This grant will enable us to continue to transition the centre to renewables and reduce our electricity bills and carbon emissions."

> Another impressive development at the Yea Wetlands Discovery Centre is the recent installation of the Gurrong dharrang, Scarred Tree, artwork by Taungurung artist Sammy Trist. Located at the entrance to the centre, the sculpture of a eucalyptus tree features Indigenous line art and the Taungurung totems, Bundjil the wedge-tailed eagle and Waang the crow. This project was coordinated by the Honour the Taungurung Yea community group, including Taungurung Elder Aunty Angela ten Buuren, with funding from the Victorian Government's COVID-19 Aboriginal Community Response and Recovery Fund.

> Works were recently completed on rejuvenating the Yea Fossil Time Path which winds alongside the Yea Wetlands Discovery Centre and tells the story of this land's geographical history, including the Yea Baragwanathia Fossil. Interpretive signage and an audio listening post will be installed in the new year. The renewal of the path was supported with funding from the Commonwealth Government's Australian Heritage

Grants program, Murrindindi Shire Council and through contributions from the community.

A new interactive display has recently been installed in the Russel Wealands Interpretive Wing and provides a fascinating insight into environmental water flows in our waterways. The display was developed and funded by the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority and is a great addition to the educational experiences on offer at the centre.

At the recent annual general meeting, the committee for the newly named Yea Wetlands Centre Inc Discovery announced. Joining chair Don Knight is Ian Marshman as vice chair and Greg Noonan continues in his role as secretary. Other members include Frank Larkins, Julie Lynch, Geoff Leslie, David Anderson and Corinne Border. The committee is looking forward to delivering a number of new initiatives over the coming year.

With the festive season now in full swing the centre's gift shop is fully stocked with a great range of gifts including books, homewares, toys, produce, artwork and jewellery, many of them made, grown or created locally.

Mr Knight said, "We're looking forward to a busy Christmas and summer period and encourage the local community to bring along their family and friends to check out what's new at the Yea Wetlands Discovery Centre".



# Beware the blue-green algae

GOULBURN-Murray Water (GMW) is encouraging people to be mindful of bluegreen algae this summer.

With the warmer weather and school holidays approaching, many people will be planning visits to one of the region's water storages. However, without being properly informed about blue-green algae and its risks, these visits can easily turn sour.

GMW regularly tests the blue-green algae levels at its storages due to its unpredictable nature and significant health risks.

Water Quality coordinator Bianca Atley noted some of the potential dangers when making contact with water that has high levels of blue-green algae.

"There are numerous toxins in blue-green algae and they affect different parts of the body," she said.

"There are neurotoxins that target the nervous system, and we've had those toxins in our lakes before. They cause people to have numb lips and limbs and it's actually very dangerous.

"We more often see algae that has a toxin which takes five to seven days for symptoms to present themselves. Those toxins affect the liver and the kidneys and the symptoms are very similar to gastroenteritis."

There is no practical way to remove bluegreen algae from large storages but it can be managed. Blue-green algae rests on the surface of the water, so, when possible, GMW seeks to release water from storages with high blue-green algae levels from beneath the surface. This ensures a regional bloom is not started by the blue-green algae travelling downstream.

Ms Atley said when dangerous levels of algae were detected, GMW's priority was always to alert people to the hazard.

"The way we manage it at GMW is to firstly warn our customers and the public that it's there so that they're aware of it and can change their practices in the water, knowing that we can't remove it," she said.

When GMW issues a warning, it puts up signs at the storage and uses social media channels to alert people of the threat. GMW also displays all the current blue-green algae warnings at its storages at g-mwater. com.au/news/bga

Lake Eildon is currently clear of bluegreen algae, but this may change. Keep an eve on the website.



## Police pleading for care on roads this **Christmas**

DESPITE spending much of this year in lockdown, Victoria has already surpassed the number of lives lost on Victorian roads in 2020 when 211 deaths were recorded.

With a busy festive period anticipated on the roads, Victoria Police have launched Operation Roadwise, a statewide road policing effort targeting high-risk driving behaviour over the Christmas period.

Police will be out patrolling major arterials and highways to detect dangerous drivers and reduce road trauma.

There will be a focus on impaired driving and motorists can expect to see Victoria Police's fleet of alcohol and drug testing vehicles checking motorists at high-risk locations. Motorists enjoying end of year celebrations are urged to think twice before consuming alcohol or drugs and getting behind the wheel.

Operation Roadwise will also see police targeting speeding drivers. Last year more than 6200 speeding offences were detected over the Christmas and New Year's period.

There were 10 lives lost between December 18, 2020 and January 6 this year.

