Fire Services Property Levy to double and stretch

ON Friday, December 13, Treasurer Tim Pallas announced that the Fire Services Property Levy will be replaced by a new Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) from July 1 next year.

Minister Jaclyn Symes said that the new levy would help to support more emergency servcies, including VICSES, Triple Zero Victoria, the State Control Centre, Emergency Management Victoria, Emergency Recovery Victoria and Forest Fire Management Victoria, as well as the CFA and Fire Rescue Victoria.

She said that there had been a 100 per cent increase in the natural disaster actions of the SES in just 12 months.

The press release said, "Every single dollar raised by this new fund will support our emergency and disaster recovery services, helping them to keep communities safe 365 days a year.

"Because our emergency services volunteers give our state so much, active CFA and VICSES volunteers and life members will be eligible for an exemption from paying the ESVF on their primary place of residence such as a house or farm, providing even more incentive for Victorians to

ON Friday, December 13, consider volunteering in our Treasurer Tim Pallas announced emergency services."

According to the Victorian budget, the new levy, which will still be included on rates notices, will result in \$6.27 billion over the next five years. The new levy will need parliamentary approval.

On the same day, a funding boost for new trucks, equipment and technology was announced for the state's CFA and SES services.

\$250 million will support CFA and VICSES volunteers across the state.

\$70 million will establish a rolling fleet replacement program for VICSES and the CFA, "ensuring volunteers right across Victoria will get new and upgraded trucks, tankers and pumpers to keep doing what they do best."

The Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) will be doubled, with more than \$62 million to ensure more volunteers have new or upgraded vehicles, equipment and better station facilities.

\$53 million will be invested in a modernised VicEmergency app and the central database for emergency services, EM-COP.

\$30 million to deliver training and support programs to the SES.



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

Preparation today can save lives tomorrow

THE weather never takes a holiday. Will you have your plan ready in the event of a flood, fire or storm? The best way to protect yourself, your loved ones and your property is to have a plan in place.

Murrindindi Shire Council is encouraging all residents to be proactive in their emergency preparedness by developing a clear emergency plan, having a contact list and staying informed through reliable local channels.

Spending 10 minutes today to create a plan can help you act quickly and effectively during an emergency. Talk to the people in your household about potential emergency scenarios and outline clear instructions for everyone to follow.

Tree clearing in wire rope barriers

MEMBER for Eildon, Cindy McLeish, said she has secured the clearing of hazardous trees and overgrown vegetation sprouting amongst wire rope barriers in the middle of the Goulburn Valley Highway.

In November, Ms McLeish called on the Victorian Government to arrange for the urgent removal of the trees and shrubs taken root among the 10 kilometre stretch of barriers between Yea and Molesworth.

Speaking in Parliament, Ms McLeish said, "There are too many trees and bushes to count, including gum trees. Many are a metre high and almost as wide. It has become a hazard impacting driver's view."

The Minister has since confirmed that, "In December, Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) will target the repair of safety barriers and vegetation clearing in sections with edge-line and centreline barriers on the Goulburn Valley Highway, including the section between Yea and Molesworth."

Ms McLeish said, "We know that roads across the electorate are in a dire state, overrun with potholes, crumbling surfaces and unsealed shoulders.

"It is a danger for road users to contend with the thick shrubs, bushes and trees that block their vision and obscure the barriers.

"Roads users are rightly concerned that the vegetation's root system will undermine the road surface as it spreads out of control. People are also worried about the barriers as it allows water to seep under the road at anchored points."

While not holding her breath, Ms McLeish said, "The Allan Labor Government needs to step up and take action to better our roads for all drivers.'

ABC runs segment on Yea Saleyards

LAST Thursday the ABC's 7.30 Report ran a segment on the work of Yea and District Memorial Hospital (YDMH) in providing free health checks at the Yea Saleyards.

The segment ran for almost five minutes and featured local people such as YDMH CEO Elizabeth Sinclair, YDMH staffer Sarah Austin, Jan Beer from the Yea Saleyards Committee, and locals Michael Purcell and Libby Pink. It focused on the importance of providing healthcare to farmers in the environment they are comfortable in, which is the saleyards. This allows for health checks without the potential stress and intimidation of the clinical hospital environment.

how you will contact each other, and essential items such as medications, important documents and an emergency kit.

