A terrifying and devastating fire

THEY say that a butterfly flapping its wings in the Amazon rainforest can cause a tiny change to the atmosphere, potentially leading to huge and unpredictable differences in the environment. Small actions, whether intended or not, can have enormous consequences.

In Longwood, a tiny fire started by the side of the Hume Freeway on Thursday, January 8 and soon became a monstrous firestorm, changing the lives of so many people in many of our small communities.

The Longwood fire swept through Tarcombe and Creightons Creek before it moved into Ruffy, decimating everything in its path. It didn't stop there. Terip Terip, Gobur, Kanumbra, Yarck, Fawcett, Koriella, Highlands, Cavet, Cathkin, Dropmore. So many communities and farms were impacted.

According to the Incident Control Centre, as of Sunday, January 18, 309 homes and

822 outbuildings have been lost in the Longwood fire.

In Murrindindi Shire, 190 homes have been lost and 10 significantly damaged. There has also been damage to 519 other structures.

852 properties in Murrindindi were saved through firefighting in efforts. 3840km of fencing has been lost in the Longwood fire and 24,120 stock. Assessments are ongoing.

Farmer Max Hobson from Terip Terip tragically lost his life in Gobur due to the fire.

Three people reported missing in the Longwood area were located safe.

It's been a shocking time, but the community is doing everything they can to support friends, family and strangers impacted by the disaster. To the people impacted, we are there for you and we will do everything we can to help you.

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Fire cause under investigation

VICTORIA Police have advised, "As a consequence of the extreme weather events last week Victoria experienced a large number of fires, some of which are still burning.

"Victoria Police continues to work with its partner agencies in response to these fires.

"At this time, the overwhelming majority of fires are believed to be as a result of natural causes.

"The major fires, including those in Longwood, Ravenswood South and Walwa, are still under investigation to determine the cause.

"Such investigations are complex in nature and it would be premature to provide causal factor updates at this time.

"When police are in a position to provide confirmed information about the cause of any fire, we will do so.

"The investigation into the cause of the Longwood fire and the associated death is being led by detectives from the Arson and Explosives Squad.

"This investigation remains ongoing including the process to formally identify the person located deceased in the Longwood fire."

Kinglake Parks vehicle stolen

ON January 13, Yarra Ranges Crime Investigation Unit and Croydon Divisional Response Unit members located a Toyota Hilux in bushland in Yellingbo.

A 35 year old Seville male and a 32 year old Launching Place male were located inside the vehicle and were arrested. The vehicle was confirmed to be stolen from Kinglake Parks Victoria depot. A search of the vehicle revealed the males were in possession of a quantity of drugs of dependence and numerous stolen items.

The 35 year old Seville male was arrested, remanded into custody and charged with theft of a motor vehicle, theft, burglary, handling stolen goods, possessing a drug of dependence, and bail offences.

The 32 year old Launching Place male was arrested, remanded into custody and charged with trafficking a commercial quantity of a drug of dependence, theft of a motor vehicle, theft, burglary and handling stolen goods.

Police patrols increased

WHEN asked about the increased patrols in Murrindindi Shire, a Victoria Police spokesperson responded, "There have been no confirmed cases of looting in areas affected by the Longwood fire.

"We received one report of a suspicious car which ended up being people looking to help rescued animals and another report of a suspicious vehicle did not amount to anything.

"We absolutely understand the concern of residents who have had to leave their properties unattended.

"That's why we are running dedicated reassurance police patrols to keep a lookout for any suspicious activity.

"Any car that shouldn't be in the area should expect to be stopped and checked by police.

"Anyone who witnesses suspicious activity should contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000."

Police re-advised on Monday that they have no confirmed cases of looting. Please report any thefts or other illegal activities to the police.

Park closures

AS bushfires continue to burn across parts of Victoria, many parks are closed due to ongoing fire activity and may remain closed for some time. It is not safe to enter or camp in these parks and forests.

Closures may change as fire activity and conditions evolve. Parks Victoria may need to extend or introduce new closures at short notice to keep people safe.

Lake Eildon National Park and Cathedral Range State Park are fully closed at present.

Recovery Hub locations

We acknowledge there a lot of towns that are doing an amazing job coordinating their own recovery efforts.

Recovery Hubs serve as a one-stop-shop for disaster-affected communities to access services and information and are there to supplement the great recovery effort already happening in affected towns.

In Murrindindi Shire, the hubs are located at Yea Library, 15 The Semicircle, open daily; and Alexandra Library, 49 Grant Street, open daily.

GARY Tuck from the Yea Men's Shed was hard at work today (Friday) organising loads of tools to be taken into fire-impacted areas.

This week, they are focused on what people in the fire-impacted areas have asked for, so the club has asked for donations of lots of hand tools and garden tools. They currently have 20 shovels and 20 rakes and other items that people need. One person very kindly donated a near-new trailer, generator and whipper snipper.

Recovery will take time

VISITING the fire ravaged communities surrounding Alexandra, including Yark and Fawcett, it was impossible to ignore the scale of what happened during the catastrophic fires over the seventh and eighth of January. A life lost. Homes ruined. Paddocks blackened. Fences destroyed. Livestock lost. Entire livelihoods upended.

These losses are deeply personal. They belong to families who now must rebuild and to communities that are grappling with the enormity of what they have been through and what is ahead.

Recovery will take time, money and our three levels of government working together with communities to heal and rebuild.

Federal recovery assistance has begun.

The Australian Government Disaster Recovery Payment has been stood up. This one-off payment, \$1000 per eligible adult and \$400 per child, is designed to provide immediate help to those who have suffered the most serious impacts, such as the loss of homes, serious injury, or the death of a loved one.

So far, residents in Alexandra, Caveat, Creightons Creek, Ghin Ghin, Gobur, Highlands, Kanumbra, Terip Terip, Whiteheads Creek and Yark are eligible for the payment. Some of these towns were not included in the initial announcement. Local residents and the council raised this issue with me and I immediately took the issue to the Minister for action. There are still areas missing and these communities will be added as assessments continue across fire-affected areas. I'll keep pushing to ensure no town is overlooked.

But recovery is not just about payments.

It's about restoring roads so people can safely reach their properties and check stock. It's about restoring power supply and telecommunications. It's about navigating complex insurance and it's about mental health support that lasts beyond the first few weeks. It's about helping farmers rebuild livelihoods, and councils repairing assets and infrastructure.

Our communities have already shown extraordinary effort and spirit.

CFA volunteers saved lives, properties and livelihoods in conditions that were dangerous, exhausting and relentless. Some of them lost their own homes while protecting others. Alongside them were forest management crews, SES, emergency services, local councils, volunteers at relief centres, and neighbours helping neighbours. In the darkest moments, people stepped up.

This fire season stretches ahead of us, demanding endurance, resolve and sustained support.

Recovery must be properly funded, informed by local needs and delivered over the long term. I am already working closely with Murrindindi Shire, and the federal and state government. I have visited many affected communities and will continue to do so as we navigate this long path back.

Statement from Murrindindi Shire Council

MURRINDINDI Shire Council stands with all community members affected by the January 2026 bushfire across our shire and surrounding regions. This has been one of the most complex and confronting fire events our community has faced in many years, with residents, farmers, businesses and visitors experiencing significant loss, uncertainty and disruption.