Operation Roadwise will involve all available personnel across Victoria Police including regional Highway Patrols, State Highway Patrol, the Heavy Vehicle Unit, Road Policing Drug and Alcohol Section and Public Order Response Team.

The operation commenced at 12.01am on Friday, December 17 and concludes at 11.59pm on Sunday, December 26.

Police enforcement will continue throughout the New Year period, with a localised focus particularly in coastal locations and holiday hot spots.

For more information and tips for staying safe on the roads during the festive period, visit the Road Safety page on the Victoria Police website.

Assistant Commissioner Road Policing, Glenn Weir said, "For most of us, this is an exciting time of year with holidays fast approaching and festive cheer in full swing.

"But for the families of the 226 people who are honoured with this Christmas tree it's a sobering reminder that their loved one will not be with them.

"Road safety is everyone's responsibility. It's up to all of us to ensure we reach our destination safely.

"While we're asking everyone to slow down, not drink or take drugs and drive, and avoid distractions like mobile phones. Rest assured police will also be doing our bit and ramping up enforcement on Victorian roads.

"Please, drive safely. We don't want to see any more names added to this Christmas tree."

#### A very productive year for Yea203

IT'S been another big year for 2030Yea. Over the year, they have worked at markets, spoken on UGFM about home efficiency and renewable energy and completed a DELWP Climate Adaptation project. They have won a number of grants based on climate adaptation strategies and the necessary move to renewable energy.

The Climate Adaptation project produced an information pod which is now on their website. It includes three short videos, Regenerative Agriculture, Composting and Gardening, and Home Energy Audits, which were produced with local team Out on a Lim. This project also provided resources for the Yea library including books, subscriptions to Sanctuary and Renew magazines, and hardware for assessing home efficiency, as well as a thermal imaging camera, a Powermate and a light meter.

Also, as part of the project, they offered six weeks of short presentations by locals and well known regional speakers at the Yea Library from April to May 2021. Topics included understanding your energy use, renewable energy options, community energy options, home efficiency, the DELWP Climate Adaptation project in Yea, and regenerative agriculture.

Adam Dennis reviewed and revised their web pages early in the year, and now Brett Groves is developing a whole new website

The Community Power Agency completed an options paper called Opportunities for Community Energy in Yea, which was sponsored by Murrindindi Shire Council.

2030Yea contributed to Member for Indi Helen Haines's Local Power Plan which was launched in Federal Parliament on February 22, 2021. It is a fully costed plan that would support community renewable energy projects and job creation across regional newsletter, Watt Matters, which will be produced quarterly.

The Yea Showgrounds and Recreation Reserve is the largest recipient of the RACV Solar Resilience in the Regions program. The solar and battery installation donated is valued at \$115,000 and is split between the football and netball clubrooms. The football clubrooms installation includes 22.5kw PV mounted onto SolPod mini tilt frames, 15kw Fronius Symo SCERT, three 5kw SP-Pro inverters with generator backup modules, and a 48KWH PPS battery. The netball clubrooms installation includes 6.29kw of PV, Enphase Inverters and Tesla PW2.

The celebration of this work is a small Yeabased family fun and sustainability day at the Rec Reserve, supported by RACV Solar, which has been scheduled for February 27, 2022. They hope to see you there. They are very much appreciative of the continuing support and interest offered by RACV Solar in their endeavours.

In early July, Victorian Minister for Energy, Environment and Climate Change and Minister for Solar Homes Lily D'Ambrosio, announced that Indigo Power and the Goulburn Valley Community Energy group had won the Hume Community Power Hub. As part of the proposal, they submitted an implementation-ready project proposal for solar PV. As a result, they won a solar PV installation for the Yea Community Shed: Men's Shed and Pottery Studio. RACV Solar and Fronius Australia have this week installed two 5kW hybrid inverters and two 4.8kWh batteries to complement the solar PV on the Yea Community Shed roof. That should up the energy of all those potters and carpenters. Thanks again to these two big companies working for the good of our community.

In September, they were successful in winning a grant through the NAB Foundation for solar PV on the Old

Schoolhouse in Pioneer Reserve. They are still waiting for planning permission through the shire for this work to go ahead and hope that the installation will take place early in 2022.

They decided to include a broader scope for their work in 2022 in response to one of our goals, namely increase home energy efficiency. Several committee members have undertaken home efficiency training with Glen Morris from Solarquip in Healesville. If they get some funds, they would like to send some of their members to an Energy Efficiency Training course being run at Box Hill TAFE in mid February. They're looking for \$1200 if you can help. In late January, a group are off to Moora Moora outside Healesville for an afternoon with Glen Morris, and they're taking along the mayor and another councillor. Anyone else want to join us?