In the event of an emergency, knowing the right authority to contact is crucial to accessing appropriate and timely help. Research your area and keep a list of agencies in an easy to access place. Some useful contacts include emergency services, such as Police, Fire and Ambulance on 000, State Emergency Service (SES) for floods, storms and earthquakes on 132 500, and VicEmergency Hotline for bushfire information on 1800 226 226.

Emergencies can happen at any time, and being prepared includes knowing where to go for accurate information. Local broadcasters play a key role in providing accurate and timely emergency advice and warnings. Make sure you have access to a battery or car powered radio to listen to UGFM and ABC Radio. You can follow both of these sources on Facebook. Find a list of local emergency contacts and broadcasters at *murrindindi.vic*. gov.au/EmergencyContacts

You can download the VicEmergency app on your mobile or tablet device for updates on conditions in your area. For more information and how to download the app, visit murrindindi.vic.gov.au/prepareforfireseason

Mayor Damien Gallagher said, "Emergencies can escalate quickly and having a plan is essential. Being prepared helps protect you, your loved ones, and your property while also easing the burden on emergency responders who are volunteers, many of whom are our own neighbours and community members. Take the time to create

Make sure to include where you will go, a plan and discuss with your household how to access reliable alerts and information, and who to contact. Staying informed saves lives."

> UGFM President, Station Manager and Radio Host and Alexandra SES Unit Controller Peter Weeks commented, "Understanding how to plan and stay safe during emergencies benefits everyone, including emergency service responders. In an emergency, our services often face overwhelming demand, requiring us to prioritise while ensuring our own safety in challenging conditions. We urge everyone to have a plan to protect themselves and their loved ones, as there may be times when we are delayed depending on the number of jobs and their priorities. Time is your greatest asset."

> "To prepare, have an emergency kit that includes essentials like food, water, medications, and first aid supplies. Know where any items are that you might need to take if you need to leave quickly. Maintain a water supply to ensure you and your pets stay hydrated. If you have a backup generator, store spare fuel in a safe location away from buildings and your house.

> "Identifying your communication channels and knowing how to receive emergency warnings and monitor weather conditions is critical. In a life-threatening event, call 000. For flood or storm assistance, call SES at 132 500.

> "Consider getting a battery-powered or solar-powered radio and test it every couple of months. If you prefer not to buy a radio, you can stream most radio stations from your phone if a connection is available, or preset one of your car's radio stations to your local designated broadcaster, such as UGFM and ABC Radio. If possible, have a charged CB radio or satellite phone on hand, as it can be very useful if mobile communications are lost. Aerial firefighting fleet ready to take to the skies

VICTORIA'S aerial firefighting fleet is ready to respond to what is forecast to be one of the most high-risk fire seasons in recent years for much of the state this summer.

Minister for Emergency Services Jaclyn Symes unveiled the fleet at Avalon Airport alongside Emergency Management Commissioner Rick Nugent and emergency services personnel.

This year's core fleet features 54 dedicated aircraft strategically positioned across the state to support firefighting efforts on the ground and gather crucial intelligence from the air to help faster tactical decision making.

Returning this year are two Large Air Tankers based at Avalon which can also be deployed from smaller regional airports, making them more agile to move around the state.

The fleet also includes a Black Hawk, other Type One helicopters, and a Super Puma which has a capacity of 4000 litres. The Super Puma is supported by an Air Attack Supervision aircraft for detection and observation at night.

An important addition to the fleet this year is a Bell 214ST helicopter, which has the ability to pick up salt water, giving responders more options to help put fires out faster.

As occurred last year, two Aircranes will join the fleet after their service period ends in North America. Victoria will have three additional aircraft on short-term contracts until the Aircranes arrive, bringing the total contracted aircraft this summer to 57.

Victoria can also access a 'call when needed' fleet of more than 100 aircraft and can request extra aircraft from the national fleet.

The Australasian Fire And Emergency Services Authorities Council (AFAC) summer outlook which was released last month made it clear that large parts of Victoria are facing their highest fire risk since the summer of 2019/20.