Council is deeply saddened by the death of Murrindindi resident Maxwell Hobson during the fire events over the past week. We extend our sincere condolences to Mr Hobson's family. Mr Hobson was a respected member of the rural farming community, and his loss is felt profoundly in Terip Terip, which has already endured widespread damage. Our thoughts remain with the community as they continue to support one another during this difficult period.

Emergency response and community support

Throughout this emergency, council teams have been working alongside state-led emergency services, providing local knowledge, coordination support and on-the-ground assistance. With active fires still in the landscape and conditions expected to remain volatile, council continues to prepare for periods of high fire danger over coming weeks.

Across the shire, communities have shown extraordinary care and cooperation, coordinating relief efforts, sharing information and supporting one another emotionally and with essential supplies. Council is working closely with these community-led initiatives and providing supplies, information and any other practical assistance as needed.

Recovery planning

While response efforts continue, council has begun planning for the long recovery ahead. We recognise this journey will take time, care and sustained effort, particularly given the cumulative toll of repeated emergencies in recent years.

In the coming days and weeks, council will be undertaking environmental health checks, building and infrastructure assessments, tree safety assessments, and supporting the state-sponsored waste and clean-up coordination in collaboration with partner agencies and neighbouring councils.

Information and support available now

Bushfire Information Hubs have been established at the Yea Library and Customer Service Centre and the Alexandra Library.

These hubs offer face to face support, assistance with accessing disaster relief payments and state and Commonwealth services, referrals for clean-up and wellbeing supports, and clear and up-to-date information.

Council is also sharing information on available services including Services Australia disaster relief payments, Commonwealth Bank pop-up and mobile banking in Yea and Alexandra, and the State coordinated clean-up program for uninsured or underinsured properties.

Advocacy for community needs

Council continues to advocate strongly to state and federal governments to ensure the needs and experiences of Murrindindi communities are recognised in relief and recovery decisions.

Advocacy to date has resulted in additional fire-impacted towns being included in disaster relief eligibility after council raised concerns about initial exclusions. Council has also sought clearer and more flexible assessment processes to ensure residents feel encouraged to lodge claims and access what they are entitled to.

Further advocacy has focused on coordinated clean-up support for uninsured and underinsured properties, improved access to financial and banking services in impacted towns, and long-term recovery funding that reflects the scale of this event and the cumulative impact of recent emergencies.

This work will continue as council pushes for community-based recovery hubs, support for primary producers and

small businesses, restoration of important community assets, and funding for rebuilding that improves resilience.

Statement from Mayor on the Longwood Fire Emergency Event

Cr Damien Gallagher, Mayor Murrindindi Shire Council

MURRINDINDI Shire Council extends its heartfelt support to everyone affected by the current fire event across our shire and surrounding regions.

This is one of the largest and most complex fire events our community has faced in many years. The situation remains dynamic and challenging, and we are still firmly in the emergency response phase. Conditions have been demanding for emergency services,

council staff and volunteers, and this will continue for some time yet.

Council's thoughts are with all residents, farmers, businesses and visitors who are experiencing loss, uncertainty and disruption. We know this is a deeply difficult time. While full impact assessments are not yet possible, it is already clear that many people have been significantly affected, including damage to property, community infrastructure and livestock. To those impacted, please know that you are not alone and that support is available.

I want to acknowledge and sincerely thank the emergency service personnel, volunteers and agencies who continue to work around the clock to protect lives and property. The dedication shown by the Country Fire Authority (CFA), State Emergency Service (SES), Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVIC), Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) and our partner agencies has been extraordinary.

Equally, we are seeing the very best of our community in the way neighbours, local groups and volunteers are checking in on one another, sharing resources and offering help wherever they can. This spirit of care and connection is a defining strength of Murrindindi.

Council's role during this time is to support the emergency response led by state authorities, while also preparing for recovery and longer-term rebuilding. Behind the scenes, council teams have been working continuously to support emergency services across the shire, manage access issues, assist with stock management, coordinate resources and prepare for impact assessments as soon as conditions allow.

We recognise how important access is for people who need to check on homes, farms and businesses. Council has raised the importance of reopening access in an orderly and safe way, prioritising those with a genuine need to access property ahead of non-essential travel. This approach supports

both community safety and the practical realities facing residents.

We also recognise that some council services may be disrupted as staff are redeployed to emergency management roles and safety priorities. These decisions are not taken lightly. They are necessary to protect staff, support emergency operations and ensure council can continue to play its part in this response. We thank the community for its patience and understanding.

Council is working closely with neighbouring councils including Mitchell, Strathbogie, Mansfield and Benalla to coordinate relief, share information and scale support where required. We are also drawing on existing agreements with other councils to bring in additional capacity as needed.

While emergency response will continue for some time, council is already planning for recovery. Recovery will not be quick or simple. It will take time, care and sustained effort, particularly given the cumulative impact of repeated emergencies our community has experienced in recent years.

Council has formally raised the need for dedicated recovery support, including funding for community hubs that allow council to work directly with affected communities over time. These hubs have proven effective following previous disasters, enabling local support, access to expertise, councillor and staff engagement, wellbeing initiatives and practical assistance. A multi-year approach is essential to support community resilience and recovery after repeated serious events.

We have also advocated for recovery funding to support the timely restoration of valued and visible community assets, including those not always classified as essential infrastructure. These places matter deeply to local communities and play a vital role in social connection, wellbeing and recovery.

Council is seeking support for betterment, so that rebuilding can strengthen resilience

rather than simply replicate what existed before. In a changing climate, rebuilding to historic standards is not always appropriate or safe. We need the ability to build infrastructure that is stronger, more resilient and fit for the conditions we are increasingly facing.

We are also advocating for clean up support, including assistance with waste disposal, lost assets and the clean-up of homes and properties, as well as targeted support for businesses that have been lost or significantly impacted by this fire event.

As soon as it is safe, council will work with partner agencies to undertake impact assessments across homes, farms, businesses and community infrastructure, and to connect people with the support services they need. Agriculture Victoria, the Victorian Farmers Federation and other agencies will commence livestock impact assessments to support affected landholders, while council prepares for building inspections, environmental health checks and early infrastructure recovery.

Council has been in direct contact with the Premier and the Minister for Emergency Services to share local information and advocate strongly on behalf of our community. We will continue to make the case for timely, appropriate and sustained state and federal support that reflects both the scale of this event and the long recovery ahead.

We understand that people are seeking clear, reliable information during an uncertain time. Council will continue to share verified updates through official channels, including emergency.vic.gov.au and the Murrindindi Shire Council website, as information becomes available.

Murrindindi is a resilient community, shaped by lived experience and a strong sense of looking out for one another. Council is committed to walking alongside our community through the ongoing emergency response and the long recovery process ahead. We will continue to listen, advocate and work steadily to support our people, today and into the future.

Water safety after fires

BUSHFIRES do not just affect the air quality. They can affect water quality too. Especially after the first time it rains.

If you are returning home, or living near a fire impacted area, here is what you need to know.

Private drinking water like tanks and dams:

If your tank water looks, smells or tastes unusual, do not drink it.