They won a grant through the Federal Department of Communities which they will use for governance training towards the end of February 2022 and media training just after Easter 2022.

This week, they were also successful in winning a small grant from the Murrindindi Shire Council for carbon emissions assessments and making pelmets and blinds

Finally, they have just received a report called 2030Yea Community Batteries Report written by two postgrad students from the Australian National University's College of Engineering Battery Storage and Grid Integration Program which explains how electrical energy in used in Yea, the first step towards deciding, with the community, what would be a useful way of storing electrical energy locally for use in the local community. They thank Dr Marnie Shaw, the ANU supervisor in this work, for her practical inputs and suggestions, along with the writers, William Ertler and Henry Dale


They have some other irons in the funding fire with FRRR, DELWP and the Hume Community Power Hub. It won't be a boring year in 2022.

So why do they do all of this? They are a small but significant part of the move to make Yea 100 per cent renewable and to reach zero carbon emissions. The website Snapshot Climate explains that on 2019 data, Murrindindi shire residents emit around 365,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide annually. We have to get that to zero or find ways of off-setting it.

Murrindindi's emissions mainly come from agriculture (41 per cent), transport (30 per cent) and electricity (25 per cent). 2030Yea is working on the 25 per cent segment by obtaining funding for and encouraging the uptake of renewables, specifically solar PV and batteries, in and around Yea. They are also working to reduce emissions (and bills) by offering advice on making dwellings more energy efficient and working towards a community energy facility in Yea.


They need others to step up and develop some strategies for dealing with the other big emissions areas, agriculture and transport. Next year, they hope to start this process by small neighbourhood meetings in Yea, where people can assess their own carbon emissions and find ways to decrease them or offset them. In order to prepare for this, when you're relaxing in January, can you gather together all your food bills, transport bills and energy bills for 2021? This is what you will need to assess your carbon footprint.

They are over the moon that almost 41 per cent of 3717 buildings have some sort of solar installation. That's fabulous. Now let's get together and do some more work in the other segments where carbon is emitted. Let's work on this together in the town that can, Yea.

# Alexandra to be the rodeo capital in January

THE ever popular Alexandra Pro Rodeo is set for Saturday, January 8. There will be live music for an hour prior to the event, with the rodeo starting at 5pm. There will also be music after the rodeo, with Danny Phegan performing. Danny is from the Wagga Wagga area and is well known on the NSW rodeo circuit.

The rodeo will be a great event for families, with lots of great entertainment. In addition to the rodeo, there will be show rides, food and a bar.

The rodeo will be a COVID-safe event. There will be a limit of 5000 people, and people need to be double-vaccinated, and will be required to check-in using the QR codes which will be positioned at the gate. Gates open at 3pm.

# Keep your pets away from Christmas food

VETS are urging the public not to allow their pets to consume any human Christmas foods, as even small amounts can be toxic and potentially fatal.

The Animal Emergency Centre (AEC) say that each year over Christmas they see a surge in emergency cases due to the ingestion of foods dogs cannot eat. Last year AEC recorded a 20 per cent increase in toxicity cases which required emesis over the festive period and anticipate that number will rise significantly this year with the continuing rise in pet ownership.

Pet parents love to spoil their pets at Christmas and assume feeding them some of their festive foods is okay, however this is not the case.

Certain ingredients that are seemingly healthy and completely safe for humans to consume, such as onion, garlic, chocolate and Christmas pudding among others, are so toxic to dogs that they can become very unwell and in severe cases, can be fatal.

Each year vets see an influx of pets in hospitals that have consumed some of their wellmeaning pet parent's foods. If you have a much-loved pet that you want to show your love to this Christmas, please think twice before you share your food with them and explore the many options of festive treats that are designed specifically for pets.



Roast lunch: Many families often want to offer their pet a special Christmas meal, however, common Christmas roast ingredients like onion and garlic which are usually in glazing, stuffing and seasoning, are poison to dogs. Skin, rich gravy, cooked bones and fat trimmings can contribute to upset tummies and painful pancreatitis. This can result in hospitalisation and be deadly to pets. It's best to avoid these human foods and give pets a human-grade vet approved meal made for dogs instead.

Christmas Pudding: Most Christmas puddings contain sultanas, raisins or currants which are all toxic to dogs and can lead to kidney failure. Many Christmas desserts and cakes may also be alcohol based which pets cannot consume even in small quantities.

Chocolate: All kinds of chocolate contain an ingredient called theobromine that is toxic to pets. Chocolate toxicity could cause a wide range of problems, with severe cases causing seizures, heart issues and even death. The more bitter the chocolate, the higher the risk.