It indicates most of western Victoria, as well as south-west Gippsland, Mornington Peninsula, greater Melbourne and northeast Victoria are at an increased risk of fire activity. The risk for the rest of the state is forecast to be normal for summer, which means fires are still possible and everyone must do their part to be prepared.

Minister Symes said, "With hardworking crews on the ground and a strong aerial fleet, we are ready for the season. I'm excited to see the return of two Large Air Tankers to Victoria this year. From its base in Avalon it can reach Mildura in the north to Horsham in the west or Benambra in the north east."

Road maintenance FOI: Missing in inaction

ON August 15, a Freedom of Information (FOI) request was submitted to the Department of Transport by this newspaper, seeking to find out "The total annual spend on road repairs and maintenance in Murrindindi Shire across each of the past 10 financial (or calendar) years."

A response was due to be received by October 14, however an extension was requested on the due date as "further time is required for the Executive Briefing and Ministerial Noting process."

We enquired again about the progress of the FOI on November 13, and were advised, "We are currently in the process of briefing the decision for Executive and Ministerial Noting. Once the above is completed, the decision will be released to you." The Minister for Transport and Infrastructure is Danny Pearson.

A timeline was sought on the same day, and we were advised that they were hoping to make the information available in the next few weeks.

A phone call was made to the Department of Transport's FOI contact on Thursday, December 12 and they were going to look into it.

The response to the FOI was still not received by the time this newspaper went to print.

So far, it's been 125 days (17 weeks and six days).

FOI's are meant to be granted within two months.

We're curious to find out what the data may reveal, and we suspect you may be too.

YEA and District Memorial Hospital and Hume Rural Health Alliance (HRHA) have announced that they now have a fully consolidated Patient Administration System across the 14 member health services in the Hume region.

Building a single, integrated Patient Administration System across 14 health services has been a giant leap forward in their digital health journey to achieve the vision of better connected patient care. The new system introduces a region-wide patient identifier to improve the continuity of care.

It has been one of the most complex implementations of the i.PM Patient Administration System ever undertaken.

As Yea and District Memorial Hospital Chief Executive Officer Elizabeth Sinclair said, "We have achieved a seamless transition to a very significant improvement to patient records administration. This work is foundational to supporting care across our region."

Hume Rural Health Alliance Chief Information Officer, Neelu Kaur added, "HRHA is pleased that we could deliver a connected Patient Administration System for the first time in the region's history. This is a great achievement which has been earned through collaboration. We thank all the health services' teams for their support for this major transition, and the activity in the years leading up to this. As always, we are looking towards the future investments in digital health to bridge the healthcare gaps in our regional communities."

Hume Rural Health Alliance has trained approximately 2500 staff across a 40,000 square kilometre region to prepare for the introduction of the new Patient Administration System.

The health services involved are Albury Wodonga Health, Alexandra District Health, Alpine Health, Beechworth Health Service, Benalla Health, Corryong Health, Goulburn Valley Health, Mansfield District Hospital, NCN Health,

Northeast Health Wangaratta, Seymour Health, Tallangatta Health Service, Yarrawonga Health and Yea and District Memorial Hospital.

The scope of HRHA's Hume PAS Connect initiative brings together multiple digital health projects to enable

health services in the Hume region to connect to state and national eHealth initiatives, to support patient safety and the flow of clinical information both in our region and more widely. It reflects the health services' joint commitment for better integrated patient care across the region.

Blue-green algae warning for Lake Eildon

GOULBURN-Murray Water (GMW) is warning people to avoid direct contact with water in Lake Eildon after monitoring detected high levels of blue-green algae.

Warning signs will be positioned at formal recreational areas around the lake and will remain in place while high levels of blue-green algae are present.

Lake Eildon will remain open to the public for any activities that do not involve direct contact with the water while the warning is in place.

GMW Water Quality coordinator Bianca Atley asked people to take care around the water.

"Blue-green algae occurs naturally in waterbodies but contain toxins harmful to humans and animals," she said.

"Contact with it can cause rashes; sore eyes, ears, and nose; or if swallowed, nausea or vomiting. It is therefore important people boating or enjoying activities near the water take extra precautions."