If fire suppressants or foams were sprayed on your property and your roof feeds your tank, do not use the tank water.

Use bottled water for drinking.

Recreational waterways like beaches, lakes, rivers, streams:

Rain after bushfires can wash ash, debris and chemicals into waterways.

Avoid contact with fire affected waterways. This means things like swimming, boating and fishing.

Boiling water may not be enough to make it safe to drink.

Blackwater and fish death events may happen after rain.

Fire fighters in Victoria no longer use PFAS in their fire suppressants.

Ruffy: A community decimated but surviving

THE community has suffered an immense tragedy in the past two weeks, with so many small towns decimated by the Longwood bushfire. Houses have been lost, sheds full of assets, livestock, fencing, tractors.

Ruffy is among them. The Ruffy Recreation Reserve and the old school are gone. The fields are black, and the sides of the roads still smoke and smoulder. Enormous amounts of work have been, and are being done, to remove trees that have fallen across roads, blocking locals from returning.

There is no way to put into words the loss and hardship faced by members of the community, as there are so many individual stories and tragedies. Some stayed to fight the fire. Some evacuated and returned to a broken town. Every person has felt the impact in some way.

As it stands, Ruffy is deep into clean-up and rebuild. The Ruffy Hall and the Ruffy CFA shed are hubs of activity. People grab supplies, reorienting themselves, working out what the next step is.

The hall is full to overflowing with donated goods, and a team of volunteers work tirelessly to keep it ordered and provide information for people seeking certain items. CFA comes and goes from the CFA shed, managing the risk, constantly working. Dinner is provided at the hall, giving locals the opportunity to feed themselves, have a cool drink, and talk with other members of the community. There are showers, and internet, and CFA providing updates about what is happening.

A hub for hay and water has been set-up, and trucks come and go along the roads, carting water, delivering hay, moving livestock and earthmoving equipment. There

are an enormous amount of utes moving around, clearing fallen trees, fixing fencing, checking on stock, moving supplies to where they need to go.

Unfortunately, Ruffy is not the only community affected by this bushfire. Various other small towns scattered across the hill, from Longwood to Terip Terip to Gobur to Yarck and Molesworth, have been affected by this fire.

So much support has been given, through supplies and incredible volunteers and more, and the community is slowly fighting to recover, but more will be needed. There is a gargantuan amount of work to be done, and for many people, life can't go back to being the same as it was before.

Ruffy is a strong and resilient community, with proud residents. To everyone in the thick of it, hang in there.

Victoria bushfires upgraded to insurance catastrophe

THE Insurance Council of Australia (ICA) has on Saturday, January 17 escalated its significant event declaration to an Insurance Catastrophe for the bushfires that have been impacting 18 LGAs across Victoria since January 7.

Since the ICA's initial significant event declaration, insurers have been able to further assess the large recovery effort that will be required as a result of these severe bushfires, with 2369 claims being lodged to date across property, commercial and motor.

Current indications suggest around 30 per cent of all property claims are total losses. The extent of commercial losses will also be significant as a result of this event and ICA anticipate increased claims numbers as people start to return to their homes and businesses.

The ICA's Catastrophe declaration serves to escalate and prioritise the insurance industry's response for affected policyholders. Under the Catastrophe declaration, the industry will continue to ensure: Claims from affected policyholders are given priority by insurers; claims are being triaged to direct urgent assistance to the worst-affected property owners; ICA representatives have been mobilised to work with local agencies and services and affected policyholders as soon as emergency services say it is safe to do so.

Insurers will mobilise disaster response specialists to assist affected customers with claims and assessments as soon as emergency services say it is safe to do so. An industry taskforce has been established to identify and address issues arising from this catastrophe.

The ICA is closely monitoring access into Longwood and remains on standby to support surrounding communities including Harcourt.

ICA Deputy CEO Kylie Macfarlane said, "These bushfires have been devastating for many communities across Victoria, and insurer's priority is getting help to people as quickly as possible.

"We acknowledge that a large recovery effort will be required to help the state recover from this catastrophic event and insurers stand ready to support communities in this process.

"I'd encourage Victorians impacted by these fires, to get in touch with their insurer and lodge a claim. They can do so even if they do not know the full extent of damage and may have not returned to their home or business as yet."

Information about what impacted policyholders should do and how to go about the claims process can be found on the ICA website.

Bushfire road repairs

ALMOST \$82 million has been announced to restore and repair state roads and public transport infrastructure damaged by the January 2026 Victorian bushfires, ensuring critical transport links are restored for regional communities.

Of that, up to \$44 million is for emergency works which will be funded by the Federal and state governments under joint Commonwealth State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA). The Victorian Government will fund a further \$37 million.

This builds upon previously announced support and responds directly to needs identified by affected communities as they start their recovery journey.

The fire has resulted in a significant impact not only on the road surfaces but also critical roadside and safety infrastructure including barriers, signage and vegetation as well as the strain to roads from heavy machinery used for tree clearing on the roads.

Crews will be out repairing wire rope and guard rails, cleaning up trees and debris, making sure signage remains intact and undertaking road repairs, supporting local economies and businesses, which rely on safe and accessible roads.

Caveat church lost

THE Catholic Parish of Yea-Alexandra is mourning the loss of one of its churches, the church of Our Lady of Seven Sorrows in Caveat, which was ravaged by the bushfires that have torn through parts of Victoria.

"On Sunday we wondered if the church and the whole area was still standing after the bushfire," Fr Jose Mathew, parish priest of Yea-Alexandra said.

The church had burnt down, with only the cross and the bell tower still standing.

Fr Mathew says one of their parishioners lives opposite the church and was already at the Seymour relief centre by the time the parish was able to speak with her. "They had already evacuated the whole area. She shared that her home was safe but all the sheds, paddocks and farms. Everything had burnt. Everything was lost.

As news of the parish's loss came to light, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli sent locals a message of support. "This humble church was far more than a building. It was a place of hope, memory and encounter with God.

"We hold in our prayers the people of Caveat, and the wider parish community

of Yea-Alexandra, as we grieve the loss of the church of Our Lady of Seven Sorrows in the recent fires. This humble church, built by faith-filled families and sustained by generations of prayer, was far more than a building. It was a place of hope, memory and encounter with God."

Constructed in 1955, the church in Caveat was a labour of love by locals, many of whom were recently arrived migrants of Czech, Polish, Ukrainian and Slovakian descent. The church was officially opened and blessed by Bishop Arthur Fox in 1956, with the bell tower and cross later added by locals.

While Sacred Heart Church in Yea is the main worshipping centre of the parish, Fr Mathew says that the church has remained an important part of the parish's history. The community last gathered in the church back in late November 2025 for Advent.

Despite the devastation, Fr Mathew says it was heartening to hear some parishioners say, "We are blessed, Father. We are alive."

He asks that people keep the community in their prayers as locals begin to survey the loss and rebuild their lives.

Generator safety reminder

AS communities begin returning home after recent emergencies and power disruptions caused by fires, the need for portable generators has prompted a warning from Energy Safe Victoria about the serious risks associated with using them incorrectly.