If a pet eats something they shouldn't, contact your nearest vet for advice.



# The end of a big year for council

THE final Murrindindi Shire Council meeting for 2021 was held at the Alexandra Council Chambers on Wednesday, December 15.

Nine members of the community appeared in seven public presentations.

Dawn French, vice president of the Yea Pottery Studio, asked whether the pottery studio might be able to use the ticket office in the Yea Railway Station, or the Yea Shire Hall Public to sell craft products. She suggested perhaps that the old toilets in the Yea Shire Hall could be decommissioned and used for this purpose. Councillor Walsh enquired about costings at the shire hall, and Councillor Lording sought more information from Ms French regarding the Yea Railway Station.

The other public presentations related to a proposed six unit development at 102 Falls Road in Marysville. Andrew Woollard spoke against the development. He was concerned about the precedent being set for small divisions, and said that it's not in keeping with the nature of the area.

Stuart Shaw spoke of his concern that the development is not in accord with some of the planning policy, including saying the design is not in character with the density and design in the area.

Margaret and Peter Barry said they were very concerned about the noise level as their property overlooks the development site, and were concerned about the nature of the development. They said that local people are opposed to the development.

Johnny and Tina Wong said they are for development, but reasonable development, and said that this development is like a caravan park. Johnny Wong was critical of the lack of consultation and said that the development is out of character with the neighbourhood.

Liza Serapiglia said that her late father purchased the block, intending for each of his children to have a unit. She said, "This development is not just about making money. It's not about going against the community characteristics or anything like that." She commented on the changes, including reducing the size of two of the units, providing two additional car parking spaces, altered floor levels, and provision of ample outdoor space. The have also previously reduced the number of units from 10 to six. She added, "We absolutely want to provide affordable opportunities for people to be able to come to Marysville and enjoy it's beautiful lifestyle and open spaces and things like that." Councillor Lording enquired about trees, and Ms Serapiglia said that the landscaping will be done once the footprint is settled.

Jackson Lai, designer for the 102 Falls Road site, commented on the reduction of the footprint and said that they are trying to maintain the cottage feel.

Cr Walsh said that to avoid VCAT overruling decisions and the creation of a precedent, it was important to bring the principle of the urban design framework into the total planning policy moving forward. He recognised that this may be a long process.

Council voted to approve the development at 102 Falls Road. Cr McAulay voted against

The three lot subdivision at 44 Villeneuve Street in Alexandra was also approved by council unanimously, per the officer recommendation.

The contracts for provision of civil works were also decided, after tenders closed in July. Twenty-two submissions were received. Sixteen were recomended for appointment.

The tender for the design and construction of the Break O'Day Road Bridge in Glenburn, as well as a temporary bridge while construction is underway, was also discussed and approved.

A tender for road resealing, and a further tender for gravel road re-sheeting, were discussed and approved, as was the tender for the Yea closed landfill rehabilitation.

Council endorsed an application to the Regional Tourism Investment Fund to deliver the Eildon Improvement Precinct Project, commit up to \$1.2m over two financial years (2022/23 and 2023/24) as a contribution to the grant funded project, and request a further report be provided to council concerning the delivery of the project following community consultation that demonstrates the range of options available to meet council's financial obligations to deliver the project. All voted in favour of the decision.

The Grants and Contributions assessment was divided into portions as there were some conflicts of interest among the councillors. These councillors left the room when the decisions were made.

Rotary Club of Kinglake Ranges received a revised grant amount of \$2500 for the Kinglake Art Show, the Alexandra Community Christmas Tree received a revised grant of \$3040.

Tri Gym received \$4500, the Rotary Club of Alexandra received \$2500 for the 2022 Easter Art Show, the Yea Golf Club received \$3500 for their Golf Carts Project, 2030 Yea Inc received \$4480 for curtain linings and a Carbon Footprint Assessment for home energy efficiency, Alexandra Indoor Heated Pool Inc received \$1982 for Breathing Safely, OpenRoads Travel received \$5000 for their rally, Eildon Action Inc received \$5000 for the Eildon Twilight Market, the Rotary Club of Yea received \$3000 for the Yea Art Show, and Alexandra Events Corporation Ltd received \$20,000 for the 2022 Alexandra Pro Rodeo and 2021 Ariat APRA National Finals Rodeo.

The Service Provision and Fire Danger Ratings Policy (Policy) outlines changes to council's services on days declared to be the most dangerous if a fire started, to minimise potential risks to personal safety. Council has a legal obligation to ensure its employees, councillors and the general public are not placed in situations of risk to safety due to its services and actions. It was approved unanimously.