GMW recommends that people and pets avoid contact with the water; those who come into contact with affected water should wash affected skin immediately in clean cold water; seeking an alternative water supply for stock and pets where possible; not using affected water for cooking, drinking, washing or showering. Boiling the affected water will not make it safe for these purposes.

It is not possible to predict how long the algae will remain at high levels. People can stay up-to-date with blue-green algae warnings by phoning 1800 013 357 and selecting the option for blue-green algae information, or by visiting the GMW website at *g-mwater.com.au/news/bga*

Water supplied by GMW is not suitable for human consumption without first being properly treated. Human consumption includes showering, bathing, washing, cooking, ice-making, and drinking.



Topic of the month: And so this is Christmas...

It's officially the festive season! It's a joyful time for many, even with the added stress Christmas can bring. But, for others, this season is more than stressful - it's dangerous. Christmas and New Year is correlated to a spike in reported (and unreported) family violence incidents. With this in mind, it is important to equip ourselves so we can support our community to stay safe. Help is always available, even over Christmas.

Family violence and the festive season

No to Violence (NTV) is a peak body working with men to stop family violence. NTV has collated statistics which tell us "significantly more family and domestic violence incidents [are] reported to police forces across Australia throughout the Christmas and New Year period". Sometimes we can fall into the habit of speaking about family violence as if it is a 'thing' that 'just happens'. But the truth is, family violence is a choice made by the person who uses it. And there is no excuse. Not stress, not finances, not kids being home, not tricky family visits, not alcohol, nothing. While these things can exacerbate or increase the likelihood of family violence, they do not cause it. Family violence is heavily gendered. University of Melbourne academic Kristin Diemer emphasises this, saying the focus must be 'on addressing the attitudes and systems that drive violence against women and children, [and] intervening early'. At Christmas time, we may find ourselves falling into gender roles or feel more pressure to conform to them. The expectations we place on ourselves, our partners and our families over the festive season can be serious pressure points. Even though we may be busier than usual, it is vital to check in on the people we care about at this time of year. Reaching out could even support someone who may be using violence to seek support to change their behaviour. A good friend is honest, even when it's uncomfortable. If it is safe, pull up your friends on their behaviour and language. It could literally save lives. We must all stay curious and work together.

Reminder: the signs of family violence

Safe+Equal have compiled the following (non-exhaustive) list about what signs of family violence could look like:

- Someone appears afraid of or anxious to please their partner.
- Someone's partner often orders them around or makes all the decisions.

Community Resource Pick up your free hard-copy community Guide resource quide to family violence at your local library or Council office, or access online via the Council website.

Ask meaningful questions this Christmas

<u>Ask your partner:</u>

- "How can I best support you over the festive season?"
- "What have I done in the past that was or wasn't helpful?"
- "I know (insert name) has been difficult at family gatherings in the past. Is there a way I can interrupt that behaviour that feels good for you?"

- "Last year, I felt like I/you took on more of the mental load around Christmas. Could we talk about splitting up the work more equally between us this year?"
- "When we think about our favourite Christmas memories, what were we doing? What were we not doing? Is there a way to incorporate these things this year?"

Ask your friends/neighbours/colleagues:

- "Are you looking forward to Christmas this year? Why/Why not?"
- "How are you planning on taking care of yourself this Christmas? I notice you often prioritise looking after everyone else, but you deserve to be cared for too."
- "I know this time of year can be overwhelming. What are you going to experiment with saying 'no' to this Christmas?"

If you are concerned a friend is using violence:

- "I've noticed the way you speak to (insert name) is a bit aggressive/judgemental. I'm worried about both of you. There are services specifically to support men to get help in dealing with their anger. Would you like me to share these with you?"
- "As your friend, I have concerns about the way I've seen you behave towards (insert name). I care about you, and I know you're better than that. Is there anything else going that I can support you with? There's no shame in seeking help."

In an emergency...

Always call 000 in an emergency. Your safety comes first. You are not expected to put yourself in an unsafe situation or behave as if you are an expert on family violence. You are the best judge about what feels safe for you. Consider calling 1800 RESPECT for advice on how to navigate a situation you aren't sure about.