Portable generators can provide temporary power during outages, but if used improperly they can expose households, neighbours, and emergency workers to serious and sometimes life-threatening risks, including carbon monoxide poisoning, electric shock and fire.

"We know people are dealing with challenging conditions and making decisions under pressure after fires and with power outages," Energy Safe CEO Leanne Hughson said.

Energy Safe is urging people with generators to pause and make sure they understand how to use them properly following concerns some households might connect them directly to household wall sockets or switchboards, a practice that significantly increases safety risks.

"Generators are a useful backup during outages, but they are not designed to power entire homes. Shortcuts or improvised connections can put lives at risk," Ms Hughson said.

Key safety reminders for generator use include: Only connect household equipment to the generator via an extension lead, then a double adaptor or power board; Never operate generators indoors or in enclosed or poorly ventilated areas; Do not connect generators directly to household wiring unless a licensed electrician has installed a dedicated connection; Never modify household wiring yourself to fit a generator; Engage a licensed electrician; and follow manufacturer instructions and only use as designed.

They have seen reports of people downloading and using an unofficial app

called 'Vic Emergencies' (plural). This is not the official app.

Reports indicate it is not working correctly. It may not provide you with critical, life-saving warnings.

If you have the wrong app, delete it and download the official one. Do not rely on third-party look-alikes for your safety.

A summary of the supports available

Emergency Recovery Hotline

VICTORIANS can call the Emergency Recovery Hotline on 1800 560 760 for information about payments and recovery programs. Additional assistance, including emergency relief payments and Guaranteed Service Level electricity bill credits, remains available for eligible households.

Community recovery officers and hubs

The state and federal government have committed \$15 million to establish Community Recovery Officers and Recovery Hubs across bushfire affected areas. Recovery Hubs will be a one-stop shop for residents to access services and information from government and community organisations. Community Recovery Officers will work within councils to identify community needs, develop tailored programs, and provide on-the-ground support to help locals rebuild.

Primary producer recovery grants

An initial \$40 million in grants of up to \$75,000 will be provided to eligible primary producers, to help cover the costs of clean-up and reinstating their enterprises. Funding can be used for essential recovery activities such as disposing of livestock, rebuilding or replacing damaged on-farm infrastructure and restoring operations. Grants will open as soon as possible and will be delivered by Rural Finance. Information on eligibility and how to apply will be available at ruralfinance.com.au

Concessional loans for primary producers

The state and federal governments will also provide a further \$10 million in concessional loans to help primary producers recover from the bushfires. Loans of up to \$250,000 will be available for producers who have suffered significant damage to assets, while loans of up to \$100,000 will support those experiencing a major loss of income. This assistance will further help cover essential costs such as repairing or replacing damaged equipment, rebuilding infrastructure, purchasing livestock and meeting working capital expenses

like wages, rent and fodder. Applications will open as soon as possible and will be delivered by Rural Finance. Information on eligibility and how to apply will be available at ruralfinance.com.au

Support for councils to restore community assets

Almost \$12 million will be delivered through the Council Support Fund to help bushfire-affected councils restore vital community assets and services. The fund boosts councils' capacity to lead recovery efforts and make decisions that reflect local needs, ensuring support goes where it's needed most. The fund will be active for two years, giving councils the time they need for clean-up and reconstruction. Councils will receive up to \$750,000 depending on the scale of impacts, providing tailored support for rebuilding communities.

Disaster Recovery Allowance

The Australian Government Disaster Recovery Allowance (DRA) will be available for Victorians impacted by the ongoing bushfires. The allowance provides financial assistance to people residing or working in designated areas who have experienced partial or total income loss due to the bushfires. Employees and sole traders may receive up to 13 weeks of income support. To be eligible, your income must have fallen below the average Australian weekly income because of the bushfires. Prolonged power outage payments

The state and federal government are providing to \$16 million in financial assistance for households impacted by extended power outages following the bushfires. Eligible households who have been without power for seven or more days within a two-week period will receive \$2380 per week for up to three weeks. Applications can be made through electricity distribution businesses, with full details available at energy.vic.gov.au/about-energy/safety/power-outages

Financial counselling

More than \$4 million is being funded to provide financial counselling for communities impacted by the bushfires, helping Victorians access emergency assistance, navigate recovery systems and stabilise their finances so they can rebuild. The funding will boost the Victorian Farmers Federation's Financial Capability Support Program, giving primary producers tailored financial advice.

Emergency relief payments

Emergency relief payments remain available for eligible Victorians who have had their homes destroyed by the fires, or who were required to evacuate due to emergency warnings. To find out more, please visit an Emergency Relief Centre or call VicEmergency on 1800 226 226.

Residential waste

The Bushfire Cleanup Program invests an initial \$10 million to support uninsured and underinsured Victorians to remove damaged structures and hazardous materials, easing the burden on families already facing enormous stress. This support is jointly funded by the Australian and Victorian Governments under the Commonwealth State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

The Victorian Government will also invest \$5 million towards waiving waste levies in eligible local government areas and fully cover landfill operator gate fees, ensuring all bushfire waste can be disposed of free of charge.

Uninsured households

The state and federal governments are making assistance payments of up to \$52,250 available to eligible uninsured households so they can re-establish their principal place of residence. Call the Emergency Recovery Hotline (above).

Community support grants

Grants of up to \$5000 for events and activities that support mental health and wellbeing so they can navigate their recovery as a community.

Animal welfare

Landholders concerned about livestock welfare can now put in a request directly via Agriculture Victoria (on 1800 226 226) who

will work with the Fire Incident Controller to assess the request and determine the earliest and safest way to get access.

Fodder distribution

A \$10 million emergency support program has been announced to help distribute fodder to those farmers who need it.

Emergency accommodation

The Australian and Victorian Governments will provide \$1.5 million to coordinate emergency accommodation options for people who have nowhere else to go and have had to seek shelter in hotels, serviced apartments and other temporary places.

Mental health support

\$1 million will fund experts in disaster recovery mental health support to provide group counselling sessions so communities can better support one another and navigate their recovery together.

Recovery Support Program

There will be one single point of help so people who've lost so much don't have to deal with government red tape. \$5 million in funding will ensure case support workers will be available for affected Victorians to help them navigate matters like housing and legal.

Funding for councils

Councils will receive between \$450,000 and \$1.3 million to employ recovery staff and deliver local programs.

Funding for community groups

Community organisations can apply for grants of up to \$75,000 for locally led initiatives.

Bushfire Appeal

The 2026 Victorian Bushfire Appeal is now open for donations to support fire affected communities, Victorians can contribute via vic.gov.au/2026-Victorian-Bushfire-Appeal

100 per cent of donations will go to fire affected communities, and the government is covering all the administrative costs.

GMW fill points

GOULBURN Valley Water (GVW) is at the Incident Control Centre (ICC) at Seymour, working with local government areas affected by fires and emergency services to ensure our people remain safe while accessing assets in the emergency area.

They have staff on the ground at different locations across the service area to keep services running and people informed about interruptions where they are occurring.

Roads are starting to open but falling trees are posing a significant risk to accessing assets and respond to service issues. They continue to work with emergency services to access these locations safely.