The council meeting dates were also fixed for 2022, and it was decided that council will livestream all open council meetings. There will be no council meeting scheduled for January 2022, due to the lack of business scheduled for this meeting. Weekly council briefings will provide opportunities for council to engage with other parts of the shire. Cr Gerenscer expressed interest in the Kinglake area being able to host a council

Cr Haslam provided a report, read by Mayor Carpenter as she was unable to attend the meeting. She said, "This is a year we will never forget. It has been one of the most trying in so many areas. However, many good things come out of difficult times. I hope we can put this year behind us and look forward to a brighter future. There is much to look forward to. The Blue Gums Recreational Trail will be a great asset for the area. There is also the opportunity to participate in the Eildon Community Plan which starts early in the new year. This is your chance to have a voice. If you have an idea or suggestion that you would like to see happen in Eildon, come and share it... Who knows what could happen or what might be achieved?" She also took the opportunity to thank the volunteers around the shire.

Cr Gerencser noted that council is still looking for Australia Day nominations, with nominations closing on January 3. She also thanked all in Kinglake for their patience while the Kinglake streetscape upgrade is underway. It is now nearing its final stages. There will be a new barbecue area installed outside the Kinglake council offices as the streetscape was under budget. She also commented on the beautiful Christmas decorations in the area.

She added, "I want to thank absolutely everyone in the shire for sticking together and helping each other through another difficult year."

Cr McAulay reported that a new municipal recovery manager is being trained in the role, important as we are coming into a late fire season. The Christmas emergency staffing roster has been updated to ensure that council is able to deal with any emergencies as required. A community advisory group is being formed, and people are encouraged to send expressions of interest to the council email address.

Councillor Gallagher attended the Kellock Lodge AGM and Friends of Kellock Lodge, and noted that most of their fundraising occurs within the Alexandra township. Work of former CEO Jo Cavill was acknowledged, along with Maurice Pawsey for his significant contributions. He also attended the Alexandra District Kindergarten AGM, and the Alexandra Library celebrations of staff and volunteer contributions. The shire's audit and risk committee met last week and identified climate change as being the most substantial strategic risk facing the organisation. Freeza funding has also been secured for activities for young people in the shire. Through meeting with Pathways for Carers, he strengthened his resolve to support council's advocacy priorities for access in our shire to adequate medical, mental and aged care service provisions. He urged pride in the Murrindindi Shire area, and the celebration of the community.

Mayor Carpenter said she is enjoying the challenge of being appointed mayor, and said that it has been a steep learning curve. She enjoyed attending the Taungurung art launch in Yea, and noted the installation of sculptures at the Yea Pioneer Reserve and the book mural on the side of council offices. She awarded a certificate of appreciation to Peter Hawser and Jim Osbourne for their work at the Yea Saleyards Christmas party. She's also developing a greater appreciation for business and tourism in the shire, and attended the Yea Wetlands Discovery Centre AGM. She found the screening of Happy Sad Man to be insightful. She is also excited about the \$1.2 million allocated for artworks along the Great Victorian Rail Trail, and was filmed for RACV Solar funding in Yea.

Shire CEO Livia Bonazzi reminded people that vaccination booster shots are available if they had their second dose five months or more ago. She noted that a priority action for council this year is to develop a reconciliation action plan, and to engage further with Indigenous culture and history. There will also be a formalisation of collaboration processes. In the last year, council has received close to 17,000 customer requests. She noted that there has been a slippage in the response time, with only 77 per cent of requests completed within the target. She stated that this may be due to an increase in the number of requests in recent months. Council is closely monitoring the situation and aiming to improve the response times. She noted that the Know Your Council data is now available, so comparisons are available with similar shires.

Top 10 Christmas lights safety tips

Consider using battery-operated LED or solar lights which don't require electricity.

Inspect your Christmas lights for any sign of damage or wear and tear. Make sure there's no exposed wiring, that the lights are in good working order and that there are no missing globes.

When decorating the outside of your home, only choose lights and fittings designed for external use.

Make sure you have a safety switch in your meter box or have a qualified electrician install one.

Don't overload power boards; use no more than three sets of lights per power board, even if there are four or more outlets on it, and avoid using double adaptors.

Make sure electric cords are completely uncoiled and are not placed under rugs or mats.

Place your tree as far as possible from any heat source, curtains or furnishings.

Maintain water in the base of natural Christmas trees to stop them drying out and remove lights once they show signs of drying.

Make sure you have working smoke alarms in all bedrooms, living areas and hallways.

Ideally, smoke alarms are interconnected. which means if a fire in one room sets off one smoke alarm, all alarms will activate.