- Someone doesn't have access to an ATM card, or they have a restricted financial allowance.
- Someone seems anxious, depressed, avoids eye contact or has lost confidence.

- Someone gets constant calls or texts from a current or ex-partner.

Anger is a secondary emotion. It is a response to a deeper emotion or feeling. When we feel out of control, anxious or fearful – anger can follow. This is normal. But how we choose to express that anger that matters. There is never an excuse for violence, and everybody deserves to feel safe at home. Asking simple questions can make all the difference this Christmas. If you feel comfortable, try out some of the suggested questions this season.

CFA warning after haystack fires destroy 1700 bales

THE Country Fire Authority (CFA) is reminding farmers about the risks of improper hay storage after two devastating haystack fires destroyed at least 1700 hay bales in separate parts of the state recently.

A fire in Coonooer West on Tuesday December 10 claimed 1200 bales, a hayshed, and several pieces of machinery, while just recently a fire in Naring saw another 500 bales destroyed.

Haystack fires are often caused by spontaneous combustion when hay is baled with excess moisture. High moisture levels, combined with the compact nature of hay bales, can create internal heat, leading to ignition.

Between June 30, 2023, and July 1, 2024, CFA responded to 121 haystack fires in regional areas.

CFA District 16 Assistant Chief Fire Officer Stephen Alcock said the incidents served as a reminder for farmers to closely monitor their haystacks.

"These fires demonstrate the devastating impact haystack fires can have," Stephen said.

"Once a fire starts, it spreads rapidly through the bales, making it extremely challenging to contain. "High moisture levels in hay, often from baling too early in the day when it's dewy or after rain, are a major contributor to spontaneous combustion."

He also stressed the dangers of storing machinery with hay bales.

"Storing machinery with hay bales is a recipe for disaster," he said.

"If a fire starts in the haystack, it can quickly spread to nearby machinery, which can halt important farming operations until new equipment arrives."

"The safest option is to store hay in a separate area well away from equipment and other buildings.

"Haystack fires don't just affect individual properties; they can spread to neighbouring farms and require extensive emergency services resources.

"Regular monitoring and proper storage can turn what might have been a major issue into something manageable."

For more information, visit CFA's website or contact your local CFA brigade for advice on haystack safety.

The CFA also offers tips for managing your haystack. These include: Ensure hay is well cured before baling; know the history of the hay you purchase; keep haystacks to a limited size and separate your haystacks; monitor moisture and temperature of your hay regularly; watch for unusual odours such as pipe tobacco, caramel, burning or musty smells; store hay in separate stacks or sheds away from farm equipment and other buildings; keep your hay dry; protect it from rain, leaking rooves or spouts, and runoff; cover stacks with tarps or hay caps; don't stack hay right to the top of a hay shed; allow some air to circulate at the top, as this helps to carry away moisture.

In terms of temperature, use a thermometer in a probe or insert a crowbar into the middle of the stack for two hours.

If it's less than 50 degrees, you should be able to handle the crowbar without discomfort. Check temperature daily. If it's 50 to 60 degrees, you can only handle the crowbar for a short time. Check temperatures twice daily. If it's 60 to 70 degrees, you can only touch the bar briefly. Check temperature every two to four hours. Move the hay to improve air flow. If it's over 70 degrees, then the bar should be too hot to hold. This is where there is a potential for fire. Call 000 immediately. Avoid walking on haystack. At this stage, pulling apart the hay may provide the oxygen it needs to ignite.

Consider early weaning to save feed and water

FEED and water shortages are likely as we move into summer, so consider weaning your beef calves early to save on requirements.

Early weaning can help your cows maintain condition and fertility while setting up the calves to receive the nutrition they need to thrive.

Lactating cows require a large amount of energy. It's more efficient to convert feed directly into the calf weight than milk for a cow and calf unit.

Providing the appropriate diet to a mob of dry cows and weaned calves, rather than cows with calves at foot, can significantly reduce feeding costs.

Cows making milk need up to 100 litres of water a day and those not feeding a calf require less. Although calves will drink more once weaned, the savings come from reducing the cow's requirements.

Weaning early also allows the farmer to complete a stocktake and sell or cull nonproductive or aged animals.