Four water fill sites are being set up for people who have been affected by the fire and need access to water. The Murrindindi Shire ones are at Rotary Park opposite 49 Vickery Street in Alexandra, and at the Yea Recreation Reserve, 18 Snodgrass St, Yea.

This is an emergency service for those affected by fires. Water carters cannot access this water supply. They need to use local standpipes. Water at the standpipes in Alexandra and Yea is free to access at this point in time.

They also have a water tanker located at the Ruffy CFA Station with a drinking water supply available to the Ruffy community.

They want to thank water carting contractors for their ongoing commitment

to delivering water to these towns and others.

Molesworth water treatment and wastewater treatment facilities are the remaining sites operating off generators. GMW deeply appreciates the efforts of emergency services in ensuring the GMW teams remain safe while performing this critical work. They have had terrific support from the Victorian Government and local councils in sharing information about water supply impacts and helping us communicate with communities.

Buxton, Thornton, Rubicon

Water supply has returned to normal. If customers have issues with water discolouration, please run an outside tap for a short period can help. The water is safe to drink.

Eildon, Molesworth, Seymour, Avenel, Mansfield, Bonnie Doon

Water supply has returned to normal.

Yea, Alexandra, Euroa, Bonnie Doon

Water supply is unaffected. GMW has water fill sites available in these four towns for fire impacted residents. You do not have to be a Goulburn Valley Water customer to access this water. These fill sites are not available to commercial water carters. They can access standpipes in each of these towns free of charge.



UGFM provided vital service under challenging circumstances

RADIO station UGFM was a lifeline for many people in Murrindindi Shire during the fire emergency, providing essential and timely information to people. This was particularly important when power, phone and internet connections were interrupted.

Peter Weeks from UGFM said on Thursday, "We basically held up fairly well. We had all our generators kick in but we ran out of fuel at the Yea transmitter. We couldn't get in to refuel it and then we got in to refuel it... and we just refueled it again [Thursday]... We've got the Telstra site going up here now as well. We've got the mobile phones working in Highlands as well today, so we've been dropping generators in everywhere."

The Yea transmitter is in the fire ground, so they had to get an escort in with the CFA to get in to refuel, and Telstra and the CFA

had to get in to get their base station going. Peter said, "We're giving them power from our generator to get them back on the air."

"I think the biggest issues we've had is network failures with Telstra and NBN. They're one of their biggest problems. We've worked hard to keep all their systems running as well."

UGFM had a generator stolen from their Marysville location in early January, but fortunately, Marysville didn't lose power so people could continue to listen.

During the fires, "We're broadcasting 24/7 for the first couple of days," he said. "Then we've been able to throttle back a bit."

"Everything's being driven out of the Alexandra studios. We've had double two crew members on four-hour shifts rotating around," he said.

They didn't leave the studio when the fire was next to Alexandra. Peter said, "We decided to stay. We're in a brick building and it's in the middle of town. We decided it was safe enough to stay. We considered our options there were if the town was getting to a point where we had to we were going to switch to programs to evacuate. That's the station at Mansfield. We could keep on air from our main transmitter."

"That's a worst-case scenario plan. We had to transmit from our studio transmitter for about half a day until we could get into the main transmitter site to sort out what the generator shut down, but the biggest issue was the network failures with telephones and mobile phones and data, and that started to impact on us. We've got a backup satellite service and we also installed a satellite service at the SES headquarters as well, so

we had communications when we had at least two failures of the mobile network.

Treasurer Jaclyn Symes, Emergency Management Commissioner Tim Weibusch, the Chief Officer of the SES Alistair Drayton and the Acting CEO of SES Deborah Mann were at the CFA/SES headquarters in the day following the fire. The Premier ended up not attending as there were protestors out the front which the police were unhappy with. The communications also went down again.

Peter said, "Unfortunately, the firefighters in the meeting and the CFA members that were there didn't get to meet the Premier... Yesterday wasn't the time to vent that anger."

He added, "Full-time firefighters and volunteer firefighters did an amazing job to protect the town. That really saved Alexandra from having a major fire coming in."

CEO Robyn Hill was asked for an update. She said, "There's lots going on. I think the big issue for us is, it's still really early days and we don't know what people need. We're waiting for assessments about needs."

"We are having information coming in about different people as they present to us or other people we're connected to, and we are distributing food."

"We're also joining the dots so where we know people have specific needs that aren't food, we can find it for them or track it down."

"We certainly are doing some work. We've accepted quite a bit of food donations locally and from outside the shire, so that pile is building up. But really, our immediate work is to see where the need is."

"We've established the Murrindindi Disaster Fund. There's money coming into that, which is wonderful," she said. They are also able to provide tax receipts if required.

She added, "We're just inundated with people at the moment, people wanting to help, to volunteer, to donate, so Charlie's manning the phone so she can field some of that."

Asked whether she had particular advice for people wanting to donate, Robyn said, "Clothing should go to Menzies or the op shops. We [Foundation Murrindindi] don't want clothing. Food to us."

"We are getting food out to Yarck and Fawcett so that they can then deal with it out there."

She commented, "It's more trying to get information like, I need a generator, I need diesel fuel, and I need tools and gloves. So, okay, so how can we organise that and be a central role for that. Any of those random things, we're happy to help try and, as I said, connect the dots to match people up."

"Basically touch base if there's needs that aren't met and we can help point them in the right direction," she said.

"Just come in [to the shop at 88A Grant Street, Alexandra]. We're going to be here in this part for a week while the Dame's not open. It's been great actually being here because people are popping in and just saying, I can do this or I need this or whatever."

Given the travel challenges at present, money from people outside the shire is the most helpful, "So we can use that for the short term, immediate stuff that needs to be done, but we're really mindful that we've got short, medium and long term things to deal with," Robyn said.

"The fund is going well. We've got donations rolling in and we've really got to keep that message going. It's really important for us to build that fund up."

VFBV supporting CFA volunteers in need

donations are made to the VFBV Volunteer Support and Recovery Trust.

This fund is currently assisting CFA volunteers impacted by the 2025/26 Bushfire Season.

The VFBV Volunteer Support and Recovery Trust Fund (formerly Black Saturday Recovery Trust Fund) was established in 2009 following the Black Saturday fires to provide assistance to CFA volunteers who had suffered loss as a result of the Victorian Black Saturday Fires.

This fund is established to respond to significant natural disasters such as floods, storms and bushfires impacting on CFA volunteers, and is receiving donations to support CFA volunteers who have been directly impacted by the 2025/26 Bushfires.

It provides swift one-off grants to help CFA volunteers recover from loss of life, loss of home, and loss of outbuildings, fencing, stock, livelihood and any other impacts.

Following its creation on Black Saturday, it has awarded over \$1.2 million in grants to CFA volunteers and their families.

VFBV covers all administration fees, and 100 per cent of funds received are used for the payment of volunteer grants.

Information and Financial Support

Financial support for eligible residents

It can be difficult to navigate the options when it comes to available financial support, contact the VicEmergency hotline on 1800 226 226, or call Council on 5772 0333 for help.

Emergency Relief Payments

You may be eligible for an Emergency Relief Payment if you have unmet immediate relief needs and:

- your principal place of residence is damaged or destroyed by the January 2026 bushfires, and you can't live in it, or
- your principal place of residence was in an evacuation warning area, and you evacuated your property.

