hand up for help, they'll get the care and support they deserve," Stitt said.

Covering expenses such as GP visits, psychiatrist or psychologist appointments and medication, the payments scheme ensures workers will not have to delay

complex and take longer to determine than physical injury claims. Prior to this scheme workers could wait up to five weeks before receiving payments to access treatment or support.

getting the care they deserve, while covering

Mental health injury claims can be

stressful out of pocket costs.

These important reforms come at a time when work-related mental injury claims are growing significantly. It's expected they'll account for a third of all workers' compensation claims by 2030.

Giving workers the support they need early increases their chance of recovery and a successful return to work.

The scheme, which commences on Thursday, July 1 encourages all workers in need of help with a work-related mental health injury to make a claim and get the treatment they need.

Eligible volunteers, including Emergency Management Victoria volunteers, volunteer school workers and jurors, will also be covered, recognising their vital work and unique contribution to the community.

MEMBER for Eildon, Cindy McLeish, said that like many locals and motorists who use the Melba Highway regularly, she is cranky that speed limit signs outside the closed Dixon's Creek Primary School are still operational.




They had visits from COVIDsafe people at the event, and they seemed to be fairly happy with how the event was run. They'll be providing a written report.

Snow Australia announces 2021 Nordic World Championships Team

Time running out to apply for sports grants

THE Victorian Government has announced funding through the Sporting Club Grants Program.

Support has announced for grassroots sporting clubs impacted by the recent coronavirus circuitbreaker action.

Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence confirmed that grants of up to \$2000 are available under the Sporting Club Grants Program's Circuit Breaker Event Support category.

The new category is available for clubs that incurred costs that could not be recouped after events or activities were cancelled or postponed due to the February 12 to 17 circuit-breaker action. Costs that can be claimed include cancellation fees, lost booking fees and the loss of perishable goods.

An additional coronavirus recovery category is also being delivered to provide up to \$5000 for leagues and associations to help them get back on their feet after the pandemic.

Other Sporting Club Grants categories provide payments of up to \$1000 for new uniforms and equipment, up to \$5000 for training coaches, officials, and volunteers and up to \$5000 to improve club operational effectiveness.

The Sporting Club Grants program is part of the Labor Government's commitment to make community sport and inclusive, accessible stimulate local economies, build sustainable sport and recreation and volunteer opportunities, and increase local participation.

Applications for the Sporting Grants Program are open until March 18, or earlier if funding is exhausted.