In most cases, calves should be weaned at around 120kg, as they will be easier to feed. The younger the weaning age of the calf, the higher its energy and protein requirements are.

Setting your calves up to succeed is very important, so exposing them to post-weaning supplements while they are still on the cow is recommended.

Post-weaning supplements should be introduced to calves slowly via creep-feeding and vaccinating two weeks before weaning to protect against clostridial diseases.

Avoid combining stressful procedures like castration and dehorning with early weaning.

Weaners can be difficult to manage at times, so it is recommended getting their nutrition and supervision spot-on to allow the calves to thrive.

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Murrindindi Shire Classifieds **Council's final** meeting for 2024

ON Wednesday, December 11 Murrindindi Shire Council held the scheduled meeting at the Alexandra Chambers. Councillor Adams was absent.

A petition was received about the road closure on Utah Place by Cleveland Aitken, asking to keep Utah Place open, as opposed to the temporary closures due the Eildon Redevelopment Project rollout. The petition was signed by 25 people. It was referred to the Director of Assets and Environment for consideration, a response and a report.

In Public Participation, Sam Watts presented to council about his planning permit on his property in Ghin Ghin. He wanted to reiterate he is running a business at the location breeding cattle and been doing so for some years. He spoke of having a house on this land and how the farm will be more accessible to him when needed. There were objections to the planning permit and his understanding is these people live a number of kilometres away from the property and that those living in close proximity didn't have any objection at all. He spoke of the flood damage to his irrigation system and said if he lived on his property he'd be more available to do his jobs around the farm and be onsite all the time.

Mike Dalmau spoke about the Key Worker Accommodation project in Eildon. He was speaking on behalf of the Lake Eildon Houseboat Industry Association and other groups. He was support of the officer's recommendation and encouraged councillors to support that recommendation. He spoke of the struggles and the limitations of accommodation available and the impacts of social capital in the town such as the schools.

Written submissions about this came from Caitlin Williams and Robyn Archer. Caitlyn spoke of how grateful and supportive for extra accommodation in the area. She has two local businesses, and they struggle to find accommodation for their workers. Robyn Archer stated support for the project. It was also noted the wider Eildon community continue to be involved in the consultation process.

212 Ghin Ghin Road, Ghin Ghin

The planning application for 212 Ghin Ghin Road, Ghin Ghin, proposes to use and develop the land for a dwelling. Three objections were received by council. The application was being presented to council with an officer recommendation for refusal. Councillors moved the motion takes place and said that they hope Mr Watts come back and proceeds with the application in the future.

11 The Ridge, Kinglake

The application proposes to amend planning permit 2020/225, which allows development of the land for the purpose of a single dwelling, to allow an outbuilding, a shed, and amend the plans endorsed as part of the permit. The applicant has not provided further information requested by council to address environmental health concerns in relation to treatment of wastewater. In the absence of this, council officers said they cannot be satisfied that the proposal meets the objectives, policy, and decision guidelines of the Murrindindi Planning Scheme. The officer recommendation was to refuse an amendment to a permit. Councillors moved the motion to refuse amendment.

Eildon Key Worker Housing Project

Council identified recreational land in Eildon surplus to need. Following consultation with the Eildon community, including a deliberative engagement forum specifically convened to consider the future of this land, council resolved in support of the community to sell these locations to support housing development, and to use the proceeds of sale to fund the contribution for the Eildon Reserves Redevelopment. The sites were subsequently identified as tier one locations suitable for council to develop in council's Key Worker Housing Strategy. The Regional Worker Accommodation Fund will require council to make a cash contribution of \$1.4 million, provide the land and project management support for the project. The cash contribution will require borrowing or contribution from council's cash reserves. The 10 year operational budget of the project includes an allocation to cover all costs, including borrowings if required. Furthermore, an allocation of \$400,000 is needed to fund the Eildon Reserves Redevelopment, which was to be funded through the sale of the land in Eildon. While it is proposed that council allocate these funds initially from its Infrastructure Reserve, this allocation can be repaid through the Eildon Key Worker Housing Project, through operational income and future sale of assets. All councillors endorsed this motion.