To apply for a payment, contact The Department of Families, Fairness and Housing:

- Call the VicEmergency Hotline 1800 226 226 (Press 0, then 1 to talk to someone, or press 9 for an interpreter)
- Visit an Emergency Relief Centre

Have personal identification (ID) with you if possible, such as:

- driver licence
- Medicare card
- letter or bill with your name and home address.

The VicEmergency Hotline is experiencing a very high number of calls about the current fires and relief payments. There may be a delay in answering your call. If you can't speak to a support officer immediately you will receive a call back, which may be from an unknown number.

Australian Government Disaster Recovery Payment

The Australian Government Disaster Recovery Payment (AGDRP) is a one off, non-means tested lump sum payment.

It offers a payment of \$1,000 for eligible adults and \$400 for eligible children who've been adversely affected by a major disaster. It can help you if the disaster caused major damage to your home or major assets that you own at your home. It can also help if you were seriously injured or your immediate family member has died or is missing.

To get AGDRP you must meet all eligibility rules, including being directly affected in a declared area. These areas are still being assessed and we anticipate more areas in Murrindindi Shire will be added to the list soon.

Experiencing a disaster can be overwhelming. It can affect your mind, body and emotions. Across our community, people have had very different experiences of this fire, and all of them are valid.

Some are dealing with significant loss. Many may feel stressed, anxious or unsettled, even if they were not directly impacted. For some, this event may have brought back difficult memories from past bushfires, along with feelings of sadness, fear or grief.

If this is how you're feeling, you are not alone. Recovery looks different for everyone, and it can take time. Strong emotions are a natural response to what is happening.

Talking about how you're feeling and staying connected to others can help. What matters now is that we are all in this together. Looking out for one another, checking in, and offering kindness can make a real difference. If you are finding things hard, asking for support is a sign of strength, and often the first step in recovery.

Communications restoration in Alexandra area

LOCAL CFA, SES, DEECA and UGFM Radio technicians and electricians worked tirelessly, spending the three days up to last Monday restoring temporary power to local Telephone Exchanges, Mobile Phone base stations, Emergency Radio Communications sites and local TV and FM radio transmitters in Alexandra, Thornton, Eildon and Yarck areas.

Generators were installed returning vital communications and internet services for residents in the fire affected areas of Murrindindi shire, following the loss of power from the Longwood fire.

Thankfully the generators that were originally to be used at Alexandra Pro Rodeo last Saturday were available and redeployed to restore and maintain services.

Roads needed to be cleared of fire affected trees to enable the team to access

communication sites and restore services following the fire.

CFA members from Alexandra are also assisting by regularly topping up fuel for the generators until normal power is restored, that may take weeks. Without the generators the situation would have been disastrous with an extended period of a total loss of communications, as external crews would have had difficulty in gaining access to make temporary repairs.

A big thank you to Alexandra CFA and SES, DEECA, UGFM, Alexandra Events, E-Tech, Grimshaw Electrics, Weeks Radio, Keaths Excavations, Tyre Power and Simpson's for the team effort in helping to keep us safe and connected following the fires spread over such a large area.



They were out fighting fires and they're thanking me for a bloody hamburger. I'm thanking them all the way along. They've done an amazing job. Yeah. It sort of brought tears to your eyes, to be honest... My hat goes off to them every single time they get on a truck."







Murrindindi Mobile Health Van launched and deployed

THE Murrindindi Mobile Health Van was deployed to Rotary Park last week, providing timely mental health support for members of the community, following its launch at the Yea Saleyards on Wednesday, January 7.

The van is an Alexandra Events initiative funded by local community groups, individuals, and Jayco Australia, being a purpose-built outreach vehicle designed to bring essential medical and wellbeing services straight to communities across the shire, improving access to healthcare where it's needed most. Over \$114,000 was raised for the project at the Alexandra Truck Ute and Rod Show weekend in June of 2025.

Members of the community flocked to the Yea Saleyards to see the new van, and guest speakers included Murrindindi Shire Council Mayor Damien Gallagher, Acting Chair of Yea and District Memorial Hospital Ian

Marshman, Warren Davies, The Unbreakable Farmer, Caolan O'Connor from Alexandra Events Corporation Ltd, Gerry Ryan from Jayco Australia and Andrew Embling from Victorian Livestock and Property. The keys were officially handed over by Gerry Ryan, owner and founder of Jayco Australia.

When the van was deployed to Rotary Park last week, Warren Davies, The Unbreakable Farmer, was available for a chat for anyone who simply needs someone to talk to, and Cassandra Fraser, Nurse Practitioner on the Run, was also operating from the van, with additional services available.

The last couple of weeks have shown just how resilient and supportive our community is. Neighbours looking out for neighbours, stepping up when it matters most. That support is incredibly important. Professional help matters too.

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AV paramedics relocated from stations during fire danger period

AMBULANCE Victoria (AV) declared a Red Escalation for their service across Victoria at 7am on Friday, January 9, in response to the catastrophic fire danger declaration for the South West, Wimmera, North Central and North Country regions and in consultation with emergency service partners.

What this meant was that paramedics and first responders within declared regions of catastrophic fire danger risk were relocated for their own safety, where those branches had been identified as high-risk due to their proximity to bushland and limited road access.

Ambulance Victoria said in their press release that crews would only be redeployed into these zones in the case of serious or life-threatening illness and only after a thorough risk assessment to consider the safety of their people.

A number of Ambulance Victoria paramedic branches that were temporarily relocated for safety reasons during the catastrophic fire danger on Friday, January 9, returned to their locations on Saturday, January 10, following updated advice from emergency management authorities. During this time, paramedics continued to respond to emergency cases in affected communities where it was safe to do so.

On Saturday, January 10 at 7pm, Ambulance Victoria downgraded the statewide Red Escalation to an Orange level for the bushfires. This reflected a reduction in forecast fire danger, while recognising that active bushfires and ongoing heat conditions continue to present risks in some areas. This allowed even more branches to return to their locations.

It is unclear from this how long the period of time was during the Longwood bushfire emergency where AV stations in regions of catastrophic fire danger risk were without personnel, but a period of time did exist.

Protecting underground utilities

BYDA is a not-for-profit organisation that delivers a vital national community service designed to help prevent damage and disruption to Australia's vast utility networks such as electricity, gas, water and telecommunications.

Protecting Australia's underground infrastructure is crucial in keeping these essential services flowing to the community.

BYDA promotes asset protection and the importance of safe digging practices by providing everyone working in and around underground infrastructure with the best possible access to plans and information directly from asset owners of utility services via the free BYD referral service.

Most of Australia's asset owners are BYDA Members, so using the BYD service is a single point of contact to obtain information about what infrastructure lies underground at the planned project site without contacting utility organisations individually.

Any project, including work on private properties, can damage assets near your dig site, leading to service interruptions, delays, costly repairs and in the worst-case scenario, injury or death. Obtaining information from asset owners via the referral service can significantly minimise these risks.

Lodging an enquiry is a free and simple process: online via the website byda.com.au, or via the BYDA iPhone and Android mobile apps.

Safety is a fundamental aspect of any excavation project, so the BYD service should always be the first point of contact. For more information, visit byda.com.au

Council advances Eildon Key Worker Housing Project

MURRINDINDI Shire Council is set to commence civil works in early January 2026 for the Eildon Key Worker Housing Project, marking a major step in addressing local workforce housing needs.

This project will deliver 33 bedrooms of dedicated accommodation for key workers across two council-owned sites at 10 Eighth Street and 18 Twenty-First Street, Eildon.

The development is funded in partnership with the Victorian Government's Regional Worker Accommodation Fund and aims to address housing shortages for essential workers such as health professionals, teachers, and hospitality staff.

Council adopted its Key Worker Housing Strategy in 2024, opting to develop these sites rather than sell them, a decision that reflects local needs and strengthens Eildon's economy and services. By developing the sites rather than selling to a developer, council retains greater control over the built form, and long-term use.

Houses are being constructed off-site and will be transported to Eildon for installation from February 2026. This modern, sustainable approach accelerates delivery while maintaining high quality.

Council awarded construction contracts in August 2025 to Millbuilt Pty Ltd and JMB Constructions (AUST) Pty Ltd following a rigorous assessment process, after issuing a Notice of Decision to Grant Planning Permits for both sites.

Council's Economic Development, Local Jobs, and Skills portfolio Councillor Sandice McAulay, said this project will make a real difference in Murrindindi Shire.

"The Eildon Key Worker Housing Project is a practical response to a real and pressing issue. By investing in housing for the people who keep our communities running, we're ensuring Eildon and the broader Murrindindi Shire remain vibrant and continue to grow," Cr McAulay said.

This project complements the recently completed Eildon Reserves Redevelopment, which has revitalised community recreation spaces and delivered new attractions including a splash park, skate park and upgraded public facilities. Income from key worker housing rentals and/or future sale of the dwellings will replenish council's contribution to the reserves redevelopment project, in line with the original intent for developing this land.

Council thanks the Victorian Government for its support and will continue to keep the community informed as this important project progresses.

AusNet strike teams restoring power for bushfire-affected properties

AUSNET is prioritising power restoration for homes and businesses in the Walwa and Longwood bushfire-affected regions, with strike teams currently on site. Their Bushfire Recovery Teams will continue to assess and restore power as quickly and safely as possible. This will involve rebuilding the network in areas that are severely impacted.

Longwood region

AusNet have been conducting aerial inspections of the network in this area via helicopters and continue to work with emergency authorities. They identified around 140 poles and other electricity infrastructure that need to be replaced.

They hope to be able to complete all assessments and provide updates to customers,

including any estimated restoration times, by the end of the weekend.

They acknowledge that this is a difficult time for many communities and understand the importance of knowing when power will be restored. Teams are working hard so that people can plan their return to their communities.

AusNet's Emergency Management Mobile Assistance Vehicles (EMMAs) will be located in bushfire-affected community areas to provide information and support, help people charge their devices and to access the internet to check in with family and friends. Specific locations and times will be updated on their Facebook page.

Prolonged power outage payment

The Victorian and Federal Governments are providing financial relief to households impacted by the January 2026 bushfires and heatwave.

Subject to specific eligibility criteria, residential customers without power for seven cumulative days January 7, 2026 will be eligible for \$2380 per week for up to three weeks.

AusNet will directly contact all customers who are eligible for this Prolonged Power Outage Payment, inviting them to apply.

Assistance and further information

AusNet's Bushfire Support line is open 8am to 8pm seven days a week on 1300 561 171 for questions about recovery, support and re-establishing electricity connections. Customers can continue to report any faults to 13 17 99. They ask that people stay clear of any damaged infrastructure or powerlines for their own safety.

Beware of scams and fraud in emergency situations

PEOPLE are advised to remaining vigilant and be extra cautious regarding unexpected calls or messages claiming to be from well-known organisations including banks, telecommunications companies and government agencies. You should never respond to links in text messages directing you to sites that ask for passwords, and you should never click on any of these you receive.

If customers receive an unexpected call, ask for their organisation name and their name, then hang up. Look up the number of the organisation and call them back. If the call is legitimate, you'll be able to resume the conversation.

Yea Community House operating as support hub

THE Yea Community House is currently operating as a Community Support Hub, acting as a drop-off and transfer point for essential supplies requested by neighbouring communities that are inaccessible.

As a result, all group activities are temporarily suspended. This decision was not made lightly by the house, and they appreciate the patience and understanding of the community.

The two community house buildings, the lounge and Pioneer Reserve, are still in use as a Community Support Hub. The house has received an overwhelming amount of donations from the community, and require time to sort, organise and distribute them to those in need.

They are providing daily updates on their Facebook page, informing the community of what donation items are required, what their opening hours are, whether they are at donation capacity or not, and various other essential details.

Farmers: register for support

RURAL Aid is issuing an urgent call for all Victorian farmers to register for assistance as bushfires continue to burn across the state, already causing widespread damage to farmland, major stock losses, and destruction of critical agricultural infrastructure.

With fires impacting multiple regions and conditions remaining volatile, producers are facing escalating threats to livestock, crops, fencing, sheds, machinery, water supplies, and their livelihoods.

Rural Aid is urging every primary producer impacted by the fires to register now, so assistance can be mobilised without delay as the emergency unfolds.

Rural Aid Chief Executive Officer John Warlters said the fires are already inflicting serious damage and the full impact is still emerging.

"We saw fires tear through productive farmland, destroy fencing and sheds, and leave farmers facing heartbreaking stock losses," Mr Warlters said.

"These aren't isolated incidents. Large parts of the state were being impacted, and many producers are under immediate and extreme pressure."

Mr Warlters said registering with Rural Aid is one of the most important steps farmers can take right now.

"Registering now means that we can respond with financial assistance, hay, water and counselling support."

Rural Aid provides support to registered farmers at no cost, including:

Financial assistance for urgent and unexpected expenses

Professional counselling and wellbeing support for farmers and their families

Emergency hay deliveries to support livestock

Water deliveries for drinking and household needs

Volunteer assistance through the Farm Army program for response and recovery

Advice from Warren Davies, The Unbreakable Farmer

AFTER the first few days of a disaster, things get quieter and often harder.

This is when tiredness hits. This is when emotions show up. This is when people wonder why they're not 'back to normal'.

If that's you please know this: What you're feeling is common. It doesn't mean you're weak.

Focus on:

one small step at a time

food, water, rest

talking to one safe person

accepting help

Recovery isn't tidy. And you don't have to rush it.

Mental health support available

LOOKING after your mental health is just as important as looking after your farm, your family, and yourself. It is understood that many farmers have concerns that seeking mental health support could put their firearms licence at risk. Getting support early does not mean you automatically lose your licence.

It is normal to have strong emotional or physical reactions following a distressing event.

Health professionals are here to work with you to help manage stress, anxiety, sleep difficulties, or low mood, and to put sensible plans in place if needed. There's no judgment, just support. You don't have to do this alone.

It is also important to look out for changes or signs that someone's mental health might be changing, as they may not notice themselves.

Yea Community Health can be contacted on 5736 0448, and you can self-refer or ask your GP for a referral.

Murrindindi Shire Council are offering that you can drop into one of their libraries or customer service centres for a quiet space, a conversation, or simply to be around others.

Kinglake SES receives replacement rescue vehicle under VESEP

THE Kinglake SES is celebrating the arrival of a replacement rescue vehicle, funded through the Victorian Government's Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP).

Member for Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes announced the 4WD Ute has been delivered, which will serve as an OPS support vehicle, ensuring volunteers have the equipment they need to assist the community. This vehicle was funded through the 2024-25 round of VESEP grant program, Kinglake SES received \$97,000.

VESEP is an annual grant program that supports Victorian emergency services

volunteer groups to purchase essential equipment or upgrade facilities so they can continue their vital work protecting communities. Funding can be used to purchase equipment such as tankers, trucks, utility vehicles, generators and pumps, as well as refurbishments or upgrades to facilities.

This year's VESEP grants deliver more than \$30 million in funding, the largest ever, including almost \$20 million for more than 40 vehicles, more than \$5 million for facility upgrades and more than \$1 million for operational equipment across CFA, VICSES, Life Saving Victoria, Volunteer

Marine Search and Rescue and other volunteer emergency service organisations.

Thanks to the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund, VESEP funding has been doubled over the next four years with an additional \$62 million invested to support volunteers. Every dollar raised through the fund goes directly to emergency and disaster recovery services.

Over the past decade, the state government has invested more than \$168 million in VESEP grants, ensuring volunteers have the resources they need to protect Victorians. A full list of this year's VESEP grants is available at emv.vic.gov.au/vesep

Member for Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes said, "The volunteers of the Kinglake SES are always there when the community needs them, which is why it's so important that they have the equipment that they need to keep the community safe."

Minister for Emergency Services Vicki Ward said, "With more funding on offer than ever before, almost double, we're showing our determination to support our hardworking emergency services volunteers."

One billion in Australian beef exports at risk due to trade restrictions

THE Australian beef industry stands to potentially lose A\$1 billion in exports following the Chinese Ministry of Commerce's (MOFCOM) announcement it will implement global safeguard measures recently.

Cattle Australia Chair, Garry Edwards, said the decision, which comes after a year-long investigation by MOFCOM which was initiated on December 27, 2024 and concluded on 30 December 2025, would unfairly disadvantage Australian beef producers.

"Australia has a long-standing relationship with China as a trusted source of high-quality and safe beef, and we are deeply disappointed by this decision. A decision we believe to be entirely unwarranted and at odds with the sentiment of the Free Trade Agreement we share," Mr Edwards said.

"Throughout the review process, Australian representatives engaged extensively with Chinese officials, both here and in China, to demonstrate the value of the trade we share and provided formal evidence our imports do not injure the local Chinese beef

industry. We strongly believe this decision will erode the access of Chinese consumers to a reliable source of high-quality, safely produced protein.

"Cattle Australia is highly supportive of 'global free trade' with countries, underpinned by minimum equivalent biosecurity and food security standards. We are proud of the trade relationship we have held with China for many years and the abundance of benefits this has brought to both nations, including supporting the Chinese beef industry in growing its own long-term prosperity by providing high quality breeding livestock and superior genetics."

China is a long-term and important market for Australian beef and the new 'safeguard' measures proposed by China at two thirds of the past 12 months (A\$3.3 billion volume) effectively means that this will impact the equivalent of more than \$1 billion in trade.

It is important to note this announcement does not single out Australia and is applicable to all nations, meaning countries including

Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, the United States and New Zealand will also have trade impacted, but it also does not specifically target those countries which have massively altered volumes to the China market.

"The safeguard measures are particularly disappointing for our industry given Australia accounts for only eight per cent of China's beef imports, while other countries have massively increased the volume they supply at lower prices. For example, South America makes up almost 80 per cent of China's overall import volume and this volume has the most direct market correlation to the beef produced domestically in China," Mr Edwards said.

Australian representatives, including Cattle Australia, will now seek further details on the specifics of the safeguard measures and continue to engage with MOFCOM to understand the final decision and find long-term, mutually beneficial outcomes.

"While China is within its rights to impose safeguard measures under certain circumstances, we need more detailed information and discussions to understand why this decision has been made," Mr Edwards said.

"We will continue to work closely with Australian and Chinese representatives to encourage them to take a longer-term view and determine how we can continue to work together for the benefit of each nation's beef industry and Chinese consumers."

Livestock burials

AS bushfires and the provision of safe road access into properties continues to affect regional communities and farmers across Victoria, many landholders are faced with the challenge of managing dead livestock.

Landowners are now advised that the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) does not have specific timelines on the burial of dead livestock due to bushfires.

EPA's advice is that farmers and landowners need to follow the direction of emergency services and not enter their properties until safe to do so. It is acknowledged that access to some areas may be limited for some time, which will delay the appropriate disposal of livestock.

EPA is available to support and advise landowners with the clean up of their property. Please contact the EPA hotline on 1300 372 842.

Yea Saleyards report from January 7

THE first cattle sale for the year at the Yea Saleyards took place on Wednesday, January 7, just prior to the outbreak of the Longwood bushfire. This was the Victorian Livestock and Property (VLP) Inaugural Weaner Sale.

The further sales scheduled for January at the Yea Saleyards were cancelled due to the emergency.

There were 3625 head of cattle yarded, fetching an average price of \$1663 per head with an average weight of 319 kilograms per head. Calculated, the average sale price was 521c/kg.

In the steer category, the top price per head was \$2360, with a top weight of 429.8 kilograms, equalling out to 549c/kg.

The top price per head for heifers was lower, at \$1900 and top weight of 373.6 kilograms, making for 509c/kg.

If nothing changes, the next upcoming sale at the Yea Saleyards will be a combined agents store sale on February 6. Keep an eye on the Yea Saleyards website for details, at yeasaleyards.com.au

Cracking down on illegal dumping

THE Victorian Government is taking action against illegal dumping in northern Victoria, cleaning up our parks and reserves and ensuring those who trash the environment are held to account.

Member for northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes announced applications are opening for the \$8.5 million Illegal Dumping Clean-up Rebate Program, providing extra financial support for councils and public land managers to clean up illegally dumped waste.

Illegal dumping is a big issue for public land managers across northern Victoria. They said they have listened to councils and land managers about the challenges and costs of dealing with illegal dumping.

The Illegal Dumping Clean-up Rebate Program will help public land managers in northern Victoria, such as councils and Crown land Committees of Management, to clean up priority waste. The program will cover up to 50 per cent of the clean-up costs in situations where all avenues to trace the perpetrator and recover costs have been exhausted or are not feasible.

This rebate program will be facilitated by DEECA and is part of the Government's \$21.5 million crackdown on illegal dumping.

To catch more people flouting the law and hold them to account, \$13 million will help the Illegal Dumping Taskforce ramp up surveillance, enforcement and clean-up efforts across Victoria.

The taskforce will be led by the EPA, who will work with Conservation Regulator and undertake enforcement activities using expanded intelligence and monitoring to detect and respond to waste crimes in key locations.

All Victorians have a part to play in preventing waste dumping. To report illegal dumping contact the EPA on 1300 372 842.
